Prizes will also be awarded to the second and third place runners-up.

Accountants for the judges will be Wilson Dennett and Wayne Elliot of Hampton.

58 YEARS AT HAMPTON BEACH

At 11 a.m. lifeguards Fred Nader and Bob Landry pulled Rev. Emile Boucher, a Montreal priest, from the water opposite the bandstand. Rev. Boucher was examined by Dr. Wayne P. Bryer in Hampton and ordered to Exeter Hospital, where his condition today is described as "good".

Hampton police said Rev. Boucher became short of breath as he attempted to swim back to shore from a short distance off. They said a strong undertow is common at that spot when the tide is coming in.

The mother of two children, Mrs. Theresa Messier, 38, also of Montreal, was standing in about three feet of water when she apparently lost consciousness and fell over. Two bystanders pulled her from the water and summoned police about 12:30. She was taken to Exeter Hospital after examination by Dr. Bryer. Hospital authorities said she was discharged last night.

At 2:45 yesterday afternoon, Arthur Rioux, 64, of Joliette, Que., was taken to the hospital after examination by Dr. Peter A. Meneghin. Police said Rioux apparently suffered a heart attack and fell to the sidewalk on North Shore boulevard opposite 19th street. Rioux was reported "somewhat improved" at the hospital this morning.

Capt. Lloyd C. Ring operated the police ambulance in all three emergency cases.

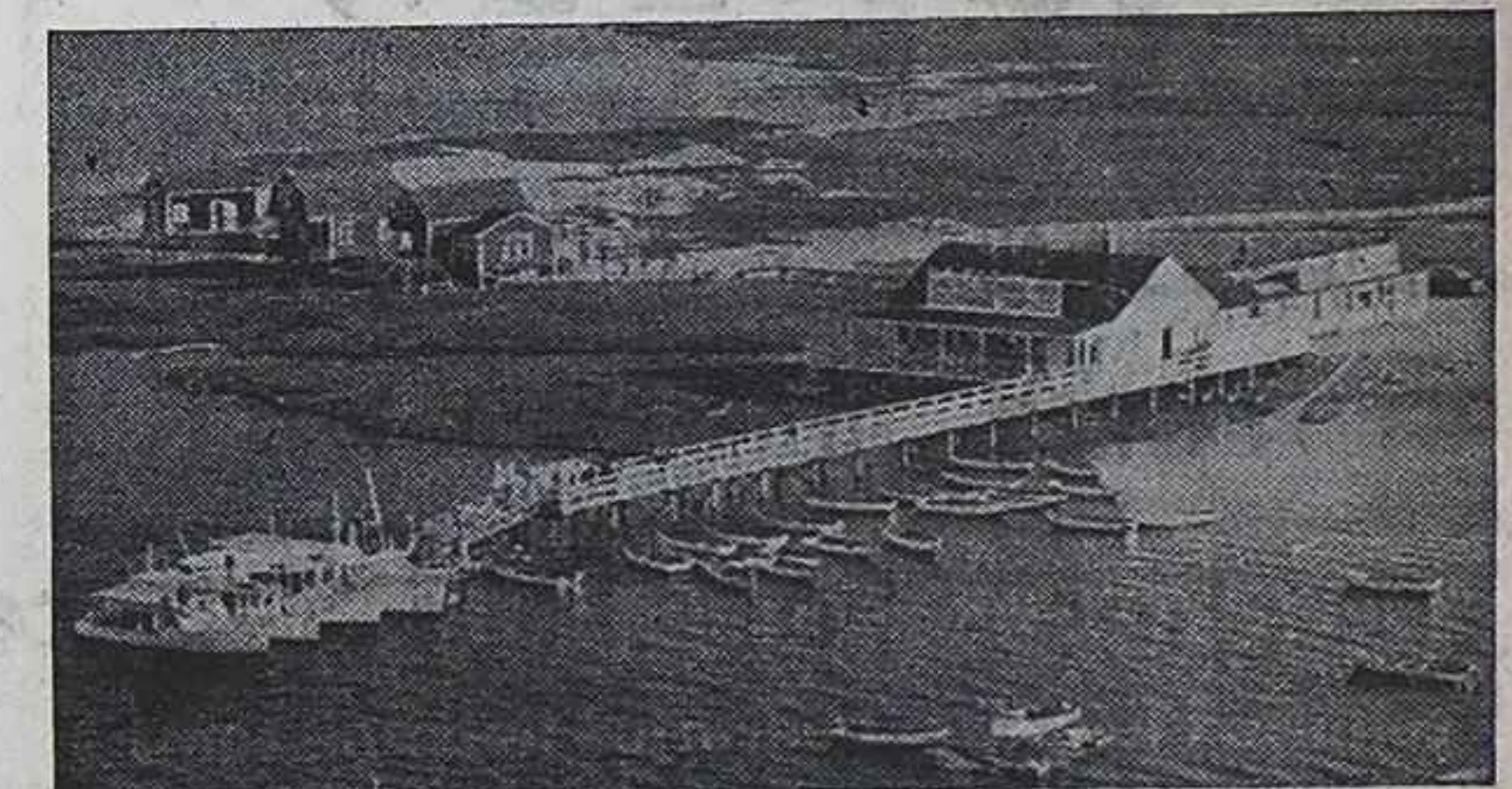

\$2 Million Erosion Program For Seacoast Aired

An erosion protection program for the entire coastline of New Hampshire, estimated

to cost nearly \$2 million, was recommended this week by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The program includes 17 specific projects, three of which were proposed for Hampton Beach.

At a hearing in Concord, the engineers outlined the recommendations which resulted from a study conducted for the State Department of Public Works and Highways. Funds for the study were used from the governor's emergency fund following the damaging storms of 1958. Local officials from the shoreline towns were present at the hearing as well as Highway Department officials.

Proposed for Hampton Beach was the construction of an impermeable jetty 235 feet long, extending out to sea from the seawall and anchored on the ledge of rocks which is visible at low tide, several hundred feet north of the N. H. Marine Memorial, opposite Church street.

The jetty would cost an estimated \$18,000 of which the federal government would pay one-third upon assurance that the state and local government would pay the other two-thirds.

The jetty would be constructed of one-ton outer stones with a sand-tight core of smaller stone. Engineers said the jetty would help prevent sand from washing off the northern end of the main beach, where sand fill has been washed away at an alarming rate.

The jetty would not solve the whole problem of keeping sand on the beach, however, and the engineers recommended that a program of periodic renourishment be established whereby the federal, state, and perhaps the local government would cooperate in replacing sand every four or five years at a cost of \$50,000 each time. Federal laws permit the federal government to pay one-third of this cost, for renourishment during at least the next 10 years.

Two other Hampton Beach projects recommended by the

Army engineers would not be eligible for federal aid. They were the proposed protection of Great Boar's Head and 2,000 feet of stone retaining wall along the steel seawall on Hampton's North Beach.

These projects do not qualify for federal aid, according to the engineers' report, because beach front property in these areas is largely privately owned and because there is not

adequate parking space for EROSION

public use. Public Law 826, 84th Congress, provides one-third federal assistance for protective work done on "that portion of the shore which is publicly owned generally."

The report recommended that 800 feet around the tip of Boar's Head be protected with riprap consisting of 1,000-lb.

stones. Cost was estimated at \$46,000. Some work has been done by the state for the protection of the north and south sides of the Head, but the tip remains exposed to storms. Rep. Douglass E. Hunter of Hampton sought a state appropriation of \$50,000 for this project in the last session of the legislature, but the measure was defeated in committee.

The report also recommended that riprap be placed along

both ends of the new steel sea-wall which runs from Boar's Head toward North Beach. Cost of this project was set at \$86,000. The engineers' report calls for 1,200 feet of riprap consisting of 1,500-lb. stones against the southerly portion of the steel bulkhead and 800 feet against the northerly portion, leaving approximately 1,200 feet of the steel wall without riprap revetment.

Improvements at Seabrook and North Hampton beaches would likewise not qualify for federal participation, but a 400-ft. breakwater at Wallis Sands beach, Rye, would qualify for one-third federal assistance toward the total cost of \$123,000.

The engineers recommended \$170,000 be spent for improvements at the beach in North Hampton, just south of Little Boar's Head. Federal assistance for this project would be justified, the engineers said, if additional facilities for public use were provided, namely parking. But under present conditions the federal government could not help cover the expense of a 460-ft. jetty and



Clams Plentiful In Hampton River Beds

The digging of clams has become a popular pastime in New Hampshire. The number of persons who have purchased li-

THE BEACHCOMBER

censes to take clams has increased steadily from 926 in 1954 to 2,668 in 1959.

Hampton River has a plentiful supply of clams for those who like to dig them. Conservation officers in the coastal area remind clam diggers that

they must use a standard flattened clam digging fork, known as Ipswich Type. Any container used in digging clams, whether on the flats, on a dock or landing, or in a boat, must be clearly identified by the owner's license number. A waterproof tag may be used, or the number may be painted on the outside of the container.

The law also states that licenses must be worn in plain view in one of two prominent positions while a person is digging clams — (a) on the cap or hat or (b) on the front of the outer garment.

There is no size limit on clams, and a licensee may take and possess one peck of unshucked clams a day for personal use. No clams may be dug before sunrise or after sunset. Residents of New Hampshire may purchase a clam license for \$2.

Five Disabled Boats Aided By Busy Coast Guard Crew

The Coast Guardsmen at Hampton Beach aided five disabled boats Saturday and Sunday in their busiest weekend of the season to date.

BM/C Frank A. Cristoph reported one call Saturday from a 25-foot lobster boat, converted to a pleasure craft which became disabled five miles east of Boar's Head when a hole in the crank case caused it to lose oil.

The craft, owned and operated by John Follansbee of Seabrook, was towed to Seabrook Harbor by the Coast Guard's 30-footer, manned by EN/1 Victor Porro and SN Richard Crowley. Follansbee had two passengers aboard.

Sunday afternoon the Hampton station aided in four emergency boat rescues between 3 and 7 p.m.

The 50-foot party boat Eb-

baster out of Seabrook Harbor radioed for help when it became disabled with engine trouble near the Isles of Shoals. The Coast Guard rescue boat, operated by BM/C Roland Peakall and BM/3 Donald Rouse took the boat in tow back to harbor. The craft, owned by Raymond Seaver of Haverhill, was operated by Max Bressler of Haverhill and had 22 fishermen aboard.

The 50-foot party boat Mary Sib, owned by Donald Littlefield of Salisbury and operated by Joseph Cole of Seabrook, was towed to the Littlefield pier in Seabrook Harbor after it broke down about 5 p.m., two miles from the entrance to Hampton Harbor, with 39 persons aboard. Peakall and Rouse operated the rescue boat.

A 17-foot outboard with seven persons aboard broke down about a mile off Seabrook Beach at 7 p.m. Sunday while headed for Newburyport, Mass. The Hampton Beach Coast Guard stood by while the 40-footer from the Merrimac River Lifeboat station came to tow the craft to Newburyport. Coast Guard officials said the owner and operator was Charles Fowler of Murdock road, Salisbury, Mass.

Seabrook police cooperated with the Coast Guard in the rescue of a 13-year-old youth whose 14-foot runabout cap-sized 300 yards off Seabrook Beach about 7:30 p.m. Sunday. John McCarthy, son of Dr. H. Frank McCarthy of North Andover, Mass., was taken from the water by Lt. Charles H. Felch of the Seabrook Fire department, who was dispatched to the scene in the amphibious duck by Seabrook Police. Felch also recovered the boat and outboard motor.

Officer Roland Felch, who

assisted Charles Felch in operating the duck, reported young McCarthy was clinging to the overturned boat when they reached him. The man had been reported by witnesses on the beach.

Last Tuesday night a boat, the Little Susie of Seabrook was towed home by Hampton Coast Guard boat. Object of a two-hour search when she was reported missing the Little Susie, with four on board, was found two miles inside the Isles of Shoals by Portsmouth patrol boat.

The Rockingham Hotel in Portsmouth was originally the mansion of Hon. Woodbury Langdon and was built in 1785 at a cost of \$30,000.

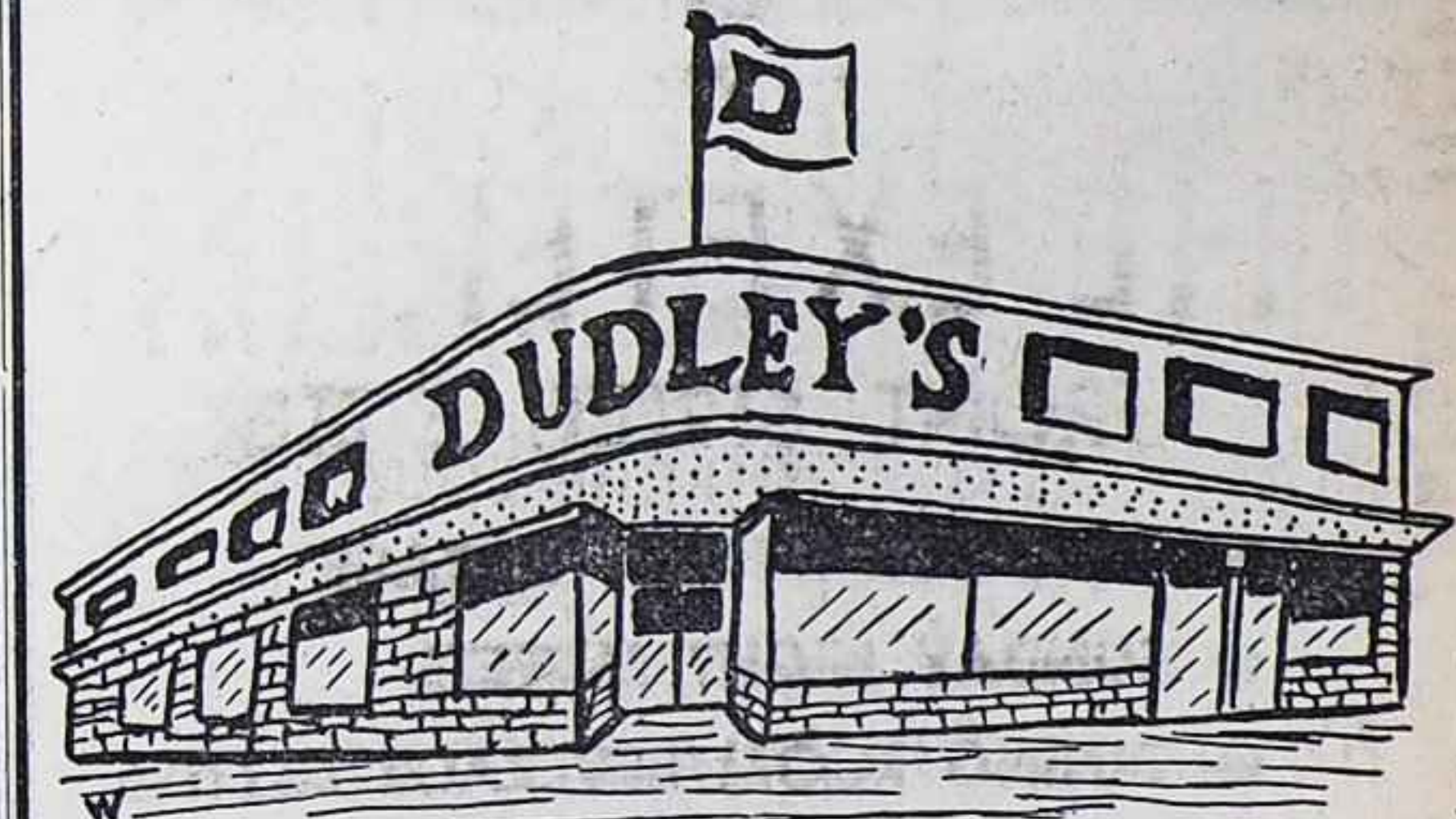

For Seabrook Beach, the engineers recommended restoring and protecting approximately 3,000 feet of beach by widening to a 150-ft. width with direct placement of sand fill and enlargement and extension of the existing south jetty at the Hampton Harbor inlet.

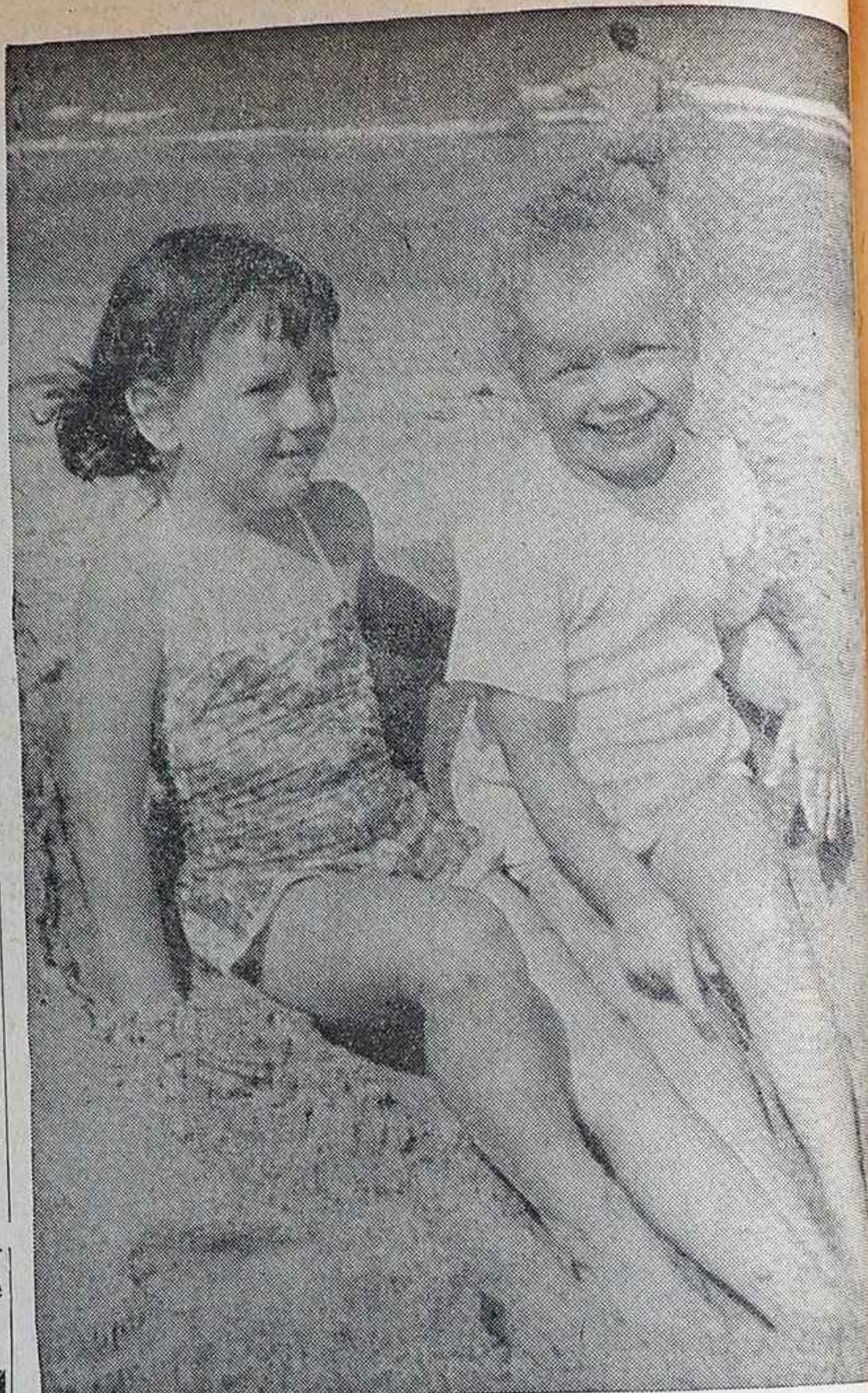

The extension of the jetty by 780 feet across White Rocks would provide the protection necessary to hold the sand fill in place and give Seabrook Beach a permanent width of 150 feet, which the engineers consider to be the desirable width for bathing beaches.

The Seabrook Beach project is not considered to justify federal assistance and thus would cost the state and town a total of \$365,000 if undertaken by local interests at their own expense.

Other projects recommended included construction of a stone mound 330 feet long at Little Boar's Head in the vicinity of the fish houses in North Hampton (\$11,000); construction of a stone mound and riprap placement along the toe of about 500 feet of bluff between Little Boar's Head and Juniper Point, North Hampton (\$69,000); and construction of a stone mound approximately 1,150 feet long on Bass Beach, North Hampton (\$60,000).

\$1.1 Million In New Construction

Construction in Hampton during the first six months of 1960 ran well ahead of that during the same period last year, according to figures released this week by Alfred Janvrin, building inspector.

Through June 30, 187 building permits representing \$1,188,375 in construction have been issued by Janvrin's office. During the corresponding period last year, 127 permits totaling \$764,200 had been issued.

Janvrin noted that the total construction figure to date is only \$186,575 less than the total for the entire year of 1959. He said, however, that building usually drops off between June and November, and that it is unlikely the figure for the year will reach the record high of \$2 million set in 1956.

Building during the first quarter of the year included several large construction projects, but in the second quarter home building led the list of permits with 37 year-round homes being constructed at a cost of \$384,500. Construction of cabins, alterations, garages and carports, as well as a swimming pool, in the last three months brought the total for the second quarter to \$535,725.

Permits issued during the first quarter included a large cottage building project by Harris Real Estate, the building of a boxboard factory by the Dalton Realty company, and the reconstruction of the Spindrift motel by Kenneth W. Langley. Those major projects plus 16 houses and a number of garages and alterations to houses brought the first quarter total to \$652,650 — a new record high for three-month period.

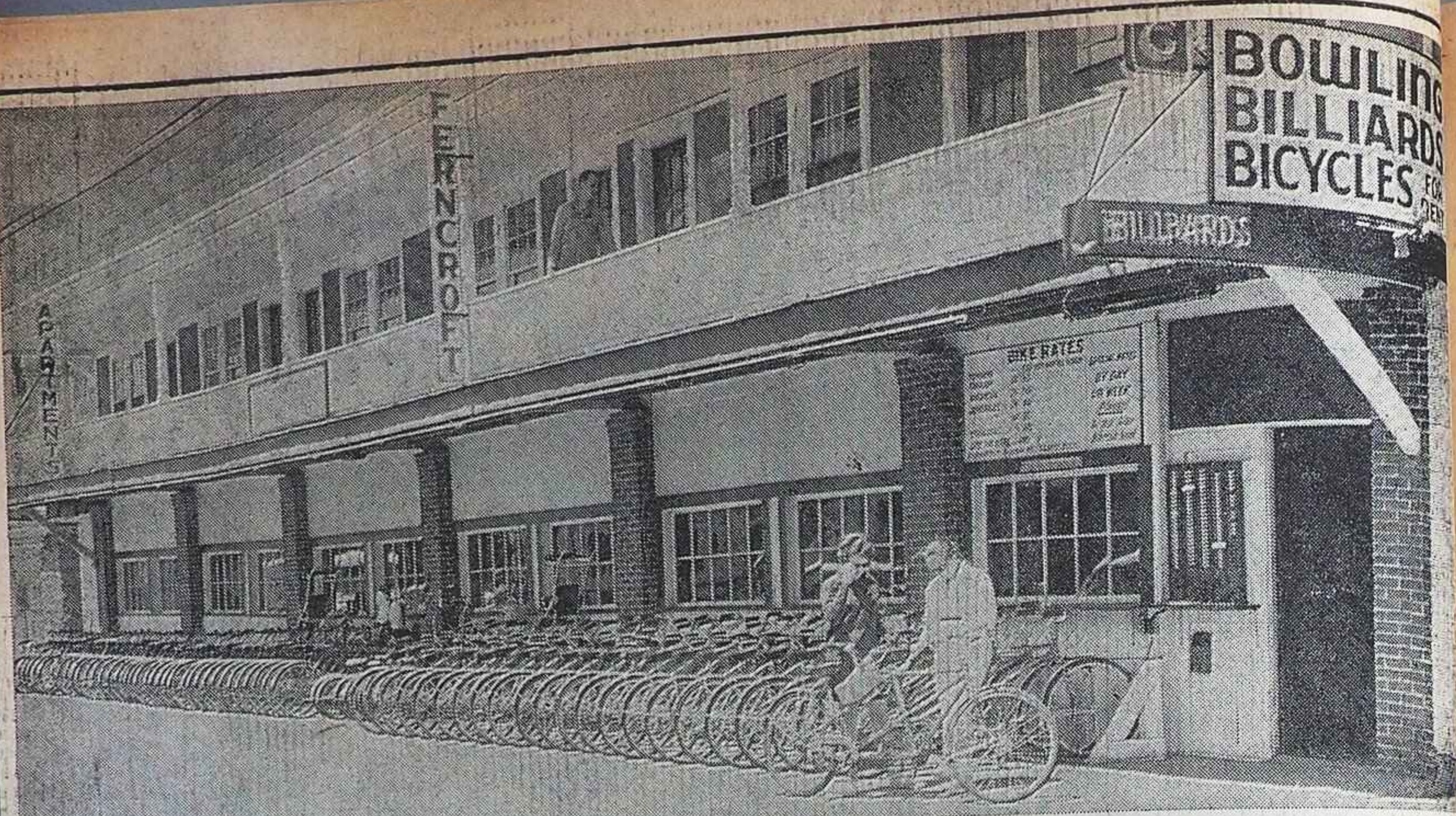
