

**Rockingham To Open
29th Season July 3**

SALEM, N. H.—Rockingham Park, New Hampshire's only thoroughbred race track, will write another chapter into its long history as it opens its 29th year Monday, July 3.

The traditional Rockingham "doubleheader" with five races in the morning and nine in the afternoon will be staged on July 4th, the second day of the 54-day meeting.

The appearance of many new stables coming in from Delaware, New York, New Jersey, Michigan, Kentucky, and Maryland lend spice to the New England thoroughbred season. A total of 1,400 horses are expected out of some 2,100 applications.

Additional parking for 1,500 cars has been provided since last year's meet, and the more remote sections of the spacious parking area will be served by surreys taking patrons directly from their parked cars to the clubhouse and grandstand gates.

All is in readiness for New England's first pari-mutuel track to launch its 29th consecutive season of thoroughbred racing Monday.

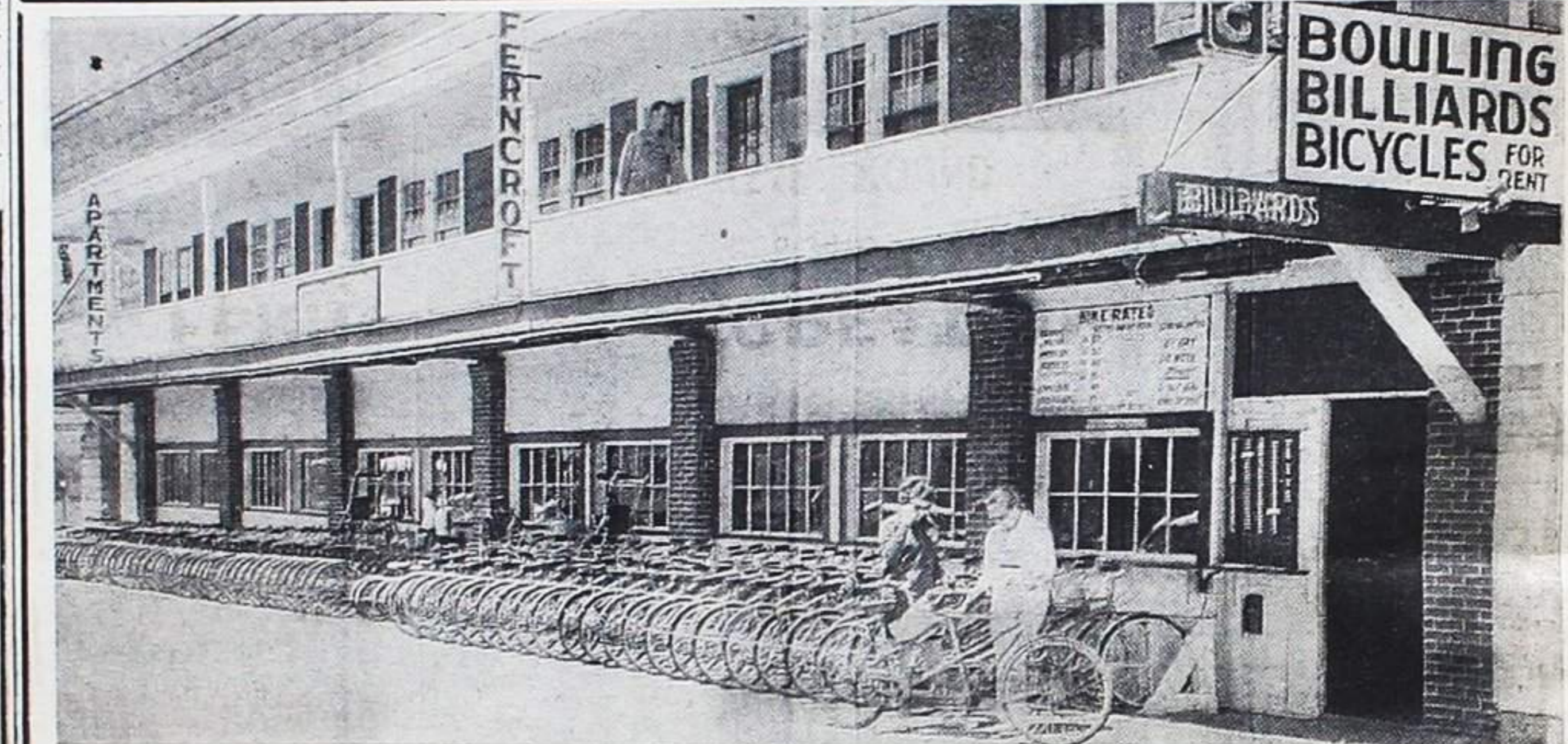

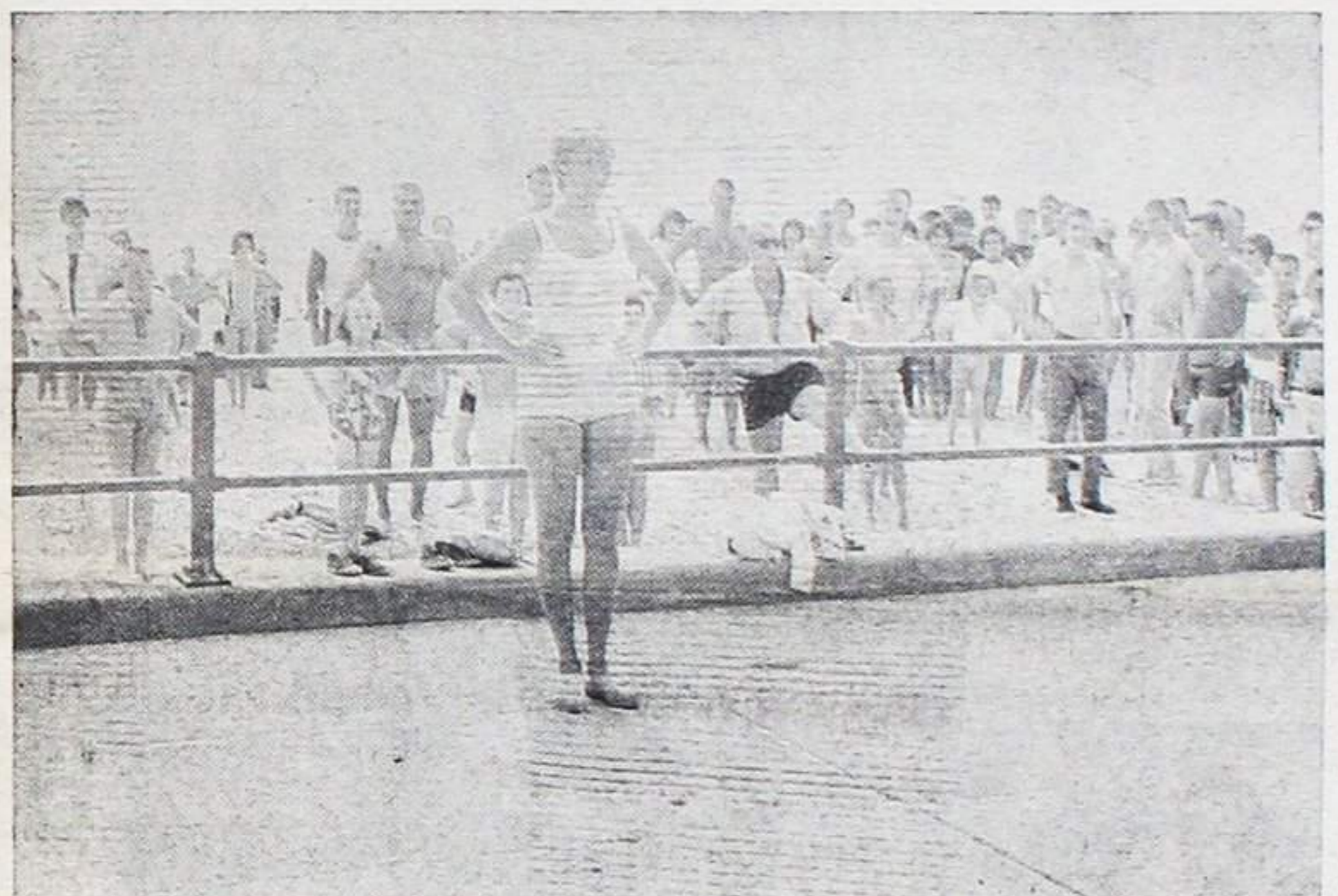

3,000 CYO Members Hold Beach Outing

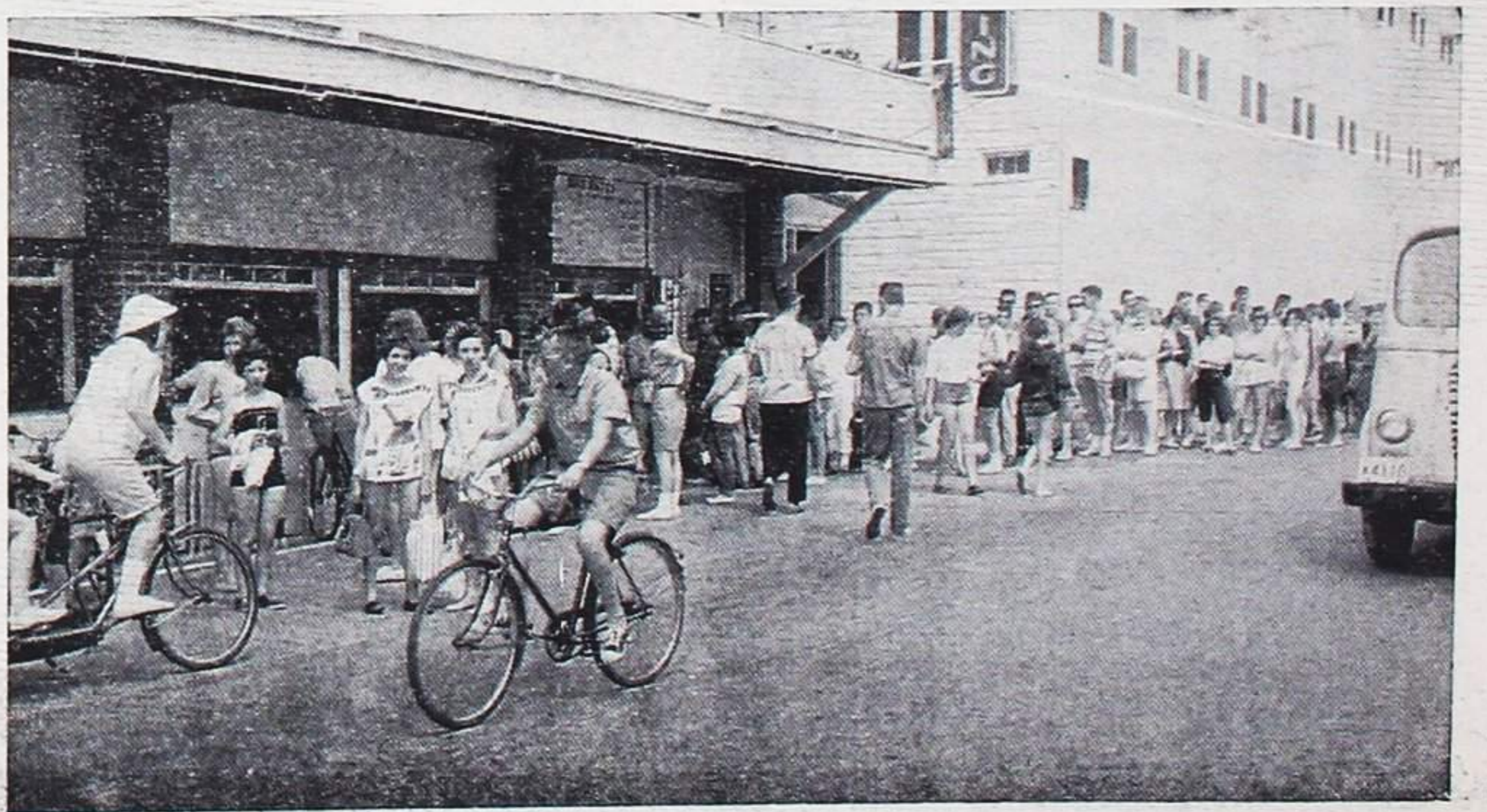
66 Bus Loads From Mass.

It was the consensus of the meeting that the Port Authority should charge users of Port Authority property rentals commensurate with that paid by others using like facilities in the port of Portsmouth. These rentals would fulfill an obligation to the taxpayers of the state in realizing a return upon their investment in Nobles Island and in the operations of the Port Authority.

Besides his wife, Elizabeth (Lovell) Ford, he leaves a son, Charles L. Jr., St. Petersburg, Fla.; two daughters, Mrs. Lee Skipworth, San Juanita, Puerto Rico, and Mrs. James Gowdy, Illinois; a brother, Arthur W. Butler, Ind., and nine grandchildren.

a frontage of 1,125 feet on Hampton Harbor. Work began in earnest on the project around September 1, 1959 at the close of the beach season. George and Helen, along with their families, which include George's wife, Shirley, and children, George, Jr., Leigh and Beverly, worked night and day on every part of the difficult project from engineering to using a shovel.

The six and one-half acre tract runs almost north and south with the westerly edge—a substantial pile bulkhead—extending 1,125 feet along the natural Hampton harbor. The Marina itself is a water basin covering 2 acres, 200' by 500 feet. There are boat slips for 100 boats, large and small, 2 launching ramps for outboards, unlimited parking, private lockers, a 20-ton capacity Holly Hoist, fueling station, transient overnight tie-up facilities, pier with electric outlets, sales room and repair station with winter storage facilities for boats of all sizes.

The U.S. Coast Guard is on frequent duty at the Marina as they check safety equipment and Conservation Officers are also available to help visiting boaters and fishermen.

This project has long been needed at Hampton Beach and, because of the hard work of these two fine persons, the recreational facilities at Hampton Beach are now bigger and better than ever.

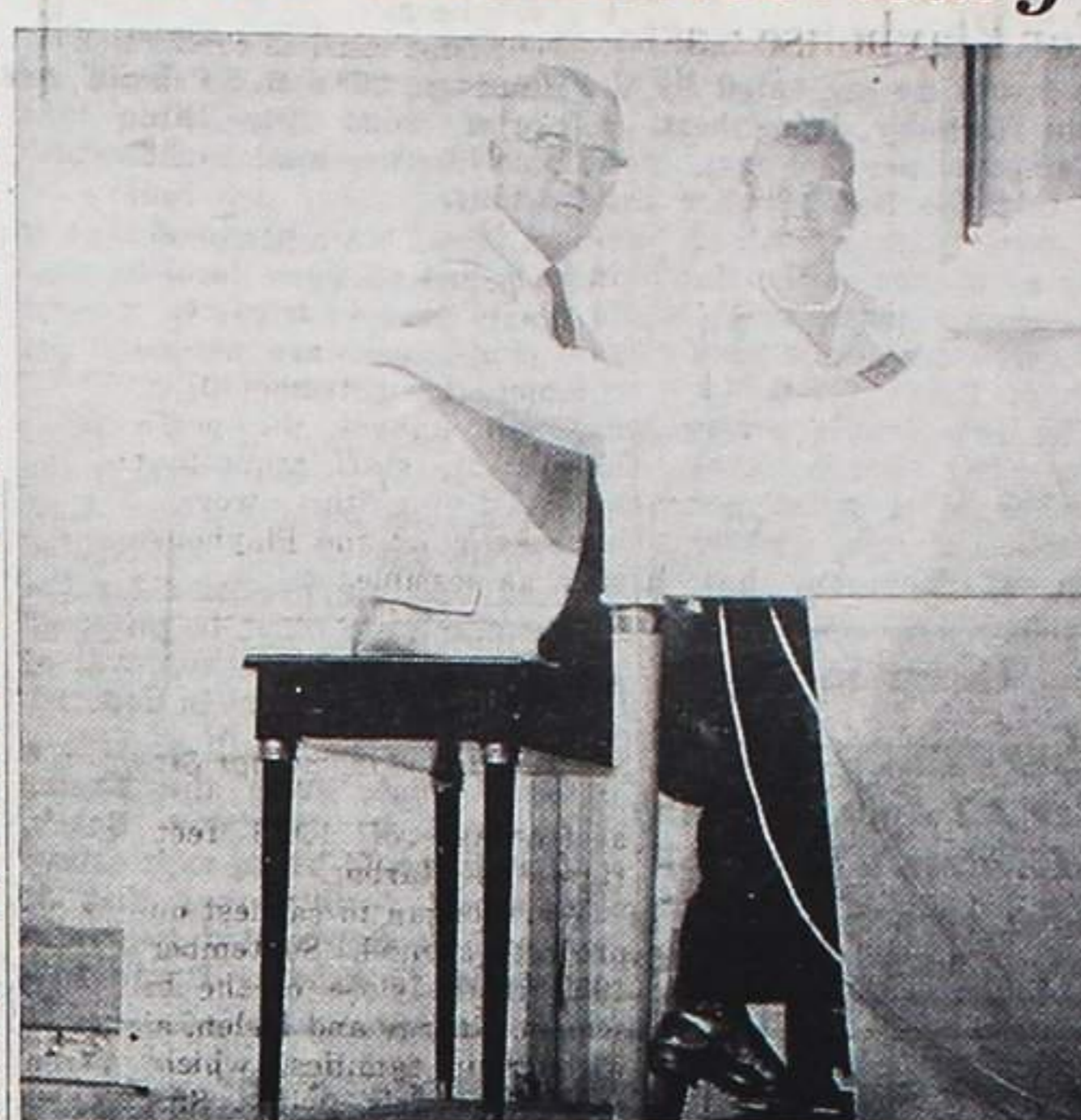
They also operate stores at Myrtle Beach, S. C. and Ocean City, Maryland. They have a large candy making plant in Philadelphia where most of the candy is made.

New \$4 Million Beach Road Approved

The long-awaited by-pass route from Exeter to Hampton Beach got the green light Monday as Gov. Wesley Powell and his Executive Council approved

the layout as presented by the State Highway department. Commissioner John O. Morton told the Beachcomber that the final plans contained basically no change in the Hampton end of the expressway which will connect with the Exeter by-pass of Route 101-C.

The new traffic artery will enter the beach over the marshes at a point near the Catholic church, where the town of Hampton has been

given permission to build an access road paralleling the beach to the west of Ashworth avenue.

Comm. Morton stated that it is hoped to have the first contracts ready for bid in August and that construction would get underway in the fall.

The total cost of the by-pass is expected to come within the \$4 million allocated by Gov. Powell out of the accelerated road building program for the Granite State which he proposed and won legislative approval of during his first term in Concord.

The new road will provide a direct route from the Exeter by-pass to Hampton Beach, that it would be an expressway of type of facility and that it would be constructed generally parallel to existing Route 101-

C. The road will be for the present a two lane highway but necessary rights of way for a four lane divided highway will be acquired at this time.

The proposal calls for a complete limitation of access to the privately owned abutting property with access to the expressway provided through the use of interchanges and ramps at important intersection points.

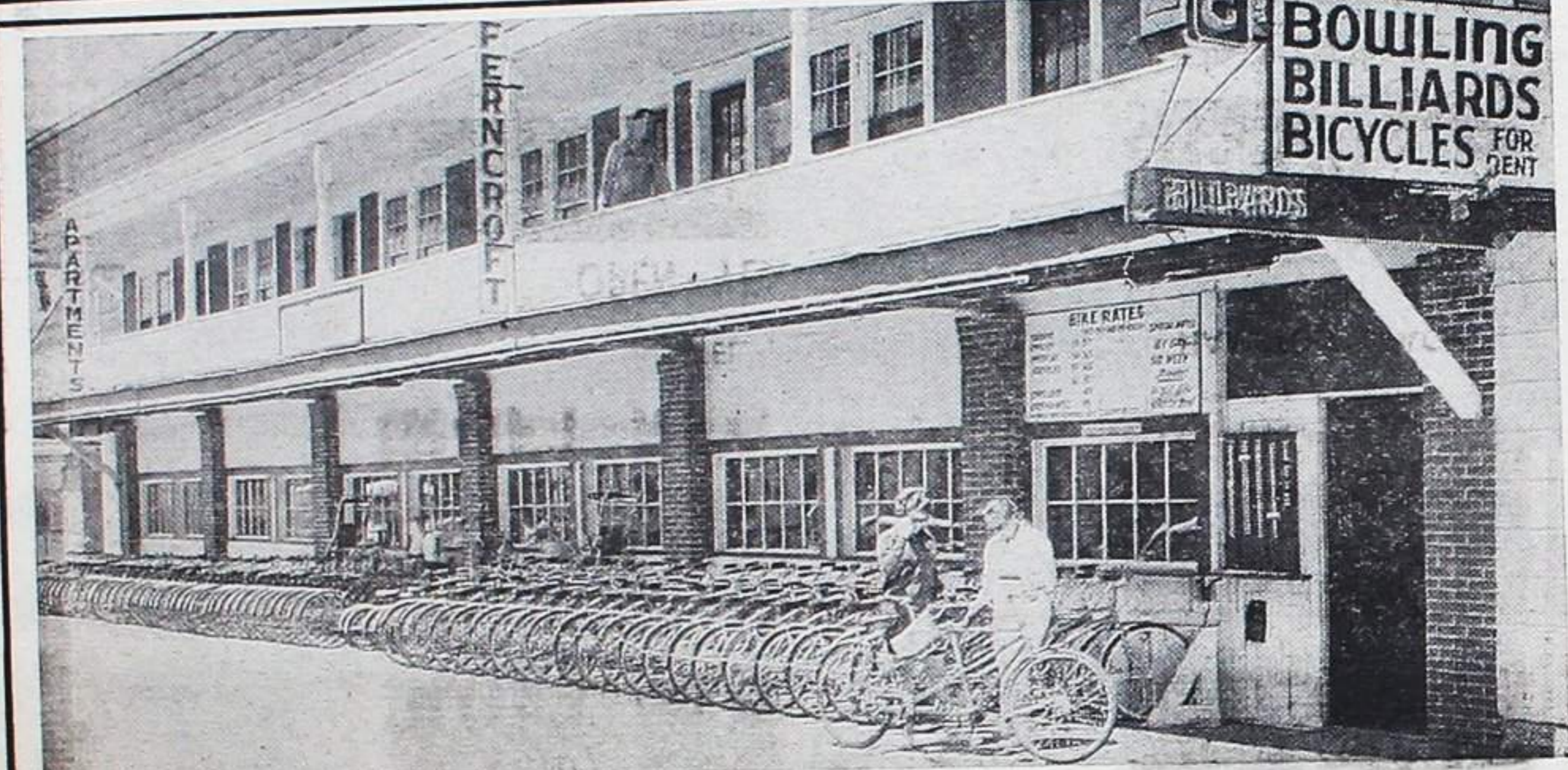
Camera Club Holds Banquet At Beach

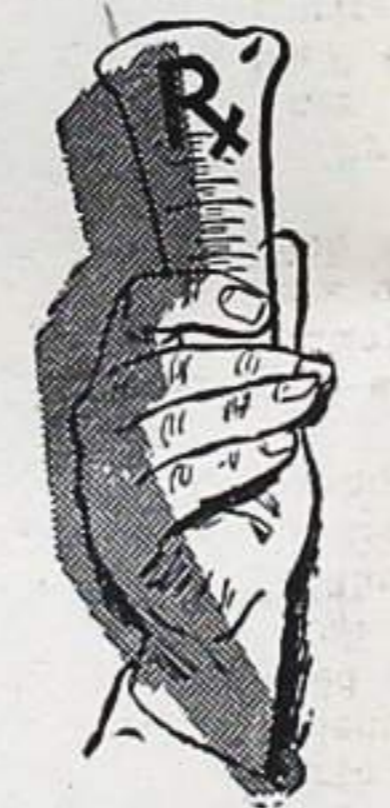

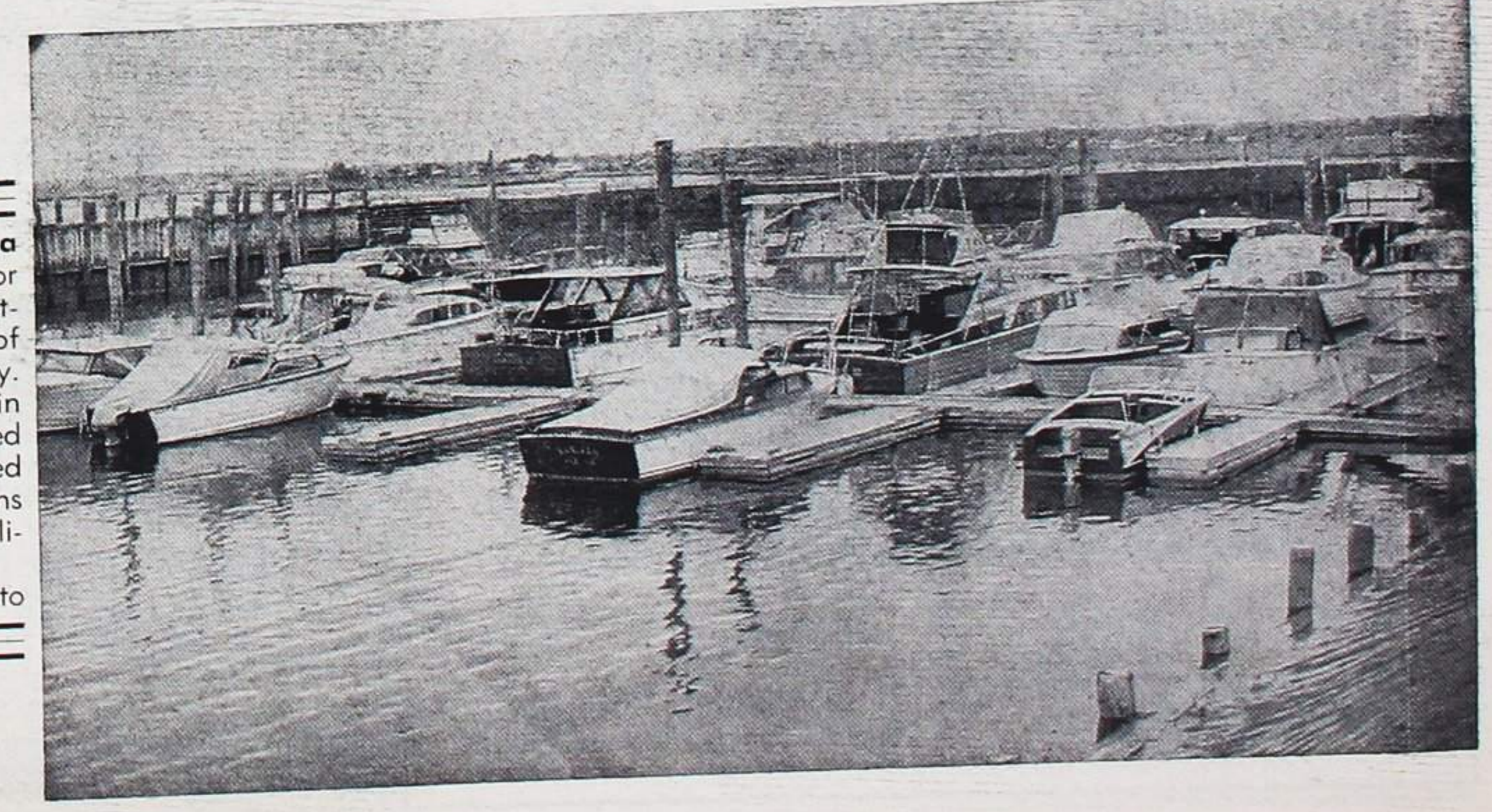
