

### Square Dancing At State Park Friday

Once again the ever popular Friday evening square dancing at the Hampton Beach State Park will be a part of the program for summer visitors who are vacationing at Hampton Beach.

Richard Stebbins, Hampton, outgoing president of the Seacoast Region Square Dance association recently released the summer schedule for the 12th season of square dancing under the stars at Hampton Beach.

Stebbins announced the club has gone all-out to make this one of the biggest years in local square dancing history by acquiring the services of 10 of the area's top callers with no repeats slated among the callers for the upcoming season. The group is also installing a new pine floor for the use of the dancers.

This year's schedule calls for activities to start Friday evening, June 29, at 8:30 p.m. with Dick and Ricky Spencer serving as callers. The rest of the year's program will find Harry Pike calling on July 6, Jim Mayo on July 13, Dick Leger on July 20, Warren Popp on August 3, Jim Taylor on August 10, Charles Baldwin on August 17, Paul Pratt on August 24 and Joe Casey on August 31.

### Partial Closing Of Clam Flats Ordered

State Conservation Officer Floyd Potter this week released the following bulletin citing the closing of a portion of the Hampton Harbor clam flats.

Ralph G. Carpenter, director of the New Hampshire Fish and Game department, stated, "Upon recommendation of the Advisory Committee on Shore Fisheries and vote of the Fish and Game Commission, Middle Grounds, Hampton River, will be closed Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week to the taking of clams."

"The effective date of this closure shall be July 18, 1962 to run for an indefinite period. Authority RSA 211:63."

Conservation Officer Potter said the action became necessary because of the scarcity and smallness of clams in the Middle Grounds area.

This section of Hampton River is located just west of the Hampton River toll house on a section abutted by the Hampton River which flows into Seabrook. Anyone not familiar with the area is urged to contact Officer Potter before digging clams in the vicinity.

### Deputy Appointed For Seacoast Area

Richard Penny of Newmarket was recently appointed as a Conservation Officer for the Seacoast area by the New Hampshire Fish and Game Commission.

Officer Penny will assist Conservation Officer Floyd Potter and will serve in the capacity of a deputy under Officer Potter. The Newmarket resident began his new duties Monday.

Conservation Officer Potter said the new deputy has been appointed for the strict purpose of working in the Seacoast area only.

At the same time, Officer Potter said a new boat will soon be made available by the Fish and Game Commission for use by the two officers in law enforcement work on Hampton and local area waters.

The new craft will replace the present 16-foot Bristol outboard boat. Officer Potter said the new boat will be a turbo-craft jet type inboard craft with speeds of up to 47 mph.

It will be powered by a 190 H.P. Dearborn V8 engine. The boat is 18 ft., 6 in. in length.

Officer Potter, in making the announcement, said the addition of the new boat is a big step in Seacoast Fish and Game law enforcement. At the same time the local conservation officer said work has been normal for this time of year with no outstanding disturbances or law violations being reported. He also said the lobster catch is below average and is running poorly at present.

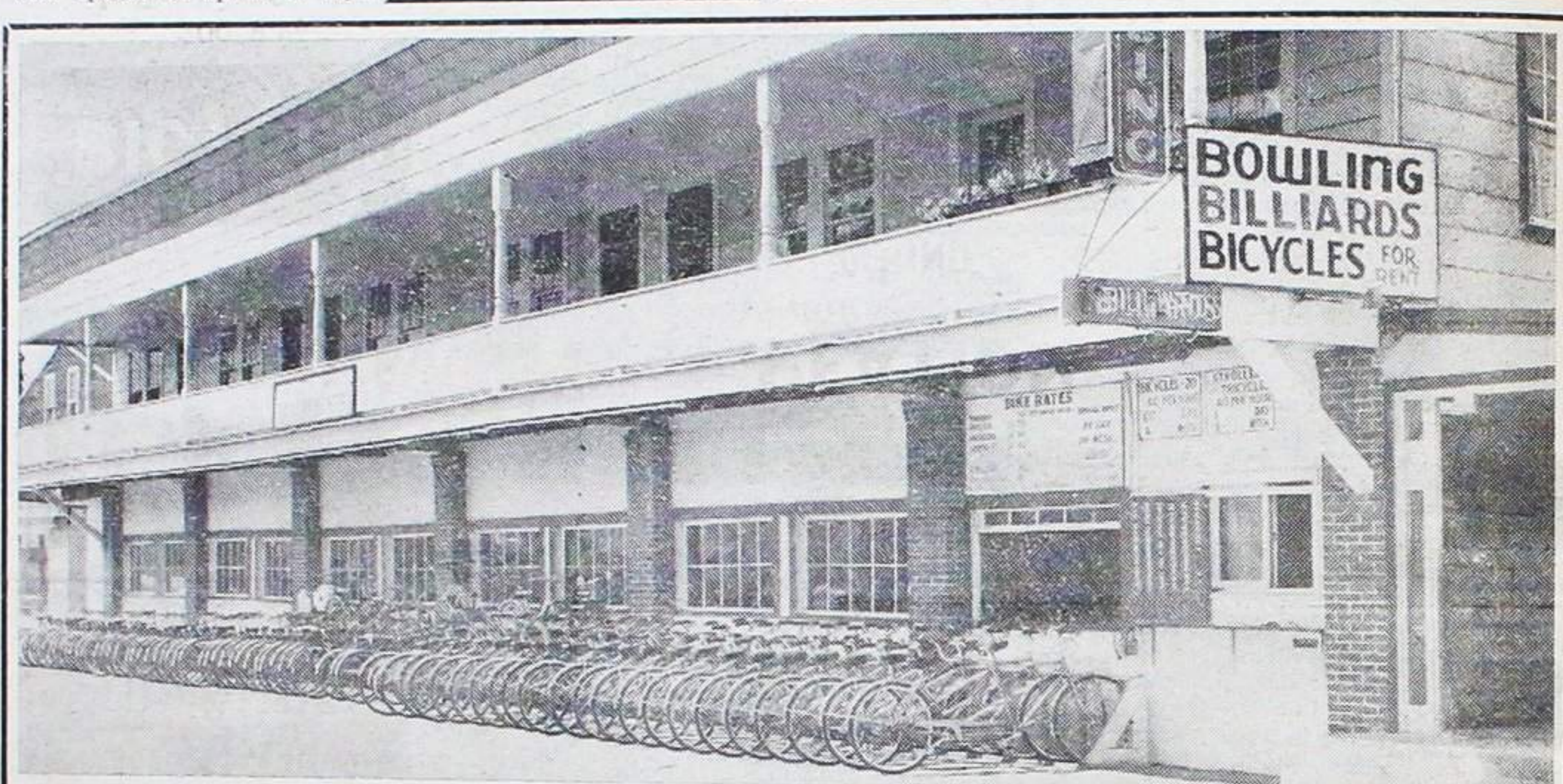

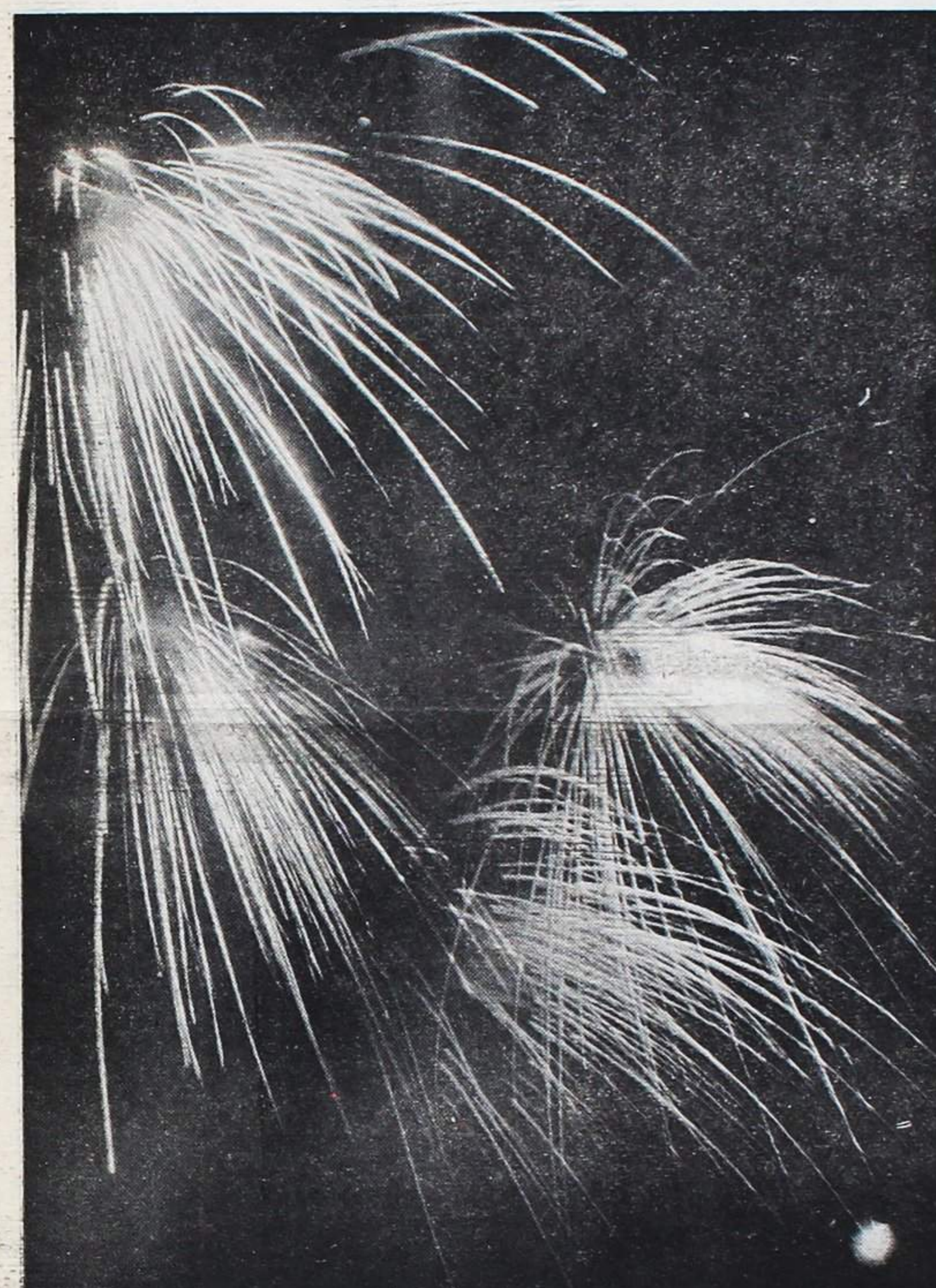

Safety Tips For Boaters

The American Red Cross, Exeter District chapter through Mrs. Gordon Cheney, chairman of water safety services, recently released advice on safe use of boats and pleasure craft.

She offered the following safety tips for boaters:

- 1. Keep the passengers in your boat down to a safety number. Don't overcrowd.
2. Don't overpower your boat. Your dealer can tell you what size motor is safe.
3. Equip your boat with safety items. A life jacket for every passenger and a stern light (if you plan to be on the water at night) are "musts". Recommended also are anchor, oars, boat hook, extra line, fire extinguisher, tool kit and first aid kit.
4. Don't smoke while fueling.
5. If your rowboat capsizes or overturns, don't swim away from it. Hang on until help comes. It usually will float.

The Red Cross has a motion picture (in color) entitled "People Afloat" demonstrating safe boating practice. The picture is available for screening before local groups. Arrange-

ments for showing can be made by calling the Exeter Chapter Red Cross.

CofC Asks Changes On Beach Project

The Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce reported one of the busiest directors' meetings of the season last week.

A report of inquiries received this year to date showed an increase of 529 requests for beach information as compared with the same period last year. Inquiries in 1962 were set at 5,350.

In other business, the chamber forwarded letters to H. Clifford Bean commending him for his work as chairman of the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Mr. Bean has tendered his resignation effective this month. The chamber also forwarded a letter to the new Newburyport Chamber of Commerce offering

assistance and to Commissioner John Morton of the state highway department requesting several necessary changes to protect pedestrians and improve the looks of the new project at Hampton Beach.

Secretary Elliot also reported that he has been invited to participate in a weekly remote control broadcast to be conducted via telephone weekly over WHAV of Haverhill, Mass.

Claude Higgins of the Sullivan Agency of Boston was on hand and discussed the cooperative chamber advertising for the remainder of the year.

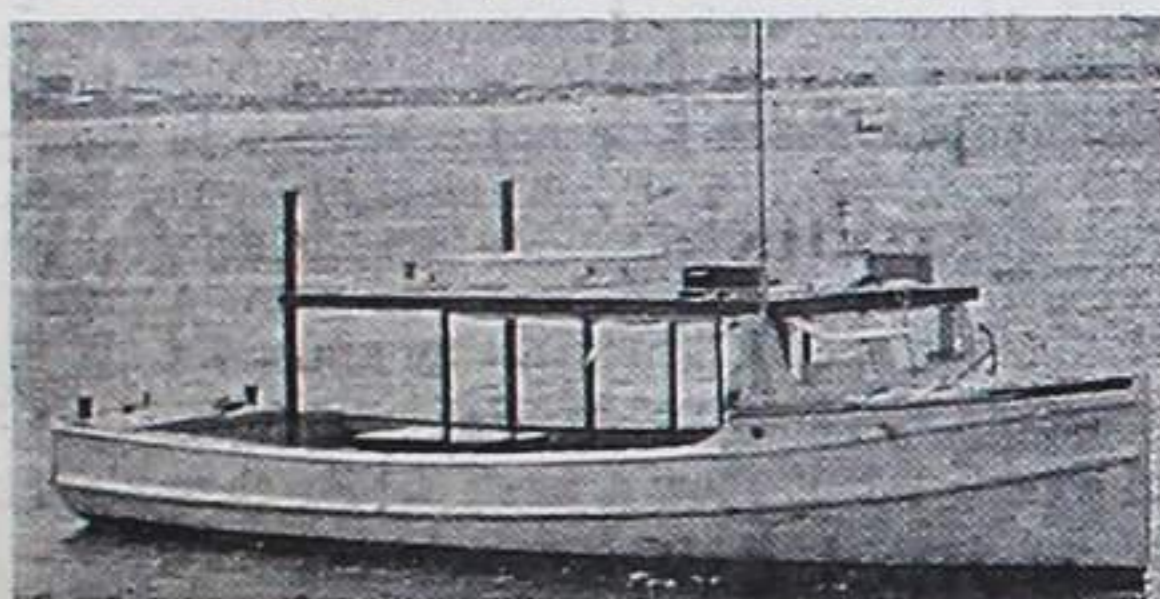

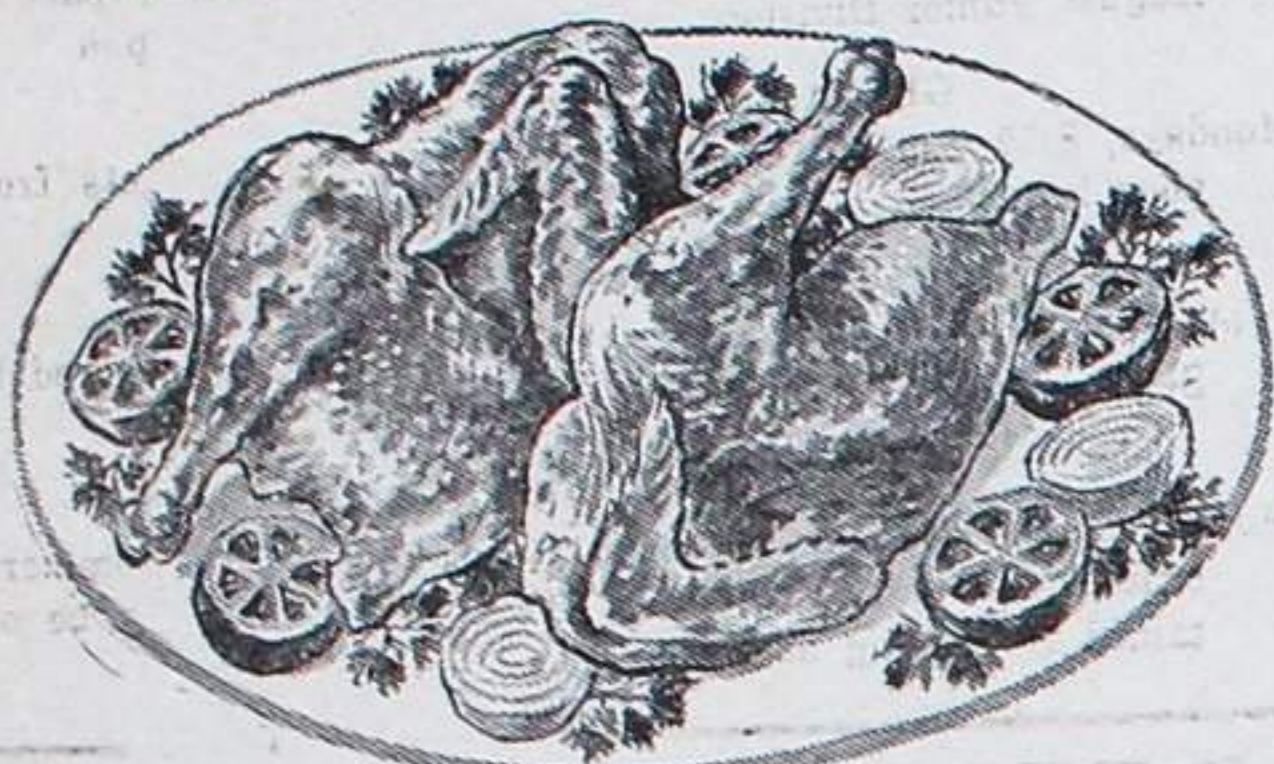
### Chamber Welcomes Seven New Members

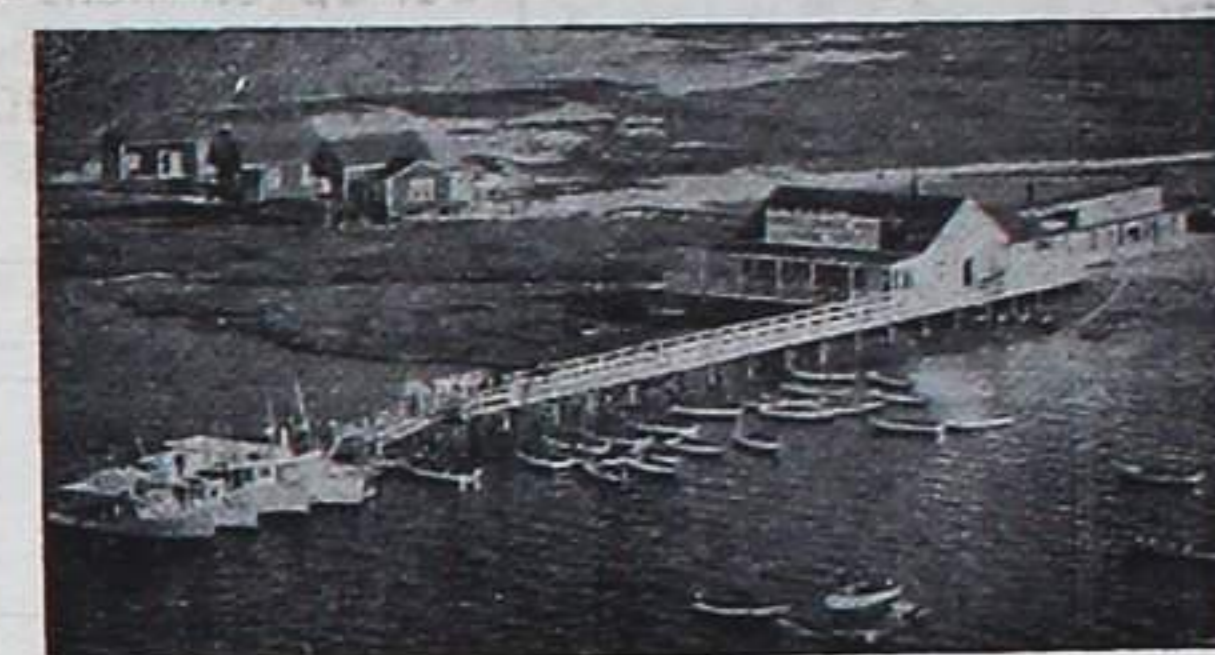

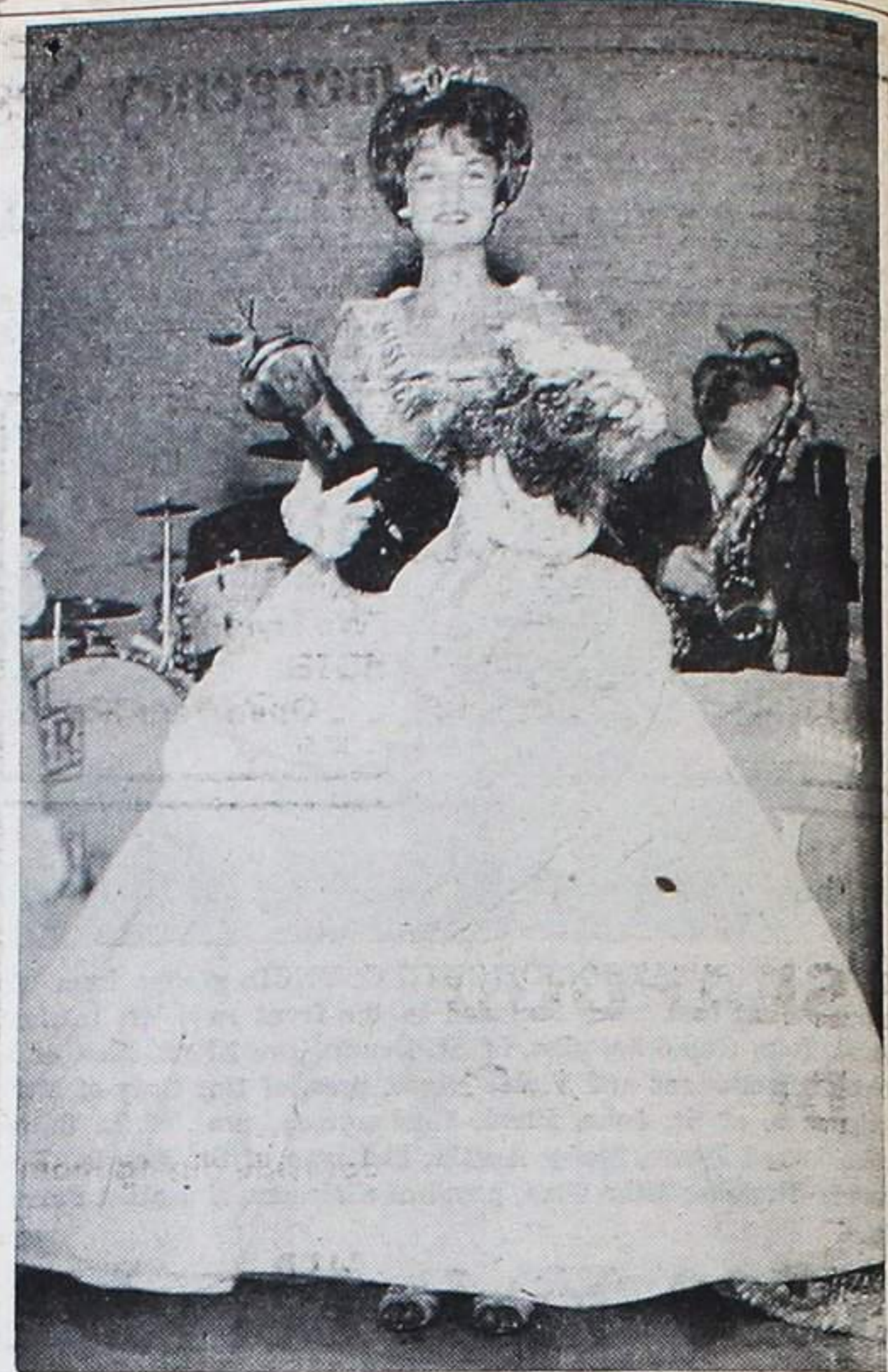

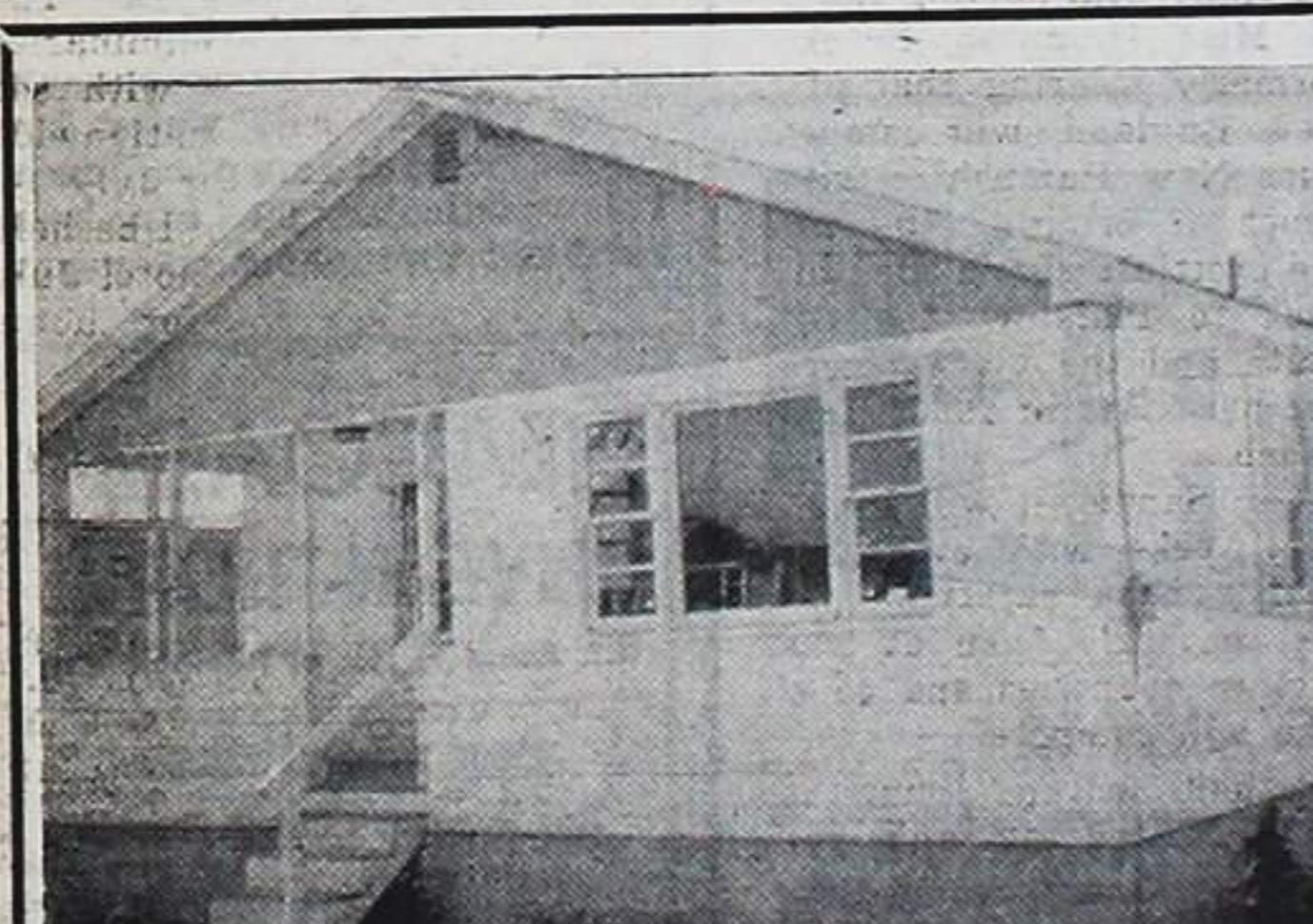

investigate an apparent bus transportation problem along the beach front.

Reports were received this week that persons desiring to travel from Seabrook beach and Seabrook side of Hampton River areas have no mode of transportation if they are without motor vehicles.

Chamber of commerce officials this week said they had received complaints that an apparent crack-down on interstate bus service does not allow interstate buses to carry passengers from the Seabrook area to Hampton Beach or from Hampton Beach to the New Hampshire side adjacent to the Massachusetts line.

Local representatives said this week they will endeavor to get a ruling on the situation. If transportation needs cannot be met as the travel situation is now set up, the chamber officials said they will endeavor to have a local bus line make two or three trips a day to the Seabrook area.

The northern end of the Hampton Beach area is now serviced by a busmobile with continuous trips throughout the day. Chamber officials said there is a possibility this type method of transportation could be worked out.

The present need developed when persons residing in the Seabrook area but working at Hampton Beach were left without apparent bus service this week.

**Skin Divers Unsnag  
Harbor Gas Line**

One of the most colorful water exhibitions in local history was staged last Friday and Saturday mornings in Hampton Harbor by skin divers from the Portsmouth area.

The previous Tuesday, a large gas main had been laid across Hampton Harbor by Simplex Wire and Cable Co. of Newington for the N. H. Allied Gas Co. Swift currents forced the cable onto a submerged wooden piling which was located beneath the surface of the water. The cable could not find its way to a resting place on the bed of the river.

Skin divers were called in to remedy the situation. Following more than two hours of work beneath the surface of the water in Hampton Harbor, the cable was freed. The divers attached approximately 12 inflatable yellow bags to the cable. Each bag was capable of lifting 300 lbs. Following attachment of the bags the skin divers, wearing colorful tanks, inflated the bags and raised the cable nearly to the water's surface.

Combined towing efforts by local lobsterman Irving Jones who hauled the cable over the top of the piling and the work of the skin divers allowed the cable to be laid on the river bed. The divers also freed another section of the huge line Saturday morning.

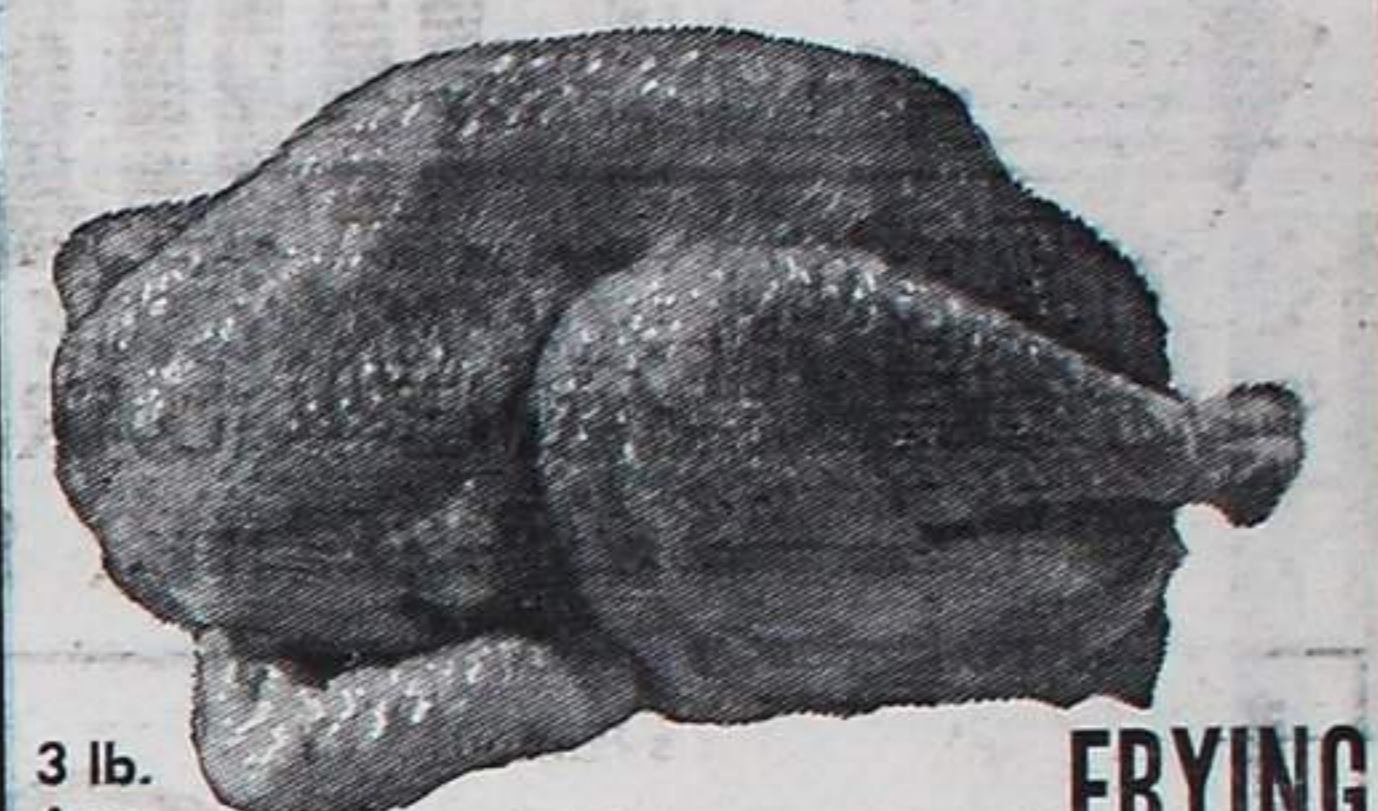
The new gas line will replace one of the older lines which had previously carried gas under the Hampton Harbor.

### Partial Closing Of Clam Flats Ordered

State Conservation Officer Floyd Potter this week released the following bulletin citing the closing of a portion of the Hampton Harbor clam flats.

Ralph G. Carpenter, director of the New Hampshire Fish and Game department, stated, "Upon recommendation of the Advisory Committee on Shore Fisheries and vote of the Fish and Game Commission, Middle Grounds, Hampton River, will be closed Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week to the taking of clams.

"The effective date of this closure shall be July 18, 1962 to run for an indefinite period. Authority RSA 211:63."

Conservation Officer Potter said the action became necessary because of the scarcity and smallness of clams in the Middle Grounds area.

This section of Hampton River is located just west of the Hampton River toll house on a section abutted by the Hampton River which flows into Seabrook. Anyone not familiar with the area is urged to contact Officer Potter before digging clams in the vicinity.

### Firemen Train As Skin Divers

Two local firemen who recently completed preliminary skin diving training, Malcolm Hopkins and Walter Ward, continued their advanced training this week by gaining underwater experience in Hampton River.

Chief Perley George, in an effort to give Hampton added protection by the use of experienced skin divers, is supervising their continued training program.

Both men were given the go ahead in their training program several weeks ago. Since that time, they completed preliminary training and have given the Hampton Fire department one of the first skin diving teams of any fire department in the area.

Hampton's selectmen and the beach precinct commissioners each voted approval of the purchase of uniforms. The men are completely equipped with most of the necessary skin diving equipment including underwater compasses and depth gauges which are worn on the wrists.

Chief George this week said that the Coast Guard hopes to have two men available for skin diving duty in the near future with two of Hampton Beach's lifeguards already experienced skin divers. George said once these men are coordinated, they will give the immediate seacoast area a fine skin diving team which will be used for emergency purposes.

The two men attached to the fire department will also be used for beach and town underwater chores throughout the year, such as cleaning the underwater inlets for the salt water hydrant system at Hampton Beach. This particular job has been hired out throughout the years.

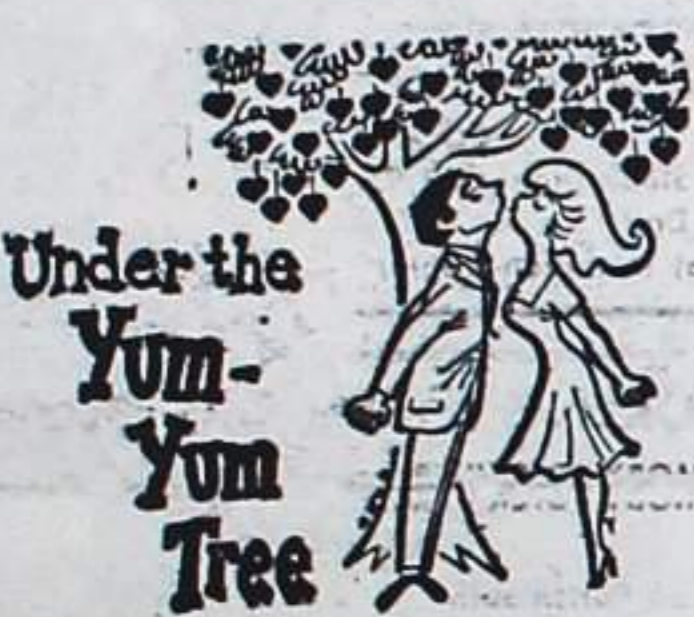

### 'Yum-Yum Tree' Is Delightfully Funny

The uproar of laughter bursting from the Hampton Playhouse this week will drown out the noisiest Fourth of July celebration along the seacoast as "Under the Yum-Yum Tree" opens the 1962 summer season this week with a side-splitting comedy that provides an evening of funny, funny entertainment.

The subject is sex—a favorite with writers since ancient man chiseled stories on the walls of his cave. The treatment of the subject is amusingly clever and yet beneath all the hilarity some rather provocative ideas concerning illicit affairs and divorce stand out. At the moment of performance, the audience is too busy laughing to catch the depth of significance but post-curtain reflection brings some of these ideas out clear and loud.

In past years, Dennis Drew has created many fine characters but he has never been so brilliantly funny as he is in the role of Hogan—the self-assertive Lothario who makes a career seducing the women who occupy the apartment of which he is landlord. He delivered his lines and business with split-second timing and delicate finesse that wrung every possible laugh out of exceedingly clever dialogue.

Katherine Helmond and Ian Sullivan teamed up as the young lovers attempting an experiment in Platonic Philosophy under virtually impossible conditions and Hogan's unrequested advice. Miss Helmond's scene when she is pricked by the needles from cactus juice and throws Plato's philosophy into San Francisco Bay is the high spot of the second act and guaranteed to bring convulsive laughter. Ian Sullivan's constant frustration and continual trouble conforming to Plato's law adds greatly to the merriment.

Ailsa Dawson—as Irene Wilson, the unhappy divorcee—provides the more sobering thoughts from "Under the Yum-Yum Tree". Her strength and versatility as an actress shine as she brings some balance into a completely "wacky" situation. William Douglas and Fred Hoskins complete the cast in walk-on roles.

The perceptive direction of

Adrian Hall resulted in a smooth production of a chaotic plot. Business and movement are a most important factor in the play. His capable directing resolved them into well-oiled unity. The set design was a colorful and clever execution by David Houston with an especially effective back drop of the Golden Gate bridge. My only objection was that the space allotted to the bathroom was architecturally inadequate. Every time anyone went through the door I had the feeling that they were going out on to the Golden Gate Bridge to brush their teeth.

"Under the Yum-Yum Tree" is a fun play. The lines are racy. The plot is suggestive. It is not an evenings entertainment for children. Nor is it a

play for adults who object to risque situation comedy. However, it is delightfully funny—extremely well-acted—and proficiently produced. It is two hours of solid laughter.

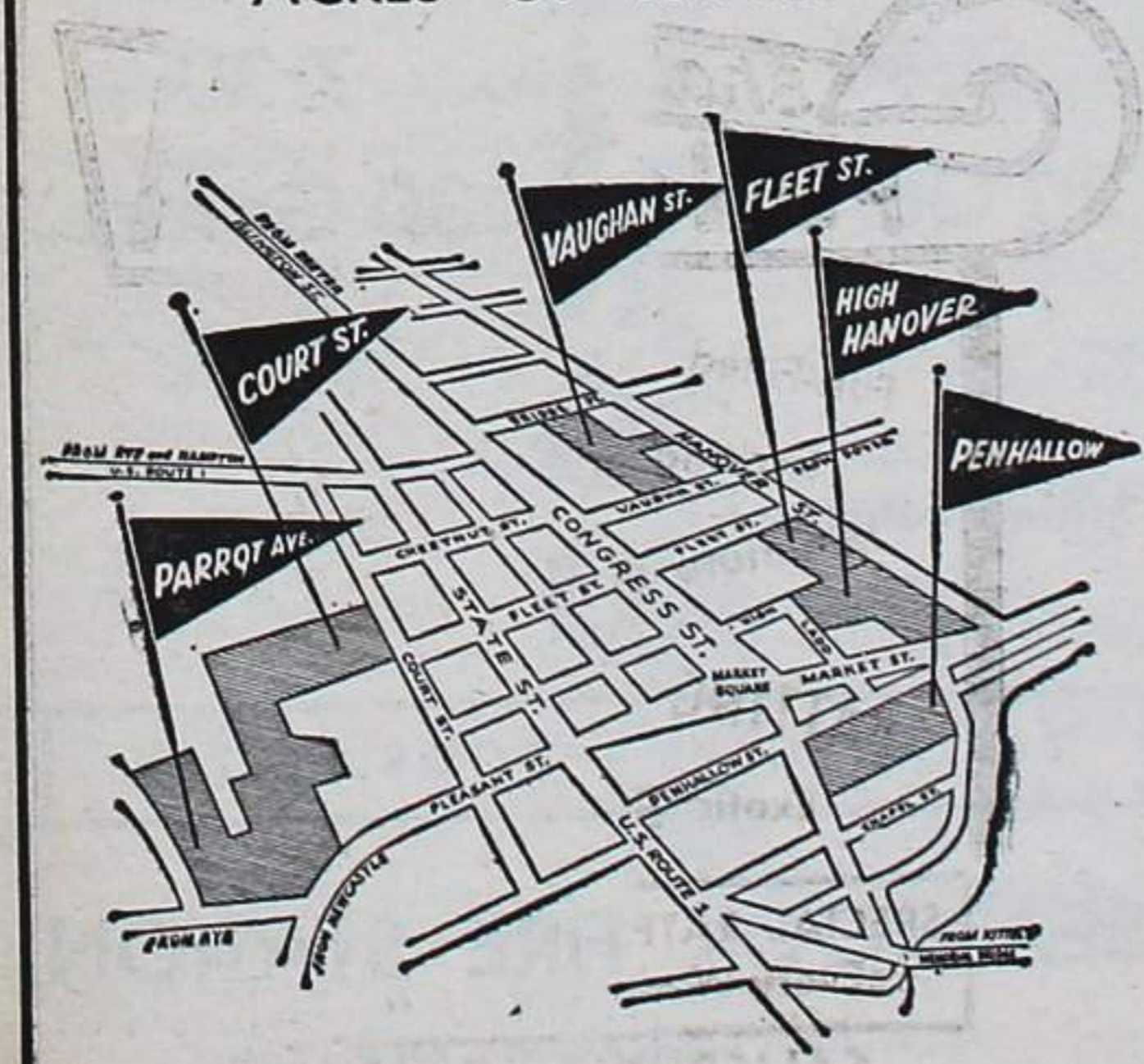

### Lougee Elected To Port Authority Post

Carl M. Lougee of Hampton was elected vice chairman of the N. H. Port Authority at a marathon session held last week at Portsmouth. At the same time, Eugene P. Soles of Newcastle was elected to serve as chairman.

An Authority committee, headed by Chairman Soles, was named to work out a set of rules to govern skin divers, water skiers and boat operators along the coast.

In other business, compensation of one dollar an hour for use of their own boats by harbor masters on duty was given approval by the authority beginning July 1.

The Authority will also ask the state for special buoys and lines to mark off bathing beaches wherever practical. It was noted that power boats had been seen too close to shore in the vicinity of bathers in several instances.

At the same time, the Commissioner John Rowe of the State Resources and Economic Development department, proposed a new idea for the authority's consideration.

### Dump Site Approved

Town officials have received approval of the State Board of Health for a new dump site. A low marshland area in need of fill on the southerly side of the present sewerage treatment plant has been selected.

Town Manager Boehner said present plans call for the continuation of dumping in the present causeway dump area as long as is permitted by the state authorities, prior to construction of the new expressway to the beach.

Following the closing of that area, town crews will use land adjacent to the treatment plant. Mr. Boehner said that no burning will be allowed in that area and dumping will be by the sanitary land fill method.

At the same time, the town manager said that no fires are

allowed to be set at the town controlled dump on the causeway. The fires which do start in these areas are set by individuals other than town employees on duty or are started accidentally. Persons caught setting the fires will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law for lighting fires without a permit, according to Mr. Boehner.

Mr. Boehner stressed that dumping off the causeway is by the sanitary land fill method only.

## Traffic Flow Poll Favors May Date

One-way traffic went into effect at 3 p.m. Monday afternoon at Hampton Beach.

A few hours later, following a meeting of the directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening, President Jack Dunfee advised the UNION that a letter had been forwarded to John P. Morton with copies to Governor Wesley Powell concerning the one-way traffic situation at the beach.

The gist of President Dunfee's letter noted that as a result of a recent poll followed by a vote of the C of C directors, it is requested that one-way traffic at the beach be started much earlier in the season.

The results to date, of an informal poll conducted by the Chamber of Commerce through the cooperation of the UNION, were released following the weekly meeting of the directors Tuesday evening.

A total of 160 business persons have thus far favored the changing of traffic to one-way the weekend prior to Memorial Day, while 57 preferred the change either the latter part of June or on the Fourth of July.

Tabulations showed that the votes on both sides of the issue came from all sections of the main beach including many of the side streets as well as the boulevard and Ashworth avenue. Chamber officials said the official tallies will be kept on file at the chamber office and may be examined at any time by beach businessmen.

One of the major opponents to an earlier date for one-way traffic was the Hampton Water Works Company. In a letter to the chamber, Mr. R. Weiners, manager, said that "advancing the start of the one-way traffic pattern to the pre-Memorial Day weekend would hamper our operations to a great extent. Since the majority of our beach accounts are turned on and meters installed between May 1 and June 21, we are of the opinion that the one-way traffic pattern would reduce our operations efficiency by at least 25 percent."

No one spoke in opposition to an earlier date at the Tuesday meeting of the chamber directors, but many reasons were voiced on behalf of an earlier change over.

Surveys indicated that tourists unfamiliar with the area should have no difficulty in locating Hampton Beach if forced to use Ashworth avenue. Signs directing persons to Hampton Beach are located prior to entering Hampton River bridge, at the exit of the main road to Seabrook Beach and at Salisbury Beach, according to spokesmen at the

fire safety factors, were also brought forth.

A two-year-old petition was produced for the records by Norman Royal which indicated that at that time petitioners asked the governor and the highway department to keep the one-way traffic pattern in effect.

As a result of the recent poll, the chamber directors, with only one director abstaining, voted to reaffirm a previous vote to seek an earlier one-way traffic starting date.

In a final note, chamber officials said they "felt the system will make beach traffic much safer for the early arrivals who deserve the same consideration as the July and August arrivals."

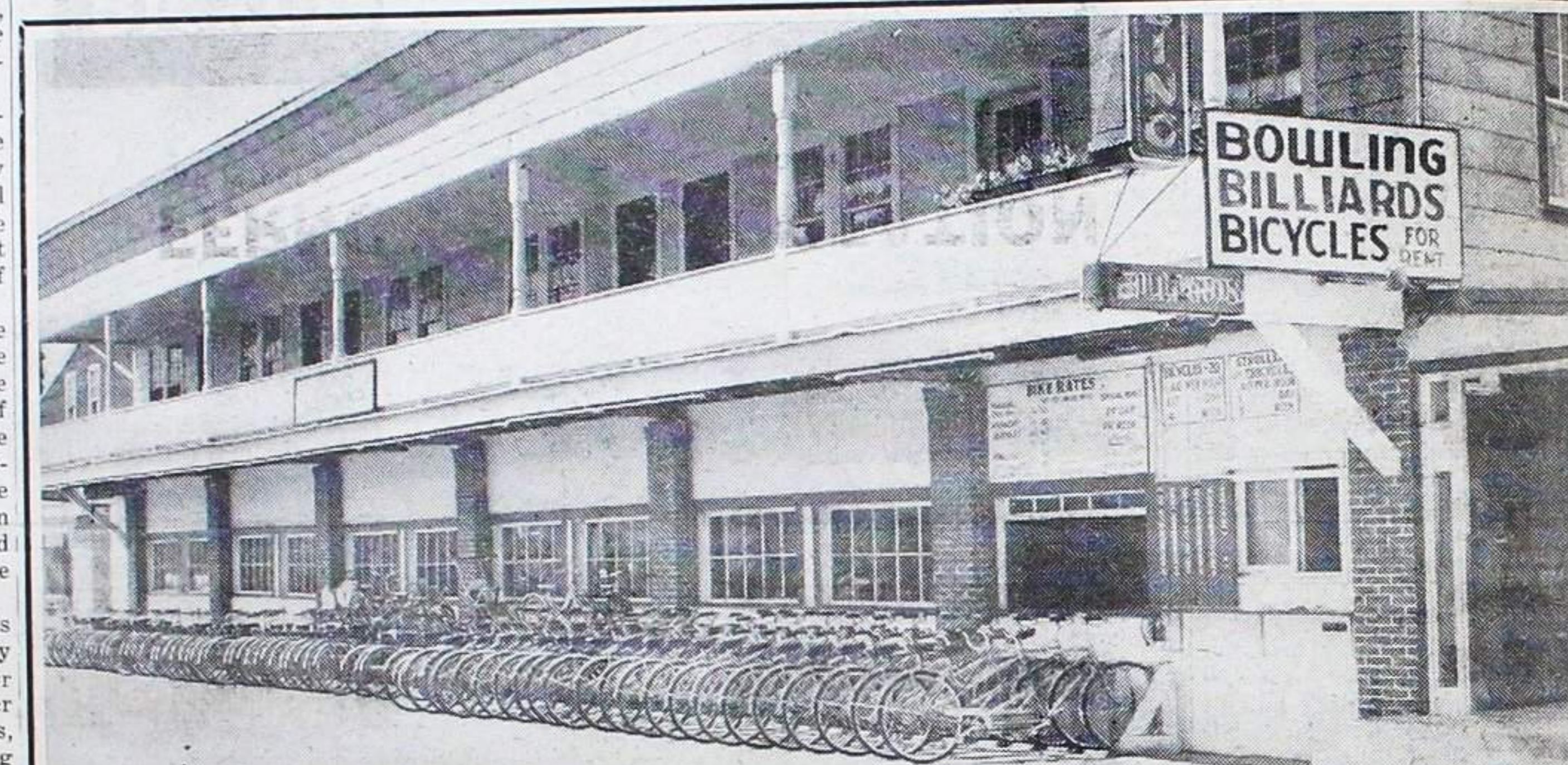
