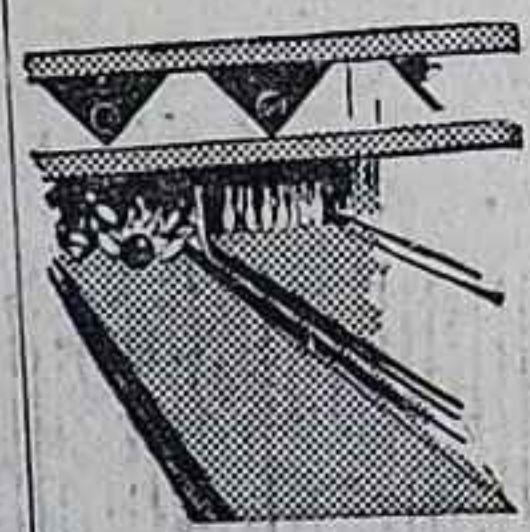

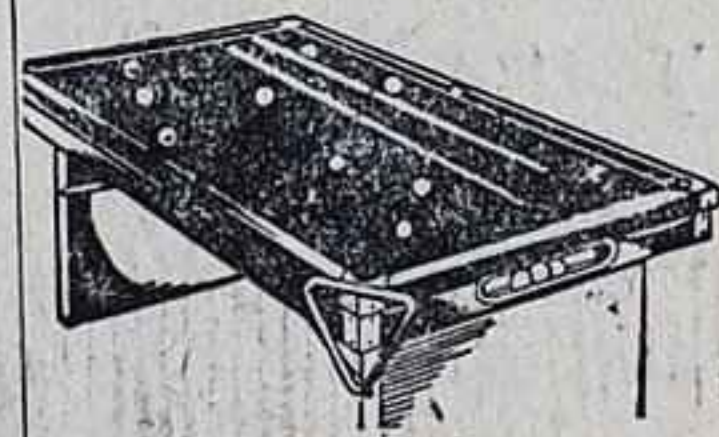

Two Youths Injured In Beach Accident

Two young men were injured early Saturday morning when their car smashed into a parked car on North Shore boulevard. The driver, Octave Dube, 22, of Berwick, Maine, suffered a fractured left arm and injuries to the left jaw, and a passenger Robert Vachen, 24, of Somersworth, suffered a cut on the hand. Both men were taken to Exeter Hospital in the Sturgis ambulance. Another passenger, Stephen A. Young, 20, also of Berwick, was not injured. Police said Dube was driving north in the parking lane when he crashed into the rear of a car parked by the seawall. Occupants of the parked car were identified as Roland Houle, 17, the driver, John Dobion, 17, both of Manchester, and Miss Mary Alice Stapell, 18, of New Britain, Conn. The car is owned by James B. Dowd of Manchester. The entire front end of the Dube car was damaged and the right rear of the Dowd car was damaged. Both vehicles were towed to Mills Garage. Investigating officers were

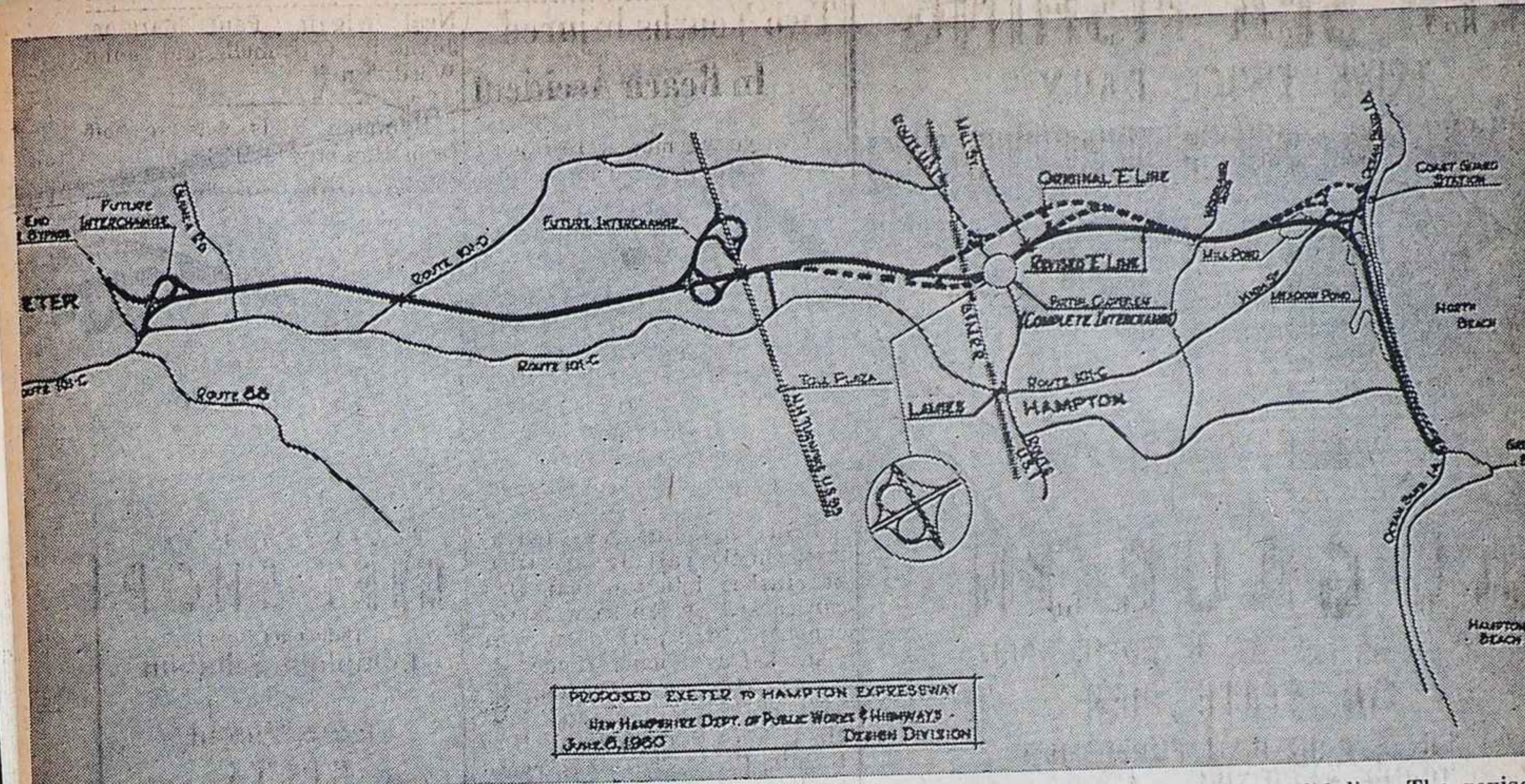

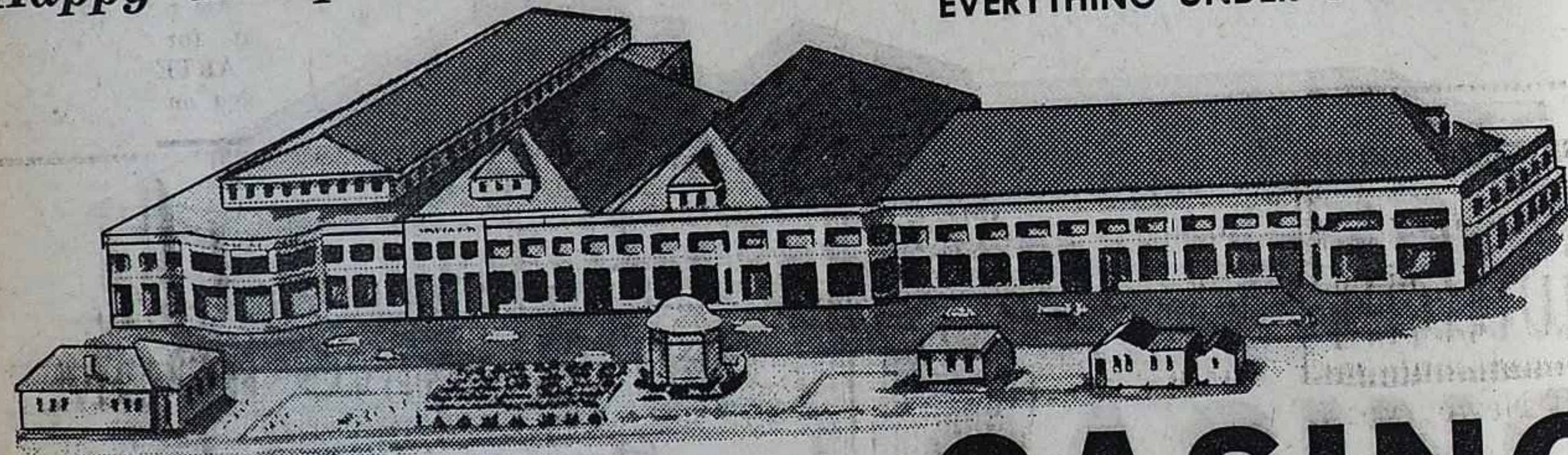

officials will be present to describe the changes and answer questions.

The hearing is not the formal Governor and Council hearing required by law, but is termed an informational meeting "sponsored in order to disseminate the details of the new proposal publicly."

The new plan is labeled "Revised Line E" and is essentially the same as the original

northern route with the exception of the Lafayette road interchange and the beach end of the road.

The originally proposed elevated oval interchange at Lafayette road near Warren's supermarket has now been replaced by a proposed "partial cloverleaf" intersection that would cover a smaller area.

The beach end of the proposed expressway, which formerly joined North Shore boulevard near the Coast Guard station, has now been altered to turn south across Mill Pond and Meadow Pond and run back of the beach front south as far as Boar's Head before joining the boulevard.

A release from the Highway Department today described the changes as follows:

"A concerted effort has been made to work out a design proposal which can be accomplished within available funds and which will eliminate a number of the features which were so strongly objected to locally last spring.

"A revised Line E, as shown on the accompanying drawing, represents a composite of the best thinking of the consulting firm and of the engineering staff of the Department of Public Works and Highways. It is an adaptation of the northern route, so-called Line E. It accomplishes the following:

1. "It has an ultimate eastern terminus at a point just north of Great Boar's Head.
2. "It eliminates the overhead type of interchange or mall and high embankments which surrounded a sizeable segment of private property at the Route 1 crossing.
3. "It eliminates the large traffic distribution facility in

the vicinity of the Coast Guard station. 4. "It includes as a component of the basic proposal that part of Line F which is an ARTERY

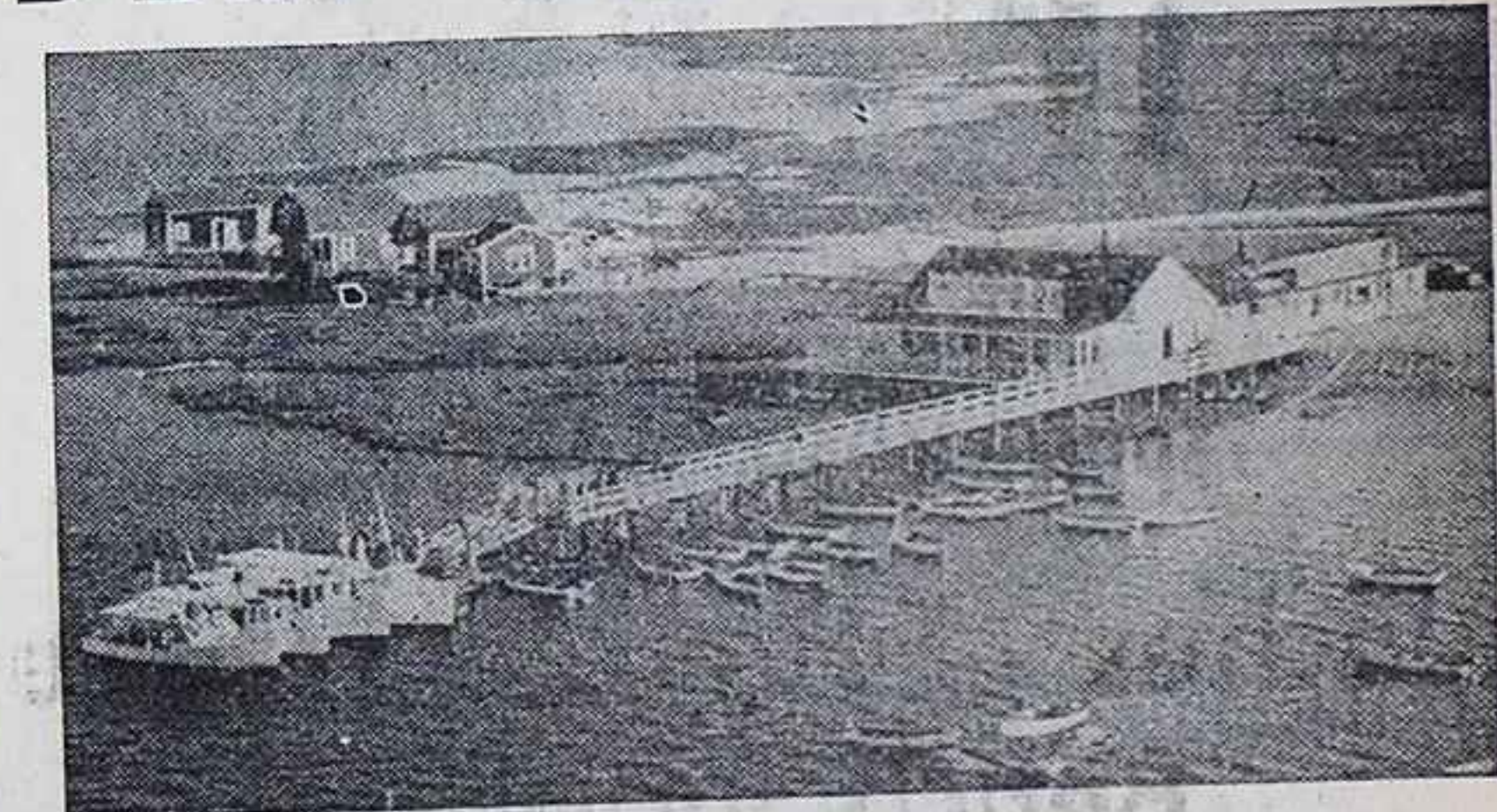

Obsolete Navy Craft For Beach Jetties Proposed

A suggestion for keeping of Great Boar's Head to serve sand on Hampton Beach was offered recently by Lawrence C. Hackett, state Forestry and Recreation commissioner.

Hackett proposed that several obsolete Navy boats be acquired, filled with sand and sunk off Hampton Beach, just south

as a jetty protecting the beach. An estimated 20,000 cubic yards of sand is washed out to sea annually from the beach immediately south of Rocky Bend. Hackett said periodic renourishment of the beach is very expensive and the construction of a rock jetty to protect this section of the beach would be equally expensive.

He said he was informed that many abandoned boats are sunk in deep water by the federal government after being stripped of all useful equipment. He said engineers should be able to find permanent use

Police Chief John A. Roden said James P. Hurrell of 82 Flanders street, North Andover, Mass., was driving south near Kennedy's drive-in when his car struck the tree, swerved back onto the road and rolled over on its roof.

The chief said the vehicle was badly damaged and had to be towed from the scene, but the young driver suffered injury only to the middle finger of his left hand.

The accident is under investigation by Officers Neal Wiggin, Paul Leavitt and Peter Smith.

State To Pay Wages Of Meter Officers

The Hampton Board of Selectmen last Friday signed a contract with the state on parking meter collection and administration at Hampton Beach.

Under the terms of the contract the state will pay the wages of four meter attendants supplied by the Hampton Police department and in addition pay the town 25 per cent of the administrative expenses, such as installation of the meters, printing of violation tags and publishing of public notices. Contrary to a previous report, the town will not receive 25 per cent of the meter collections.

The state recently reimbursed the town \$877 for the cost of purchasing courtesy boxes which may be used by parking violators to deposit their overtime fines without reporting to the police station.

A list of unpaid property taxes was posted Saturday by George H. Sumner, tax collector. Unless these taxes are paid by July 29, the properties will be sold at public auction.

Hit-Run Driver Is Picked Up At Beach

Hampton police officers Tuesday night apprehended a seaman wanted on a hit and run accident in Salisbury, Mass., in what Massachusetts State Police termed the fastest pick up

on a hit and run case in many years.

Sgt. Jon Lovejoy was at the desk in the Hampton Beach police station when a description of the hit-run vehicle was radioed by Bay State police. Lovejoy notified officers on patrol at Hampton Beach and the car was spotted quickly by Officer Neal Wiggin parked outside a restaurant.

When the suspect returned to

his car he was taken to the Hampton Police station on a drunk charge, bailed out and turned over to Massachusetts authorities.

He was identified as Howard Albert Dewitt, 20, of Monroe, Mich., a member of the crew on the submarine USS Seawolf, now at the Portsmouth Naval base.

to the north of Winnacunnet road." (Line F, as proposed, runs the full length of the beach west of the now developed sections.)

"In developing this proposal every effort has been made to minimize damage to existing properties and to locate the route in a manner which will permit continued expansion into the presently undeveloped areas in the northern part of Hampton. As the route approaches the coast, it will be noted that it actually crosses Mill Pond and Meadow Pond, leaving the firm ground to the rear of the north beach available for future development. From a factual point of view in terms of property damage, it affords a potential saving of approximately \$200,000.

"For comparative purposes, this saving may be translated as follows:

(a) "Revised Line E requires the taking of a total of 220 acres whereas the original Line E plus the northern portion of Line F required 342 acres.

(b) "It will require the taking of 12 sets of buildings as compared to a total of 23 sets of buildings for Line E as originally proposed.

(c) "This reduction in taking occurs largely between the railroad tracks and Winnacunnet road.

(d) "In terms of construction costs it is estimated that a useable facility can be constructed from the easterly terminus of the Exeter Bypass to a connection with Winnacunnet road for a cost of \$3,791,000.

(e) "There is at least a good chance that it may be possible, within the \$4 million allocated to this project, to continue the route southward across Winnacunnet road to a junction with Route 1-A just north of Great Boar's Head in the initial construction. In any event, the right of way and layout under this proposal would be accomplished to the latter point and construction continued to the extent of the total funds allocated to the Route 101-C connection.

"The foregoing figures are predicated on an 'at grade' intersection with High street from the south and an 'at grade' terminus with Route 1-A north of Great Boar's Head.

"Adequate right of way would be taken to provide for an ultimate four-lane facility. However, in the rapidly developing areas to the north of Hampton village, it is proposed that the right of way width be kept to 150 feet. This width is just about the minimum which will permit eventual four-lane construction. It will also be noted that the type of interchange proposed with Route 1 requires a minimum of acreage. The traffic lights, at the grade intersections indi-

cated, eventually would be placed with separation structures as traffic increases demand it.

"The revised Line E as established will, in the department's opinion, provide for expressway type of facilities the New Hampshire section so located as to provide maximum of service to the tire community of Hampton, including its well developed beaches. In establishing concept of revised Line E effort has been made to combine in a modern engineering design the maximum of service with a sound expenditure of funds. This proposal climaxed many months of study by department's engineering staff and that of its consultants, Spofford and Thorndike of Boston."

Beach Band Popular With Crowds

The Hampton Beach concert band under the direction of Dyson Kring has returned for the second season and will be playing four concerts a day, seven days a week, through Labor Day.

New to Hampton Beach last year, Kring's band proved popular with young and old vacationists alike. Marches, show tunes, old melodies and semi-classical music make up the repertory of the 11-piece band.

1,200 Lb. Shark Harpooned 7 Miles Off Hampton Shore

The biggest catch landed off Capt. Walter Sturgis was Hampton Beach within memory about seven miles out with a 12-foot long Daskin party of 19 fishermen when he shark, harpooned by the skipper spotted the shark, estimated to of Al Gauron's party boat, the weigh about 1,200 pounds. Alice G, Tuesday morning. Gauron's son, Ricky, 12, and

his friend, Stephen LaShane, 9, took over at the wheel while Sturgis hurled the harpoon. Sea gulls have been known to carry clams high in the air and drop them on hard surfaces in order to break the shell.

The harpoon caught the big fish in the backbone on the first strike and the shark was unable to put up much resistance. Unable to pull the big fellow aboard the 40-foot party boat, the skipper radioed for a winch, but this too failed and the shark had to be towed back to the harbor behind the boat.

Nine husky men lugged the beast ashore where it attracted a large crowd of spectators. Fish markets and lobster fishermen said the shark would have made good lobster bait, but it was so big they were uncertain they could use all of it. The big shark was therefore towed back to sea.

The "John Paul Jones" House in Portsmouth is now the home of the Portsmouth Historical Society. Capt. Jones boarded there while the "America" was being outfitted on Badger's Island for the Continental Navy.

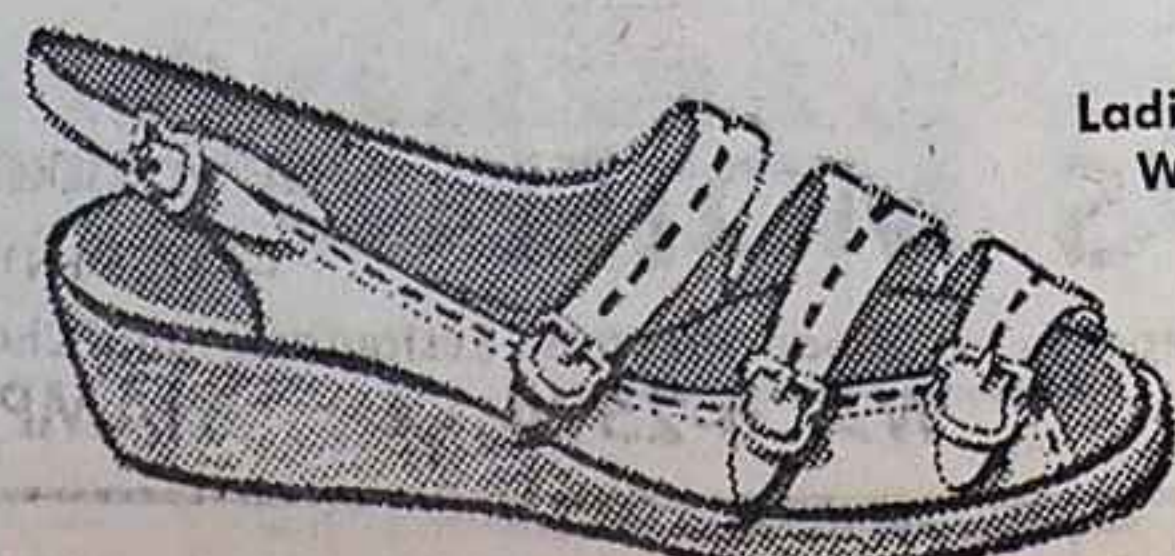

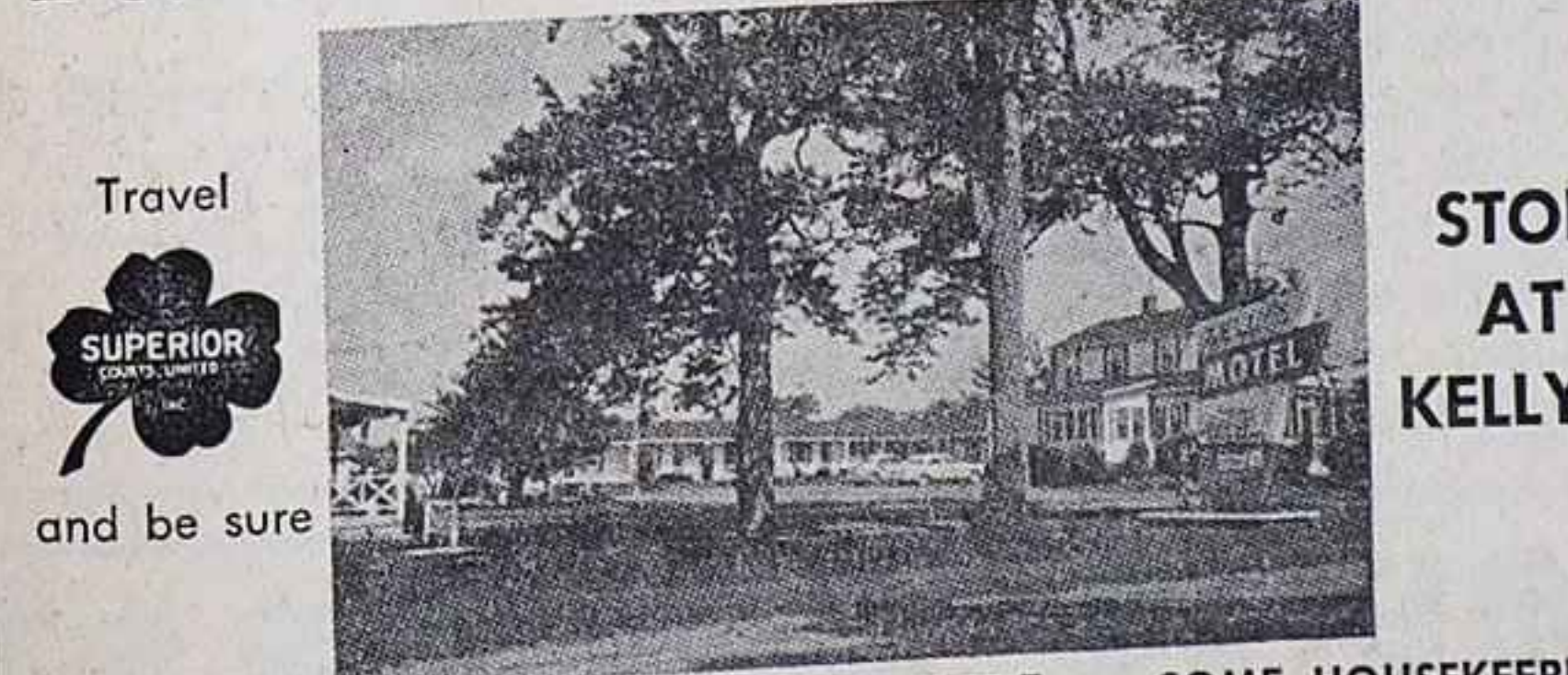

Approve Uniform Code For All Beach Areas Starting '61

After this summer rules affecting use of the Hampton beaches will be made uniform for both state and town beaches, eliminating the difference between rules posted for the state park area and those for the town-patrolled beaches.

Town Manager Kenneth D. Bohner and Police Chief John A. Roden with State Recreation Director Russell B. Tobey, it was agreed that after this season, the state's code of regulations would apply to all beaches in Hampton.

ulations at the present time applies to the use of surf boards on the beach. The use of inflatables is prohibited at the state park beach, but has been allowed in the past on the other beaches. Town Manager Bohner said lifeguards would be instructed to prevent the use of inflatables after this year. The Chamber of Commerce has instructed store owners at Hampton Beach not to stock inflatables after the 1960 beach season.

Other beach rules, prohibiting fires, changing clothes, unleashed dogs, etc., on the beach are generally the same.

C of C Contribution Formula Approved

Early this spring the directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce approved a new formula for contributions and advertising which they hope to put into effect after the 1960 summer season.

A committee had been appointed earlier to study the problem and determine a "fair means of increasing contributions to the chamber." The directors approved the recommendations of the committee and voted to present the following formula at the annual meeting in September.

Real estate dealers are to be asked to contribute a \$75 flat fee including advertising in the Chamber guide and handbooks. Cottage owners are to contribute \$2 per cottage plus \$40 in advertising. Restaurants on the boulevard between Highland avenue and Haverhill street are to contribute \$1 per seat, and all other restaurants, 50c per seat.

Take-out stands in the central area of the boulevard are to pay \$5 per foot of frontage and all other take-out stands, \$2.50 per foot. The same rates also apply to gift shops and stores.

Hotels of 10 rooms or less, \$40 including advertising; 10 to 15 rooms, \$50; and 15 or more rooms, \$2 per room plus \$40 in advertising. Rates for motels were listed the same as for hotels, except that motels

New Flag Designed For Water Skiing

A new safety flag to be used as a water skiing signal has been designed by the Evinrude Boating Foundation and is being recommended for use to all clubs of the American Water Ski association.

The new signal flag will be approximately 12 inches by 17 1/2 inches in size and is made up of a red diagonal bar, flanked by a pair of red water skis, on a white field. The diagonal red bar through the center of the flag will be a plastic stiffener, or stay, so the flag will remain unfurled even when the boat is not moving.

In the interest of providing a safety precaution both for the skiers and other boats in the area, the flag will signify that the boat flying it is engaged in pulling a skier or retrieving a fallen skier.

In addition to providing protection for the towing boat and skier, the safety flag will serve as a warning to other boats to stay clear of the area. Very often serious damage results from tangling with ski lines or hitting skies.

The flag will be flown amidships on a special inexpensive fiberglass staff at least three feet in length. This staff will be mounted in a socket on the gunwale of the water ski boat, thereby giving the flag distinctive identity, preventing con-

fusion with other ensigns or participants of this popular sport.

Marine dealers throughout the country will soon have these flags available for use by 000 germs on its body.

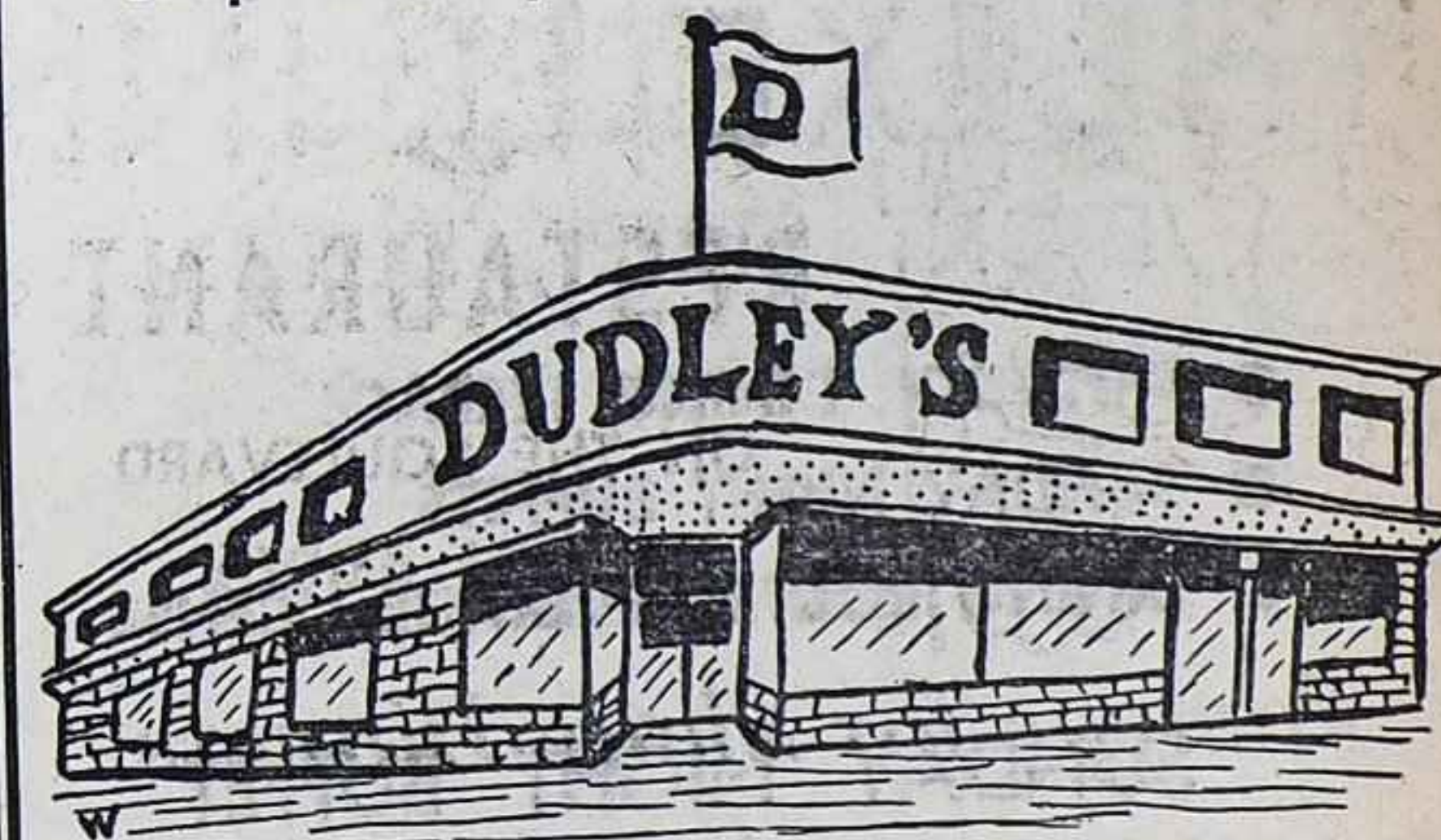

An Irish hornpipe dance won top place in Monday evening's talent parade, in which 12 acts were entered.

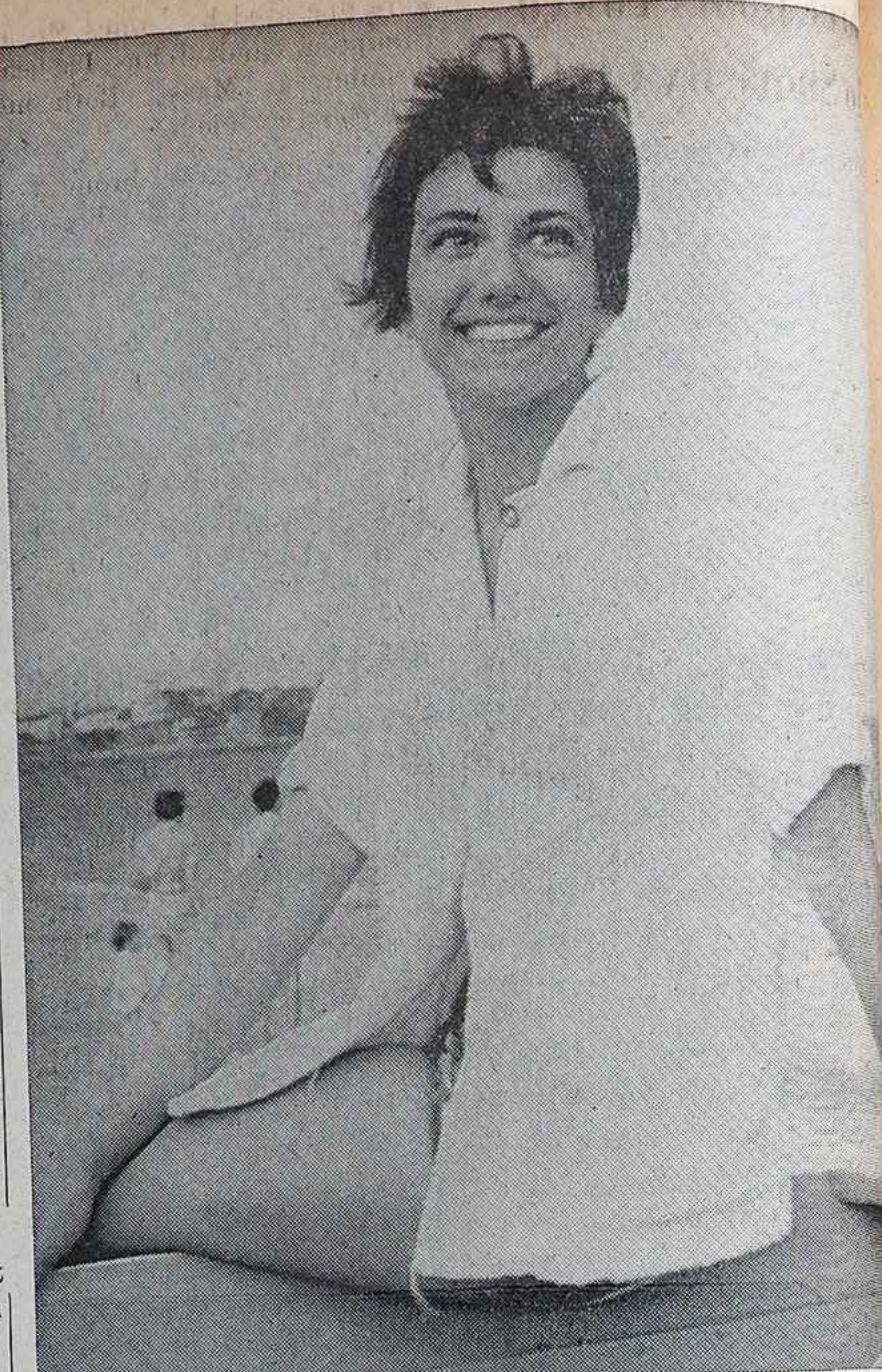
