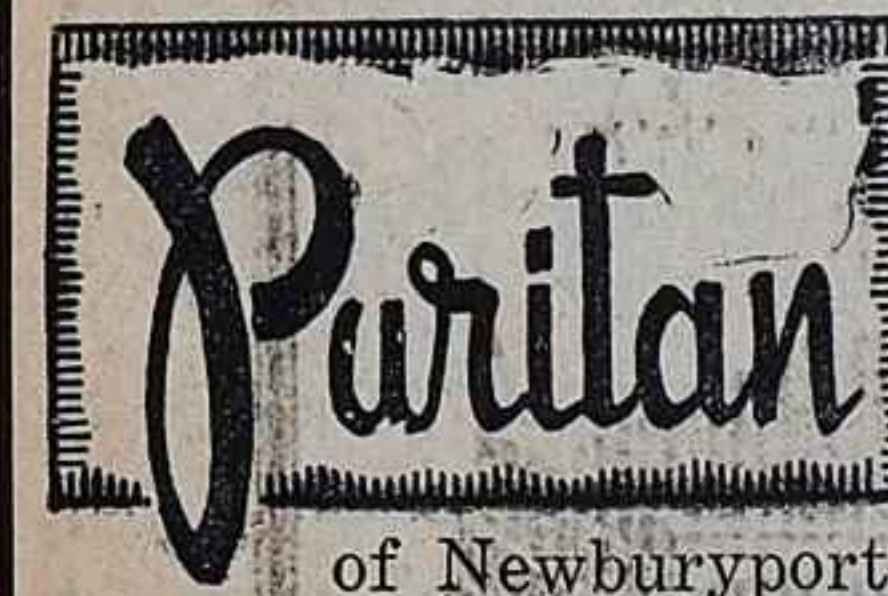

Beauty Contests, Talent Shows Highlight Beach Summer Program

A full schedule of events for the vacation season this year has been coordinated by the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce.

The first big weekend, Boat Safety Days, is already past, but even bigger events are in store for everyone as the season progresses.

Regular band concerts begin Friday and will continue through Labor Day. Four concerts each day from the bandstand, seven days a week will be presented by a group of professional musicians directed by Bandmaster Dyson Kring. The hour-long concerts begin each day at 2, 4, 7, and 8:30 p.m.

Seven fireworks displays have been scheduled for the season, the first of which will be Saturday night in celebration of

the Fourth of July. The fireworks will be set off on the main beach, opposite the Casino at 9 p.m. They will also be shown each Wednesday evening for the remainder of the season.

A feature which has become quite popular with Hampton Beach visitors in the past is again being conducted to further the physical education program for residents and guests alike. Each morning from July 5 to September 3 at 10:30 calisthenics on the sand will be directed by the "Coca-Cola Girl". The Chamber of Commerce maintains this physical fitness program, believing that vacations are intended to be healthful as well as restful.

For the seventh season, the Old Salts club will be inducting new members throughout the summer. This club honors fishermen who bring in the "big ones" from the waters of the Hampton area. Specifications for membership in this select club are available at the Chamber of Commerce office. Certificates of membership, felt sleeve patches, and billfold cards certifying that the carrier has hooked a fish worthy of permanent recognition are presented to qualified fishermen.

WEEKLY SPECIALS

Beginning next Monday night and continuing each Monday through the summer, a talent show will be held at the bandstand at 7 p.m. Any amateur performer may enter and each week a trophy will be awarded to the winners of both the junior and senior divisions. Weekly winners will compete in the finals August 22 for a cash award.

Another Monday night special is the "Get Acquainted

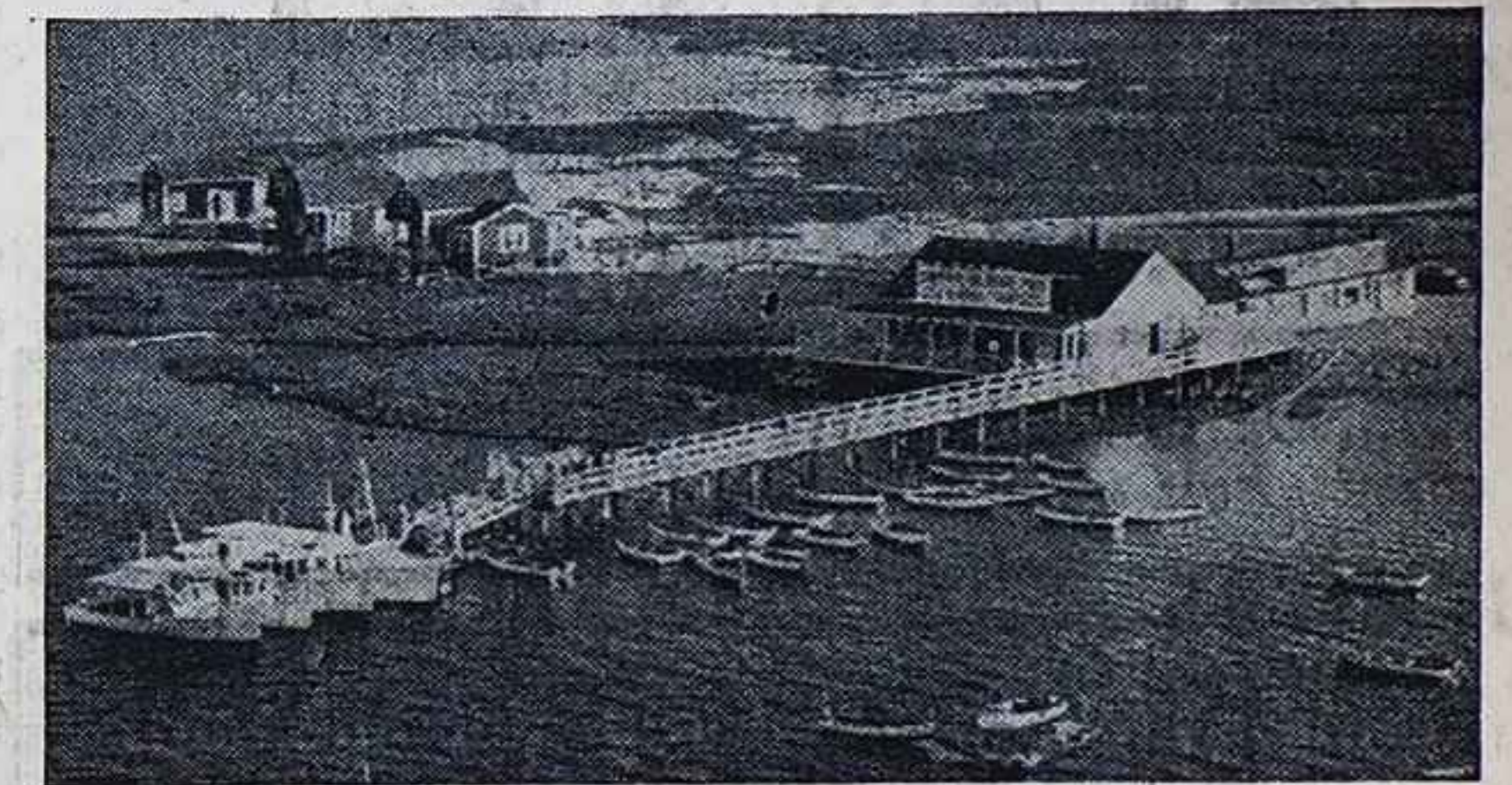

State Spending \$7 Million On Seacoast Projects

Between six and seven million dollars is being spent by the state of New Hampshire during the present biennium on projects which will be of direct benefit to Hampton Beach and the seacoast area, Governor Wesley Powell told more than 200 persons who attended the annual Hampton Beach Precinct - Chamber of Commerce banquet June 21 at the Ashworth hotel.

The Governor reviewed briefly more than 20 state projects already completed or underway in the coastal area and discussed projects elsewhere in the state that will contribute to the economy of this area.

Gov. Powell emphasized the importance of the proposed Route 101-C by-pass from Exeter to the beach and expressed hope that a location for the highway satisfactory to all could be worked out.

He termed the road of such importance that "it is my intention to ask the full Executive Council to attend the final public hearing on the proposal with me."

Normally a committee of three councilors conduct the public hearings on new highways for which both federal and state funds are to be used.

Speaking of the overall state highway program, Powell described it as the biggest in the history of the state. He pointed

out that with the decline in rail service, highways were the state's only hope for an expanded economy. He cited industrial firms that had located in New Hampshire since the new road building program was publicized, and he pointed to the benefits the recreation business will reap from the accelerated highway program.

Noted specifically was the improved arteries leading down from Quebec and the fact that 300 miles of roads will be resurfaced during 1960 in highway betterment projects apart from new construction.

The Governor publicly thanked Highway Commissioner John O. Morton, also a guest at the banquet, for his "forward look" regarding highways.

Local highway improvements mentioned by Powell included STATE

Two New Motels Pace Growth Of Beach Accommodations

Two new motels have opened at Hampton Beach this month for their first season, pacing the spring construction work which also included dozens of new cottages as well as extensive remodeling of many older hotels and motels.

The new motels are the Spindrift on North Shore boulevard and Brownie's motel on Ashworth avenue.

Owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Brown, Brownie's is a 12-unit colonial structure opposite P street on Ashworth avenue. The motel features spacious rooms, all with knotty pine panelling, each able to sleep four guests. The motel includes four units with kitchenettes.

In a future year the Brown's plan to enlarge their motel by building a second deck over the present building to double its capacity. The contractor for the building was Charles Hartman of Exeter.

The Brown family will make its home in the two-story center section of the motel.

The Spindrift, located at the

intersection of High street with the boulevard, can accommodate up to 200 guests, according to its owner, Kenneth W. Langley of Hampton.

This three-story resort motel will offer vacationists a fresh water swimming pool, a putting green and a snack bar on the

property. There are four two-room suites with kitchenettes, 18 rooms with double beds and 18 with twin beds.

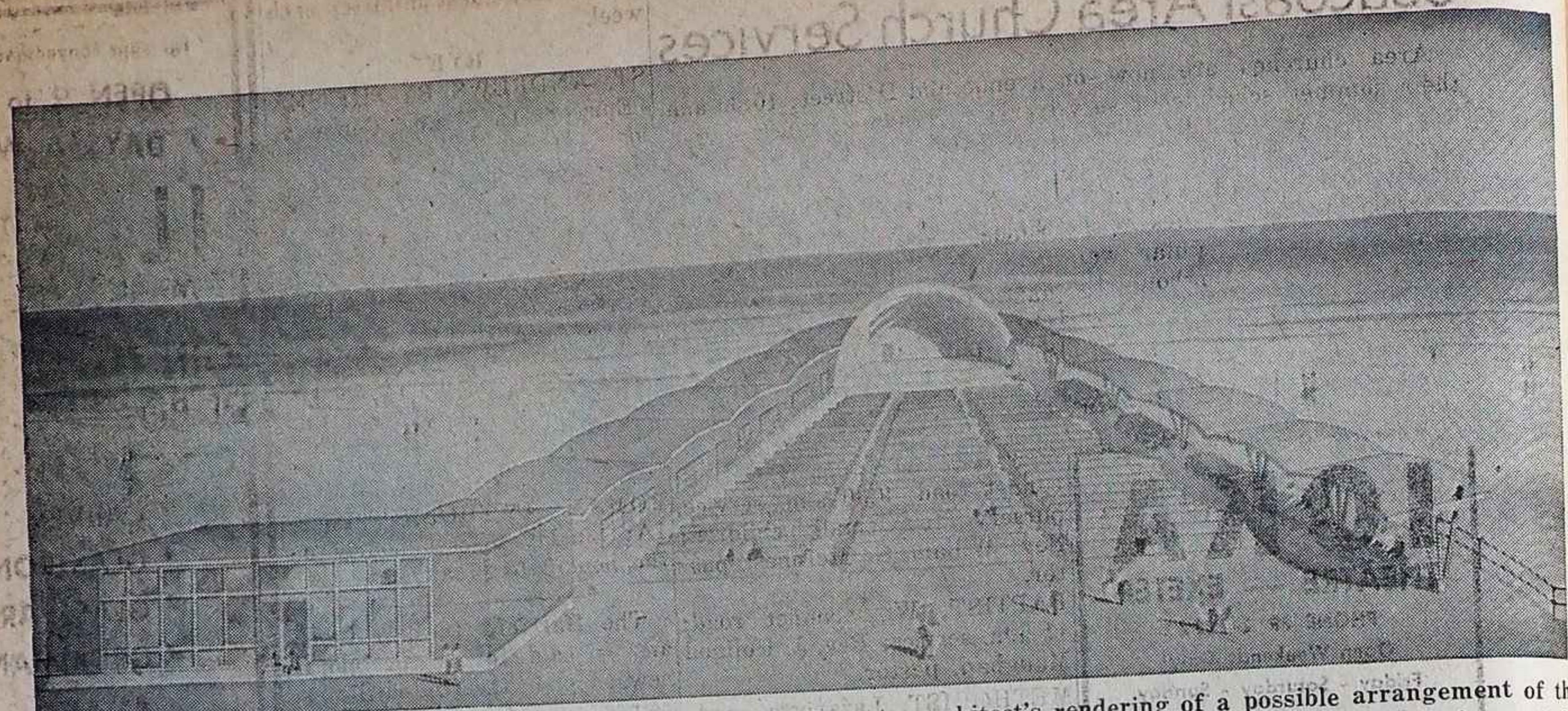

New Band Shell Proposed For Beach Front

A \$150,000 beach front facility, including a new band shell, police and information offices, is now in the planning stages for Hampton Beach and a possible completion date of July 4, 1962, has been predicted by Gov. Wesley Powell and officials of the state Forestry and Recreation department.

The proposed structure would replace the present police station, bandstand and Chamber of Commerce office with an attractive composite building, possibly on a pier over the beach.

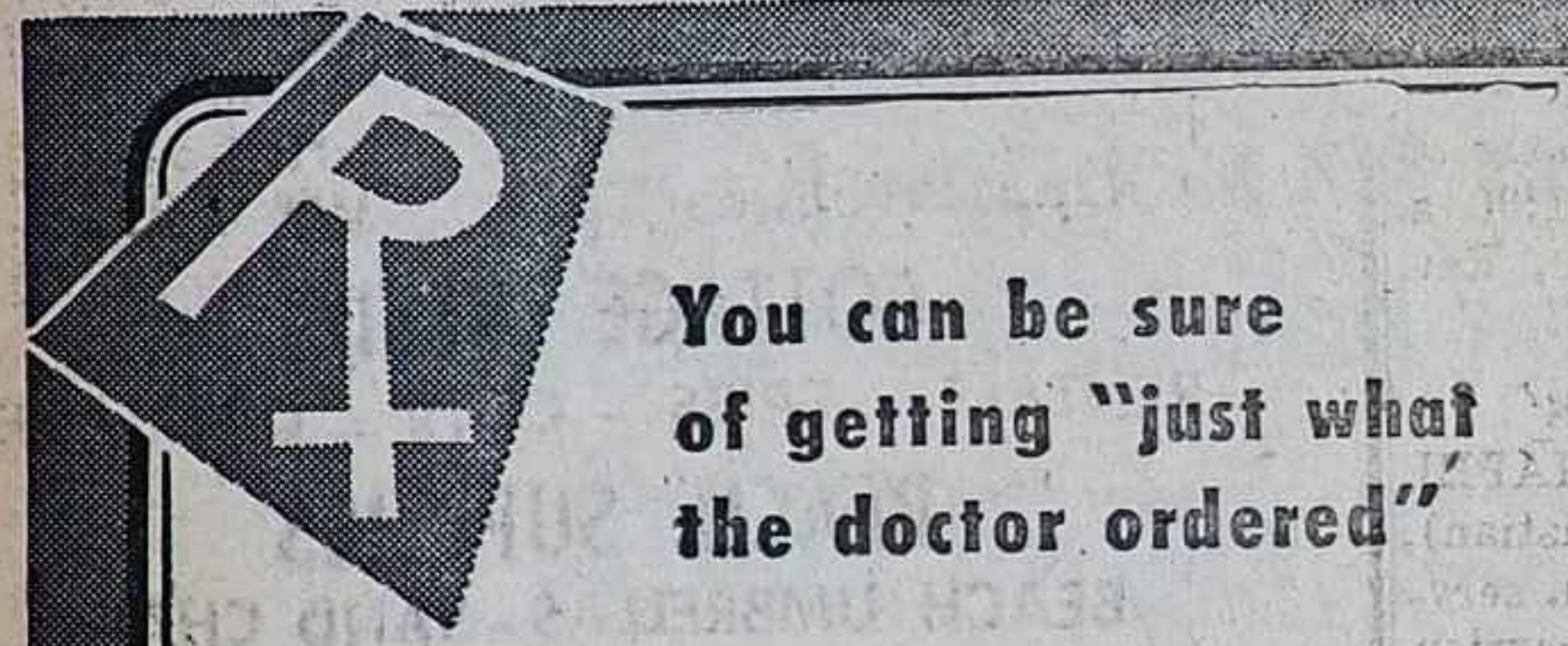
A \$7,177 planning loan from the federal government, granted last April, has spurred the study of the central beach front redevelopment, which has been long hoped for by beach officials.

The proposed structure would feature a music shell with band and dressing rooms in the wings, an open-air auditorium, public toilet facilities, life guard headquarters, first aid station, a Chamber of Commerce information office and a traffic control office.

An architect has been hired to study the possibilities for such a building. State Recreation Director Russell M. Tobey has expressed hope that the next session of the legislature

would act favorably on a bill to finance the actual construction. The town of Hampton will have to share the cost of the facility.

Long range plans for the beach front call for the elimination of all present buildings and parking on the beach between the Chamber of Commerce and Haverhill street. This area would be made into an attractive mall with trees and flowers lining walkways with park benches.

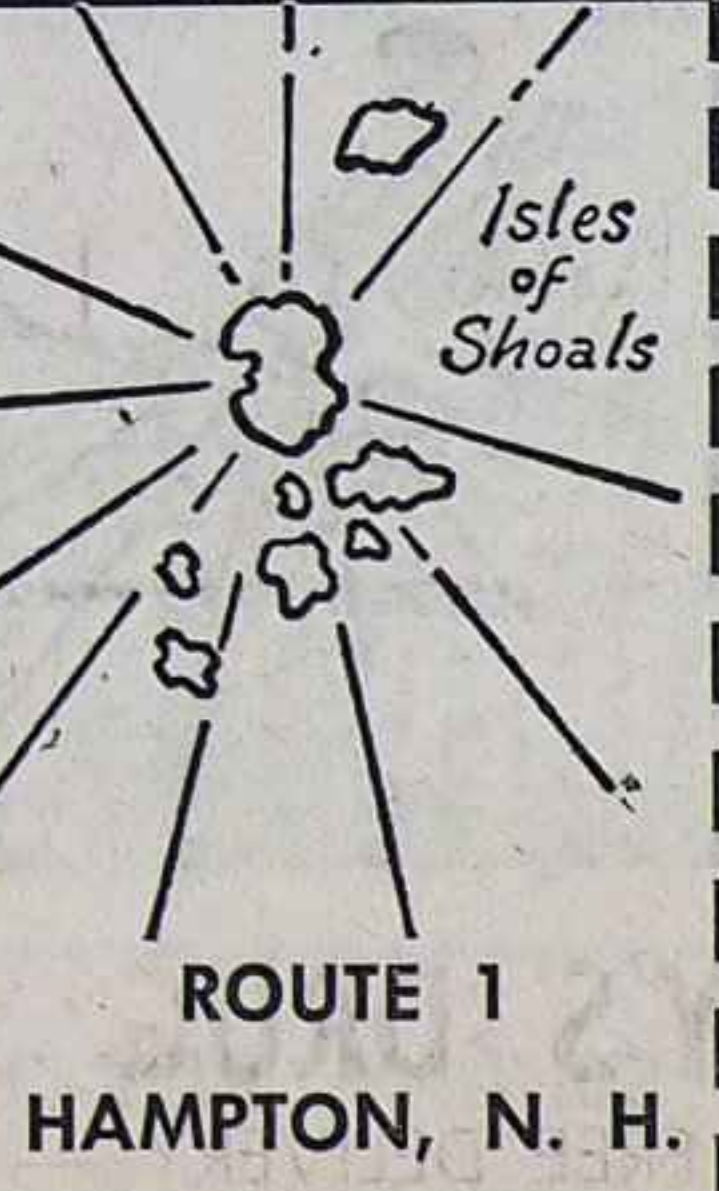

Beach Route Toll Proposal Prompts New Traffic Study

The State Highway department is reviewing traffic surveys of the Hampton area this week to determine whether or not a toll road between Lafayette road and Hampton Beach could be financially feasible. The study was undertaken as a result of suggestions by Rep. Ralph Sanborn of Hampton last week, that available funds for the proposed Route 1 expressway be used for the section of the road between

Exeter and Route 1, south of Hampton center. He further suggested that the remaining section of the highway to the beach be constructed as a toll facility, since present funds are not sufficient to construct the entire road over the southerly route preferred by area residents.

In response to Sanborn's recommendations, Deputy Highway Commissioner Robert H. Whitaker this week said his de-

partment "is making an analysis of the section of the route between the turnpike and the coast in an effort to determine its financial potentialities on a toll basis."

He told Sanborn that the department's planning engineer was reviewing the results of a traffic survey conducted last year in this area, and that if necessary a new traffic survey would be conducted this season. He also stated that the department "is giving serious consideration" to the engagement of a consulting firm specializing in evaluation of toll road potentialities.

Whitaker added that further revision of the northerly route, recommended by Fay, Spofford and Thorndike, the engineering

firm employed by the state, was being considered "to eliminate some of the local objections to its features and to seek a more acceptable easterly terminus". The original plans called for the terminus to be near the Coast Guard station on North Shore boulevard.



Submarine Mine Cables Off Coastline Being Salvaged

Curiosity and interest were aroused last week by the appearance of an unusual looking craft in the harbor near Great Boar's Head. None of the Coast Guard authorities could

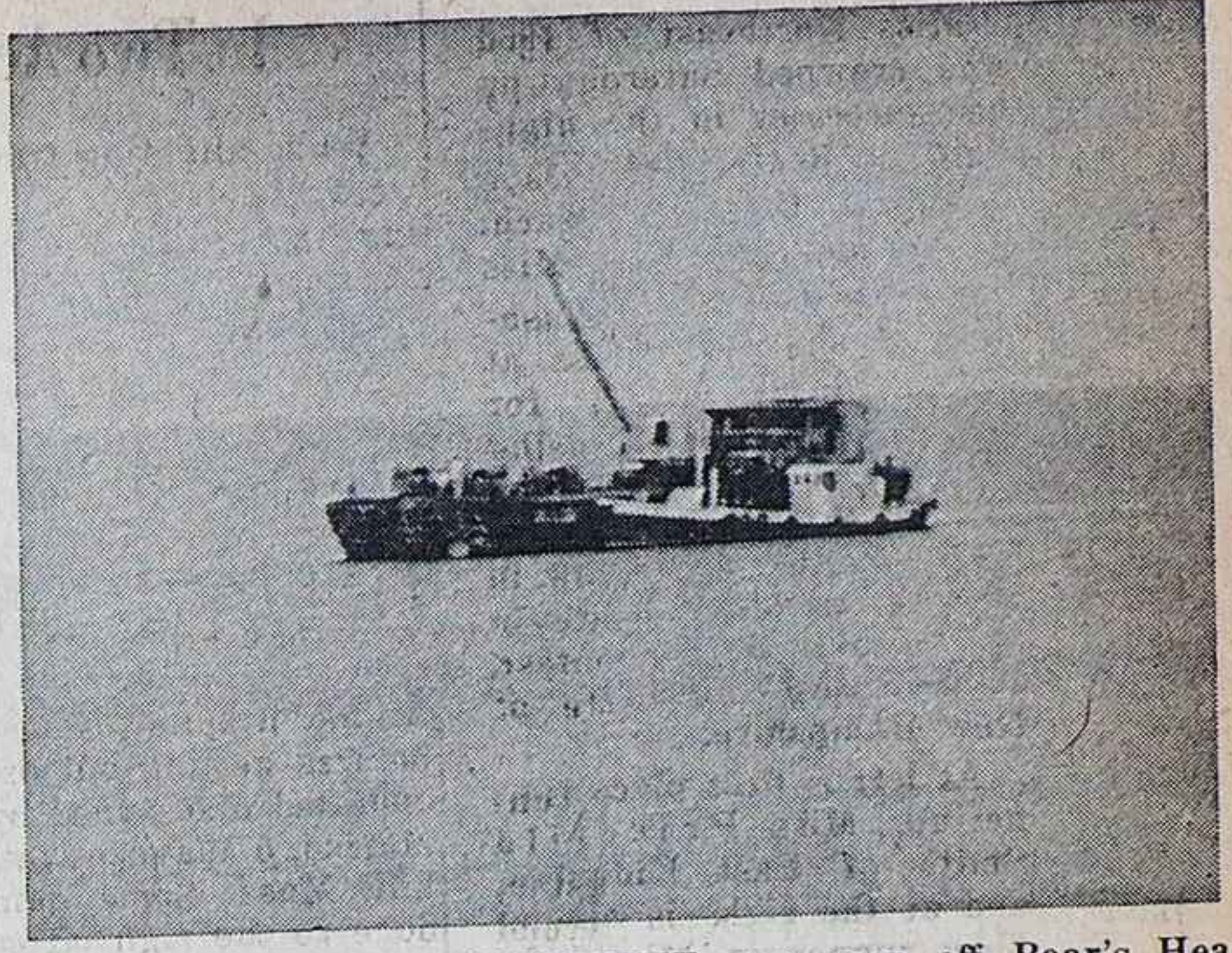
explain its presence until investigation proved it to be the boat used in the salvage operation near Rye.

The salvage of the submarine cable got under way the early part of the week. The cables were laid during World War II by Battery A of the 22nd Coast Artillery as part of the Harbor Defenses of Portsmouth. They were used in linking submarine mines, containing 600 pounds of TNT. The mines were recovered shortly after the war, but the cable was allowed to remain.

The contractor on the job is Leonard H. Warren of Coxsackie, N. Y. When the company began its operations, the lobster fishermen in the area made a complaint concerning the manner in which the work was being done. They feared the salvaging operation would damage some valuable lobster gear. State authorities visited the area to ascertain the extent of any damage which may have occurred prior to agreements between the salvage company and the lobster fishermen.

The salvage company agreed to meet these three conditions requested by the lobster fishermen:

- (1) That the salvage operation area be buoyed off. (2) That at least two days notice be given so fishermen will have time to move their gear. (3) That the salvage operation be carried out entirely during the daytime.



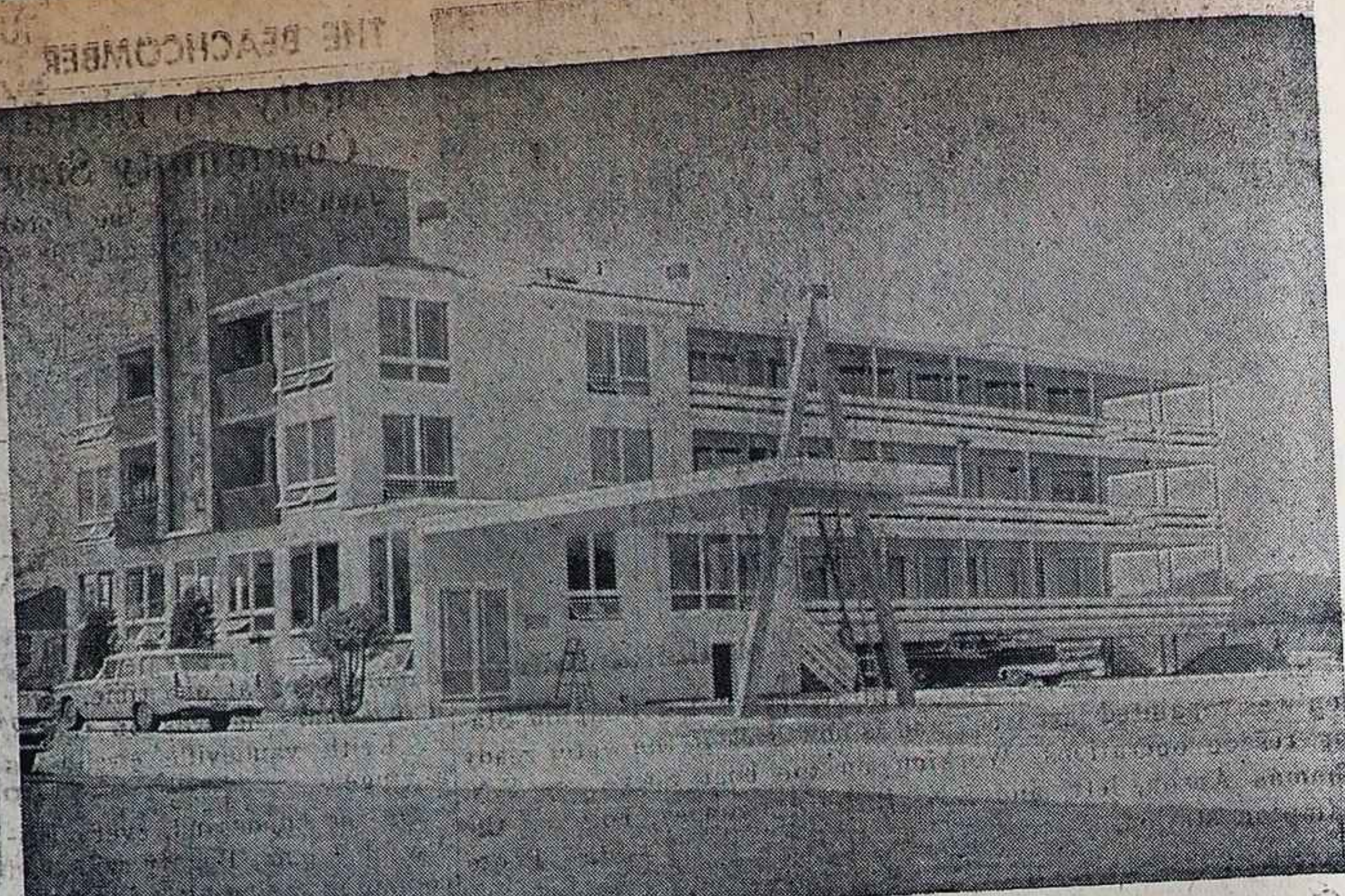

tion is part of the adjacent Janmere Motorhaven, which has been operated for 15 years by Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Josselyn of Hampton Beach and Miami, Fla. he Seabrook Beach parking lot and roadside repairs, drainage improvements at Plaice Cove, improvements on Winnicut road, North Hampton, scheduled to begin next month, resurfacing and shoulder construction on Lafayette road the length of the coast, the Exeter by-pass, and Route 101 reconstruction in Stratham and Greenland, in

addition to plans for the Route 1-C expressway from Exeter to Hampton. Cost of these highway projects alone totals close to \$6 million.

Gov. Powell also reported on repairs to the Wentworth-Cooledge mansion, Portsmouth, the Meshch Weare monument, Hampton Falls, the electrical system at the Hampton River bridge, the state bath house, Hampton Beach, and the cleaning and painting of one mile of railing along the seawall at Hampton Beach.

Prior to the banquet the Governor took part in ribbon cutting ceremonies on the newly completed concrete beach front promenade. Also completed recently were improvements at the state pier on Hampton Harbor and an information booth at the Hampton toll plaza on the Eastern Turnpike.

Powell noted planning progress on other projects including the Rye and Hampton Harbor improvement programs, the Hampton Beach band shell, the Metropolitan Water System study in the seacoast area, and several promotion projects.

In concluding the Governor emphasized that the stepped-up highway and parks program was being accomplished on a balanced budget with a surplus for future needs.

Gov. Powell was introduced by President Seth M. Junkins of the Chamber of Commerce, who also joined with Ralph T. Harris, chairman of the Preinct Commissioners, in welcoming the guests. Bill Elliot, executive secretary of the Chamber of Commerce served as master of ceremonies.

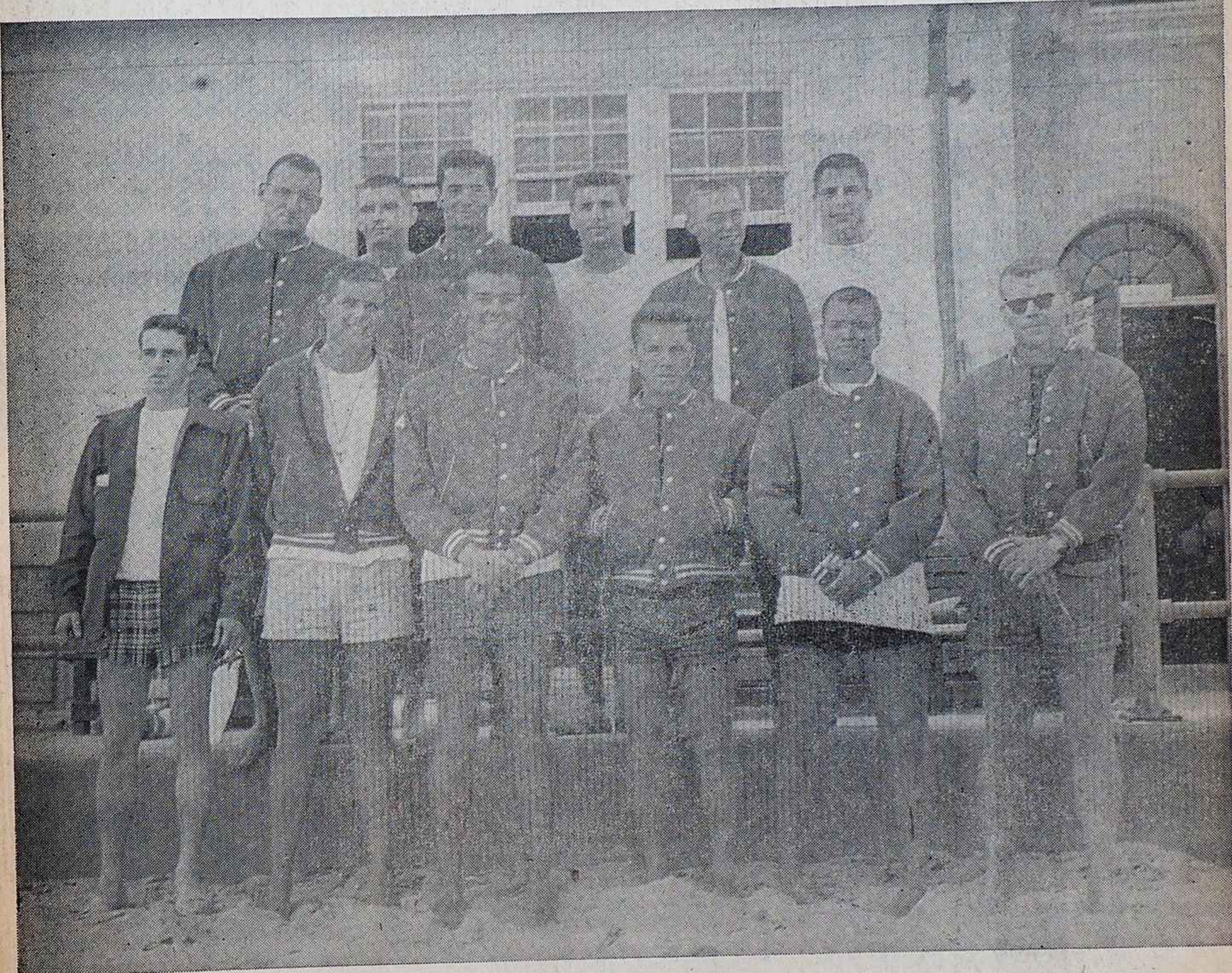
