One of the largest Hampton Beach Casino ballroom audiences in history witnessed the crowning of Miss Sandie Kay as Miss New Hampshire Saturday evening. Miss Kay, a native of Plaistow, will represent the Granite State in the Miss United States and Miss Universe beauty pageants at Miami Beach, July 6-14. She will be the fifth girl to go on from a local beauty contest to the Miss Universe contest. She is the only girl to have held both the titles of "Miss Hampton Beach" and "Miss New England".

During the short but impressive ceremonies, orchestra leader Harry James placed the official crown on the head of Miss Kay. Taking part in the program were William Elliot, executive secretary of the chamber, who served as master of ceremonies and production manager, Henry Hamel, who this week began his tenth season in that capacity.

Cindy Chevalier presented Miss Kay with the official white and gold "Miss New Hampshire" sash while ballroom owner and past chamber of commerce president, John Dineen, presented her with the trophy.

Holly Elliot and Linda Moul, both of Hampton, served as attendants and carried the official robe. Sheri Perkins of Hampton Falls was flower girl with John Coulp serving as crown bearer.

Miss Kay, presently studying at Chandler college of Boston, Mass., will join the other New England state winners the first of July. The group will be flown to Miami Beach where they will each be assigned chaperones for their two week stay.

Unlike the Miss America contest, girls participating in the Miss Universe contest do not have to give a demonstration of talent. They will be required to answer questions and will take part in the various parades and other functions.

New Beach Front Project Underway

Over the years, Hampton Beach has been transformed from a small seaside fishing town to one of the largest modern summer recreational centers in the United States.

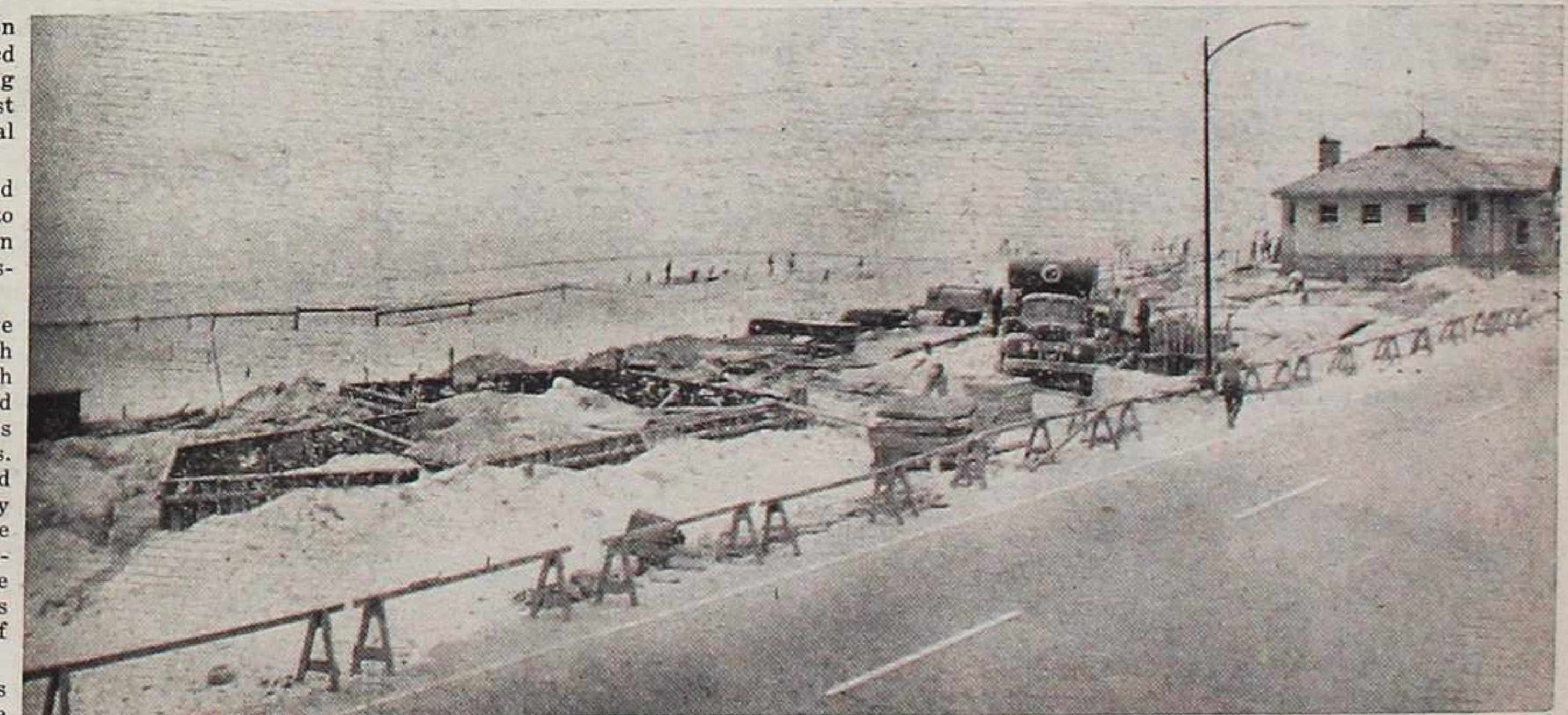
Swelling from a year round population of 6,000 persons to as many as 150,000 persons on a single summer day has necessitated many changes.

Local and state officials have striven each year to give both Hampton and Hampton Beach the forward look as evidenced by increasing signs of progress in keeping with modern times. Although each year has found major changes being noticed by the returning vacationist, the fall and winter months of 1961-1962 have perhaps been the largest single period of progress of any in the past history of this famed resort.

Long Named Head Of Leased Land Study

The newly appointed leased land study committee held its first meeting June 14, according to a joint announcement made this week by Town Manager Kenneth Boehner and newly appointed chairman, John D. Long.

The committee met with the selectmen and the town manager to review the background of leased land in Hampton. Following the general meeting the

group went into an executive meeting.

Appointment of the committee came as the result of action at this year's town meeting when it was voted that the selectmen appoint a committee "to study the possible sale of town owned leased land (excepting the land leased to the Hampton Beach Improvement Company, Inc. and such other matters as may be related thereto, and to authorize said committee to engage engineering, legal and other services, to hold public hearings, to prepare a report, and to submit its report and recommendations to the next annual town meeting, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the reasonable expenses of said committee."

No definite plans were formulated for the future, according to Mr. Long, but an executive meeting will be held July 19 to outline a program for the future. Meanwhile, Mr. Long noted the committee members hope to develop opinions from citizens on the leased land topic.

Serving on the committee in addition to Mr. Long are Mrs. Cora Munsey, who was elected secretary of the group, Dean B. Merrill, Atty. H. Alfred Cassassa and Walter Nichipor.

Beach Front Project Will Not Interrupt Summer Programs

What about the band concerts at Hampton Beach? Will all the usual programs be held? These are questions which are being heard constantly as visitors arrive daily at Hampton Beach. They take one look at the spot where the famed bandstand stood and express wonderment.

The answer to the above questions is "yes". Local chamber of commerce officials have done an "admirable job", in the words of selectman Robert Danelson, salvaging used lumber and erecting a temporary bandstand just north of the former site.

Working continuously throughout the winter months, the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce has been co-ordinating a program that will provide a summer of relaxing fun for those who visit the seacoast area as well as for permanent residents.

Unofficially underway since April 28, when John Dineen threw his Casino ballroom doors open to Saturday night dancing, the official season commenced June 19.

One of the outstanding new attractions introduced last year for the first time, was the use of an organ as part of the musical entertainment at the beach. This year, a transistor type Gulbranson organ will be used with concerts being given each Monday afternoon and evening. Frank Lawlor and Paul Verrette will again this summer head the band.

Since the opening of the beach season, several events and many attractions have taken place. Visiting the Casino ballroom have been and will be such renowned musicians as Tommy Dorsey, Stan Kenton, Guy Lombardo, Glenn Miller, and Louis Armstrong. Highlight of the year's season activities was the crowning of Miss New Hampshire on June 16. She will take part in the Miss United States and Miss Universe contests at Miami, Florida.

The annual precinct and chamber of commerce banquet kicked off the season June 19 at the Hotel Ashworth with the John Hancock Life Insurance Outing at the beach on June 23. The Catholic Youth Organizations have its day June 25 with Senior Citizens Day scheduled for June 26.

The twelfth season of square dancing under the stars, sponsored by the Seacoast Region Square Dance association, has

its opening set for June 29 at the Hampton Beach State Park area. The Hampton Playhouse opens June 30.

WEEKLY SPECIALS
The Chamber of Commerce officials believe that vacations should be healthful as well as restful. They are, therefore, continuing a feature which has been very popular in past years by offering a calisthenics program each morning at 10:30 a. m. The program will be conducted on the beach in front of the bandstand.

Salt water fishermen who visit the area will, for the ninth consecutive year, be given a chance to join the Old Salts club. This club honors fishermen who bring in the "big ones" from Hampton waters. Specifications for membership, felt sleeve patches and billfold cards certifying that the carrier has hooked a fish worthy of permanent recognition are presented to qualified fishermen.

A fireworks display will be held on the beach opposite C street each Wednesday evening at 9 p. m., beginning with a Fourth of July display.

The ever popular talent show will again be held from the bandstand every Monday evening. The junior talent competition will get underway at 7 p. m. with the seniors show starting at 8 p. m. Any amateur performer may enter and each week a trophy will be awarded to winners in both the junior and senior divisions. Finals, with all winners competing, will be held the latter part of August.

Another night specialty, initiated by John Dineen at the Casino ballroom, is the "Get Acquainted Night" dance. This begins at 8:30 and is held each Monday evening throughout the summer season. The dance is designed to give visitors a chance to become acquainted the old fashioned New England way.

The first big event of the sea-

son is the 15th annual Miss Hampton Beach contest to be held at the Casino ballroom July 24. The Miss New England contest will be held August 14 with the feature attraction of the summer set for August 18 through August 24. The Mardi Gras week festivities will be highlighted by parades, sand castle contests, antique car exhibitions, fashion show and will be culminated with the famed Coronation Ball on August 24.

In addition to the regular schedule provided by the precinct and chamber of commerce representatives, many new and additional surprises await the visitor to Happy Hampton Beach.

Name Hampton Girl 'Miss Safe Boating'

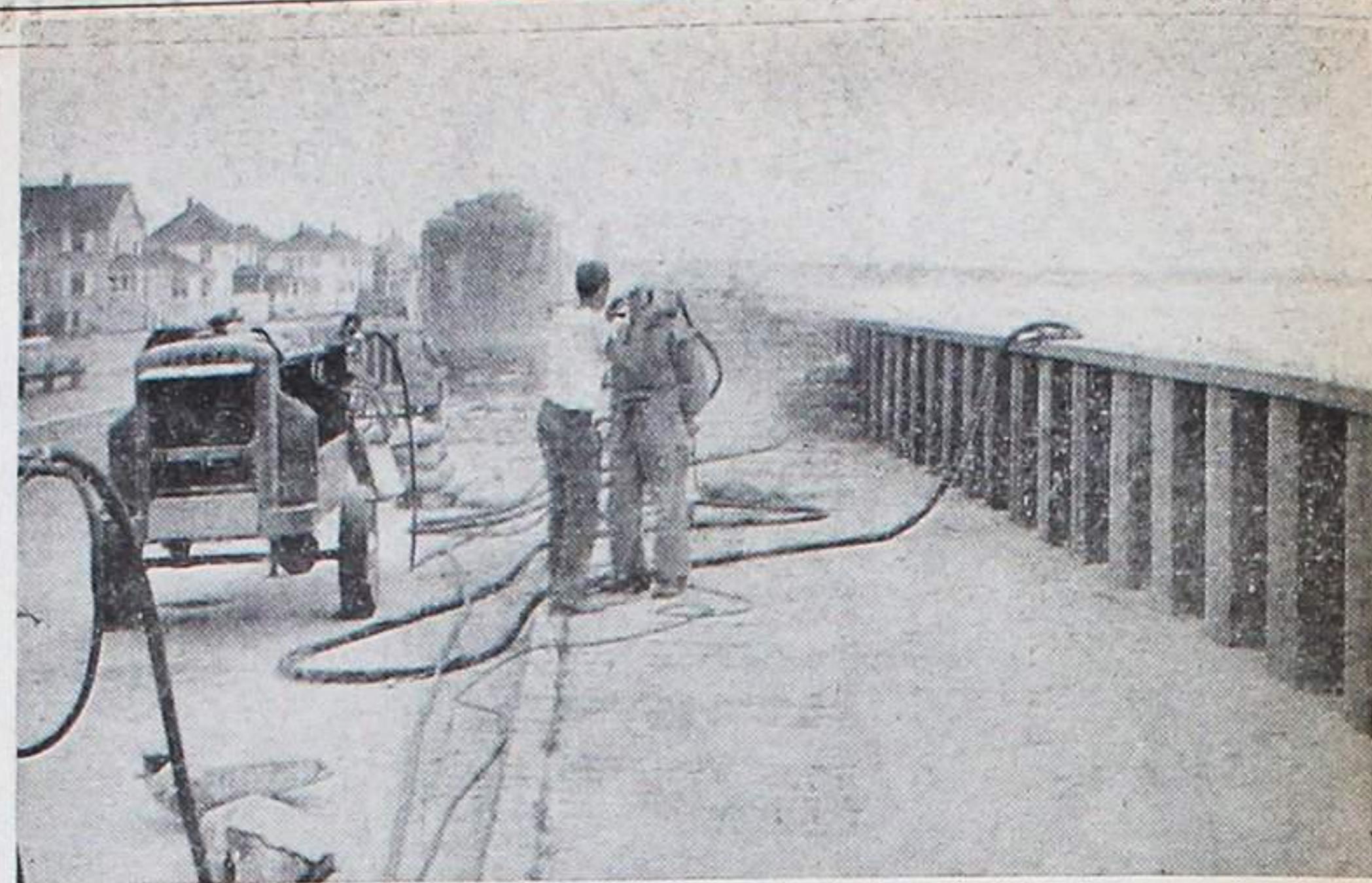
The Portsmouth Power Squadron held its annual Rendezvous at Little Harbor, Portsmouth, June 24. In spite of bad weather a large crowd was present.

Work is rapidly nearing completion on repairs to the concrete seawall located at North Beach. At the same time, additional work has started on repairs to the steel seawall north of Great Boar's Head.

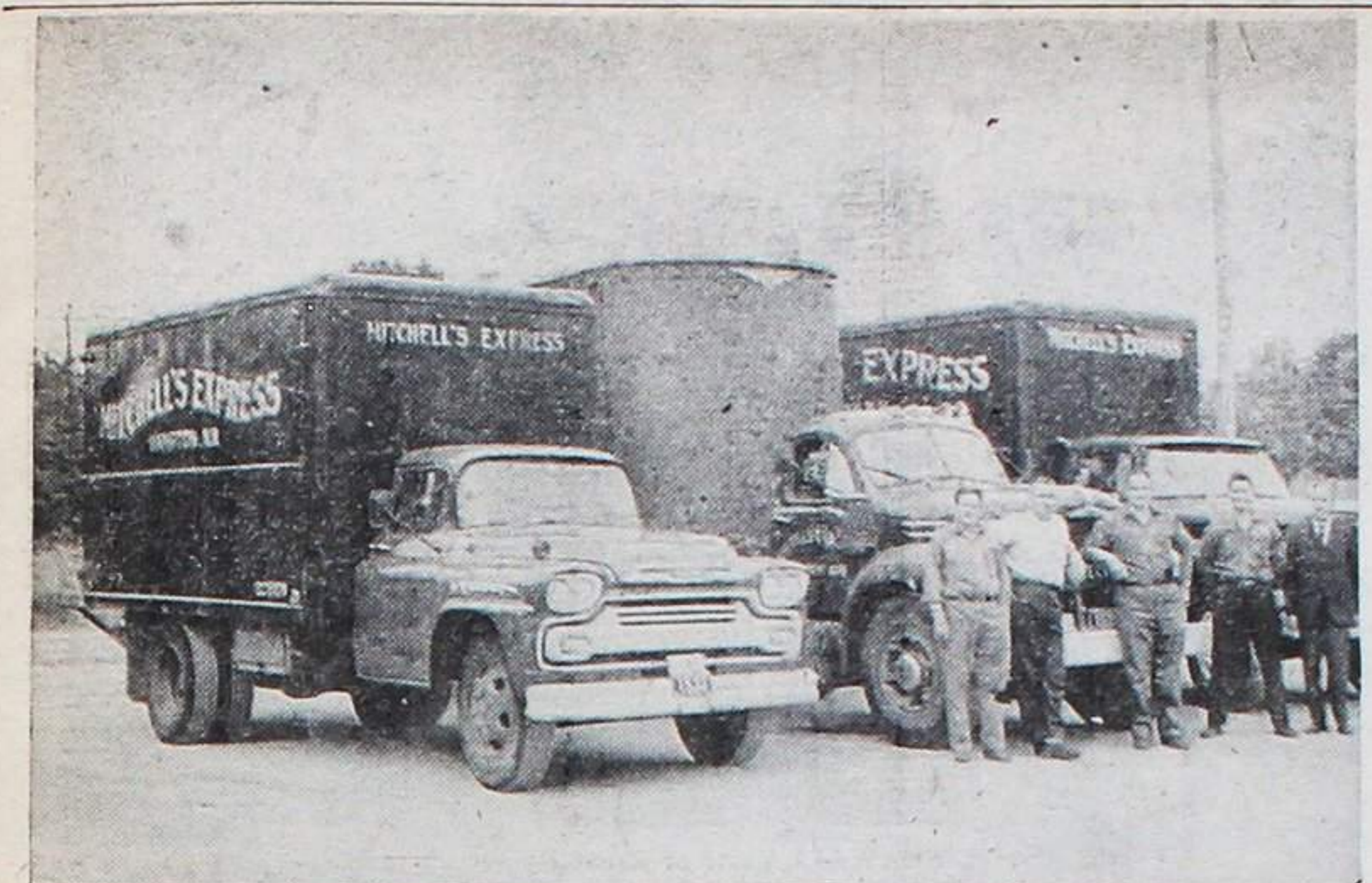

Trucking Firm Changes Hands

Announcement was made this week of the purchase of the Mitchell's Express by George H. Ryan, a resident of Hampton Beach. Completion of the transaction was expected this week.

Ryan told the "Beachcomber" this week he will continue operation of the business from the present site as long as is possible. Although the business will be incorporated, the familiar name of Mitchell's Express will remain the same. The new owner said he hopes to modernize equipment as well as expand the business.

Mr. Ryan and his wife Theresa, moved to Hampton approximately five years ago when they purchased a guest house at Hampton Beach. While operating the guest house, Mr. Ryan continued work in Boston with the New England Motor Rate Bureau where he has been employed for the past 15 years. It was here that he gained his experience in trucking business. His position was traffic manager.

The local express business is one of the oldest firms in Hampton. The former owner, Victor Mitchell, prior to his death in March of this year, had owned the business for 37 years. Prior to that date Mr. Mitchell and Kenneth N. Ross had operated the Ross and Mitchell Express company at its Hampton Beach office from 1920-25. The firm was originally operated by Mr. Ross who sold it in 1916 to Carl Mitchell, a brother, and it was later repurchased by Mr. Ross and Mr. Mitchell in 1920.

Starting in 1925 with one truck, Mr. Mitchell built the firm over the past 37 years to furnishing trucking service throughout the seacoast region of New Hampshire and Maine as well as Massachusetts.

Mr. Ryan, the new owner, said daily trips will be continued to Boston with service of the entire seacoast area as far west and north as Exeter, Durham and Dover. During the summer months the beach areas will be traveled with daily trips from Boston to Newburyport and along the N. H. and Maine coast to Ogunquit, Maine.

Mr. Ryan is a native of Cambridge, Mass. The couple will reside in the uptown Hampton area with their two boys, Mark and Peter. Mr. Ryan attended Salem Teacher's college prior to taking up employment with the New England Rate Bureau.

Earlier Opening Of State Facilities At Beach Sought

Chamber of Commerce officials this week said numerous complaints of the lateness in which the sand was cleaned from the beach area and the fact that the rest room facilities at North Beach were not open as of the past weekend, will prompt a request of state officials prior to the 1963 summer season for an earlier date for completing state controlled clean-up projects and opening of facilities.

Beach authorities said that early season beach crowds have been using the beach facilities during weekends since early May. Three of the largest Spring weekend crowds in beach history, two set at 50,000 persons in May and another at 75,000 in early June, have invaded the seacoast area.

State officials have always waited until the last possible minute to clean the sand from the boardwalks and other beach areas because of the possible cost of a late season storm after the initial cleaning has been undertaken. Local officials said this makes no difference. They are still expected to request an earlier cleaning of the area.

Bringing the subject to a head was the fact that local officials, after receiving many complaints that the North Beach rest room facilities were not as yet open, even for weekends, and after having already previously contacted the state officials in regard to the matter, found the facilities still closed.

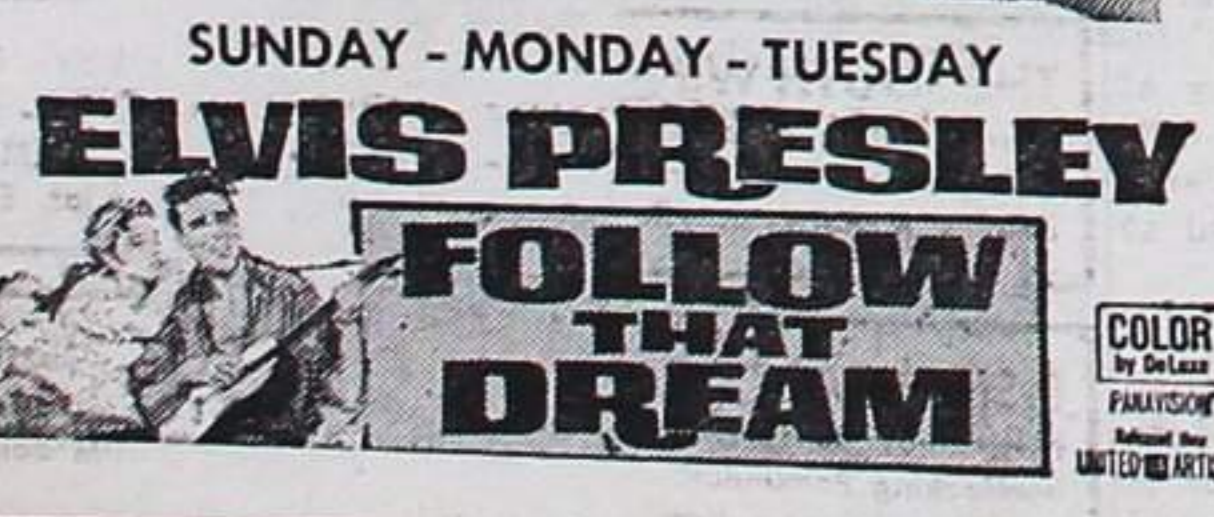

Safety Tips For Boaters

With the advent of increased boating enthusiasm, the BEACHCOMBER, for the first weeks of the season, will offer tips of safety as stressed by the Coast Guard, the local U. S. Power Squadron, Red Cross and other agencies interested in fostering boating safety.

Aside from the Coast Guard, perhaps no other local group has contributed more to boating safety than the United States Power Squadron. Nationally, the group was founded on February 2, 1914 at the New York Yacht club. It's membership has swelled to more than 40,000 persons with more than 250 local squadrons located throughout the United States.

The local squadron, located at nearby Portsmouth, was constituted February 5, 1942 and consisted of 23 charter members. Today there are over 90 members. The aim of the group is to provide Safety through education.

With this thought in mind, the BEACHCOMBER offers "Tips for Safe Boating."

Perhaps of prime importance in all boating, especially along the seacoast, is the weather. Boaters should learn to recognize the following clouds and their meanings:

(1) Cumulus — these are light and fluffy clouds and are usually a yachtman's fair weather sign. If they grow in size and tend to become thicker or darker, chances are a thunderstorm is at hand.

(2) Stratocumulus — are rainmaker clouds and could foretell trouble, especially in the summer. This is especially true when they grow denser or close in on blue or fair skies.

(3) Alto cumulus — are pretty clouds and are usually high-floated. They are, although pretty to watch, signs of probable thunderstorm. If they group into the bigger, darker type of cumulus cloud there is little doubt a blow is at hand.

(4) Squall — is usually preceded by a squall line or dark smudge on the horizon. Winds shift quickly and are often violent.

Before heading out to sea, especially if unfamiliar with the local waters and weather conditions, check with local boating headquarters or the coast guard for approaching weather conditions.

Beach Rules For Safety

Ordinances and regulations for Hampton Beach remain essentially the same as in past years. For the benefit of newcomers regulations to ensure the safety and pleasure of vacationists are in force as follows:

No person or organization is permitted on the beach between the hours of 1 a.m. and sunrise unless through a special permit issued by the chief of police.

The lighting of fires on the beach is prohibited.

The changing of clothes in cars in the beach area is prohibited.

Dogs and other pets are prohibited on the beach and in the water.

Ball playing and similar games may be permitted at the discretion of the lifeguards.

Inflatables are not permitted in the water at any time.

Missing persons should be immediately reported to the lifeguard on duty.

In matters of safety and orderliness, persons shall obey all requests made by the lifeguards.

Lifeguards will not assume

parental responsibility for children left unattended by their parents or guardian. Complaints should be addressed to the Town Manager, c/o Town Offices, Hampton.

Persons found violating any of the above regulations or ordinances shall be evicted from the beach and subject to a fine of not more than \$25. (Section 7, Chapter 219, RSA)

Ordinances at the state controlled area of the beach vary slightly and should be checked by visitors to those areas. Complaints should be addressed

to Recreation Commission, Department of Resources and Economic Development, State House Annex, Concord, N. H.

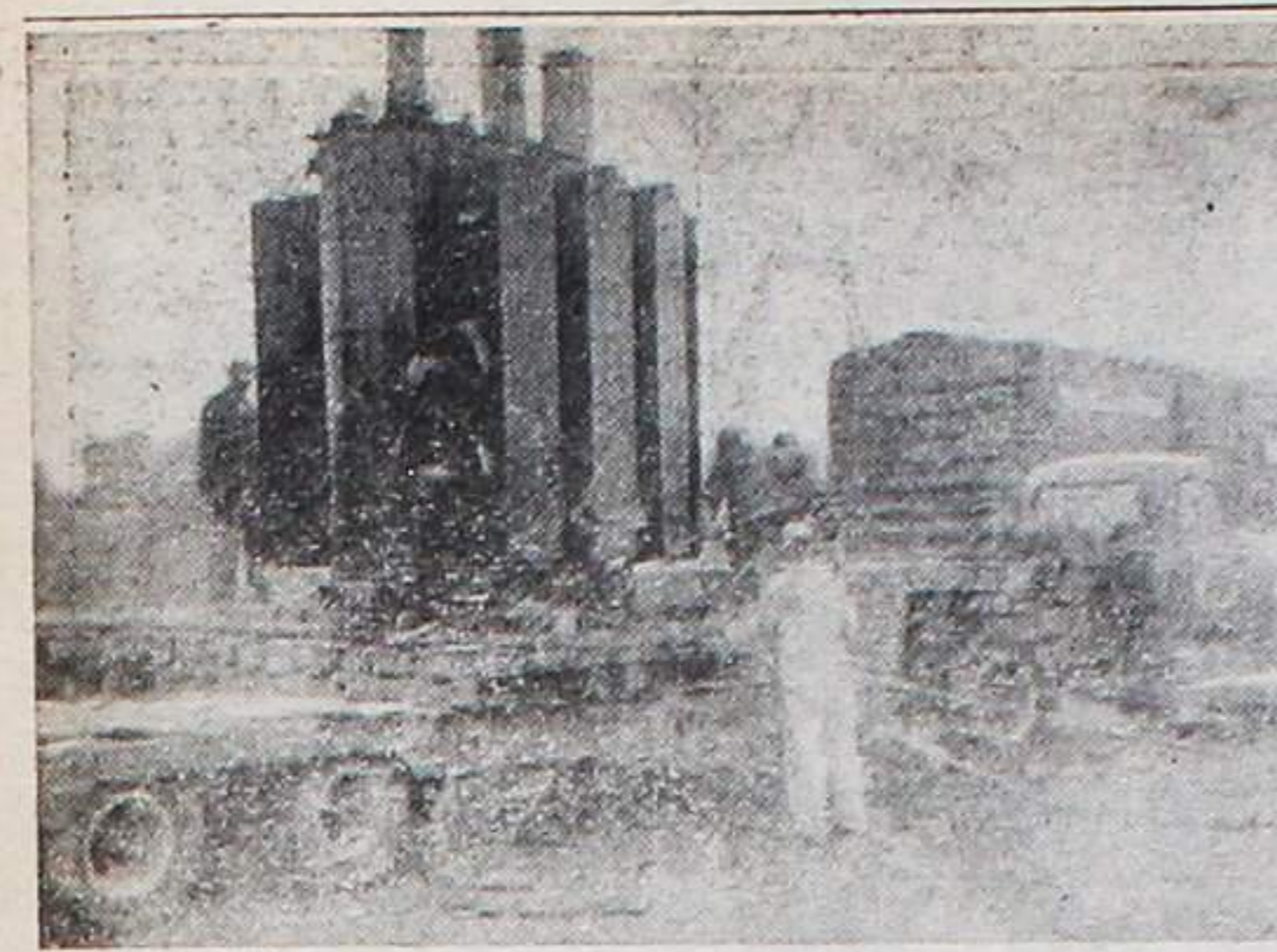

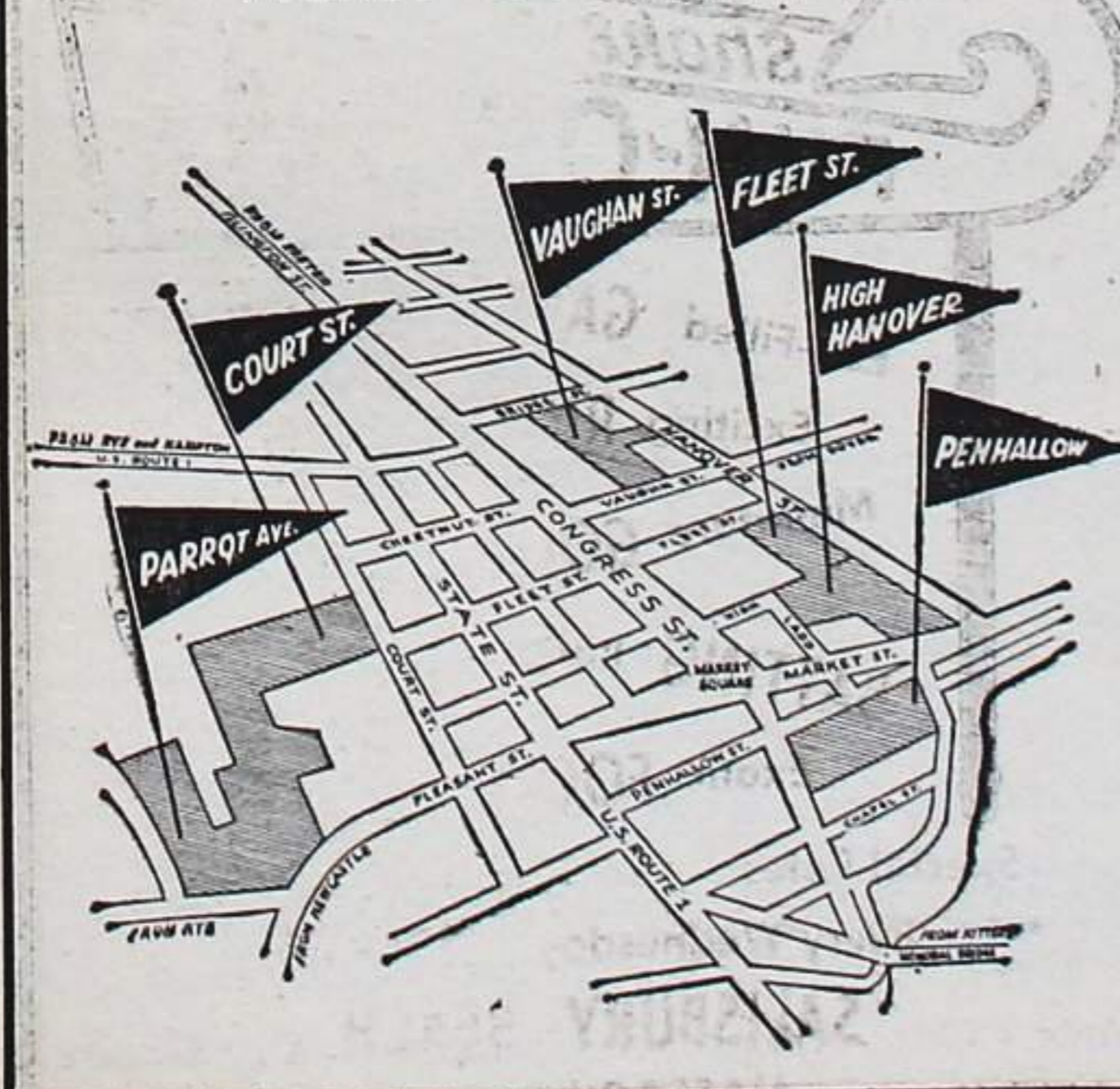

three years of planning, meetings and hard work by both local and state representatives, Governor Wesley Powell and his Executive Council gave the new beach front pavilion the green light late this spring.

Center of the new attraction will be a large, shell-type stage with seating capacity for nearly 1,500 persons. Included in the structure, in part, will be new chamber of commerce facilities, lifeguard and first aid headquarters, office of employment security, rest rooms, travel agency and many other such items. Work is expected to be completed by the 1963 summer vacation season.

Meanwhile, through the cooperation and help of much volunteer labor, precinct and chamber of commerce officials have constructed a temporary bandstand adjacent to the chamber of commerce building which has been moved approximately 150 feet north of its original location. The program for the beach summer season has already been arranged and promises to be bigger and better than ever, according to beach officials.

Some of the largest May and June crowds, 50,000 to 75,000 on consecutive Sundays, have already tested the facilities at the beach. Many establishments have changed hands during the winter months with several new places of business being opened.

Perhaps the second project of importance to future vacationists at the beach was the "go ahead" signal on the long awaited Exeter to Hampton Beach expressway.

The new road will open up easier and faster driving facilities to the entire seacoast area of New Hampshire. All sections of the road are expected to be under contract by this fall, with several sections already under construction.

Visitors approaching the area from all directions will find future entrance methods easier. The project will include the longest bridge span over another road in the state of New Hampshire.

During the winter months, other important problems were tackled to provide the safety as well as the convenience of all persons vacationing and living in the area. Through legislation spurred on by state representatives from Hampton, the treacherous erosion area around the outer perimeter of Great Boar's Head was checked by the installation of thousands of tons of stone rip rap. Also accomplished during the winter

months was the strengthening of the steel seawalls to the north and south of Great Boar's Head by the placing of rip rap in front of the walls. More work will be accomplished in these areas after the 1962 summer season.

At North Beach, the badly deteriorated concrete seawall has been under repair by state crews since early spring. Not only is safety enhanced by the repair of the heretofore crumbling steps leading to the sand, but the entire wall has been reinforced to withstand the winters and storms ahead. The steel seawall is also receiving a long needed coat of epoxy paint to not only protect it against the elements of the weather but also to make it more pleasing to the eye.

Also underway since early spring has been a million dollar sewerage expansion program, which will find much more of the beach and town areas being serviced by town sewage lines. Mains are now being installed with lift or pumping stations soon to be constructed. The modern sewage treatment plant will also be enlarged, repaired and modernized.

Hampton center dedicated a new post office building June 23. Badly needed additional education facilities prompted local voters to again expand the school system with the result that a huge addition is now being constructed adjacent and adjoining the present junior high school.

For residents and vacationers on the southern side of Hampton River new parking facilities were approved by Hampton voters at the March town meeting.

Voters also approved preservation of a portion of the Hampton marshlands as a reservation for wildlife. This section of land will remain as it is forever.

In nearby North Hampton, construction is underway for a new 18-hole golf course.

Other happenings and events which have made history in the seacoast area during the past months include:

Two winter fires totally destroyed the Penobscott Hotel and partially destroyed the Hotel Allen. The fires occurred within 10 days of each other during the bitter cold of the winter months. Both facilities, however, have been readied for the summer months.

Through the efforts of Hampton Beach citizens, a taxpayers association was formed.

Hampton became one of the first communities in the country to commission and train a K-9 dog corps. Three dogs and their masters have been trained for use with the local police department.

Local voters also approved expenditure of local money to be added to state and federal funds for future re-nourishment of the sands at Hampton Beach, dredging of the Hampton Harbor area and stabilization of erosion through construction of jetties.

In another major item, voters zoned liquor off Hampton Beach by rezoning the area. The action was by an overwhelming majority.

A committee was appointed as the result of voting at town meeting, to study the feasibility of the sale of town owned leased land at Hampton Beach.

Plans are underway for construction of a new police station to replace the station at Hampton Beach which will be raised in the fall.

Foresightedness and hard work by local residents and state officials alike have brought about these and other changes in order that the seacoast area will continue to be the family vacation spot it has been for so long in the past.

Colonel Otto J. Rohde, deputy division engineer, Corps of Army Engineers, notified the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce this week that "in view of the action by the recent town meeting, our study of Hampton Harbor has been scheduled for completion this year."

Colonel Rohde went on to note that "the New Hampshire Port Authority has been requested to furnish a written statement that the improvement would meet local needs and that the requirements of local cooperation would be met. The statement is needed before a project can be recommended for authorization."

The statement was furnished for chamber of commerce officials following previous correspondence on May 24 and an emergency meeting to discuss the sand problem in the harbor entrance on June 5. The Federal government, in its original outline of requirements stated as a condition that an additional public landing would be needed at Hampton if the Federal government was to consider improvement of the entrance channel.

Voters at the March town meeting felt that docking facilities were adequate at the harbor for the present in view of the fact that additional piers had been completed and another repaired since the original study of the harbor was made by engineers.

In his letter to the chamber of commerce, Colonel Rohde agreed with the sentiment of the persons in attendance at the town meeting. He writes, "a requirement that local interests provide two public landings on the north side of Hampton Harbor was necessary in July 1958, when local comments on the proposed plan were requested. At that time, there was only one dock north of the bridge, and one dock at Seabrook. Since then, the public landing just

north of the bridge has been rebuilt, the Hampton Beach Marina constructed, and a section dock built at Seabrook." It now appears that an additional public facility need not be required if the present facilities are maintained.

As recently as June 5, a group of local, state and federal officials were called together for an emergency meeting at Hampton. They viewed the sand erosion problem which has found thousands of tons of sand being washed south from the northern end of Hampton Beach and spilling into the Harbor entrance, with the area is urged to counter was forwarded to Captain W. S. Adams of the N. H. Port Authority.

Harbor Study Will Be Completed This Year

Colonel Otto J. Rohde, deputy division engineer, Corps of Army Engineers, notified the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce this week that "in view of the action by the recent town meeting, our study of Hampton Harbor has been scheduled for completion this year."

Colonel Rohde went on to note that "the New Hampshire Port Authority has been requested to furnish a written statement that the improvement would meet local needs and that the requirements of local cooperation would be met. The statement is needed before a project can be recommended for authorization."

The statement was furnished for chamber of commerce officials following previous correspondence on May 24 and an emergency meeting to discuss the sand problem in the harbor entrance on June 5. The Federal government, in its original outline of requirements stated as a condition that an additional public landing would be needed at Hampton if the Federal government was to consider improvement of the entrance channel.

Voters at the March town meeting felt that docking facilities were adequate at the harbor for the present in view of the fact that additional piers had been completed and another repaired since the original study of the harbor was made by engineers.

In his letter to the chamber of commerce, Colonel Rohde agreed with the sentiment of the persons in attendance at the town meeting. He writes, "a requirement that local interests provide two public landings on the north side of Hampton Harbor was necessary in July 1958, when local comments on the proposed plan were requested. At that time, there was only one dock north of the bridge, and one dock at Seabrook. Since then, the public landing just

Partial Closing Of Clam Flats Ordered

State Conservation Officer Floyd Potter this week released the following bulletin citing the closing of a portion of the Hampton Harbor clam flats.

Ralph G. Carpenter, director of the New Hampshire Fish and Game department, stated, "Upon recommendation of the Advisory Committee on Shore Fisheries and vote of the Fish and Game Commission, Middle Grounds, Hampton River, will be closed Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week to the taking of clams."

"The effective date of this closure shall be July 18, 1962 to run for an indefinite period. Authority RSA 211:63."

Conservation Officer Potter said the action became necessary because of the scarcity and smallness of clams in the Middle Grounds area.

This section of Hampton River is located just west of the Hampton River toll house on a section abutted by the Hampton River which flows into Seabrook. Anyone not familiar with the area is urged to contact Officer Potter before digging clams in the vicinity.

Deputy Appointed For Seacoast Area

Richard Penny of Newmarket was recently appointed as a Conservation Officer for the Seacoast area by the New Hampshire Fish and Game commission.

Officer Penny will assist Conservation Officer Floyd Potter and will serve in the capacity of a deputy under Officer Potter. The Newmarket resident began his new duties Monday.

Conservation Officer Potter said the new deputy has been appointed for the strict purpose of working in the seacoast area only.

At the same time, Officer Potter said a new boat will soon be made available by the Fish and Game commission for use by the two officers in law enforcement work on Hampton and local area waters.

The new craft will replace the present 16-foot Bristol outboard boat. Officer Potter said the new boat will be a turbo-craft jet type inboard craft with speeds of up to 47 mph.

It will be powered by a 190 H.P. Dearborn V8 engine. The boat is 18 ft., 6 in. in length. Officer Potter, in making the announcement, said the addition of the new boat is a big step in seacoast Fish and Game law enforcement. At the same time the local conservation officer said work has been normal for this time of year with no outstanding disturbances or law violations being reported. He also said the lobster catch is below average and is running poorly at present.

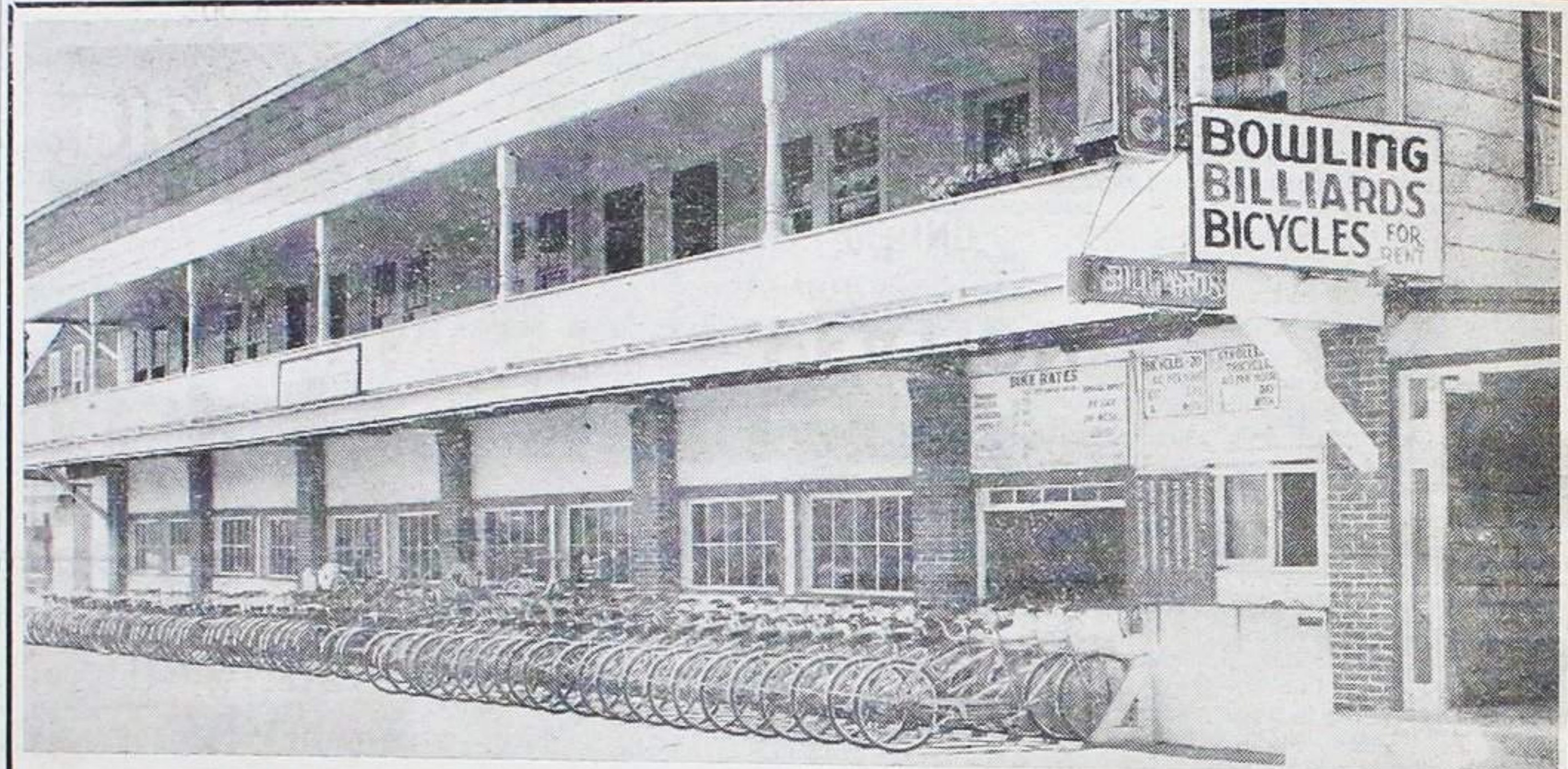
