

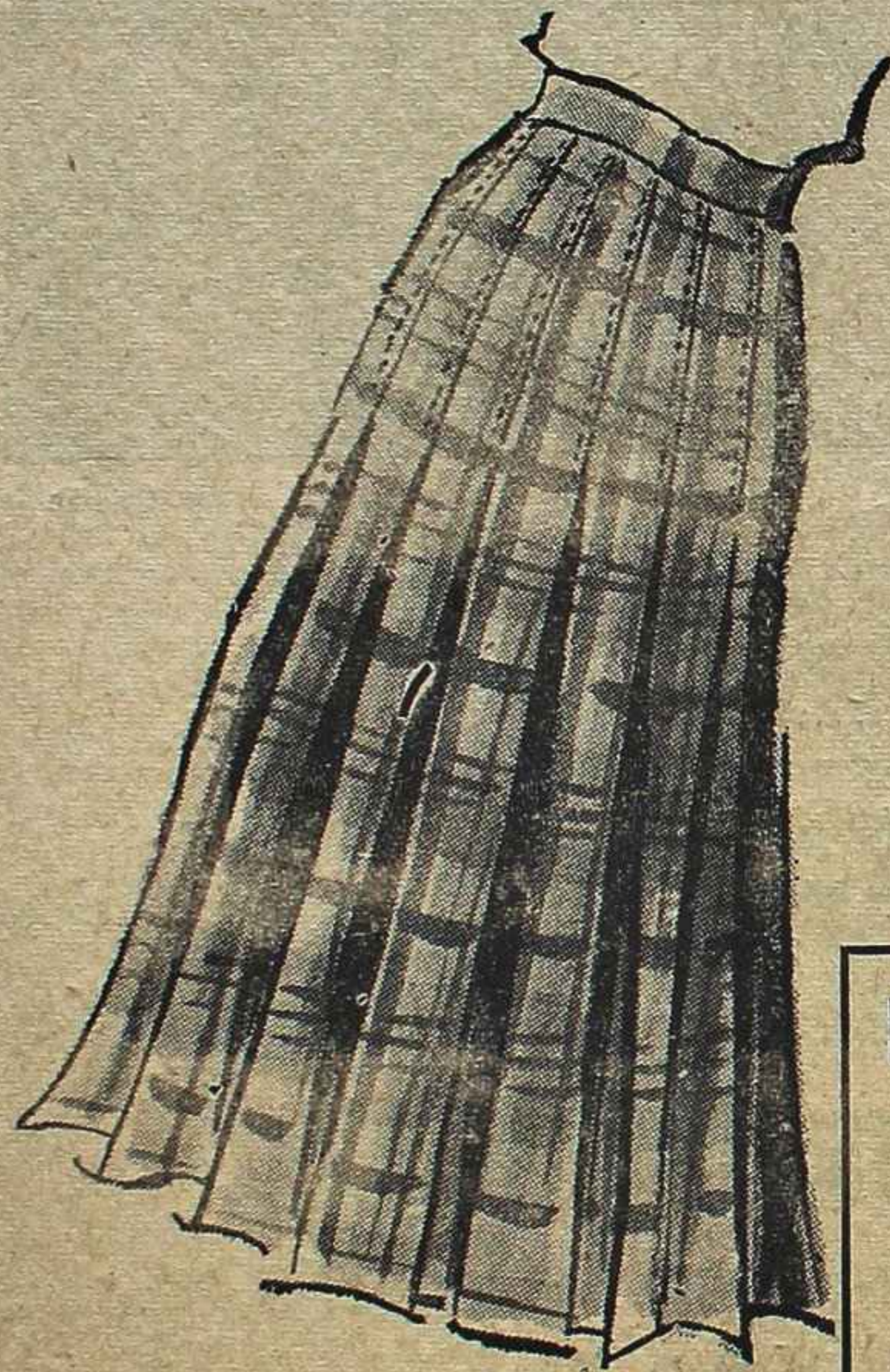

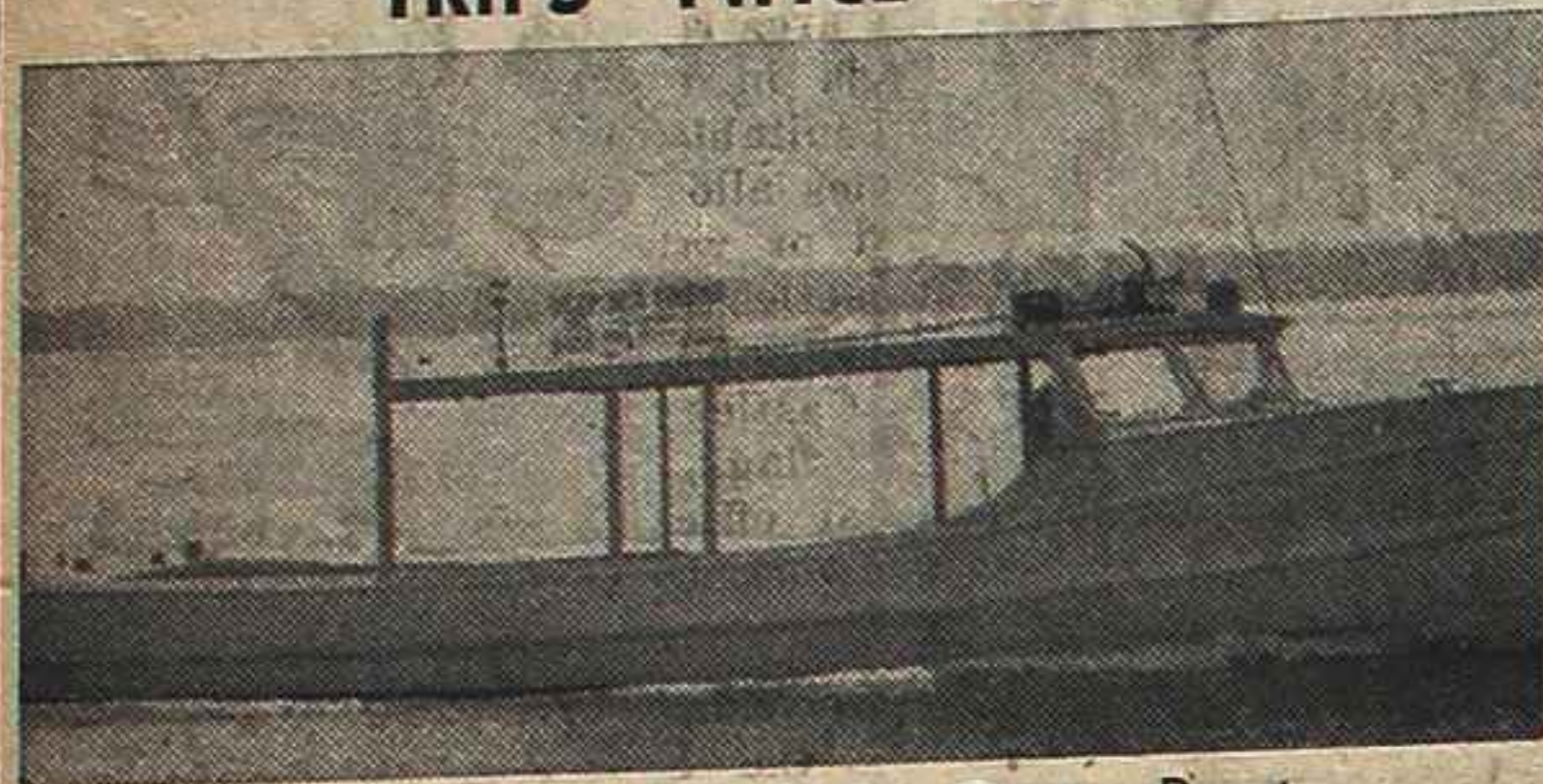

New Boardwalk Construction At Beach Slated This Fall

Close to 1,000 yards of boardwalk at Hampton Beach will be replaced this fall or next spring by a new concrete walk, provided the state budget is passed with no changes in the boardwalk provision.

State legislators are expected to agree on final approval of the budget this week or early next week.

The measure, introduced by Gov. Powell in the original administration budget last April, calls for \$42,000 for the construction of a "board" walk of reinforced concrete 14 feet wide, the exact dimensions of the present boardwalk. The measure was approved by the joint Senate Finance and House Appropriations committee and submitted as part of the controversial general budget.

Robert Sullivan of the state Recreation division said his department would proceed with contract arrangements as soon as the budget is passed, so

that construction may begin before cold weather sets in. Other beach projects to be completed in the next few years are the rebuilding of Ashworth avenue, completion of the new marsh road to Hampton center, and further development of plans for a new band shell on the beach front.

Sand Castle Contest Features Children's Day

The sand castle contest to be held this morning at 10:30 will be the main feature of the annual Hampton Beach Children's Day. Many activities scheduled for today will provide entertainment for all the children on the beach.

Miss Sarah Cutts of North Hampton, one of the originators of the sand castle contest last year, will be in charge of the contest again this year and also serve as a judge. Miss Cutts worked at the Chamber of Commerce last summer and recently returned from France where she has been a counselor in a children's camp.

The sand castle contest, originated last season by Miss Cutts and Edward Jewell of the beachcomber staff, Exeter, is believed to be the first and only such event in the country. Special films for television will be taken during the construction and judging at noon.

Also serving as judges will be Joyce Mansur of 46 Dearborn avenue, Hampton, a well known local artist who recently won honors in a Portsmouth art show, and David Snyder, reporter for the Beachcomber.

All children between the ages of one and twelve are eligible to build castles in the sand near the boardwalk, beginning at 10:30. Castles must be ready for judging by 11:30. The Hampton Beach fire department

will wet down the sand in a large area roped off by the lifeguards in order to make the sand suitable for building.

Rules allow the use of cardboard or wood for support in the castles, but use of adhesives to hold sand in place is forbidden. Castles may be decorated with flags, small toys, etc., contest officials said. Children may work in teams of two or three.

Afternoon features will include the Kiddies' Parade at 2 p.m. with prizes for the children with the best decorated rolling toys; a special show called an Indian Pow Wow at 2:30 on the bandstand; the coronation of the Junior King and Queen at 3:30; the annual baby show at 4; and music by Broadway singing star, eight-year-old Paul O'Keefe, at 7 p.m.

The commissioners of the Hampton Beach precinct will have a special treat for all children at the playground during the day.

Bay State Trumpeters Cop Talent Finals

A trumpet trio from Medford, Mass., won recognition Monday night as the top performers to appear in the weekly Hampton Beach talent parades held each Wednesday during the summer season.

The trumpeters won first place when they first appeared in a talent show August 17 to become eligible for the finals, in which the first place winners for each week compete with

each other for a large trophy and cash prizes.

The trio consists of Thomas Gannon, John Consolmagno, and Michael Leavitt. They were accompanied on the piano by Brooks Wheeler, and their "manager", Harry Steele, turned pages. All are from Medford. The trumpeters are students of Dyson Kring, conductor of the Hampton Beach concert band. Their rendition of "Bug-

ler's Holiday" with excellent execution of triple-tonguing passages won repeated rounds of applause from the large audience which turned out in spite of earlier showers.

13-YR-OLD SINGER WINS
A 13-year-old singer of Naugatuck, Conn., won first place in the junior finals for her rendition of a female parody on "Sixteen Tons." Miss Karen Cullen bemoaned the woes of a woman who "owes her soul to the man she wed." Miss Cullen competed with eight other previous winners for the junior trophy.

Cash prizes were awarded to the second and third place winners, six-year-old Terri Murphy of Jamaica Plain, Mass., and a team of Irish figure dancers

consisting of Mary Downing, 9, Edmund Daly, 13, and Ann Marie Doherty, 13, of Somerville, Mass. They danced the Three Hand Reel and the Hornpipe to the accordion accompaniment provided by Tommy Sheridan.

Second and third place in the senior division was won by Ann Marie Leger, 14, of West Newton, Mass., a master baton twirler who performs with a flaming baton, and Johnny Kotseos, 19, of Concord, who sang "The Wonder of You." There were only seven contestants in the senior division since one of the weekly winners, a pianist from Montreal, was unable to return for the finals, and one of the senior shows was called off due to poor weather.

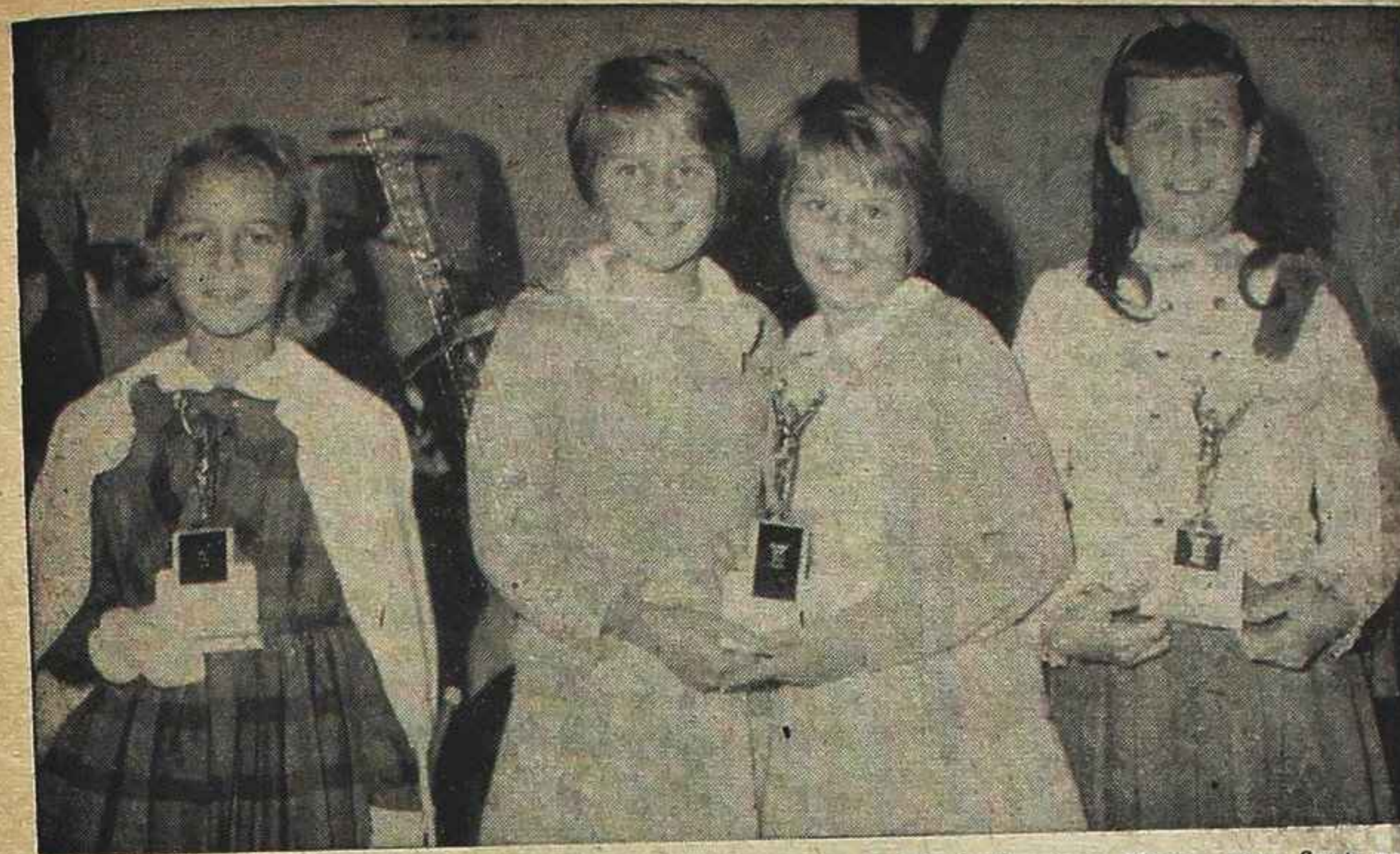

Two Boats Recovered Beach Employment
By Coast Guard Duck Office Closes Today

The Coast Guard duck from the Hampton Beach station recovered a 12-foot outboard motorboat Sunday after the craft, owned by Stewart Fanning of North Shore boulevard, broke loose from its mooring in Plaice Cove.

A converted landing craft, known as "Ye Olde Bucket," was reported missing from Portsmouth Harbor Sunday and was located by Hampton Coast Guardsmen safely moored in Seabrook.

The New Hampshire Department of Employment Security will close the branch office at Hampton Beach for the summer season at the close of business Thursday, September 3, it was announced today by Francis P. Tucker, manager of the Portsmouth office.

Fog Forces Seaplane

Landing Off Beach

Dense fog forced a single-engine seaplane to land off Hampton Beach Saturday. Its two passengers were uninjured and the plane was escorted into Hampton Harbor until visibility improved.

Police Capt. Lloyd C. Ring said the sound of the low-flying plane was heard by Daniel Stone, chief life guard, who with guards David Stone, Henry Stone, and Robert Landry, located the craft about 500 yards from the mouth of the Hampton River and towed it with the amphibious duck to the state pier in the harbor.

The pilot of the two-seater Cessna 120 was Thurber Savery, 40, of Stamford, Conn., who had his 12-year-old son as a passenger. Thurber told police he took off from Lake Winnepesaukee earlier Saturday with fair conditions prevailing, but ran into heavy fog over the ocean. Visibility was close to zero when he landed off Hampton Beach, thinking he was off Cape Ann, Mass.

The lifeguards notified the Coast Guard which also escorted the seaplane to harbor, where Savery and his son left the plane over night. They returned to Stamford Sunday.

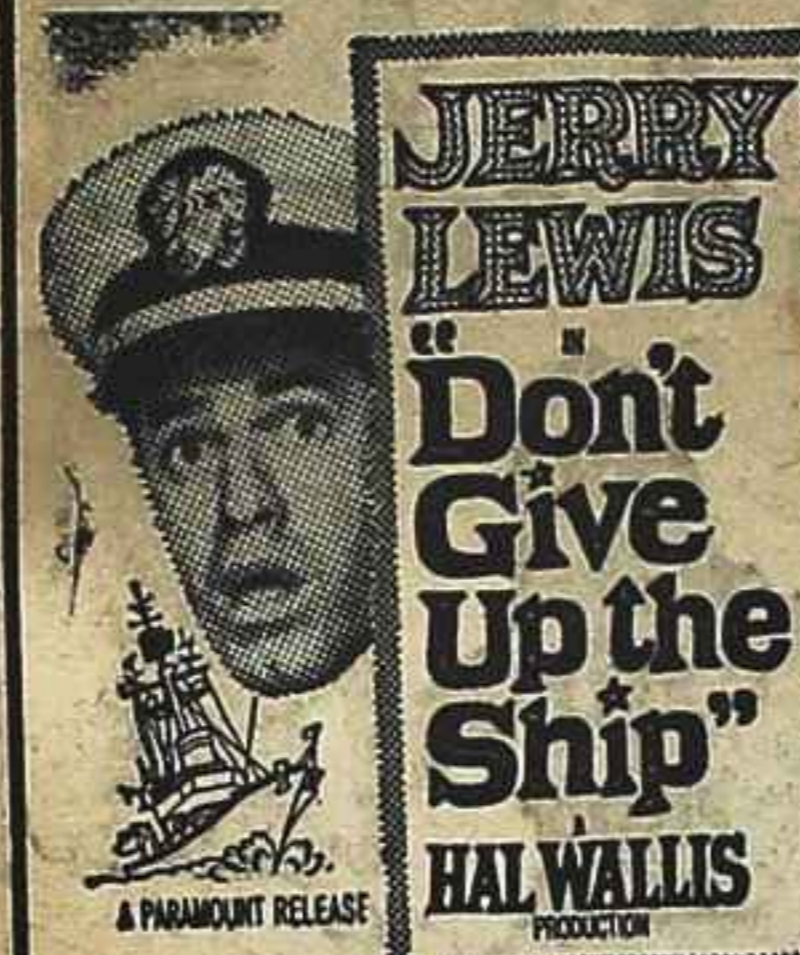

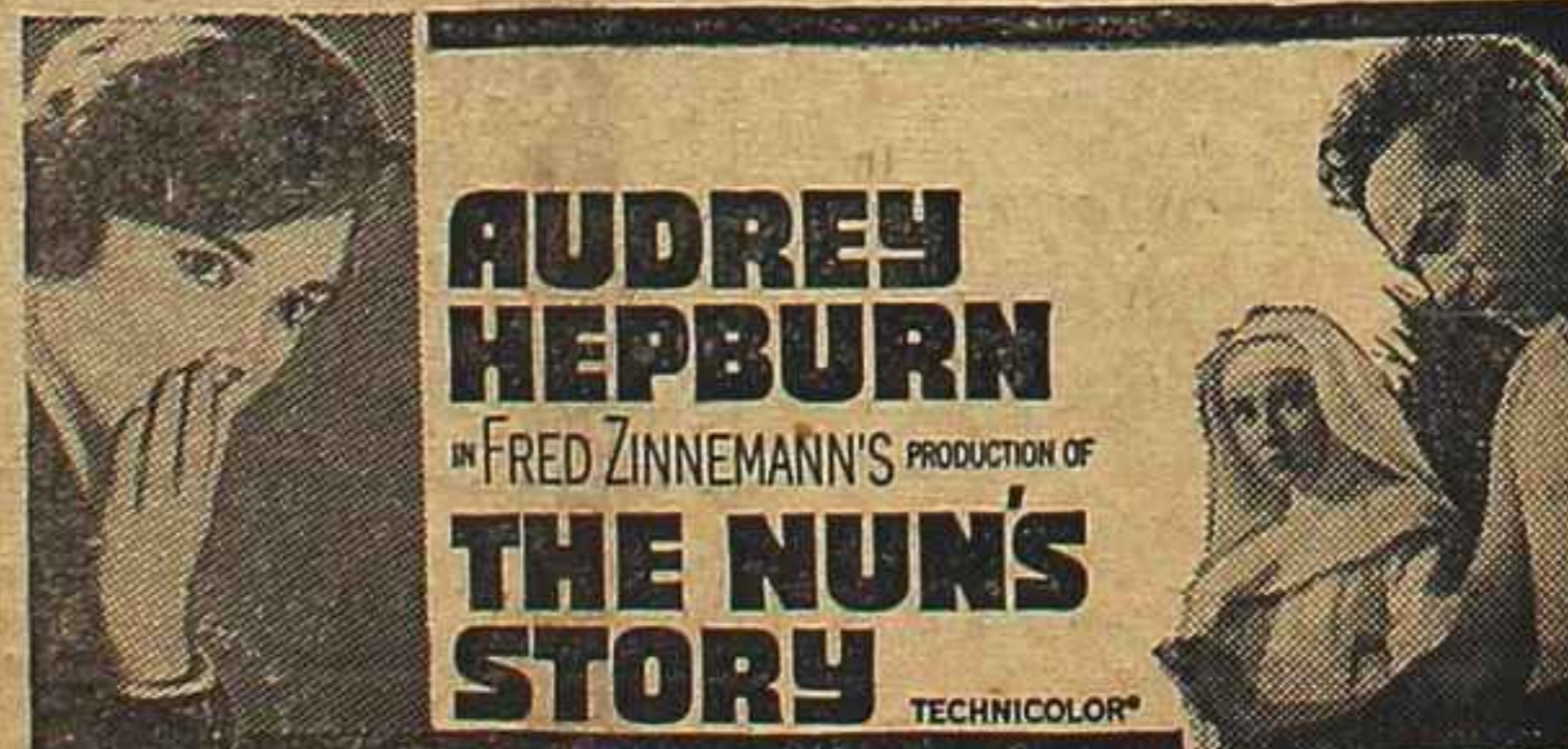

Sunset over Hampton Harbor seemed a fitting cover picture for the sunset issue of the 1959 series of Beachcombers.

Hampton Harbor, actually the mouth of the Hampton River, is home port the year round for two dozen or more fishing boats, and in the summer provides mooring space for many pleasure craft as well.

Except for the new bridge built across the river in 1949, Hampton Harbor looks the same as it always has, but in the near future many changes will be noticed. A large marina is now under construction on the harbor, just to the right of the portion shown in the picture. The marina will undoubtedly attract scores of pleasure boat operators to make Hampton their home port and increase activity around the harbor.

The picture, taken at low tide, shows the wide sandy beach around the harbor, and to the right, the state pier. Persons are often seen stopping by the harbor in the evening to watch the red sun set across the marshes and reflect its glow from the water.

The Hampton Beach lifeguards proved their swimming prowess last Saturday morning by defeating the Salisbury guards in a 2½-mile race held at Hampton Beach.

The team picked to represent the Hampton Beach guards consisted of the three Stone brothers, Dave, Henry, and Dan, of Manchester, who defeated the three-man Salisbury team 7½ to 3½ points. Dave Stone was the winner, completing the run from the police station to the river mouth to the Marine Memorial to the police station in 58 minutes.

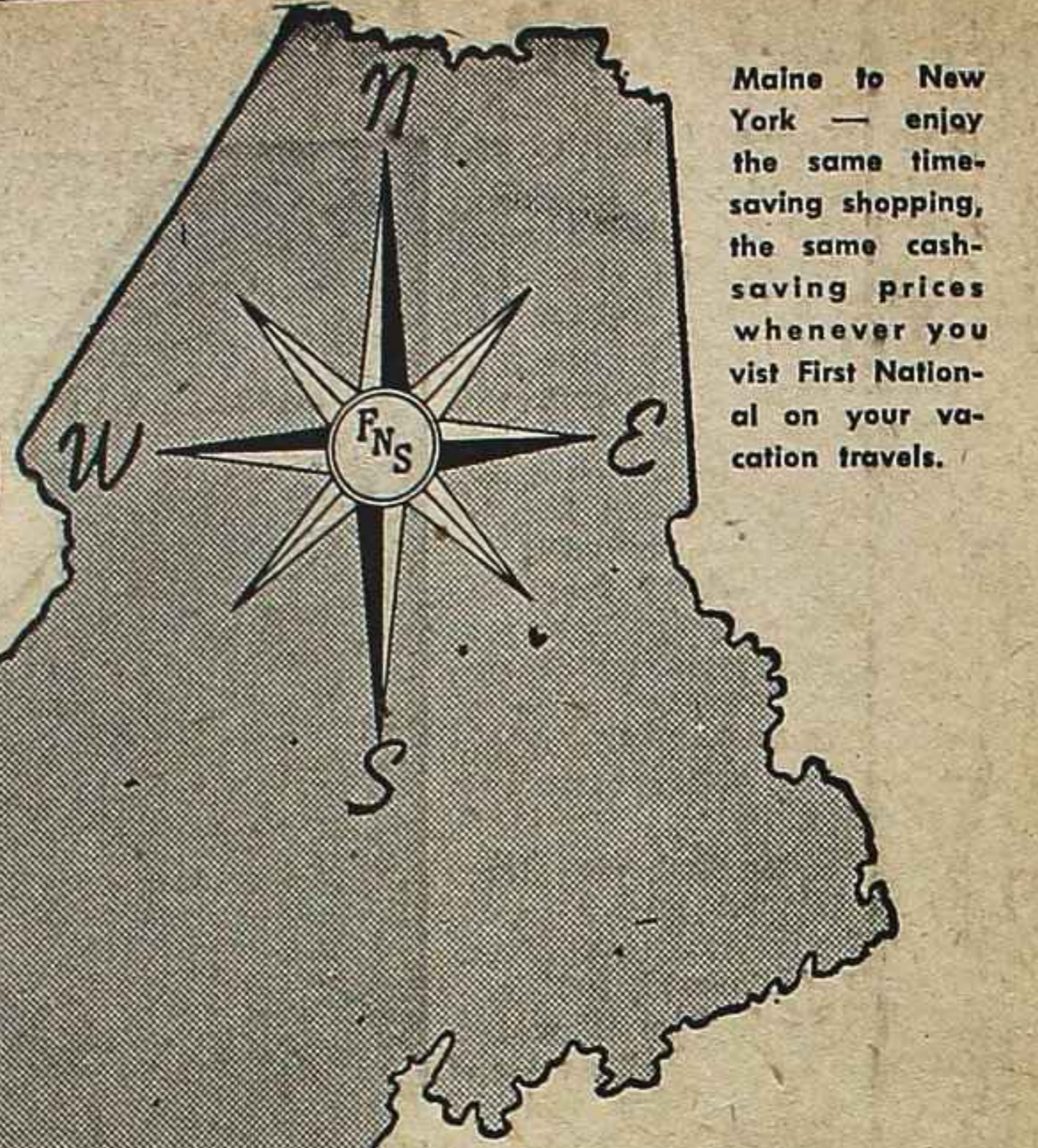

**Beach State Park
Income Reported Up**

A summer season that may surpass previous income records will come to an end Labor Day, Sept. 7, in five New Hampshire state parks. Twenty others and three historic sites remain open until late September and October for fall foliage visitors.

Closing next Monday are Forest Lake in Dalton, Hampton Beach in Hampton, Rhododendron in Fitzwilliam, Wadleigh in North Sutton, and Ellacoya in Gilford. Also closing Monday are Clough's State Park in East Weare and Wallis Sands State Beach in Rye, neither of which have service charges.

The latest available figures released today by the New Hampshire Recreation Division show that income, compared to last year, at four of the closing parks was as follows: Hampton Beach, up 19 percent from 1958; Forest Lake, up 11 percent; Rhododendron and Wadleigh, both up 23 percent. Ellacoya has no basis for comparison since it opened for the first time last July 4 as the newest unit in the state park system.

Beaches will close for the season Labor Day, but other facilities will remain open at the following parks: Bear Brook in Allenstown, Echo Lake in North Conway, Franconia Notch, Moose Brook in Gorham, Mt. Sunapee in Newbury (reopens for the weekend of Sept. 12 only); Wellington in Bristol, Wentworth in Wolfeboro and White Lake in Tamworth.

Silver Lake in Hollis and at Kingston State Park in Kingston but both are open for picnicking until October 12.

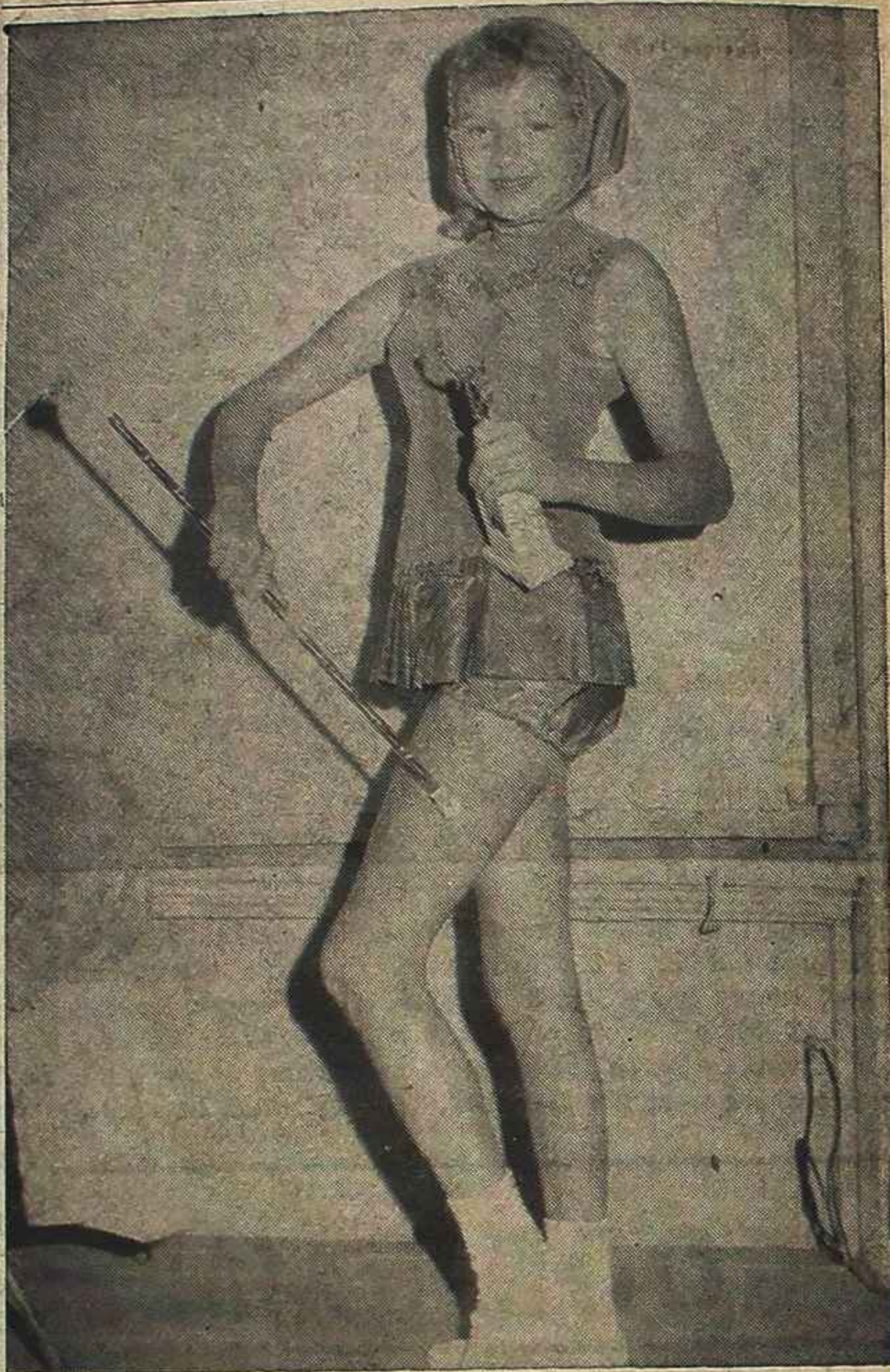

With less than a week remaining in the official Old Salts season, which closes Labor Day, 96 persons have been

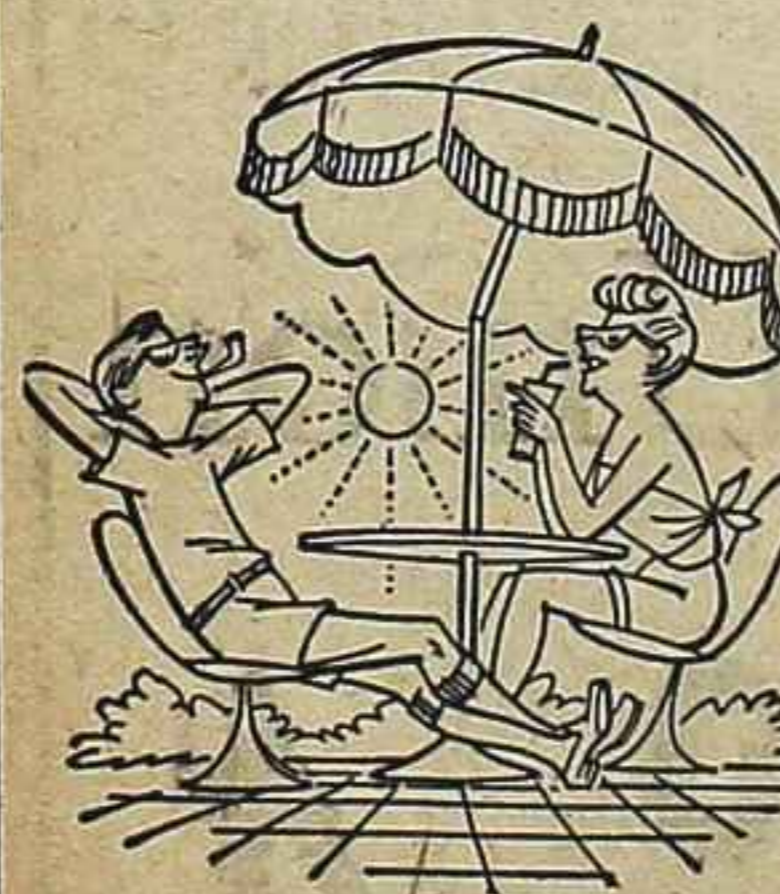
initiated into the select club this summer. The total will undoubtedly go over 100 for a new record before the season closes.

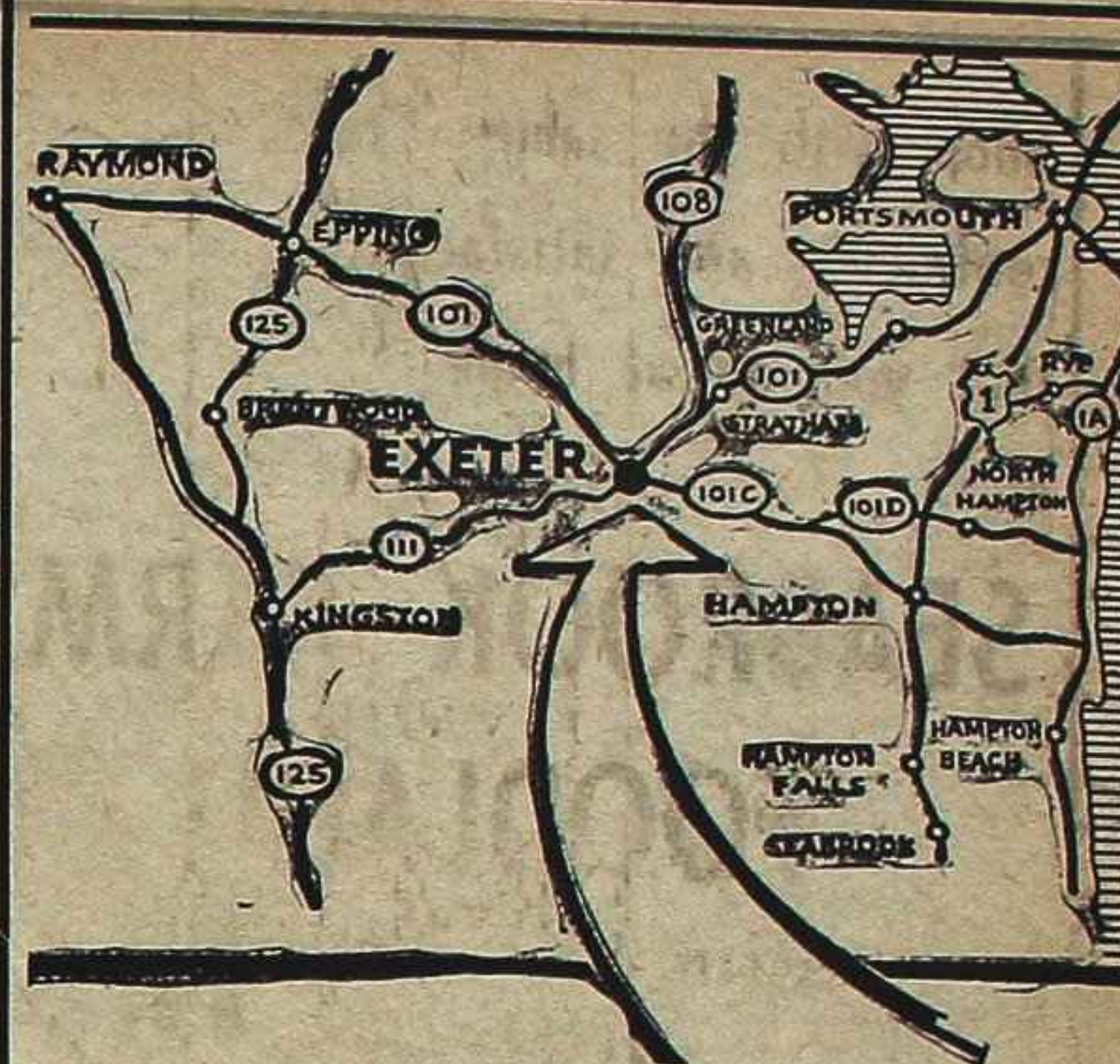

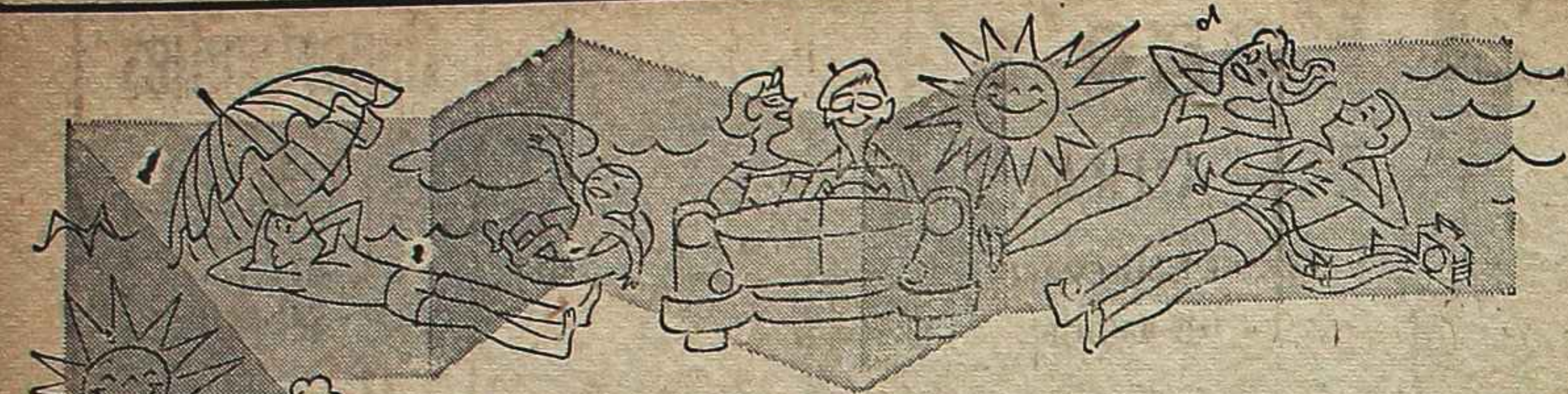
