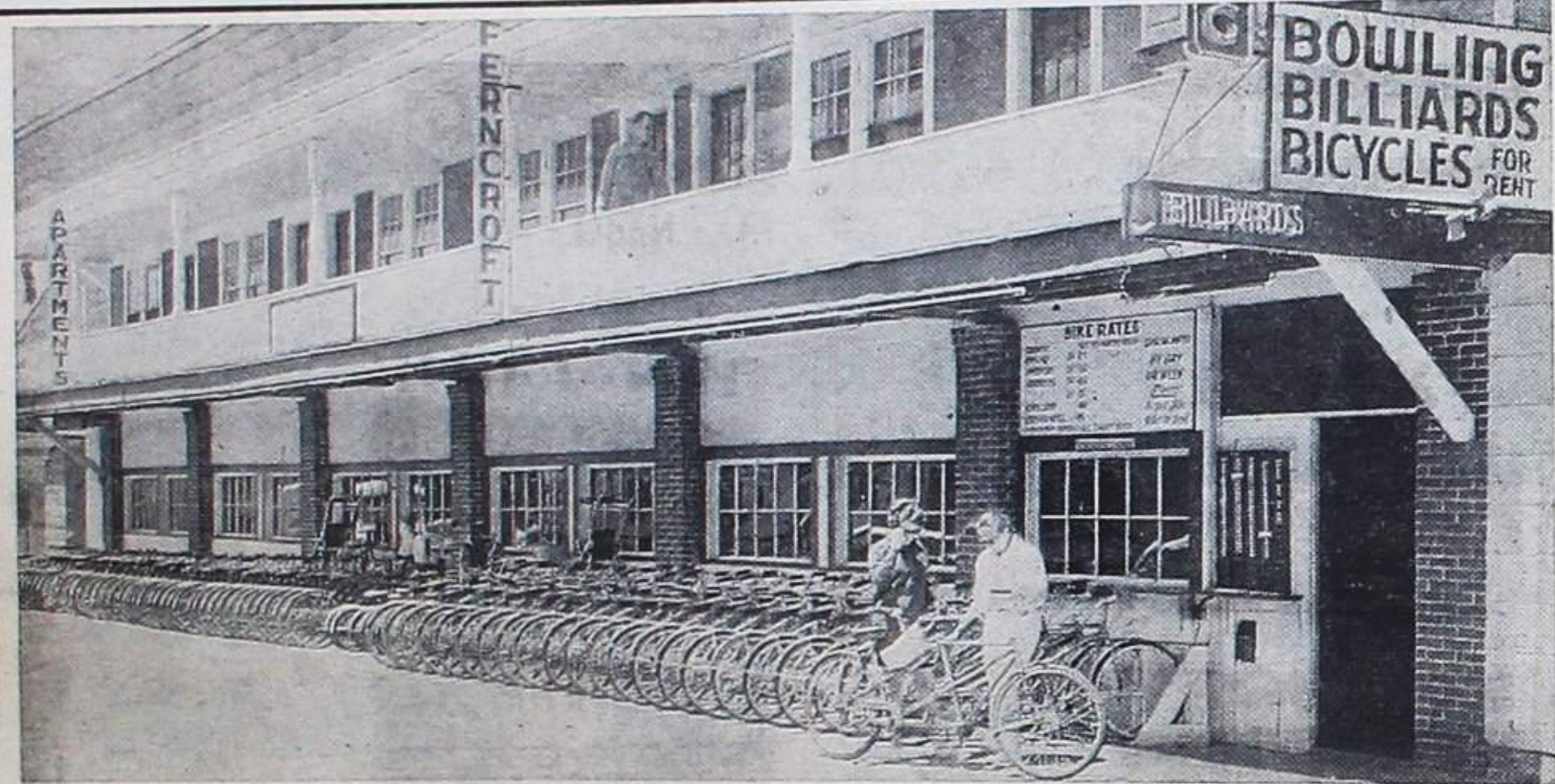

Weather Forecasts Hurt Resort Area

The Associated Press put the name of Hampton Beach on the front pages of many leading Eastern United States newspapers this past week when the local Chamber of Commerce officials forwarded a telegram to the Federal Communications Commission as a follow-up to a news release the previous day by orchestra leader Guy Lombardo.

Lombardo, who produces the Paradise Island show at Jones Beach, Long Island, fired a blast at weather commentators when he stated that opinionated weather forecasts by radio and TV commentators are hurting the resort business. He noted that he had no quarrel whatsoever with the official U.S. weather forecasts, but only in the way that some broadcasters dramatize them.

Following suit, the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce sent a telegram to the head of the FCC, Mr. Newton Minnow, and to Senators Styles Bridges and Norris Cotton.

The telegrams read: "We heartily endorse the stand taken by Guy Lombardo in yesterday's news release. As recently as last weekend, weather reports did irreparable harm to this and many other resorts on the N.H. coast. People were advised to refrain from going to beaches or seaside resorts because of a northeast blow. The storm failed to materialize, and, although it was cloudy Saturday, the sun appeared here on Sunday and from 11:45 on, it was the nicest beach day of the season.

"At 1:30 p.m. radio stations were still using the early morning reports of 'rain all day and fog.' We were so upset that we called several radio stations to inform them of the beautiful weather conditions along the N.H. seacoast. We asked them to mention the fact that at least this resort area was enjoying the finest day of the summer, all to no avail.

"We admit people may make a mistake in predicting the weather, but we strongly believe they should correct errors when they become apparent. Even more strongly are we opposed to 'opinionated forecasts' as Lombardo calls them, but we prefer to say they are editorializing weather forecasting. On Saturday, people were advised to be sure to stay home and not go near the beaches. Unlike hurricanes, no one can be harmed by raindrops. While on the subject of hurricanes, we are sure you and your commission are aware of the way in which weather men frighten millions of people when the WEATHER

State Authority To Develop Port Plan

At a special meeting of the State Port Authority held in Portsmouth Thursday, standing committee appointments for the year were announced by Hugh G. Hamilton, chairman. The group also voted to employ a man as industrial assistant for the authority to perform necessary administrative work.

Committee appointments include the following: port regulations, Eugene Soles, chairman, John Seybolt, Donald Craig; harbor improvements and port facilities, John Rowe, chairman, John Seybolt, Donald Craig; salt water fisheries, John Seybolt, chairman, John Rowe; foreign trade zones and free port areas, John Rowe, chairman, Eugene Soles.

During the business session the group discussed the legal authority of harbor masters under various conditions giving them power of arrest. Also considered was the possibility of pollution of the river and bay waters by accidental oil overflow, and it was felt that suitable inspection is being

maintained to prevent this occurring.

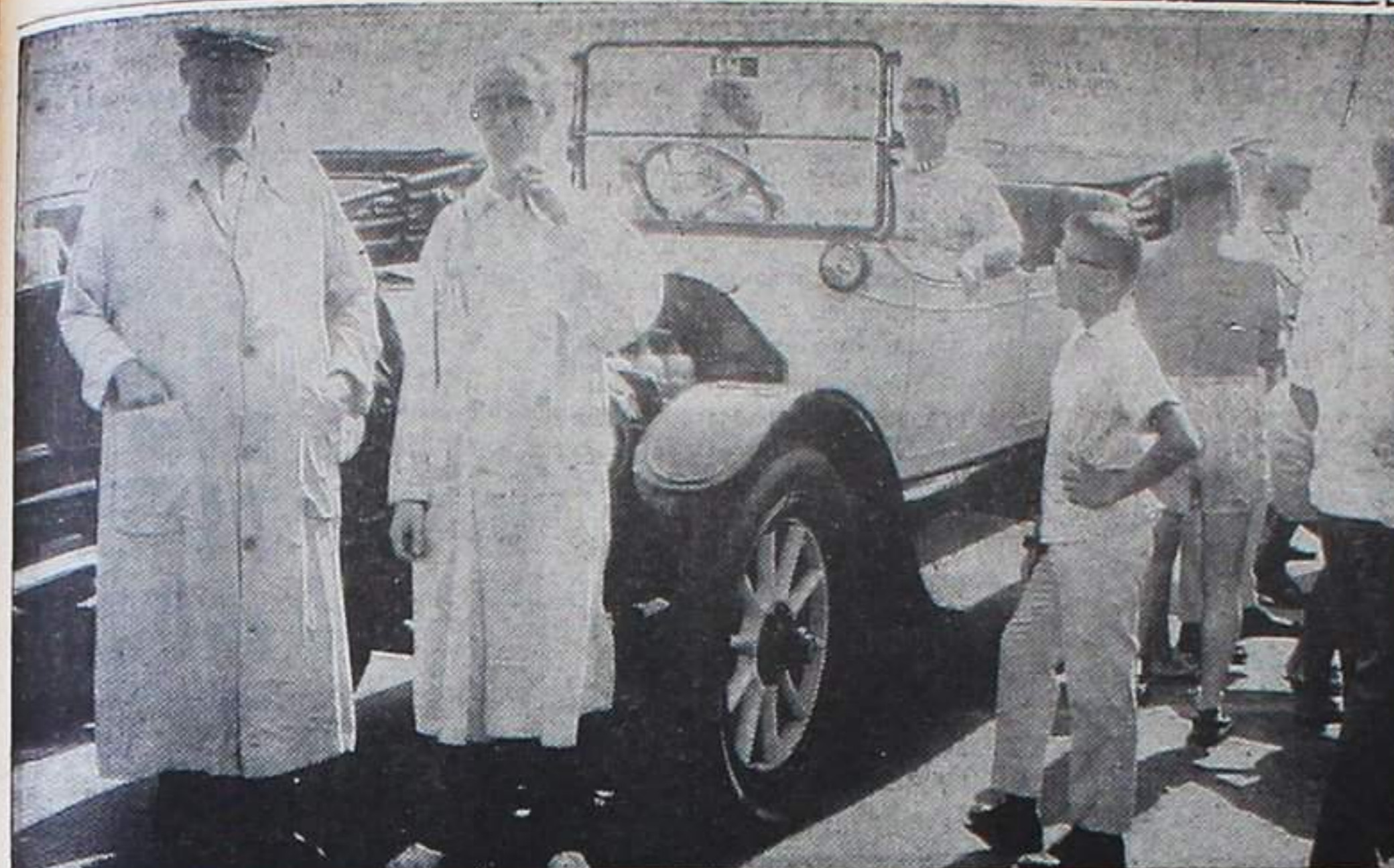

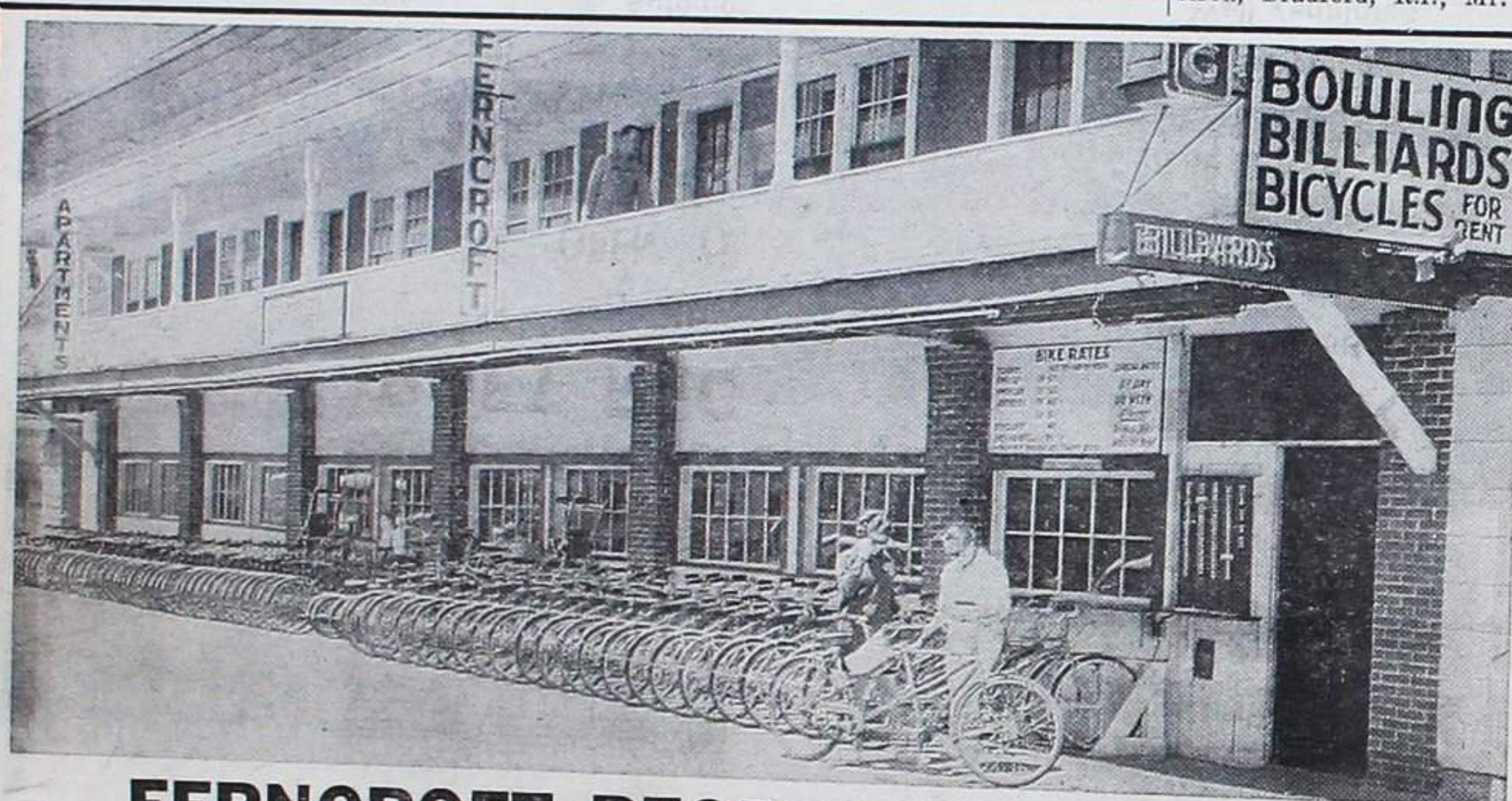

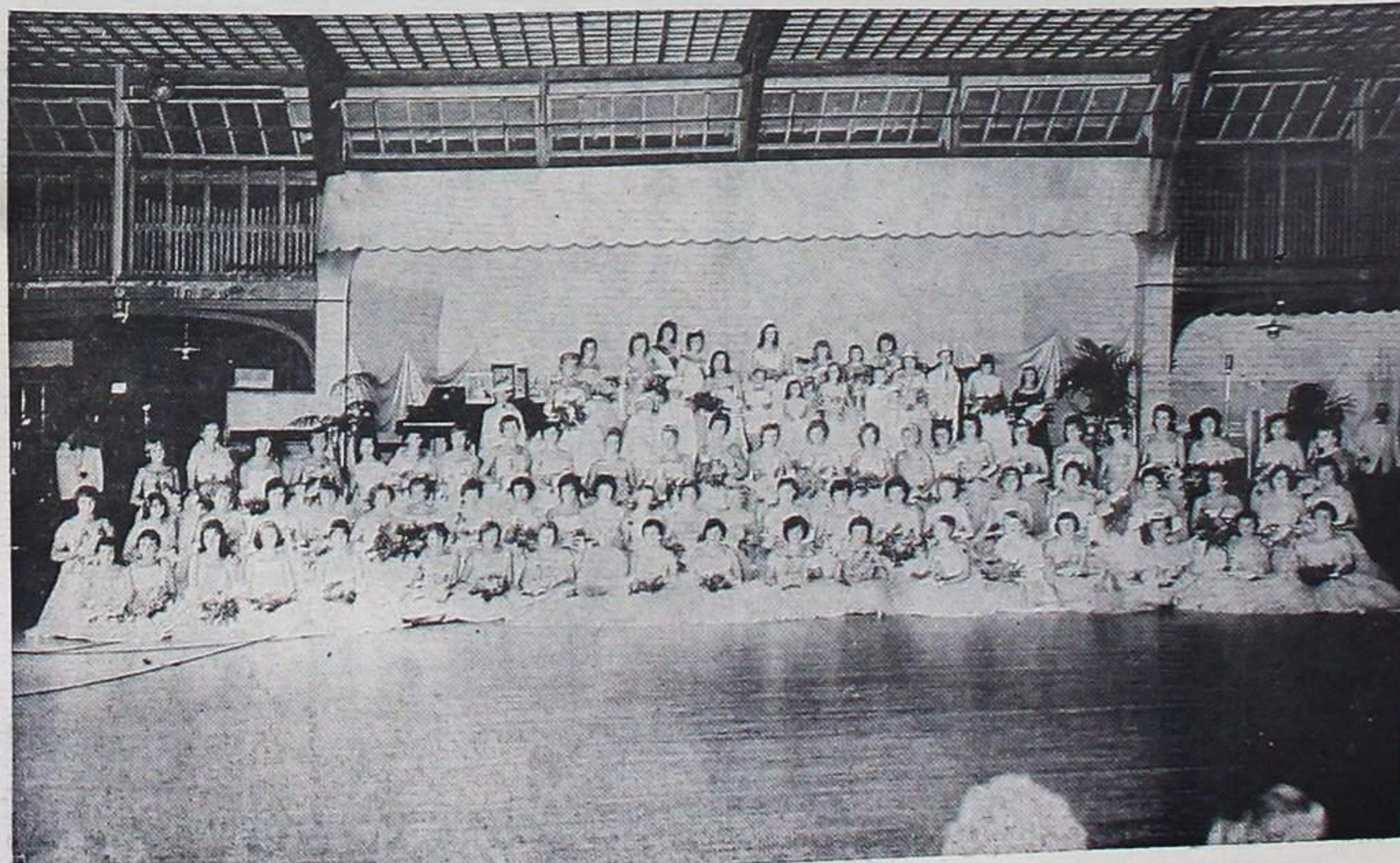
