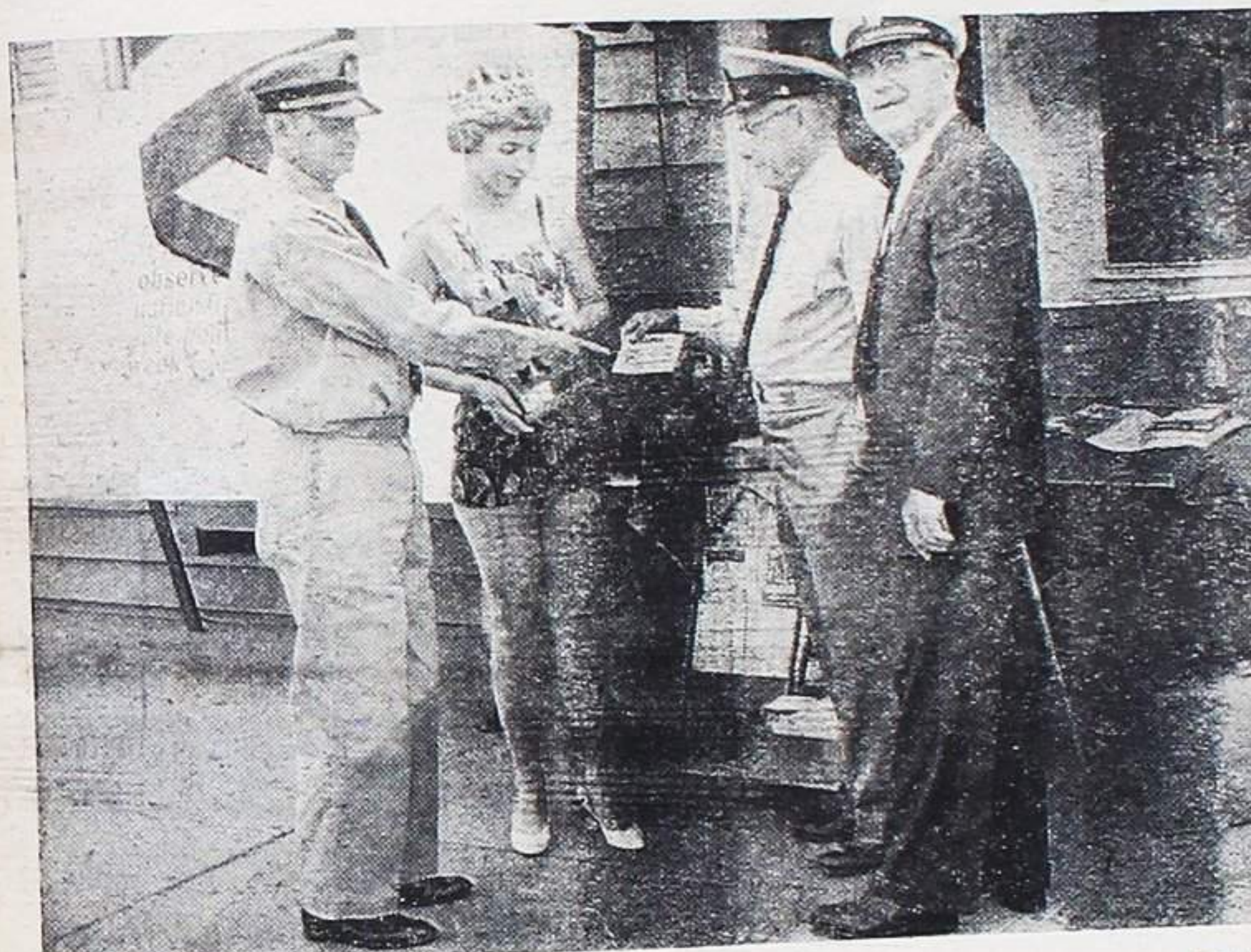

Governor Wesley Powell has proclaimed July 2 through July 8 as Boat Safety week in the state of New Hampshire. As a prelude to this event, Hampton Beach held its annual Boat Safety days June 23 and 24 under the supervision of Harry Aspey, Public Relations and Safety Officer as well as Director of the U. S. Power Squadron located at Portsmouth.

The highlight of the two day affair was the crowning of the Boat Safety Queen at Hampton Beach Saturday afternoon from the bandstand.

The U. S. Power Squadron of Portsmouth, representing the Seacoast area, chose this year's queen. The winner was Rita Eugaine Buzachers, 18, 518 Sherburne road, Portsmouth.

Miss Buzachers previously attended the Dover High school where she was a member of the debating team for two years. She was also on the editorial staff of the school newspaper where she was Variety Editor. She was a member of the Student Council at Dover High and she recently competed in state and national dramatic contests. She graduated from Portsmouth High school last week.

Lionel Lambert and Harry Arthurs, both officers in the Portsmouth Power Squadron, placed the coronation crown.

New Route Across Marshes Planned

Governor Wesley Powell recently announced that he and his Executive Council hope to reach a decision July 3rd on the location of the long awaited road from the Exeter by-pass to the beach.

Throughout the winter and spring months, plans for the proposed expressway have continued in the planning stages. Following an expression of opinion of the voters of Hampton and Hampton Beach during the spring, stating that they were not in favor of a northern route as proposed by the State Highway department, new plans were formulated for a so-called southern route by Commissioner John Morton and his department.

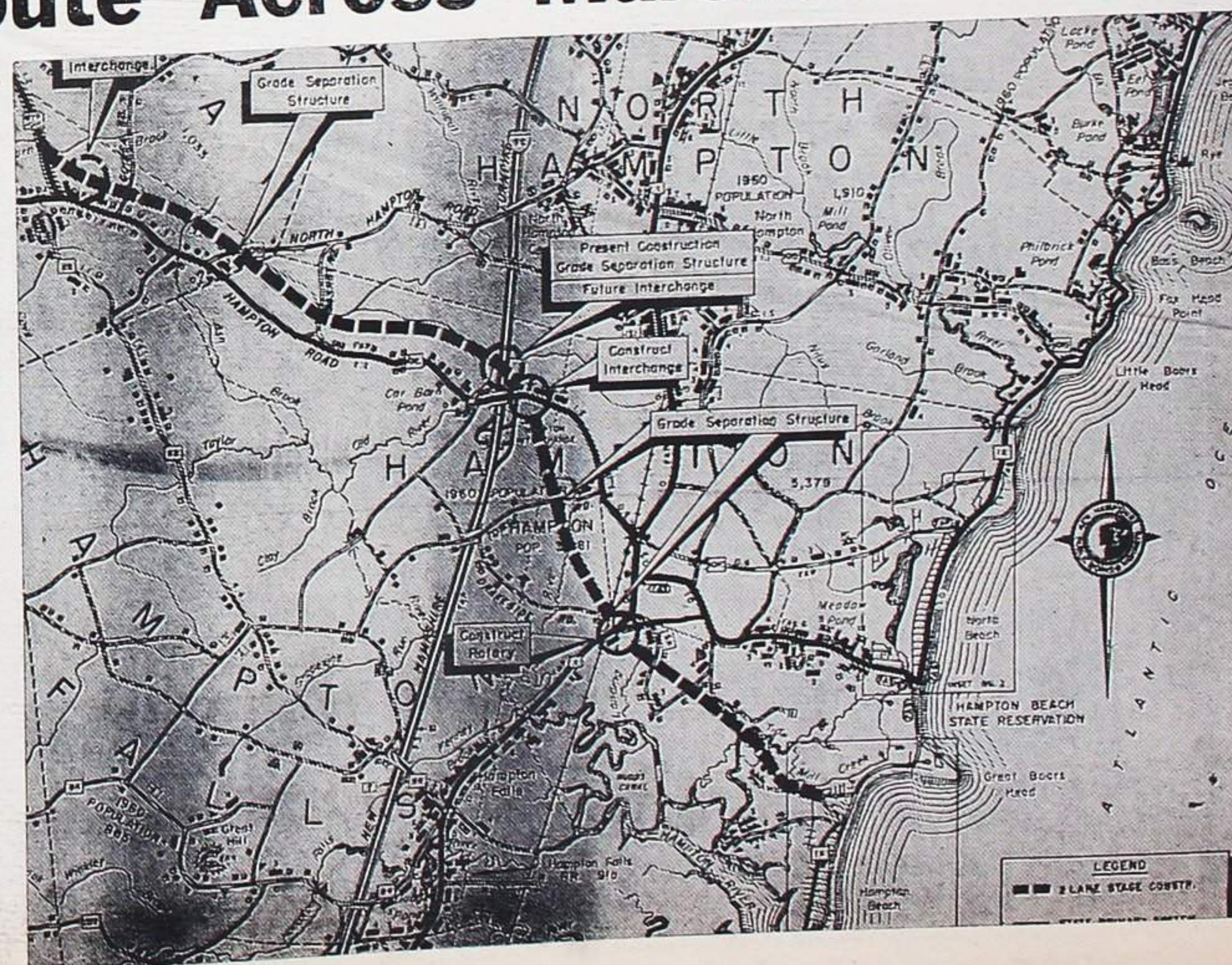
On June 9, a capacity crowd of more than 200 persons filled the Marston school, Hampton, to overflowing to take part in a public hearing on the revised southern route.

Governor Wesley Powell, as he had previously promised the citizens of the area, personally conducted the hearing. All the members of the Executive Council were in attendance.

The governor, in his opening remarks, stated that if the present lay-out was accepted that work on the northerly or Exeter end would undoubtedly begin late this summer and work on

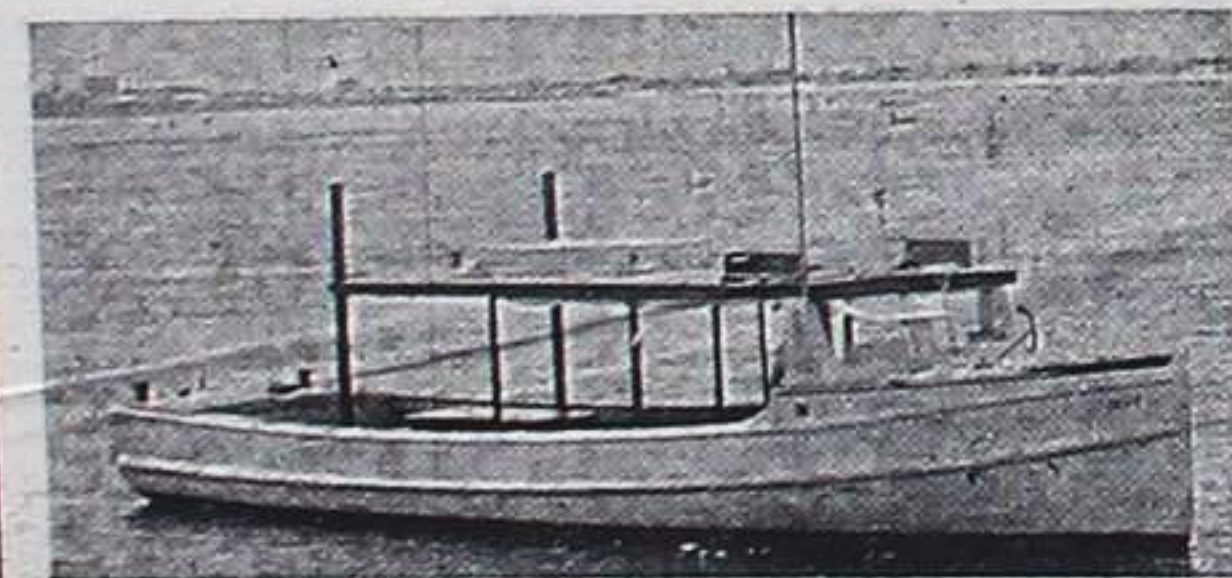

List Outstanding Events For Beach Summer Visitors

The Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce recently released the largest schedule of events in its history for a summer season. The local Chamber works continuously throughout the winter months co-ordinating a summer program that will annually provide a summer of relaxing fun for those who visit the seacoast area as well as providing entertainment for the persons of its own area.

One of the outstanding new attractions, which the directors of the Chamber have been working on for several years and have finally succeeded in arranging, will be the use of a Kinsman home organ.

Elmer Henneka, well known beach business man, has been giving "spot" concerts with the organ from the bandstand during the past several weeks. On June 24, the organ will be officially used for the first time with the new Hampton Beach concert band which will be conducted by Frank Lawlor. Paul Varette, well known musician in the seacoast area, will give concerts on the organ each Monday afternoon and it will be used with the Monday evening talent parades as well as with the daily band concerts.

Unofficially, the beach season opened April 15 when the Casino ballroom doors were opened for the first time. Since that time, the beach has been visited by the New Hampshire D.A.V., the Elks, and the John

Hancock Mutual Life Insurance company. The latter group held its outing here for the fourth straight year.

Officially, the 1961 summer vacation season opened Tuesday, June 20, with the annual precinct and Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The first big weekend was held Friday and Saturday by the United States Coast Guard and United States Power Squadron as they hold "boat safety days". A turbocraft jet boat demonstration was given.

Other special days will be Senior Citizens' Day on June 27, Golden Age club outing, July 9, C.Y.O. day, June 26, Air Force day, July 13, and Old Home day, August 5.

Regular band concerts begin June 30 and will continue through Labor day. Four concerts will be presented each day except Monday from the bandstand. The hour-long concerts begin each day at 2, 4, 7, and 8:30 p.m.

A fireworks display will again be held on the main beach at 9 p.m. on each Wednesday evening. The first display is scheduled for the Fourth of July celebration.

The Chamber of Commerce believes that vacations should be healthful as well as restful. They are, therefore, continuing a feature which has been very popular in past years by offering a calisthenics program each morning at 10:30 a.m. The program will be conducted on the beach in front of the bandstand.

Salt water fishermen who visit the area will, for the eighth straight year, be given a chance to join the Old Salts club. This club honors fishermen who bring in the "big ones" from Hampton waters. Specifications for membership in the select club are available at the Chamber of Commerce office. Certificates of membership, felt sleeve patches, and billfold cards certifying that the carrier has booked a fish worthy of permanent recognition are presented to qualified fishermen.

WEEKLY SPECIALS The ever popular talent show will again be held from the bandstand every Monday evening at 7 p.m., beginning July 10. Any amateur performer may enter and each week a trophy will be awarded to winners in both the junior and senior divisions. Weekly winners will compete in the finals August 22 for a cash award.

Another Monday night special initiated by John Dineen, popular owner of the Casino ballroom, is the "Get Acquainted Night" dance. This begins at 8:30 and is designed to give persons a chance to become acquainted the old-fashioned New England way. Guests at the beach may obtain passes for half prices from their hosts.

Starting July 5 and continuing every Wednesday through Labor Day, the Casino ballroom will also be open for teen age. Guest disc jockeys will be featured from 2 to 4 p.m. tured.

The big favorite of Hampton natives and vacationers alike will be held each Friday evening 7 to 8 p.m. Paul Verrette will be at the organ for the weekly Community sing at the bandstand.

The two big mid-season events will be the crowning of Miss Hampton Beach at the Casino ballroom on July 25 and the selection of Miss New England on August 15. Both contests are open to any girl who wishes to enter and is qualified. Applications may be obtained at the Chamber office.

The season will be climaxed with a week long Mardi Gras celebration from August 19 to August 26. A few of the special events during the week will find an antique car exhibition being held, parades, horseshoe contest, barber shop quartet competition, fashion show, sand castle contests, vaudeville acts, and dances. Climaxing the gala week long festivities will be the Coronation ball to be held at the Casino ballroom on August 25.

Gov. Wesley Powell indicated Tuesday night that final layout and design plans for the Route 101-C expressway from Exeter to Hampton Beach will probably be ready for action at the next Governor and Council meeting - scheduled for July 3rd.

State Highway department engineers and survey crews are busy on the Hampton section of the by-pass and Commissioner John O. Morton expects that all necessary preliminary layouts can be completed for the July 3 session of the Council.

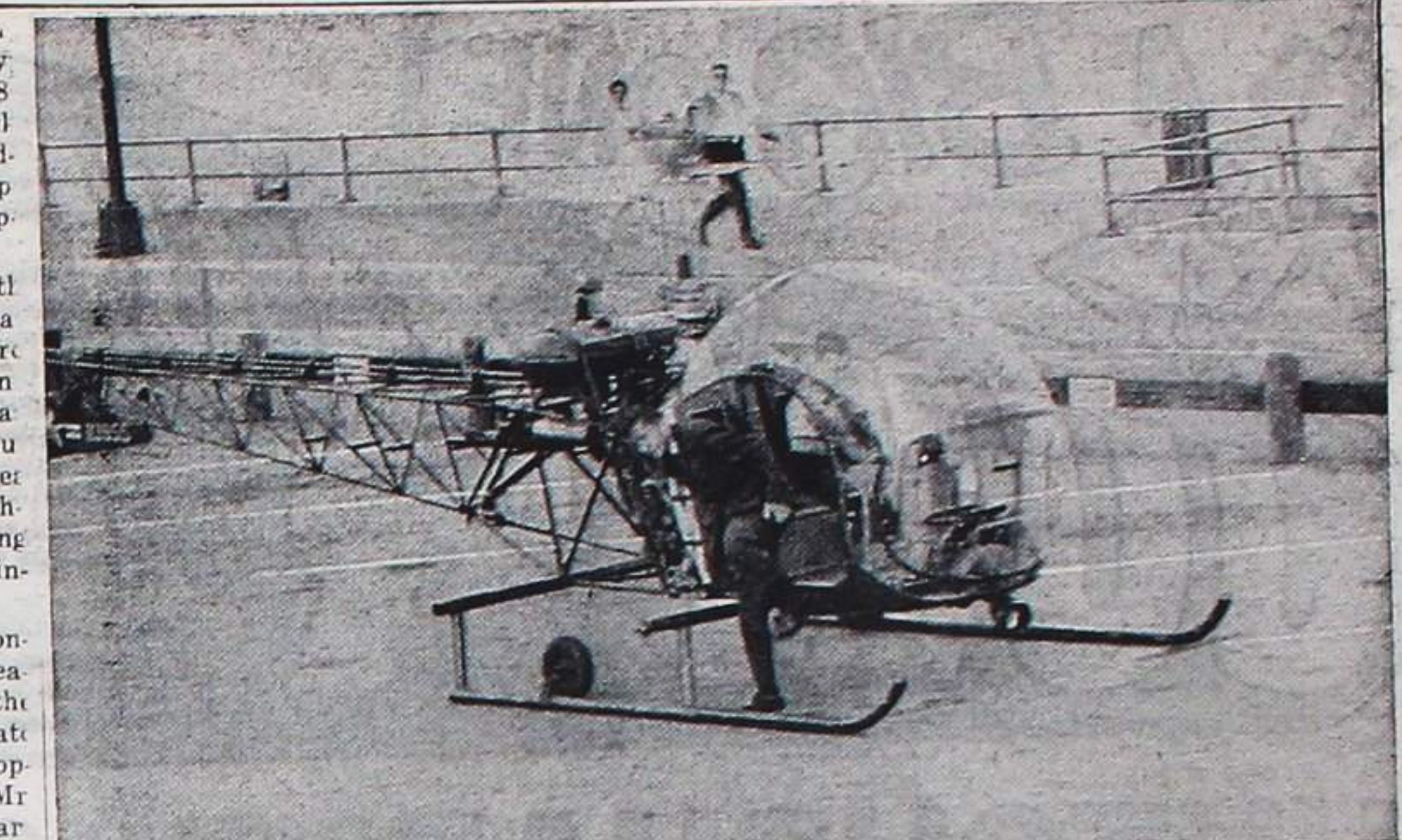

Powell Lauds Work Of '61 Legislature

One of the finest seasonal kick-off banquets in recent years was held last Tuesday evening at the Ashworth Hotel by the combined efforts of the Hampton Beach Precinct and the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce.

Highlighting the evening's events was the arrival of Governor Wesley Powell in a National Guard helicopter. Gov. Powell was forced to use this means of transportation from the National Guard armory in Concord after a previous engagement in order to reach the beach banquet on time.

The helicopter made a perfect landing in an area roped off by Hampton police in front of the Ashworth and Governor Powell immediately joined his wife at the head table.

Following the invocation which was delivered by the Reverend Manning Van Nostrand, new pastor of the Hampton Methodist church, another of the many highlights of the evening took place. Stanwood Brown, chairman of the Merchants Division of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce, presented Miss Carolyn Brown, valedictorian of this year's graduating class at Winnacun-

net High school with the first annual Valedictory award. This honor is to be annually bestowed upon the class valedictorian for her outstanding scholastic ability by the Merchants Division.

Following the serving of the lobster dinner and a community singing, a moment of silence was observed for Alvin T. Redden, former executive secretary of the Seacoast Regional Association, Al Morse, former director of the beach Chamber of Commerce, and James Fallon, lifetime honorary member of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce. These men who had done so much for the Seacoast area in past years, died during the winter months.

Words of welcome were spoken by chairman of the Precinct Commissioners, John Foley and by Ralph Moulton, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

Miss Molly Savage, director of the N. H. state promotional office located in the Laurentian Hotel in Montreal, Canada gave a brief talk on her duties. She is on a short tour of the entire state of N. H. seeking first hand recreational information which she may pass on to her Canadian friends.

Ralph Moulton introduced Governor Powell who in turn presented the first annual Man of the Year Award to James W. Tucker, Sr., who received a tremendous standing ovation as Governor Powell handed him the beautiful mahogany plaque. Governor Powell gave, what he termed, a report to the people of his communities. The governor introduced many members of his Executive and Legislative families who were present for the occasion and elaborated on the fine work they were doing on behalf of their respective communities and for the state during this session of legislature.

He stated that he firmly believed that the 1961 session of legislature will go down in the annals of legislative history in N. H. as the most outstanding in modern times.

Governor Powell especially praised the work being done by local representatives of the General Court who were present, Herbert Casassa and Douglas Hunter of Hampton and George Carter of North Hampton.

During the evening, the governor spoke of the long awaited road from Exeter to the seacoast. He noted that he and his council will probably reach a decision concerning the location of the road on or about July 3.

He also noted that a N. H. state promotional office has been opened in Boston with Andrea Dale in charge. He also stated that N. H. will join shortly with other New England states in opening another promotional office in Cleveland, Ohio.

The governor also drew a round of applause when he noted that the state will probably go over the \$1,000,000 mark in advertising and promoting the state of New Hampshire for the first time this year. This has long been a sore spot of many business people as they did not feel their own personal advertising and promoting was being backed up by the state.



Working with Stone will be eight permanent and three part time guards. Dean, Tom, and Paul Quinlan, all of Wakefield, Mass., Don Trembley, Lawrence, Mass., Hal Curlette, Haverhill, Mass., Skip Perkins, North Andover, Mass., Dave Do-deau, Lawrence, Mass., and Jim Donahue, Melrose, Mass. will round out the full time guards. Helping during the week ends will be Bill Donovan, Somerville,

Mass., Bob Landry, Concord, N. H., and Wade Southwick, North Hampton.

The guards again will operate on a rotating basis this year with 6 men being stationed at the main beach, 2 guards at North Beach, and one man at Plaisance Cove daily. This will be the final year that the guards will come under the jurisdiction of the town of Hampton. Next year the state will have complete charge of the life guards at the beaches mentioned above as well as at the State Park area.

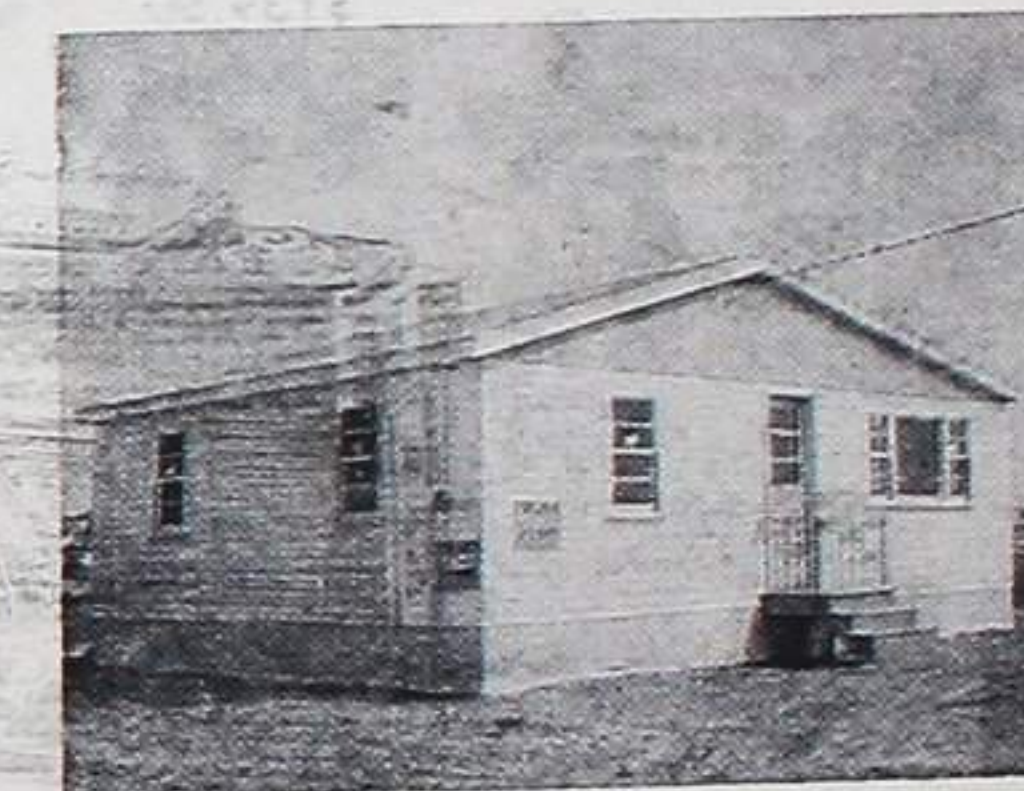

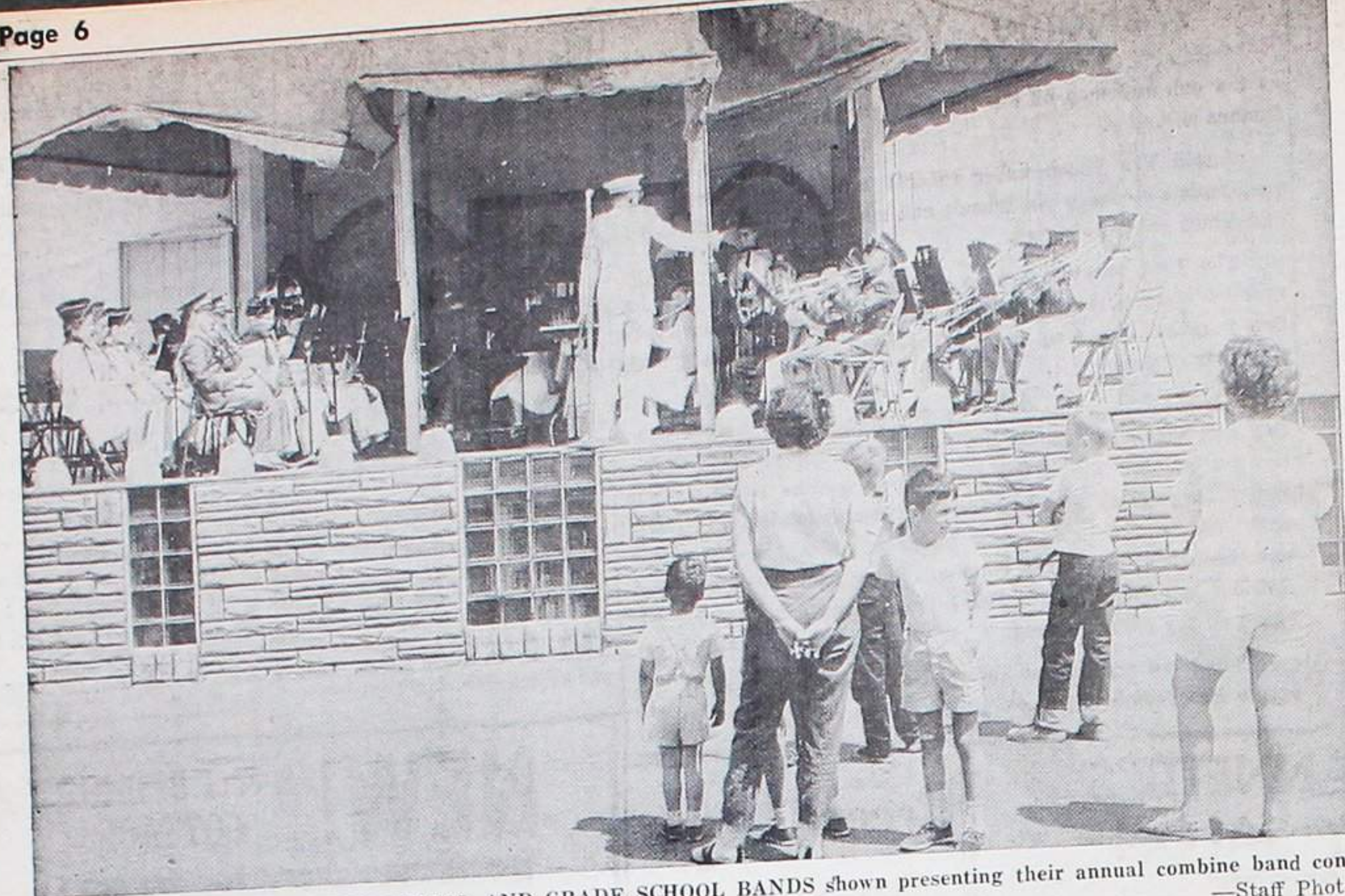

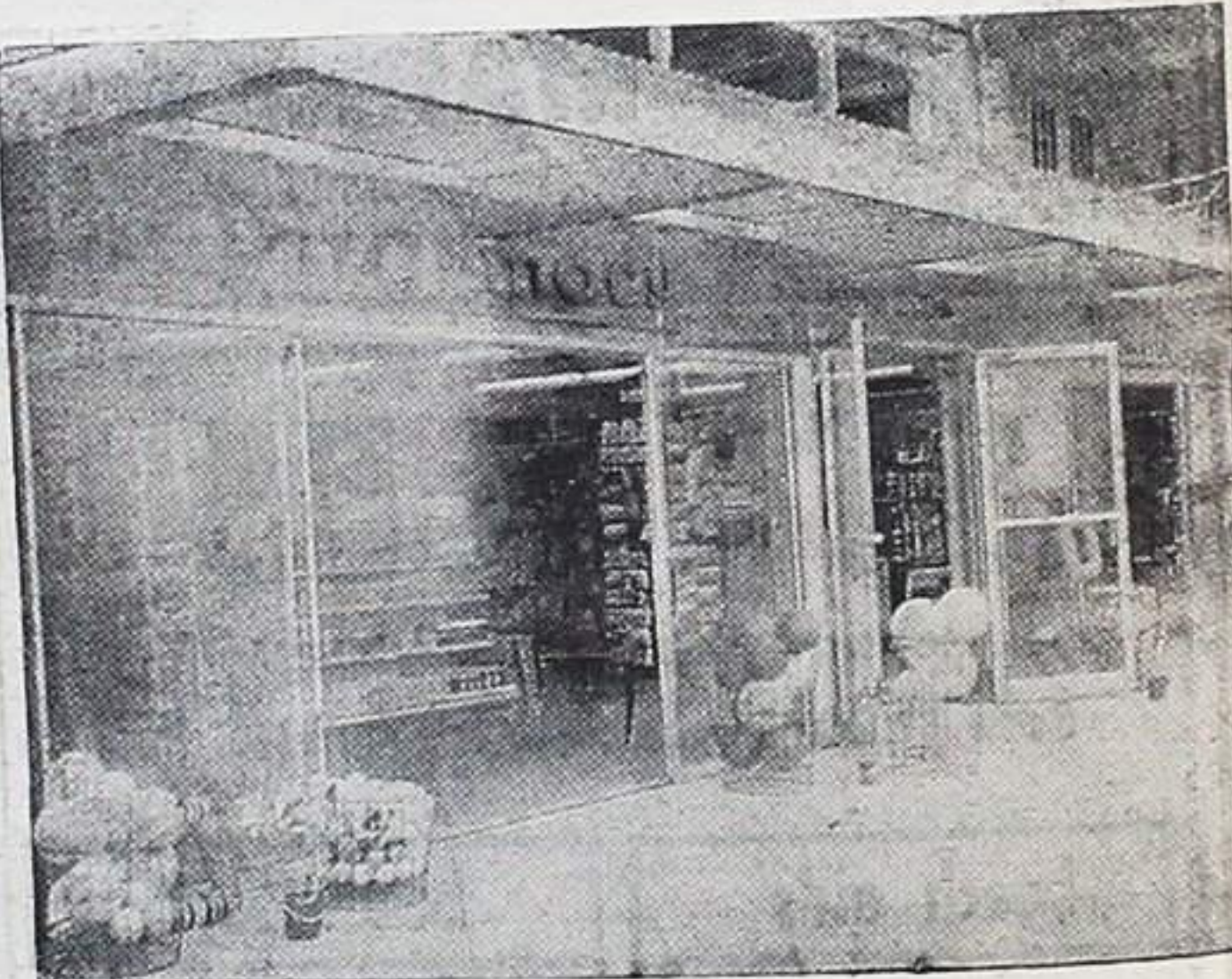

Toll Rates Up

Motorists using the New Hampshire toll road and the continuation of the Eastern turnpike to Rochester have found that the toll rates have changed, effective June 20.

Under the plan, toll charges from Massachusetts line to Seabrook went from 20 cents to 25 cents. The toll from Seabrook line to the Hampton toll house is up from 10 cents to 15 cents.

From the Portsmouth traffic circle to Dover, the cost dropped from the original 15 cents to 10 cents.

The changes affect only passenger cars, pickup trucks, and panel trucks.

State Highway Commissioner John O. Morton proposed the changes in the toll on the 40 mile turnpike from Seabrook to Rochester which he expects to bring in an estimated \$8 million revenue by 1966.

Space Age Industries Pace Rapid N.H. Economic Growth

CONCORD, N. H. - "New Hampshire's increase of 12.7% from 1950 to 1960 was the second highest in New England. Much of it occurred in the last year or two of the decade as a result of an inflow of people from other states."

"Space and missile age industries accounted for most of this growth, reacting to a combination of advantages in which geographical location, labor supply and favorable government attitudes were critical ingredients."

"Geographically New Hampshire is a 'natural' for the electronics industry. Its southern border is only minutes away from other states."

"The evidence of recent growth are both tangible and statistical in New Hampshire. Former textile plants enjoy a high rate of occupancy."

"In Nashua, New Hampshire, where Tectron vacated 2.4 million square feet of industrial space in 1948, not one foot remains available for lease or sale. Elsewhere in New Hampshire the supply of older buildings is decreasing constantly," says the article written by Vincent R. Dahlfred, assistant industrial director of the New Hampshire State Planning and Development Commission.

"Simultaneously in New Hampshire, new industrial construction hits a steady pace, spotting isolated plants in smaller communities but developing rapidly growing concentrations in most of the cities by the expanding interstate highway network."

"Statistically New Hampshire can counter to both national and regional trends by increasing the number of its industrial workers by 6% from 1955 to 1960."

"Population in New Hampshire grew to keep with the Granite State's increase in employment opportunities. New

Beach Grocery Store Is Badly Gutted By Blaze

The first major fire of the young beach season gutted a building at 39 King's highway, North Beach recently. Chief Perley George of the local fire department stated that the State Fire Marshal's office was notified of the fire immediately and Deputy Fire Marshal Herbert Whitney is conducting an investigation. Firemen responded to an alarm at Box 41 to find the two-story frame building burning furiously. Observers noted that the fire seemed to have burst forth from the interior almost instantaneously and that it was well under way by the time the fire department arrived.

1650 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and 150 feet of 1 1/2 inch hose had to be laid as firemen battled the blaze to save it from spreading to other nearby buildings. Before the fire could be contained, firemen had to enter the burning building through thick smoke and intense heat in order to reach the center of the blaze. The building, known as Evelyn and Paul's grocery, contained a grocery store, bakery, one apartment on the first floor and two apartments on the second floor. It is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Paul LaRochelle of Manchester. The couple also own the Shoals View motel at 161 North Shore boulevard. Mr. LaRochelle stated that two of the apartments had just recently been remodeled and that the grocery store had just been completely renovated. He also noted that much new bakery equipment had been added and that some new equipment was still in the process of being installed.

The building was deemed a total loss by Fire Chief George and insurance adjusters even

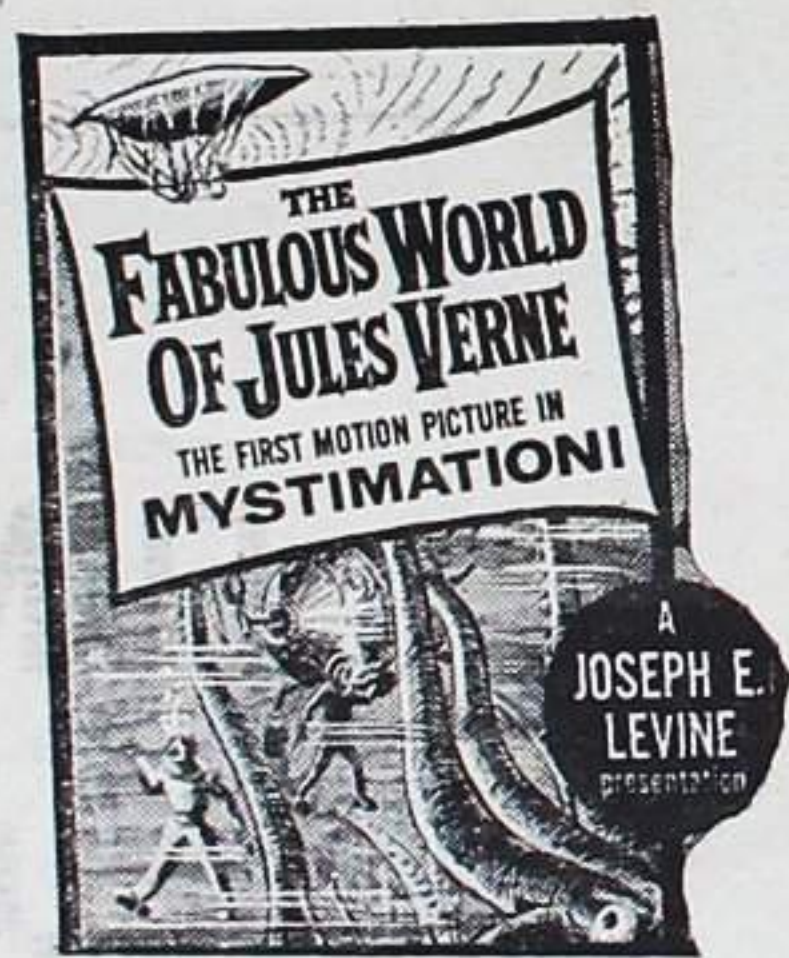

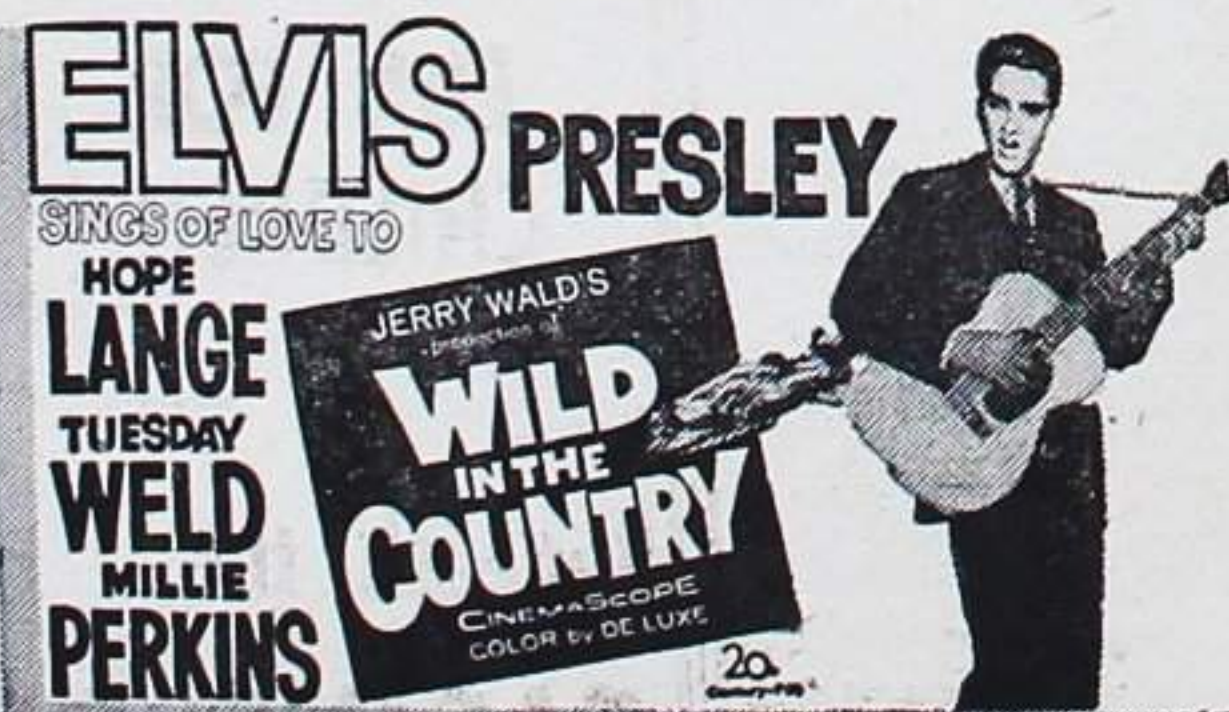

Top Athletes, Coaches Attend NHIAA Session At Beach, June 25 - 27

New Hampshire boat owners registered 17,009 craft during 1960, an increase of 1,744 over the previous year.

One of the greatest groups of athletes and coaches ever to visit the seacoast area met for the seventh annual New Hampshire Interscholastic Athletic Association coaching school to be held at the Hotel Ashworth, Hampton Beach, June 25, 26 and 27.

Winnacunnet High school director of athletics and head basketball and track coach, Robert Dodge, who is president of the New Hampshire coaches association noted that this was one of the greatest schools ever.

Head Boston University football coach, Steve Sinko, and his staff, Harold Kopp, line coach, John Mazur, backfield coach,

and George Winkler, end coach, headed the football instruction. Sinko, head coach at B. U. for the past 3 years, formerly played college and professional ball and was line coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers. He is a firm believer in "fundamentals."

Al Grenert, head basketball coach at St. Anselms highlighted the discussion on basketball. Grenert formerly played professional basketball, was a star at N.Y.U., compiled 12 consecutive winning seasons and has an overall record of 189 wins and 81 losses. He was elected small college "coach of the year" in 1961.

The conditioning and training of an athlete was handled by Tony Dougal, head trainer at Dartmouth for 11 years. He is widely known as a lecturer on athletic injuries.

Duke university graduate John Winkin, Jr., now baseball coach at Colby college in Maine, highlighted the baseball discussion. Winkin played at Duke under Jack Combs, formerly of the famed pitching trio of Combs, Bender and Plank of Connie Macks' Philadelphia Athletic days. Combs for many years was regarded as one of the deans of American baseball coaches. Winkins record at Colby brings this out as he has an 88 win - 42 loss record with 4 consecutive Maine titles.

Assisting with the basketball program was Press Maravich, head basketball coach at Clemson College, South Carolina. He is a former professional player with 10 years college experience as a coach and 4 years as a high school coach. Completing the staff for this year's session was Dr. John Bateman, head football coach at Rutgers. Bateman studied under "Bud" Wilkinson, was 10 years line coach under Lou Little and is a winged "T" authority.

A bulletin from the NHIAA stated that "coaches owe it to themselves and to their school systems to be up-to-date on latest developments in their sport. The care and prevention of athletic injuries, care and maintenance of uniforms and equipment, organization and administration of the total athletic program as it relates to the school - these are but a few of the areas to which attention was given." The NHIAA goes on to note that with coaches from all areas of the eastern U. S. in attendance at these meetings great opportunity is present for the sharing of ideas pertaining to the administration, development, and progress of inter-scholastic athletic programs.

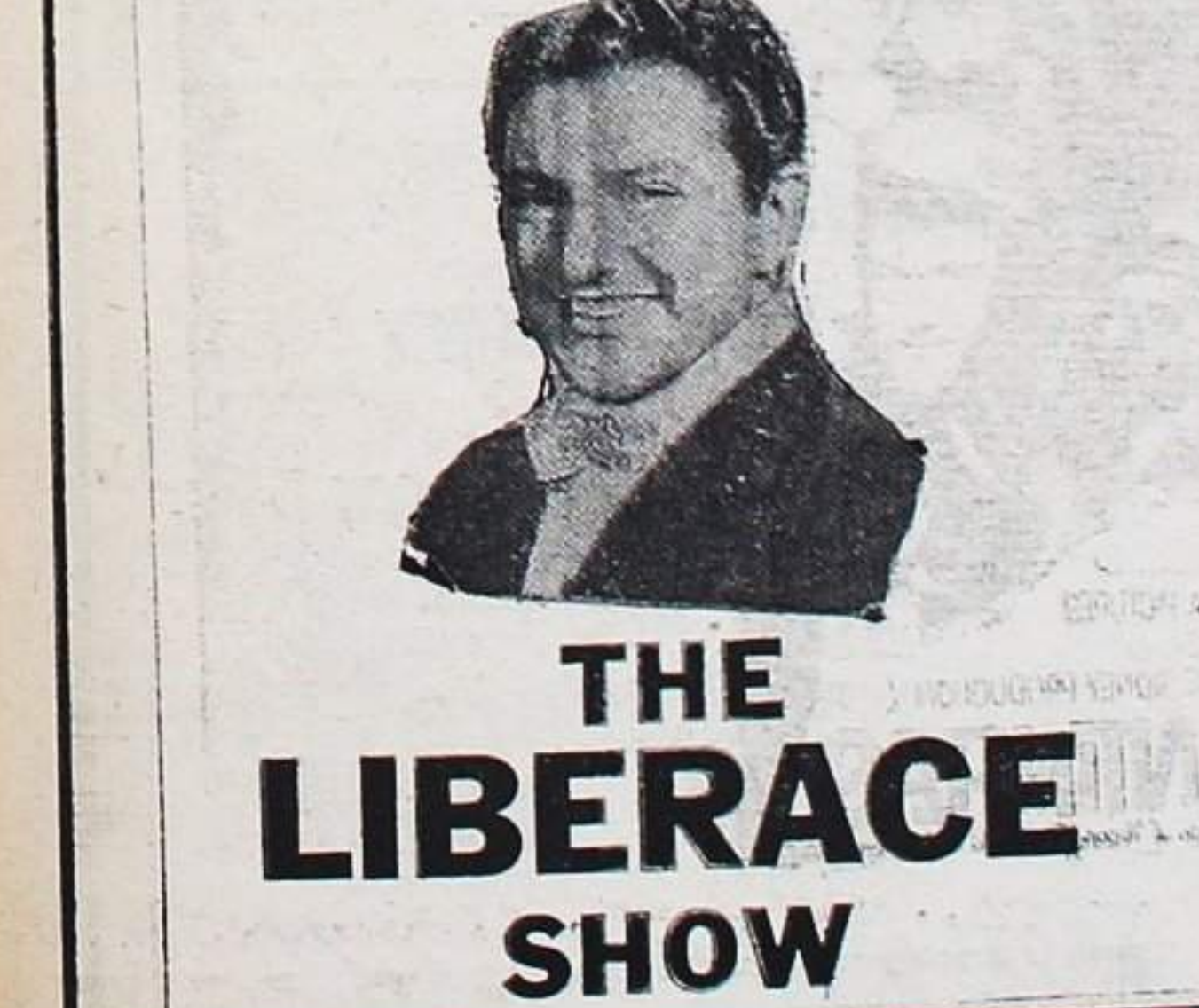

State Ordinances Govern Beach Front

No hard ball or football playing on the beach or sidewalks at any time.

No ball playing on the beach in crowds whether hard or soft. Causing broken glass or other dangerous substances to be left on highways or beaches is punishable under the laws of the state and shall be enforced. It is also unlawful for any persons to leave refuse by the roadside in N. H. in the towns of Hampton, North Hampton, and Hampton Falls under the code of ordinance Chapter VII, Section 6. The code does not apply to rubbish or garbage correctly left for collection.

The following regulations have been adopted for New Hampshire State park beaches including Hampton Beach. Swimming shall be restricted to the area designated as the swimming beach. Swimming under the raft or horseplay upon it, shall not be permitted.

Inflatables shall not be permitted in the water. Empty bottles shall not be permitted on the beach or in the water. Fires shall not be permitted on the beach. Dogs and other pets shall not be permitted in the water or on the beach.

When not endangering others, ball playing and similar games may be permitted at the discretion of the life guard.

In matters of safety and orderliness, persons shall obey all reasonable requests made by the authorized park personnel.

Persons found violating any of the above rules and regulations shall be evicted from the park and fined not more than \$25.00 (Section 7, Chapter 219, RSA).

Missing persons should be immediately reported to the lifeguard.

Lifeguards will not assume parental responsibility for children left unattended by their parents or guardian.

No person or organization shall be permitted to use or occupy any part of the town owned or controlled beaches between 1:00 a.m. and sunrise without first obtaining a permit from the Chief of Police of the Town of Hampton. The territory shall include all town owned or controlled beaches from Seabrook to North Hampton on the low water mark thence westerly to private, State or leased land. There shall be no fee for permits. Any person violating any of the provisions of this by-law shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$10 for each offense.

the beach end would commence later this fall. The road will be approximately 7½ miles long and will cost approximately \$3½ million.

State Highway Commissioner John O. Morton, with the assistance of many engineers and other members of his staff who were present and with the aid of large aerial photographic maps, gave a thorough explanation of the proposed southern route. Commissioner Morton stated that, "The location selected for this highway is the result of extensive engineering studies undertaken by consultant engineers who, in turn, have consulted at frequent intervals with local and civic officials and civic organizations contained in the Hampton area."

The Commissioner explained that the road would provide a direct route from the Exeter by-pass to Hampton Beach, that it would be an expressway type of facility, and that it would be generally constructed parallel to existing Route 101-C. The road will be for the present a two lane highway but necessary rights of way for a four lane divided highway will be acquired at this time.

from the complex of universities, laboratories and other supporting facilities in the metropolitan Boston area.

"From this breeding ground of electronics, branch plants and small beginning enterprises radiate naturally up the Merrimack River Valley along a leg of the interstate highway system which now reaches, without interruption, all the way to Tilton in the foothills of the White Mountains.

"New Hampshire's geography has some additional attractions. For some companies, it is the answer to the problem of recruiting engineers and scientists. One new plant was located in mid-state New Hampshire because company executives believed that a location in a four-season vacation area would be a real asset in recruiting technical personnel.

"Another company liked the fact that New Hampshire is a state of small cities and smaller towns where the absence of slums leads to one of the lowest juvenile delinquency rates in the nation.

"Symptomatic of New Hampshire's attractiveness to that type of industry, relying heavily on technically trained personnel, is the development, under private auspices, of a 200-acre industrial park in Laconia, catering exclusively to this type of industry.

"The Laconia park offers not only industrial sites and buildings, but also housing in garden-type apartments and single family residences, plus beach

privileges on nearby Lake Winnepesaukee, one of the state's major recreational waters.

"Backing up New Hampshire's physical attractiveness is a labor supply oriented toward industrial employment.

"Among all the states, New Hampshire has the second highest percentage of its population employed in manufacturing.

"Stability is the outstanding characteristic of this pool of workers. A high percentage of most manufacturers report a very low rate of labor turnover. Although half of all industrial workers are union members, the incidence of strikes and work stoppage is consistently low and was the lowest in the nation in 1960.

"Recognizing the overriding importance of manufacturing in the total economy, both State and local governments strive to create a favorable environment for industry.

"In terms of total tax impact, New Hampshire ranks slightly below the average for all the states, according to several studies.

"All indications are for an improvement in this situation, rather than the reverse. A key factor is the general agreement that a corporate income tax is out of the question and that new revenues when needed must come from other sources.

"Tax concessions and other forms of subsidy as an incentive to industry are either unconstitutional or frowned upon as a matter of principle. New Hampshire, however, has consistently been in the vanguard in extending other types of cooperation to industry.

"The New Hampshire Industrial Park Authority, created by Legislature in 1955, continues to be the only agency of its kind in the nation. This agency of State government is authorized to borrow to a limit of \$3 million from the State treasury to develop industrial sites and construct industrial buildings.

"All projects of the Authority are self-liquidating and, until the present time, the Authority has required reimbursement in full for its investment in either land or buildings at the time of sale or occupancy.

"In the New Hampshire Legislature, however, is a bill which would, in effect, make the Authority the instrument for a State-backed long-term financing program. The bill, regarded as virtually certain of passage, gives the Authority power to guarantee up to 50% of the amount of the mortgage loan on new industrial construction.

"The amount so guaranteed added to the amount available through normal first-mortgage financing, could add up to a total of 100% of the cost of land and buildings.

"In the New Hampshire Business Development Corp., the Granite State has the second credit development corporation in the United States. The agency, in 10 years, has loaned more than \$1.5 million to finance industrial development, most in the form of second mortgages.

"A bill giving this corporation mortgages guarantee powers comparable to those proposed for the Industrial Park Authority is also pending in the Legislature.

"Behind these two agencies

in New Hampshire are 30-odd community industrial development corporations with broad powers to aid in industrial development in a wide variety of ways.

"Tying the whole package is the Industrial Division of the New Hampshire State Planning and Development Commission. Best known as the State's representative in negotiations with industrial prospects, the Industrial Division also functions as a liaison agency between other development groups at both State and local levels.

"The Industrial Division also carries on a variety of programs for the benefit of established industry. One of these is an effort, begun four years ago, to aid industry in the recruitment of key personnel, particularly engineers.

"This increasingly successful program progressed through stages to the point where the State, on behalf of all New Hampshire industry, placed the first of a series of recruitment advertisements late last winter.

"It is, so far as the state is aware, the first instance of any State government participating

actively in attempts to aid industry in solving its recruitment problems."

Tucker, Sr., Sponsored by The Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce, June 20, 1961, In Recognition of his dedicated and unselfish service in behalf of this community, not only during the current year, but for his counsel and inspiration over many prior years."

Mr. Tucker is perhaps best known for his weekly articles entitled, "Our Town", which appears in the HAMPTON UNION. For many years, he has waged a personal "crusade" on numerous controversial issues. He has fearlessly, often times in the midst of a great deal of ridicule "fought with the pen" for the things he honestly believed would most help his beloved community of Hampton.

Jim has, for many years, been a great advocate of economical school systems. Yet, he is a firm believer of educating the child in the best possible way.

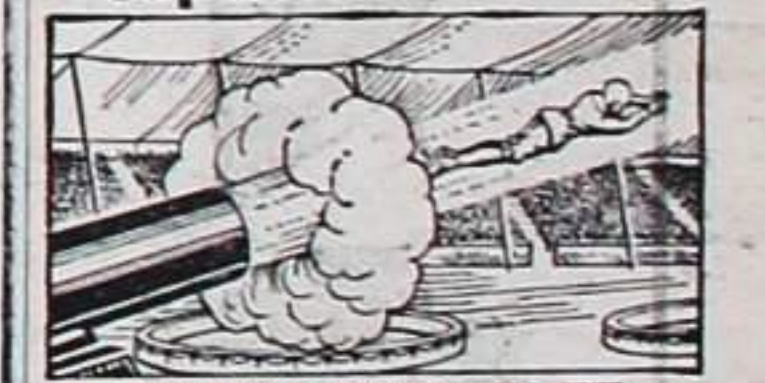

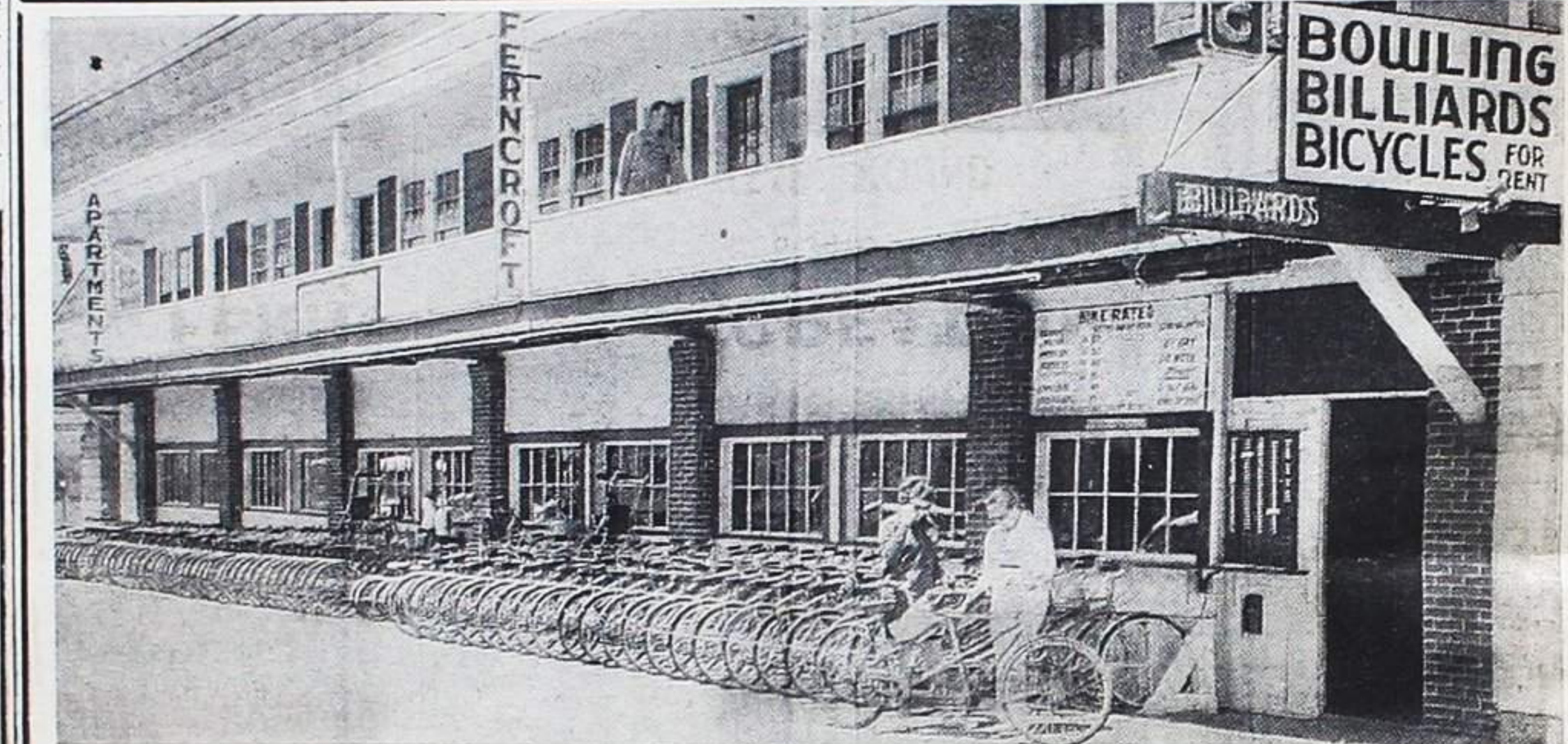

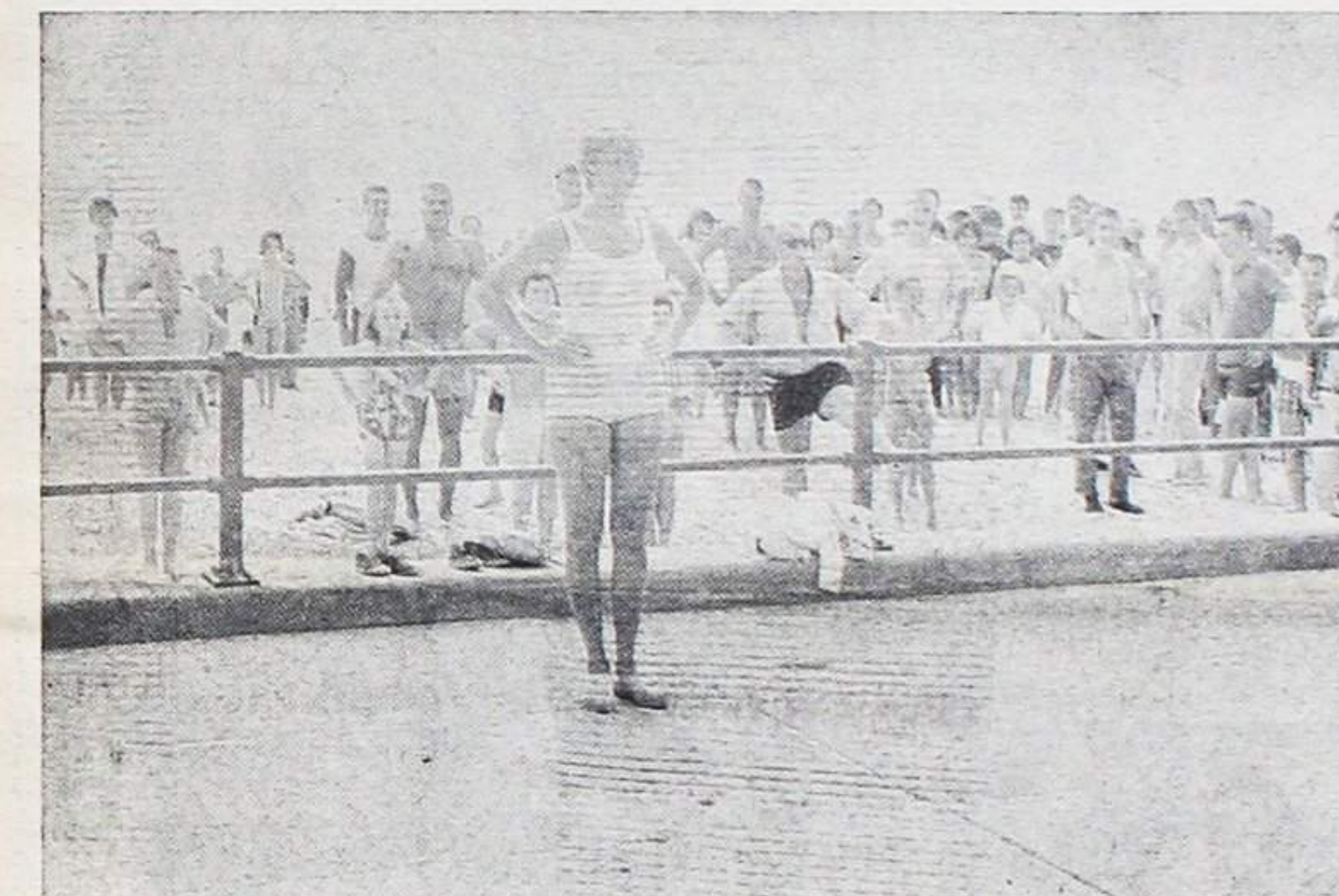
