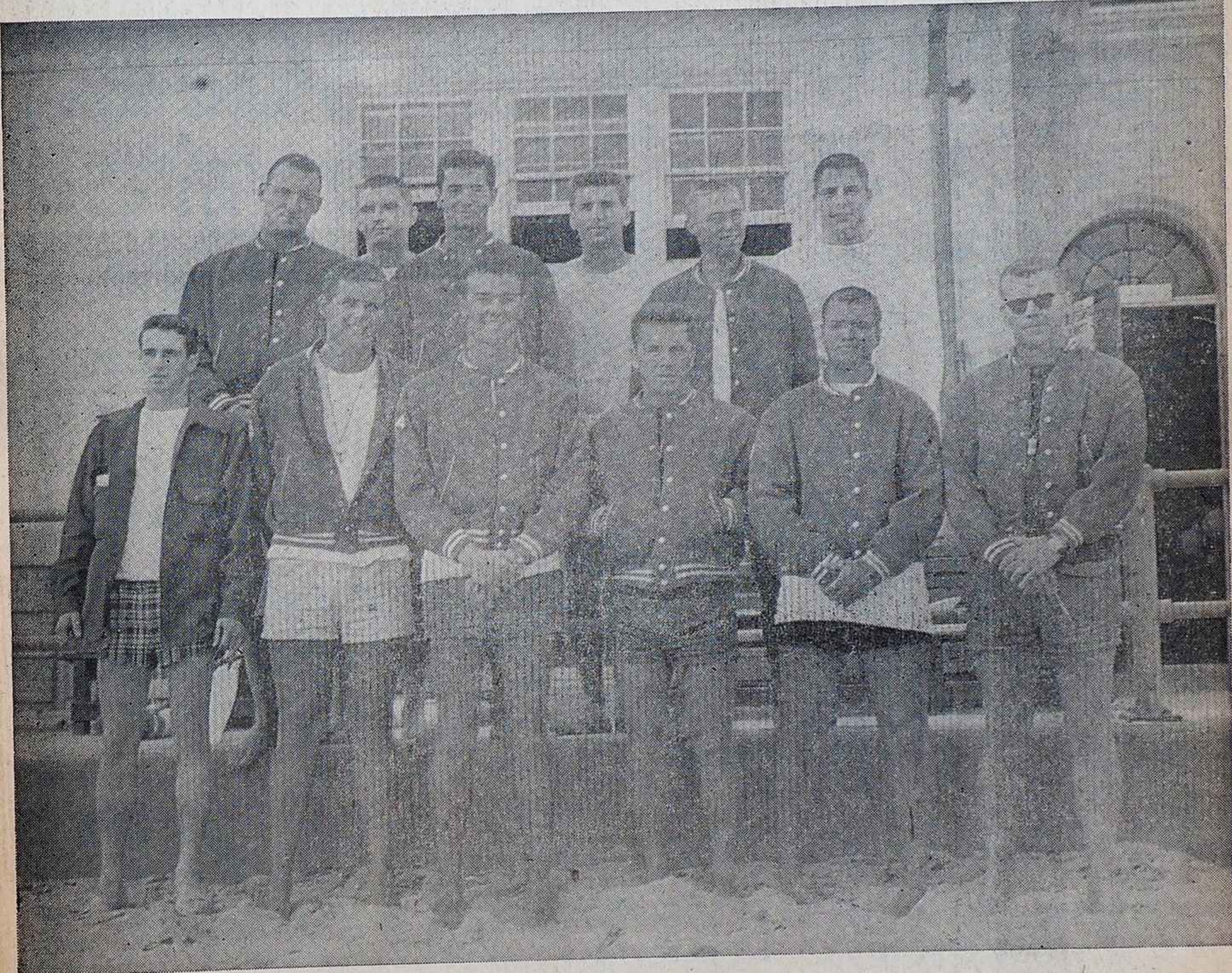

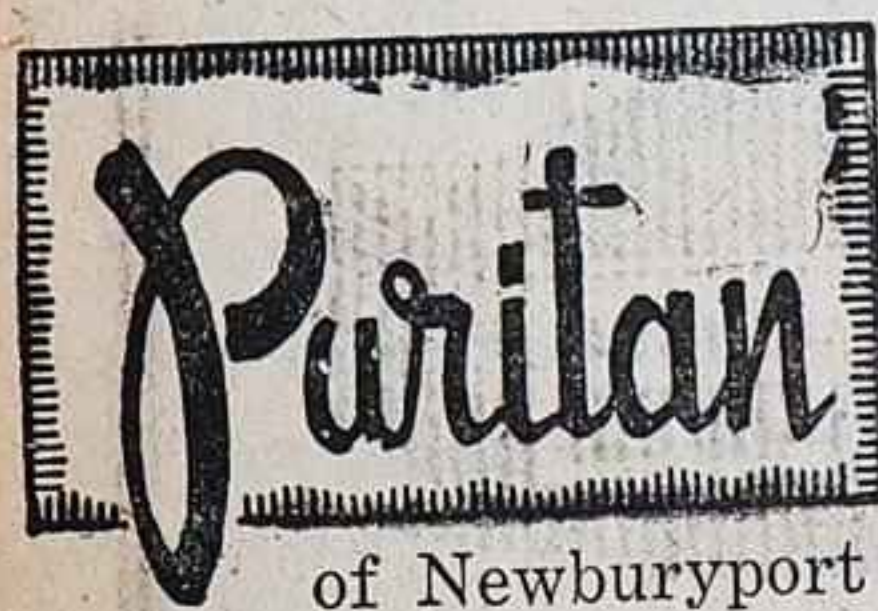

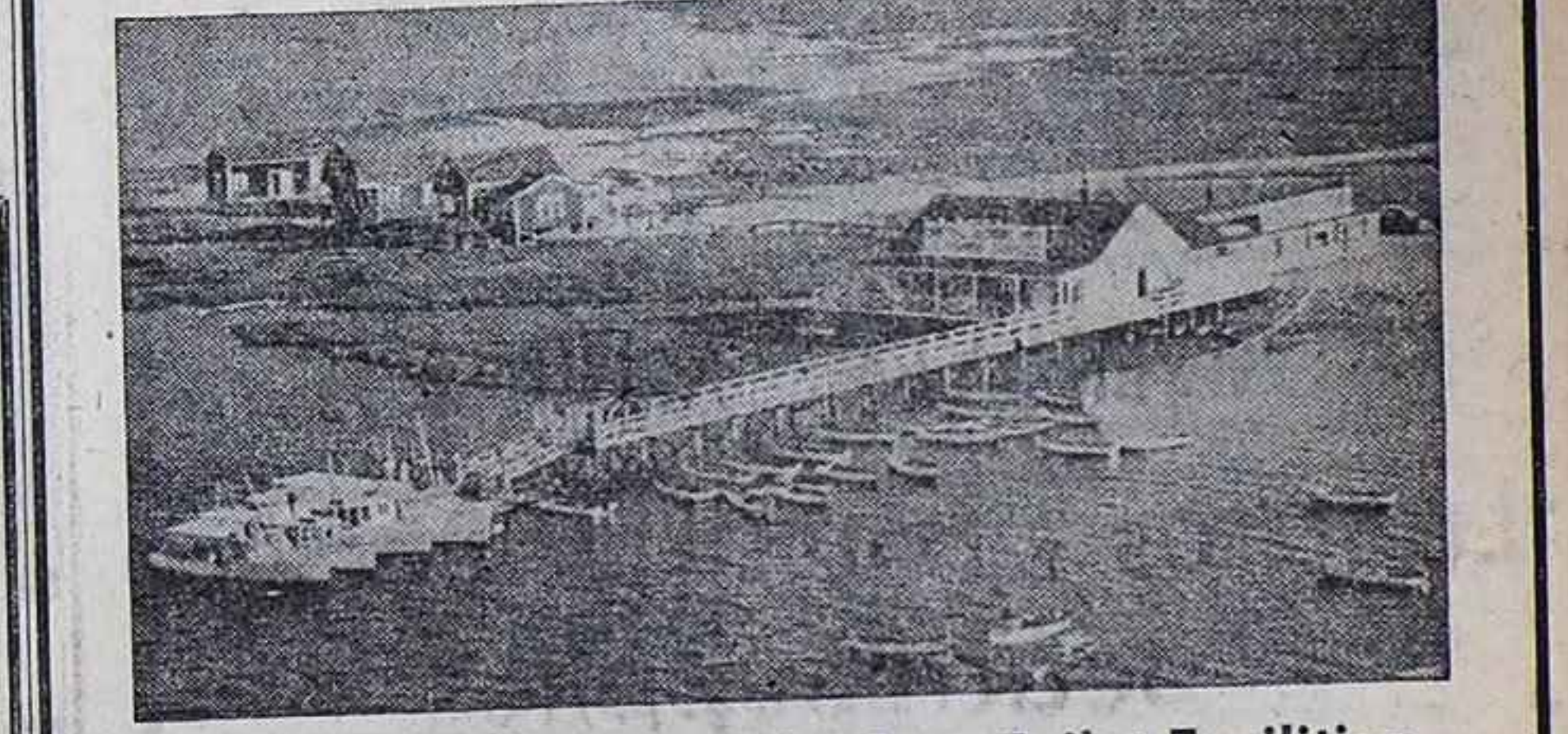

N.H. Senior Citizens Hold Beach Session

The Federation of the Senior Citizens' clubs of the southern part of New Hampshire held their annual meeting recently in the form of an outing at Hampton Beach.

The business meeting was conducted at the fire station, Ashworth avenue, with approximately 175 members attending. Mr. Harry C. Knox, president of the Sunset club of Manchester and Federation president, welcomed members from the seven represented clubs and presided over the business session.

Rev. Timothy G. Paddon, president of the Concord club, gave the invocation.

There will be a meeting of officers and one delegate from each club sometime in September.

Good Fishing Is Reported

Off-shore fishing has been improving steadily, according to party boat operators and many regular fishermen.

Cod fishing has been good for several weeks and during the past week excellent catches of good-sized pollock have been reported.

Smith & Gilmore pier operators reported one 30-pound pollock and Al Gauron's office reported a 24-pounder was caught recently. Many pollock catches have been over 16 pounds to qualify for Old Salts recognition. Cod up to 25 pounds have been hooked. Nine pounds is the minimum weight for cod to win Old Salts labels for the lucky fishermen.

Increasing numbers of black sea bass or tautog have been caught in the past two or three years, and this summer quite a number have been taken from the river. Bill Fellows of Hampton Beach last week went skin diving near the bridge one evening and spear-gunned three black sea bass.

Harbor pollock have been very plentiful, according to Mrs. Helen Gilmore, and flounder fishing has been excellent just outside the harbor, she noted.

Mrs. Alfred Gauron said some haddock, a few mackerel, and, of course, lots of dog fish have been caught from party boats. All day parties have gone out as far as 25 miles, she said, and regular deep sea fishing excursions go out from one to 14 miles, depending on where the captain finds good fishing for his party.

Boat captains have reported seeing schools of tuna playing around, but have been unable to get close enough to harpoon them. Capt. John Foote of the Gannet harpooned an 18-foot shark, however, last week. He estimated the big fellow to weigh about a ton.

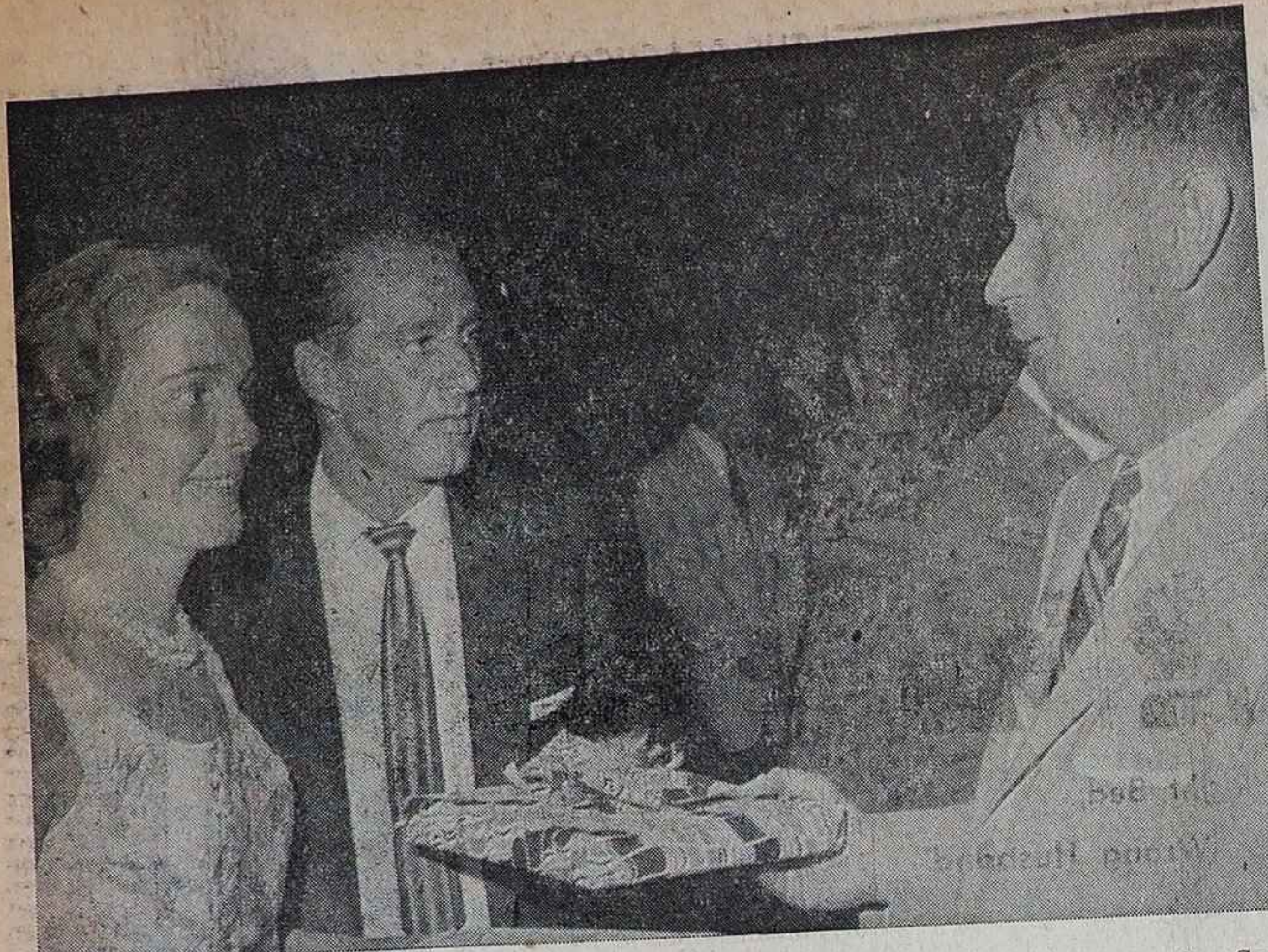

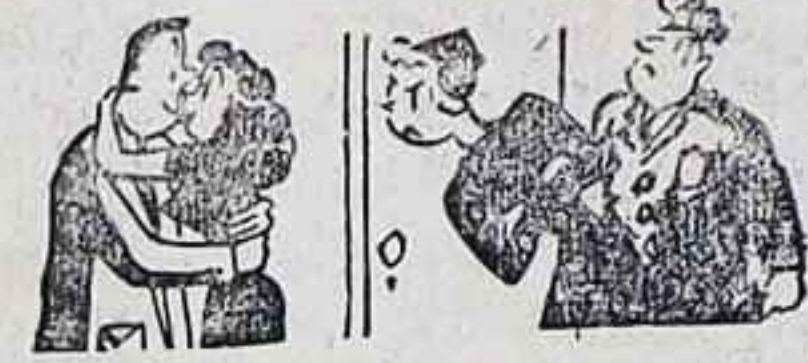

"Two For Seesaw" Is Given Superb Rating

The Hampton Playhouse opened its 1960 summer season this week with a superb production of William Gibson's enchanting comedy, "Two For The Seesaw" starring Ailsa Dawson and Dennis Drew.

Set in a pair of one room apartments complete with bedbugs and roaches, the story opens the hearts and minds of two unsettled people. The man is escaping a broken marriage back in the mid-west and the girl is bouncing from affair to affair among Greenwich village "beats" — both floundering — both lost in the endless ups and downs of the seesaw.

The patter is fast and racy. The laughs come hearty and often. Yet beneath amusing dialogue runs a sensitive and a delicate plot that will choke your throat with emotion and fill your eyes with tears over the desperate entanglement of two misallied lives.

As the Jewish dancer who is too generous with her love and too trusting with her possessions, Ailsa Dawson gives one of her finest dramatic performances in interpreting the delicate nuance that Gibson has written into comedy lines of "Two For The Seesaw". On the outside she is a fresh and outspoken girl who is liberal with her love, but underneath she is a confused, unhappy female searching for real love. She finds this real love in the young lawyer come to New York to forget his smashed marriage. Dennis Drew, known for his comedy roles, fully matches Miss Dawson's ability to grasp the great dramatic potentiality of "Two For The

Seesaw". He develops the laughs when they are in the line — but gives unmistakable feeling to the undercurrent of emotion that threads throughout the entire play.

The play builds to an unforgettable climax. Summer theatre-goers were treated to a fine performance of an outstanding play under the masterful directing of Alfred Christie and acted against a clever and realistic dual stage setting by Allen Klein, who creates the meagerness of a couple of "down and outter's" living quarters.

If "Two For The Seesaw" is a sample of what can be expected during the 1960 summer season, it will be a summer to remember.

Holiday Crowd Reaches Peak Of 130,000

In spite of record crowds over the long Fourth of July week end, no serious traffic accidents occurred in the Hampton area. The only accidents reported were two bicycle mishaps in which two Marines suffered arm and leg abrasions, and a Hampton boy was shaken up.

Police and Chamber of Commerce authorities estimated the Sunday crowd at Hampton Beach at 130,000, but the number fell off by five or ten thousand Monday as Sunday night showers sent holiday vacationists scurrying. Most of the three-day holiday was sunny, however, and the beaches were filled to capacity.

Thomas J. Downs, manager of the municipal parking lots at Hampton Beach reported that the Ashworth avenue parking lot, with a capacity of 1,000 automobiles, was filled Sunday and nearly filled Monday. For a period Sunday afternoon cars were turned away from the lot. No serious traffic tie-ups occurred although traffic was extremely heavy at the beach

and in Hampton center all three days. The final surge of heavy traffic followed the fireworks Monday night at the beach, but traffic was back to normal Tuesday.

Lifeguards kept a close watch on bathers and no one had to be helped from the water. The first aid attendants treated a number of persons who suffered minor cuts or abrasions on the beach and sidewalks.

The U. S. Coast Guard station at Hampton Beach reported that only two boats were assisted over the weekend, which is a record low for a holiday. A sail boat operated by Robert Britt of Westfield, Mass., was towed to harbor from off Seabrook Beach Sunday afternoon after the sails became too wet to haul in the vessel. An 18-foot skiff was towed to the Merrimack River, Newburyport, Monday afternoon, by the Hampton station's rescue boat after its outboard was damaged on rocks off Hampton Harbor, according to BMC Frank Christoph. The operator was Otto Naiman of Newburyport.

The fire department reported a false alarm from Box 31, Great Boar's Head, Saturday night; a call to wash gasoline from a car early Sunday morning; and an ambulance case early Monday morning. Fire Chief Perley R. George said Miss Mary Lou O'Brian, 17, of Lowell, Mass., was taken from 13 F street to Exeter Hospital at 5:25 a.m. Monday when she suffered improper breathing. She was supplied with oxygen on the way to the hospital. She was discharged Tuesday. Two 20-year-old Marines from the detachment at Ports-

mouth Naval Shipyard suffered abrasions when they were knocked to the ground from a tandem they were riding on Ashworth avenue Saturday night.

Police said a car driven by Theodore H. Checkers of Rockville, Conn., caught the handlebars of the bike between I and J streets. The cyclists, Thomas J. Wojtala and Gary D. Collier, said they would report to the dispensary at Portsmouth Naval Hospital for treatment.

Ten-year-old Barry M. McComb, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond M. McComb of 21 Naves road, Hampton, was knocked from his bicycle Saturday afternoon on High street when struck by a vehicle oper-

ated by Bradley B. Bailey, 17, of 42 Exeter road, Hampton. Police reported no serious injury resulted.

The office staff of the Chamber of Commerce reported that all accommodations in the area were filled to capacity Saturday and Sunday nights and many persons seeking rooms were referred to Exeter and Portsmouth for accommodations.

has been necessary to overcome a long series of serious obstacles, one after the other, to reach the present stage of practical completion. These obstacles were met head-on with courage and determination. They most certainly would have daunted the spirit of any but true pioneers.

The marina, which has a frontage of 1,125 feet on Hampton Harbor, presented a serious engineering problem, complicated by winds, storms, tidal currents and the forces of ero-

tion. This, together with the problems of planning, financing and building, have kept the indomitable trio of George, his wife, Shirley and sister, Helen, on the job, day and night, all winter long. The trio has had a splendid assist from George's 17 year old son, George, Jr. Leigh, 13 years, helps too and Beverly, 8, is handy with advice.

Boating Business
Work began in earnest on the marina project around Sept. 1, 1959, at the close of the beach season. Up to that time, all the members of both families had been busily engaged in operating the Smith and Gilmore Fishing Pier, a long established summer business at Hampton Harbor which includes four party cruisers and a big flotilla of rental row boats — many equipped with outboard motors — for fishing and for pleasure. Helen's son, Claude, Jr. and her son-in-law, John Foote, operate two of the big cruisers, used for deep-sea fishing parties. The large building at the head of the pier contains restaurant, tackle shop and lobster pound.

Out of long experience with boating in Hampton Harbor, George Smith learned much more than the need for a modern marina. He gained a practical knowledge of conditions which led him to the belief that with the help of his family and a minimum of professional engineering assistance, he could plan, design and engineer the big project himself, thereby saving a substantial sum. So he bought text books and a transit — at the outset squinting through the wrong end of the instrument — and started to lay out the six and a half acre marina tract. George, his wife Shirley and sister Helen, made up the team of amateur surveyors. All members of the

families have likewise helped in various phases of the actual construction.

Two-Acre Basin

The new Hampton Beach Marina is a few hundred feet northwest of the Smith & Gilmore Fishing Pier. The six and a half acre, rectangular tract runs almost north and south, with the westerly edge — a substantial pile bulkhead — extending 1,125 feet along the Harbor. The marina itself —

a water basin covering over two acres, is 200 feet wide and 500 feet long. It occupies the northwest section of the tract with the harbor entrance at the northern end of the western bulkhead. At low tide there will be at least six feet of water in the dredged basin which is surrounded by walks, access roads and parking areas.

A floating platform along the northern side of the basin will contain mooring slips, and four similar platforms extending from the eastern, hard-topped embankment of the basin will also contain mooring slips. There will be a total of 137 slips available for rental. At the south end of the western side of the basin is the dock

for transient craft. The south side of the marina will be busiest.

Near the westerly end of the south side is the service dock, adjacent to which are three gasoline pumps. Just east of the service dock on the south side is a hard-topped, triple launching ramp designed for the convenient launching of trailer-hauled boats. Right next to this ramp is a large boat slip, above which is the Holly Hoist boat lift — a remarkable device which not only can lift a 20-ton boat, 55 feet long out of the slip, but can transport it to the nearby storage shed or to other winter storage facilities.

Fronting the busy south side of the basin is the huge Marina building, 40 feet wide and 100 feet long. The front part of this structure, or the northern end, is a combined showroom and office. Directly in back of it is a fully equipped repair shop with test tank for outboard motors. The rear of the building, or south end, will be used for various purposes, including winter storage. Great doors in the south wall will permit the entrance of the perambulating Holly Hoist.

Welcome Facilities

Near the north end of the west side of this great Marina building, are entrances to commodious and modern toilet accommodations for both men and women. The facilities are airy, clean, light and include several shower stalls and many lavatories. The building contains every other facility required by men and women and even the younger generation of today's boating enthusiasts.

On July 1, a fleet of from ten to fifteen, 25 to 35 foot power boats from the Metropolitan Yacht Club of Brain-

tree, Mass., will cruise to the Hampton Beach Marina where the owners have engaged docking facilities for the holiday weekend. This will give an adequate idea of what the vision and the courage of two present-day pioneers have already accomplished in support of the recreational economy of our town. George A. Smith and his sister, Helen C. Gilmore deserve the thanks of our community and their new venture deserves such support as we are able to give it.

Deserve Community Thanks
Perhaps the best way Hampton citizens can evidence their appreciation is to work with increased vigor toward the end that the Federal plan for improving the entrance to Hampton Harbor, the inlet and the harbor itself, be consummated at the earliest possible time. That's a practical way to show appreciation to a couple of real present-day pioneers.

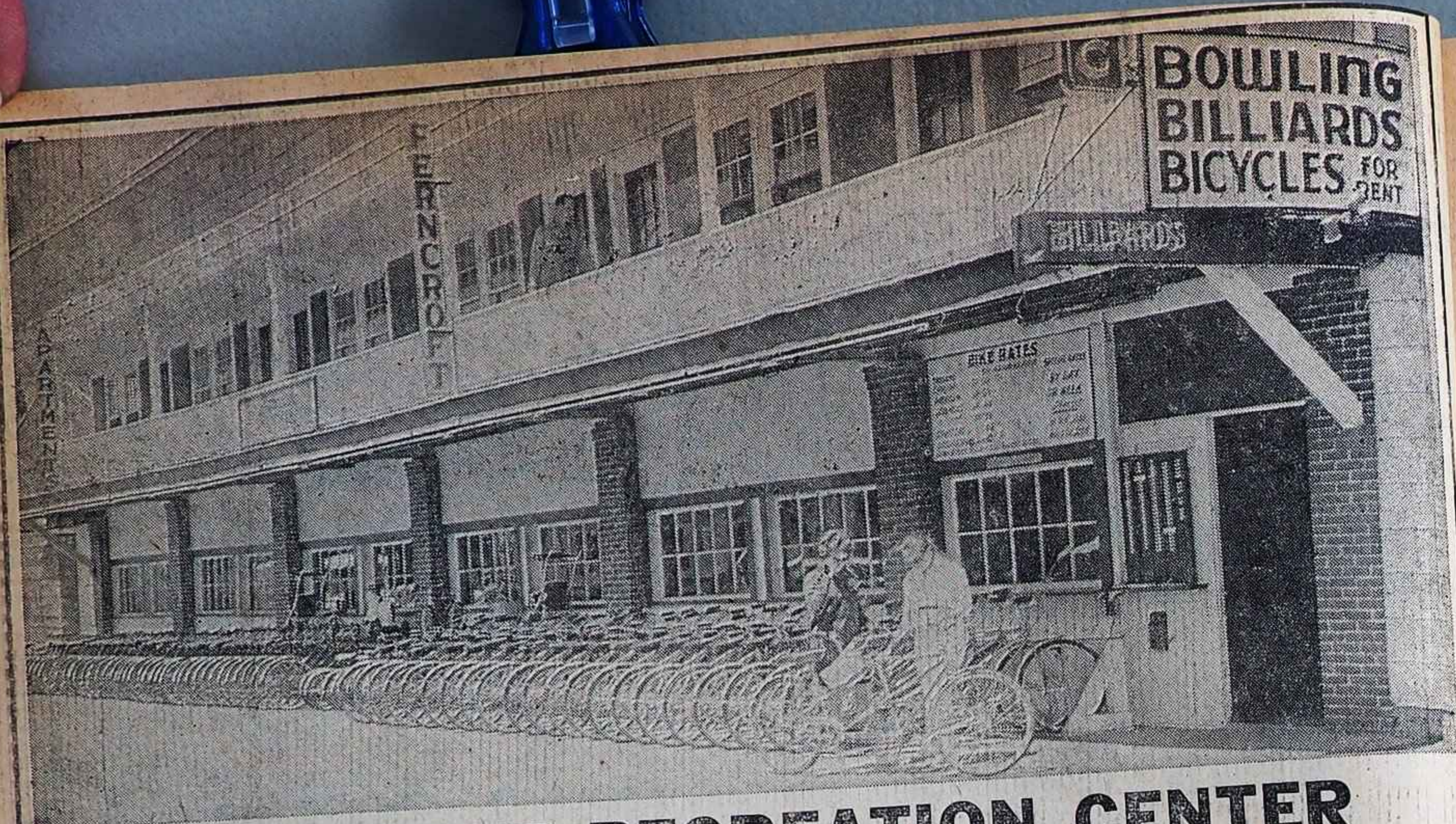

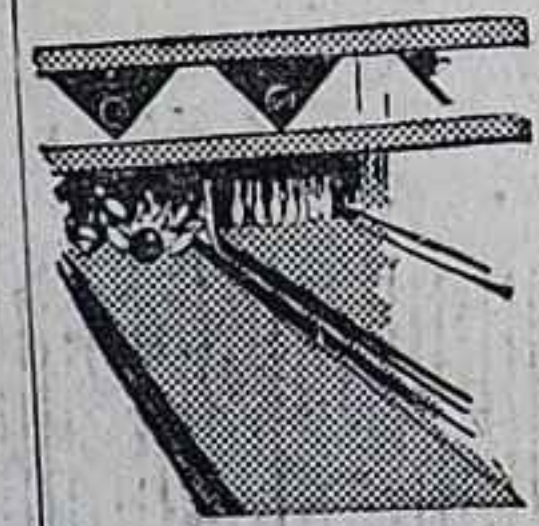

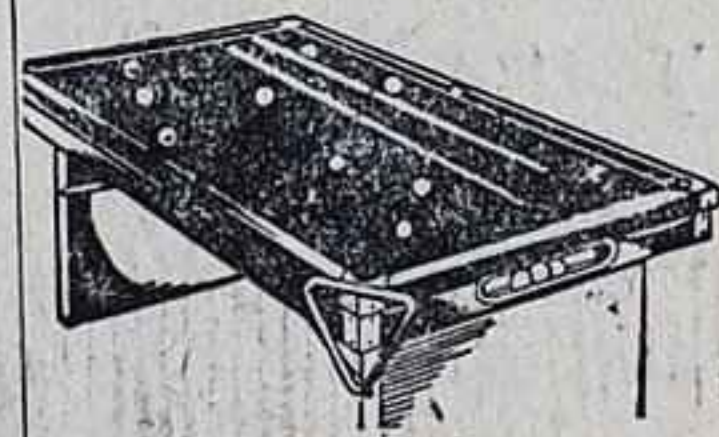
