

Traffic Flow Poll Favors May Date

One-way traffic went into effect at 3 p.m. Monday afternoon at Hampton Beach.

A few hours later, following a meeting of the directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening, President Jack Dunfee advised the UNION that a letter had been forwarded to John P. Morton with copies to Governor Wesley Powell concerning the one-way traffic situation at the beach.

The gist of President Dunfee's letter noted that as a result of a recent poll followed by a vote of the C of C directors, it is requested that one-way traffic at the beach be started much earlier in the season.

The results to date, of an informal poll conducted by the Chamber of Commerce through the cooperation of the UNION, were released following the weekly meeting of the directors Tuesday evening.

A total of 160 business persons have thus far favored the changing of traffic to one-way the weekend prior to Memorial Day, while 57 preferred the change either the latter part of June or on the Fourth of July.

Tabulations showed that the votes on both sides of the issue came from all sections of the main beach including many of the side streets as well as the boulevard and Ashworth avenue. Chamber officials said the official tallies will be kept on file at the chamber office and may be examined at any time by beach businessmen.

One of the major opponents to an earlier date for one-way traffic was the Hampton Water Works Company. In a letter to the chamber, Mr. R. Weiners, manager, said that "advancing the start of the one-way traffic pattern to the pre-Memorial Day weekend would hamper our operations to a great extent. Since the majority of our beach accounts are turned on and meters installed between May 1 and June 21, we are of the opinion that the one-way traffic pattern would reduce our operations efficiency by at least 25 percent."

No one spoke in opposition to an earlier date at the Tuesday meeting of the chamber directors, but many reasons were voiced on behalf of an earlier change over.

Surveys indicated that tourists unfamiliar with the area should have no difficulty in locating Hampton Beach if forced to use Ashworth avenue. Signs directing persons to Hampton Beach are located prior to entering Hampton River bridge, at the exit of the main road to Seabrook Beach and at Salisbury Beach, according to spokesmen at the

fire safety factors, were also brought forth.

A two-year-old petition was produced for the records by Norman Royal which indicated that at that time petitioners asked the governor and the highway department to keep the one-way traffic pattern in effect.

As a result of the recent poll, the chamber directors, with only one director abstaining, voted to reaffirm a previous vote to seek an earlier one-way traffic starting date.

In a final note, chamber officials said they "felt the system will make beach traffic much safer for the early arrivals who deserve the same consideration as the July and August arrivals."

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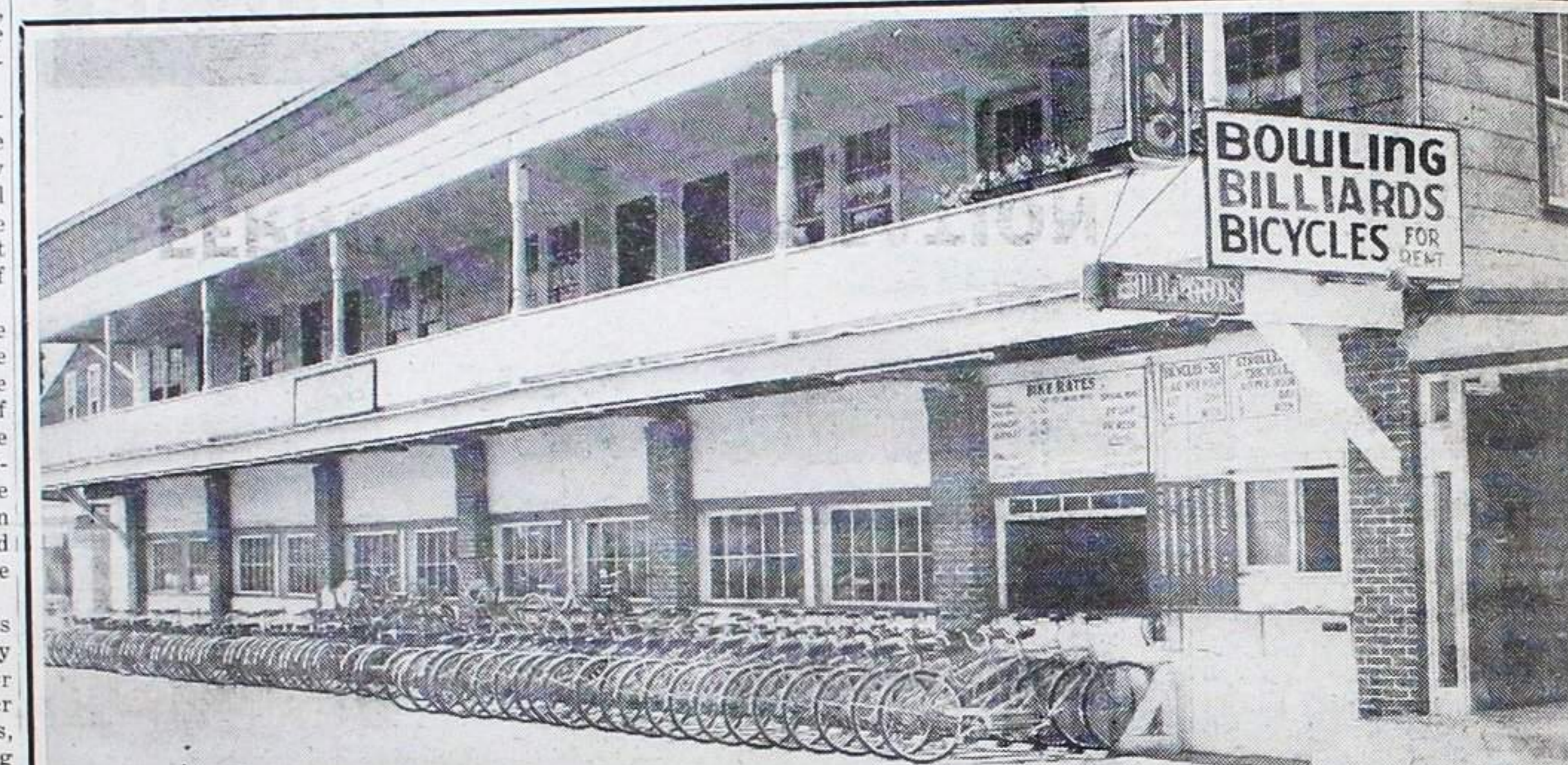

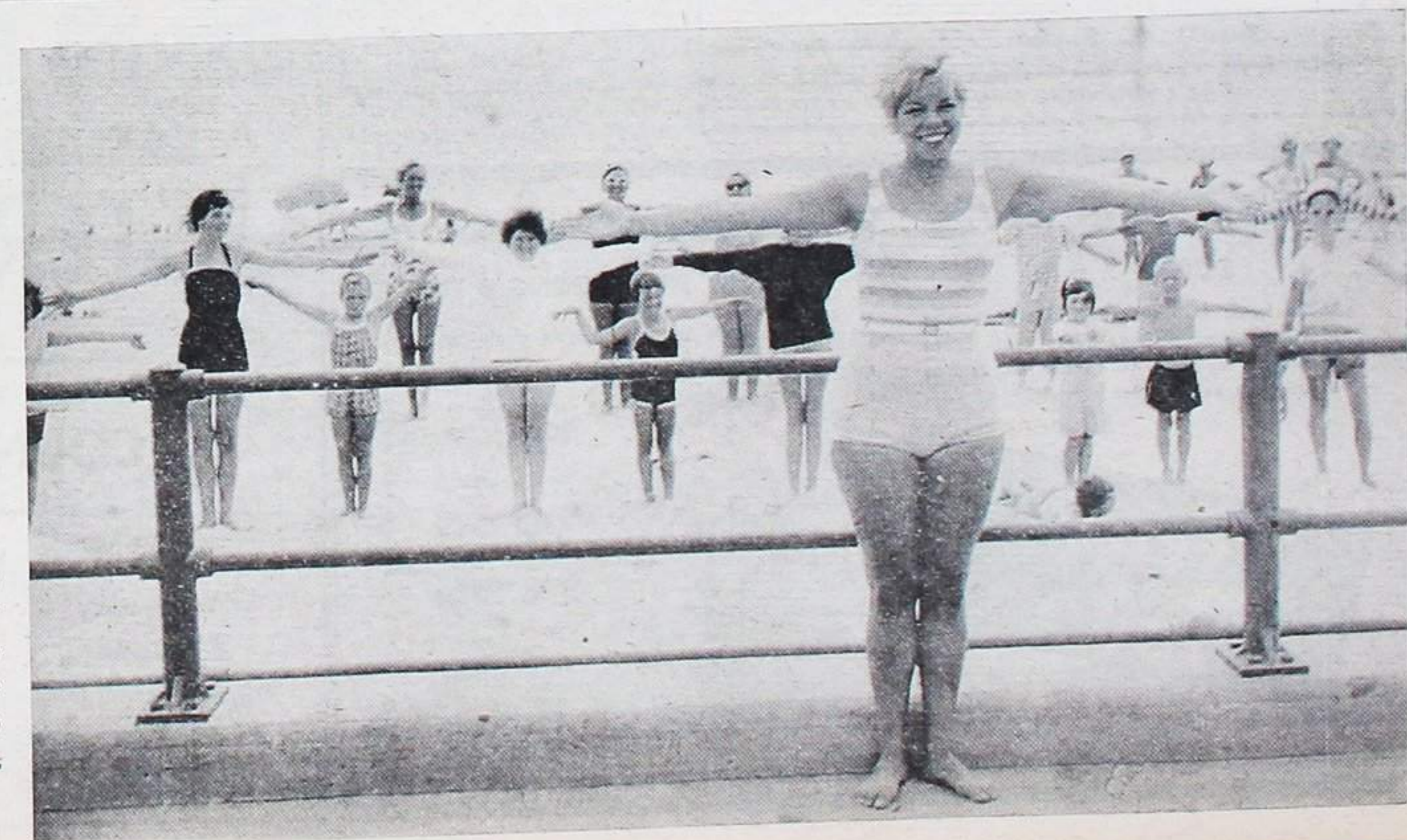

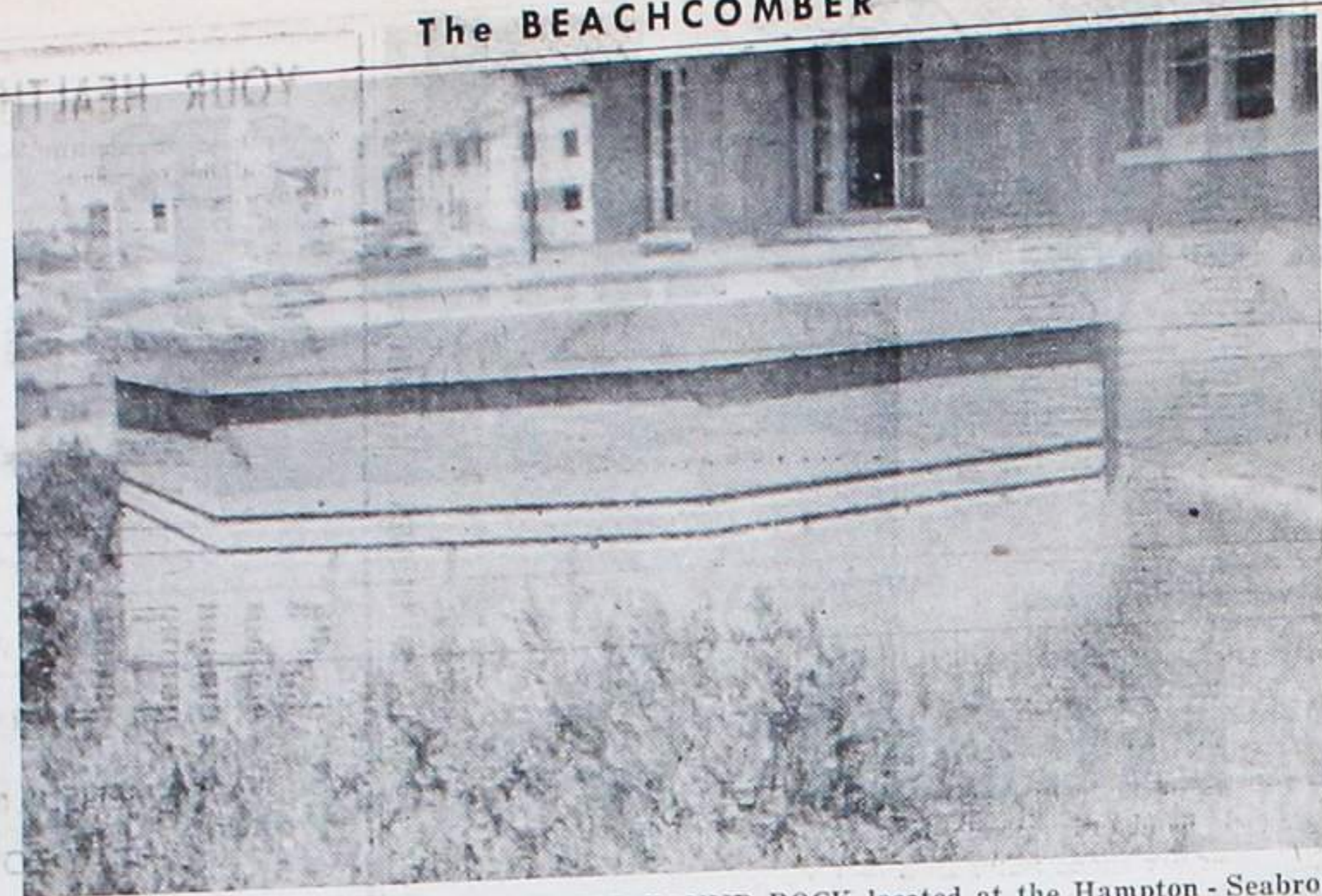

Historic Rock To Get Protection

A steel grill will be placed over the octagonal concrete well-type structure now housing the famous historic Bound Rock as a safety measure it was announced this week by the board of selectmen.

Although the concrete wall surrounding Bound Rock is approximately three feet high on the outside and sufficiently large enough to prevent accidental mishaps, town officials in view of the now heavily congested area of Hampton and Seabrook felt it wise to cover the rock. The actual rock is located approximately 10 feet below the surface.

For many years, the historic site was in the headlines, both as a source of history and the focal point of a famed court case between the towns of Hampton and Seabrook.

Bound Rock, an historic Hampton marker which is over 300 years old, is believed to be one of the earliest authenticated boundary markers in the United States and is located on the southerly side of Hampton river.

Location of the spot has proven very deceiving to many persons who have tried to find it because of the fact it is much further south of the river than most realize. It is located in a vacant lot just off Ocean drive and is approximately 600 feet south of the river.

In March of 1953, the New Hampshire Supreme Court settled the age-old Hampton-Seabrook boundary dispute in favor of Hampton after the case had climbed the legal ladder to the state's highest tribunal.

It was the contention of the town of Seabrook that the dividing line was the Hampton River. The high court confirmed

that Hampton gained possession of a large tract of land on the south side of the river. The disputed stretch of beach was made by the process of accretion, the piling of sands by tides and shifting currents when the mouth of the river was stabilized by the construction of rip-rap jetties at the inlet.

The State Supreme Court upheld the Superior Court decision in that Bound Rock was the original dividing line between the towns and because it was definitely established as that the shifting sands or the course of the river do not in any way alter the original boundary marker. Evidence and exhibits in the case dated back to 1640.

In 1956, voters of the town of Hampton appropriated \$2,000 to purchase the lot on which the historical marker now rests. The lot is now owned by the Town of Hampton and selectmen, in the decision to partially cover the Bound Rock, have taken not only safety measures but also further steps to preserve the area's rich historical heritage.

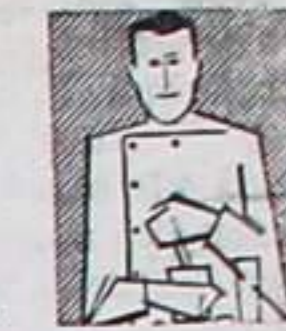

Canadian Boy Scouts Visit Beach On Hitchhiking Tour

Three Canadian Boy Scouts on a whirlwind hiking and hitchhiking trip from their home in Joliette, Province of Quebec, Canada, recently visited the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce.

En route home through the northern New England states after trekking and hitchhiking to Provincetown on Cape Cod, the three senior scouts stopped at Hampton Beach.

Making excellent time, the boys, two brothers and a friend, had been gone from home exactly a week when they arrived at Hampton Beach. They had already toured the Cape Cod area and were once again headed north.

When interviewed, it was found that the boys could speak very little English. It was learned that they had heard of Hampton Beach through the local and state advertising program in Canada. 35 lb. Halibut Gives Fishermen Thrill

A Hampton Beach resident and a Seabrook man made one of the season's biggest catches to date in local waters.

Terry Bragg, who made headlines last year when he hauled in one of the largest cods of the entire season and Harry Dionne, recently teamed up to boat a 35 1/2 lb. halibut.

More spectacular was the fact that the catch was made with a light line and on a rod and reel. It took the duo 45 minutes to bring the huge fish into the boat.

Pulled in near enough to attempt gaffing, the fish took off at a high rate of speed when the fishermen missed in two attempts to bring it aboard. The halibut pulled the 14-foot outboard boat approximately a quarter of a mile before being reeled in by Dionne.

The catch was made just off the mouth of Hampton Harbor Sunday. Bragg is already a veteran member of the Old Salt club and as yet no other persons have registered for the 1962 membership at the chamber of commerce office.

Leavitt Family Holds Reunion At Beach

The gathering paid tribute in silent prayer to Fred C. Leavitt of North Hampton whose funeral was held Saturday morning in Portsmouth. Mr. Leavitt was buried in North Hampton in a cemetery which occupies land once owned by his branch of the Leavitt family.

The association is nationwide in scope and its secretary is Mrs. Lena Leavitt Fahlow of Woburn, Mass.

Tom Leavitt, born in 1817, built Leavitt's hotel at the foot of Great Boar's Head, later run by his son Albert and grandson Joseph, and his descendants are active members of the family association.

Transportation Problem To Seabrook Alleviated

Mr. Charles Stafford of the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission notified Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce officials this week that transportation facilities to serve the Route 1A area south of the Hampton River bridge into Seabrook as far as the Massachusetts state line have been arranged.

The complaints came following an apparent crack-down on interstate bus service in the area.

cians around the clock during the previous week's rehearsal period, brought order out of chaos to produce a fine version of "South Pacific" that will bring joy to your heart and tears to your eyes.

As Nellie Forbush — the nurse in love with the French planter — Susan Hesse took command of the challenging role and played it with great tenderness and understanding. Her voice was most pleasing and gave full interpretation to the wonderful Hammerstein lyrics in such memorable songs as, "I'm In Love With A Wonderful Guy", "Cockeyed Optimist" and "I'm Gonna Wash That Man Right Out-A My Hair".

Especially strong was Dennis Drew, as Emile De Becque when he unleashed for the first time to Hampton Playhouse devotees a strong, sure baritone voice that gave great dramatic quality to his fine singing of "Some Enchanted Evening" and "This Nearly Was Mine". His broad acting ability added significantly to the expression of his abiding love and need for the pert Navy nurse.

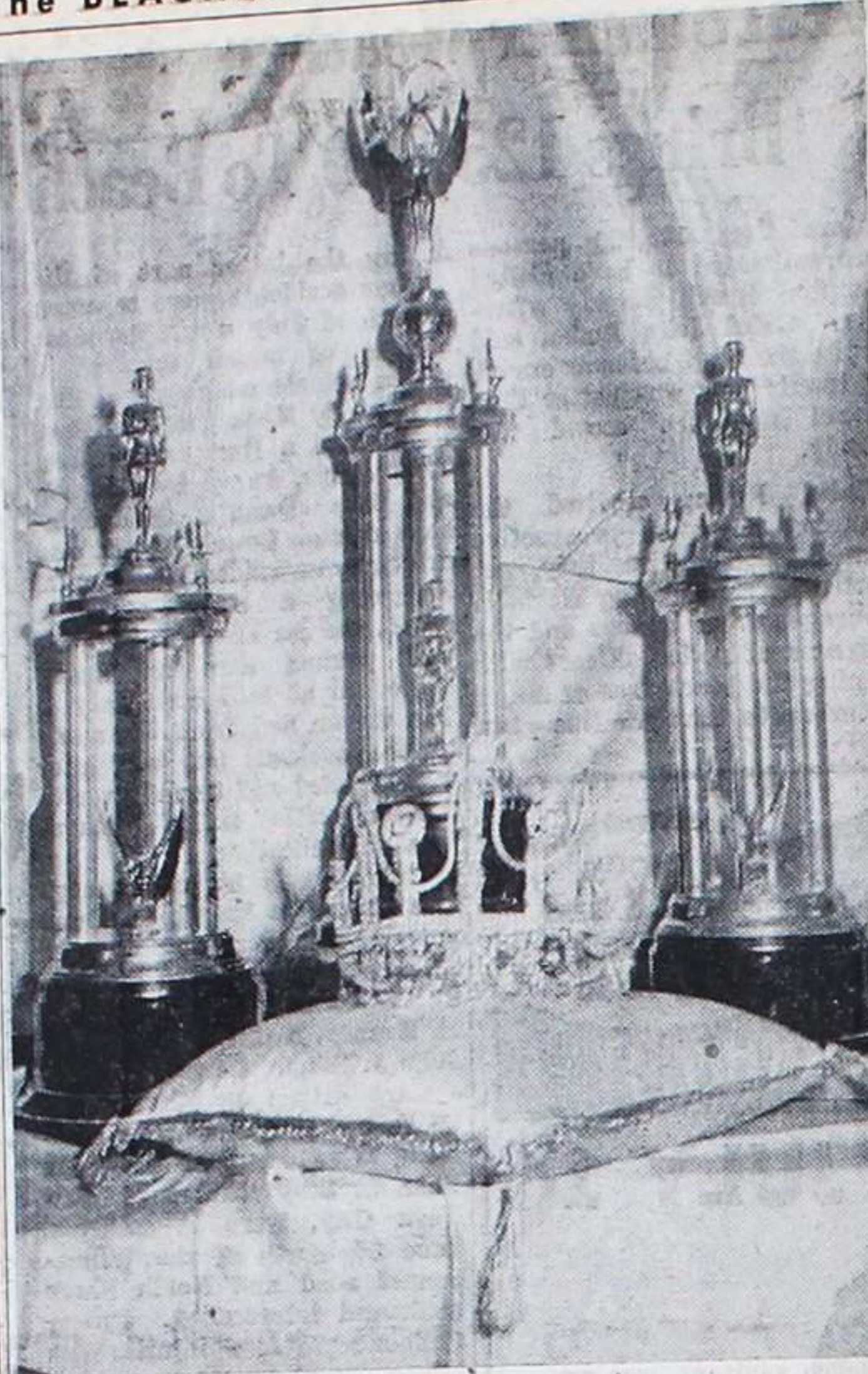

**Study Bids On
Sewer Project**

Bids were received Monday on phase two of the extended sewer project now underway in Hampton.

Town Manager Kenneth Boehner said the bids were now in the hands of Haley and Ward for inspection and an announcement of the winning contractor would probably be made at the regular meeting of the board of selectmen, Friday, July 6.

Phase two deals with the construction and installation of two lift stations, not of the package type. One is slated to be erected in the King's Highway area while a second will be constructed at the beach end of Winnacunnet road.

The stations will be constructed of masonry and brick with pumps being installed in each to carry the flow of the

sewerage which cannot flow by gravity.

There still remains major portions of the over-all project to be let out for bid. Mr. Boehner said phase three, consisting of enlargement of and repairs to the sewerage treatment plant, should be ready for bid in approximately a month.

A fourth phase of the project will come later and will consist of the relaying of some of the old sewerage lines to meet present demands. Still a fifth portion of the project will be handled by letting a portion of the job out for contract while town sewerage crews will participate in a portion of the work. This consists of the laying of laterals and street sewers in those places deemed most necessary, healthwise, as far as funds will go.

In case of rain the fair will be held in the First Congregational church vestry.

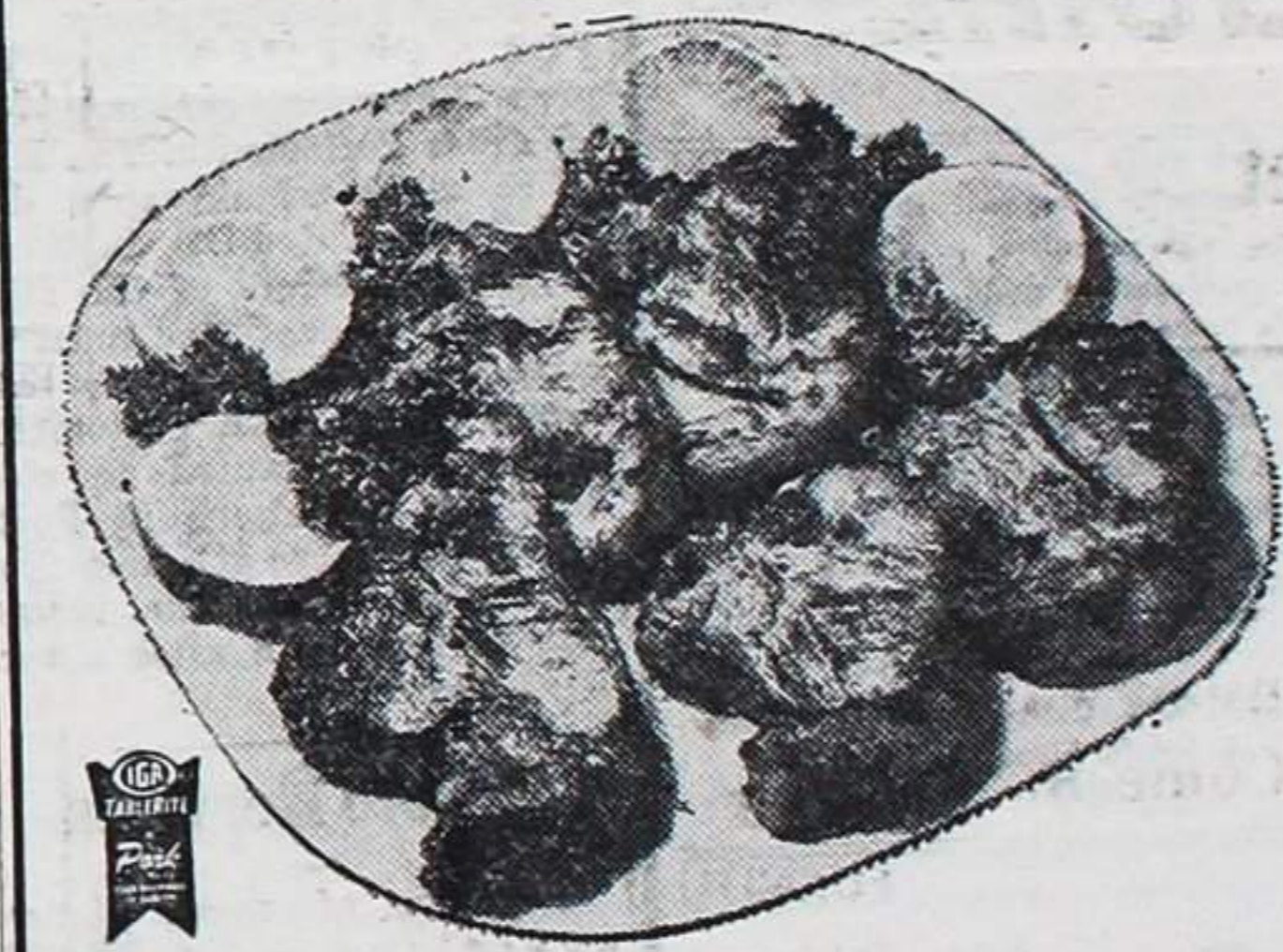

PUC Decision Keeps

RR Station Open

The New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission this week upheld its first decision on a petition by the Boston and Maine Railroad to close the Hampton station to summer service.

The PUC granted a motion for a rehearing on April 20 with respect to Specification 26 of the motion presented by the Boston and Maine which said, "The Commission erred in basing its conclusion upon irrelevant and unsworn statements of persons at the hearing."

Following the most recent hearing, the PUC stated "there was no evidence presented at the hearing which supported the allegation or specification that irrelevant and unsworn statements were used in the Commission's decision to require the continuation of agency service at that point."

by Town Manager Kenneth Boehner further said, "Upon consideration of all the facts, the Commission is of the opinion that the prior report is in accordance with the evidence submitted, and it reaffirms its earlier finding."

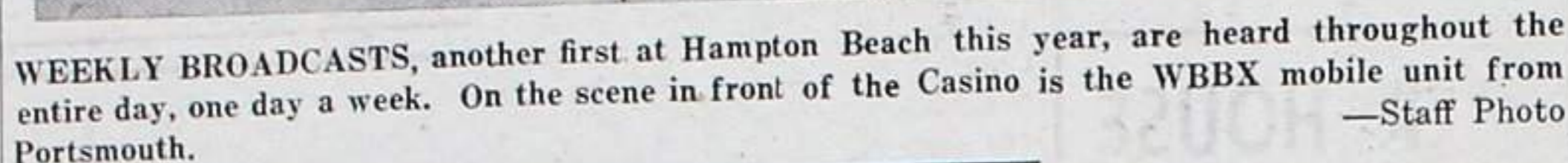
The original finding based on the report issued by the Commission on March 23 of this year stated that the proceedings were being dismissed without prejudice pointing out that "until more accurate figures can be obtained relative to the actual use of the service during a more fully representative period, it seems desirable that the agent should be continued in Hampton at this point as required by the currently effective order."

Almost simultaneously, the PUC ordered the Railway Express Agency to continue service from Portsmouth. The REA office must remain open during what the PUC says are "reasonable hours of the regular business day" and must receive, accept and deliver shipments to the REA customers. The REA wanted to close down all operations in Portsmouth and serve the area from its Dover office. The request was turned down after several PUC hearings.

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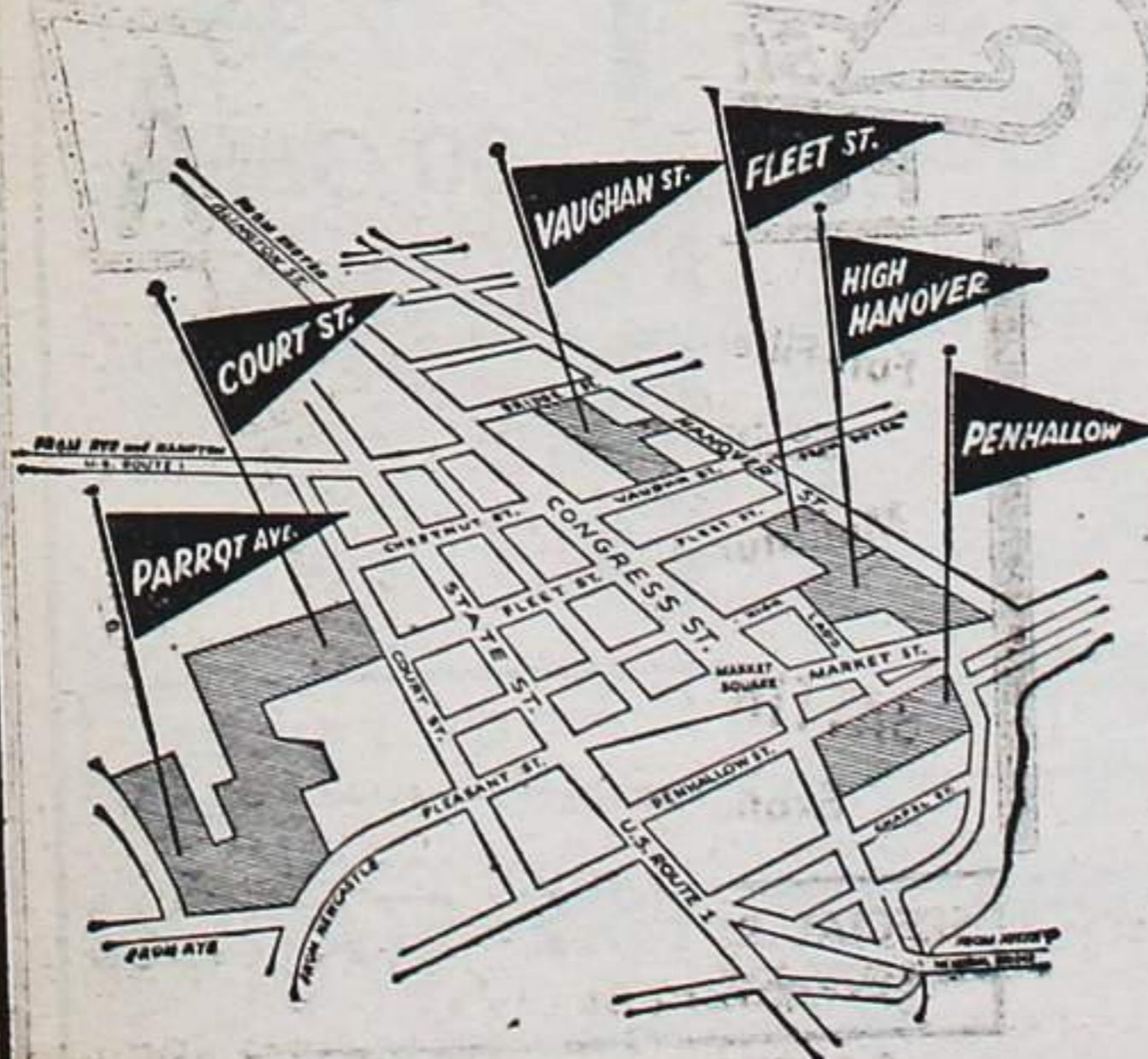

Beach Rules For Safety

In matters of safety and orderliness, persons shall obey all requests made by the lifeguards.

Lifeguards will not assume parental responsibility for children left unattended by their parents or guardian.

Complaints should be addressed to the Town Manager, c/o Town Offices, Hampton.

Persons found violating any of the above regulations or ordinances shall be evicted from the beach and subject to a fine of not more than \$25. (Section 7, Chapter 219, RSA)

Ordinances at the state controlled area of the beach vary slightly and should be checked by visitors to those areas. Complaints should be addressed to Recreation Commission, Department of Resources and Economic Development, State House Annex, Concord, N. H.

Ordinances and regulations for Hampton Beach remain essentially the same as in past years. For the benefit of newcomers regulations to ensure the safety and pleasure of vacationists are in force as follows:

No person or organization is permitted on the beach between the hours of 1 a.m. and sunrise unless through a special permit issued by the chief of police.

The lighting of fires on the beach is prohibited.

The changing of clothes in cars in the beach area is prohibited.

Dogs and other pets are prohibited on the beach and in the water.

Ball playing and similar games may be permitted at the discretion of the lifeguards.

Inflatables are not permitted in the water at any time.

Missing persons should be immediately reported to the lifeguard on duty.

State Official Favors Early Traffic Change

One-way traffic at Hampton Beach will go into effect at an earlier date in 1963, according to a letter received by President John Dunfee of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce from Commissioner John Morton of the New Hampshire State Department of Public Works and Highways.

Commenting on the recent survey conducted in regard to the long standing traffic situation at Hampton Beach, the highway commissioner said, "Reference is made to your communication dated July 2, 1962 which reported on the recently completed survey that was conducted by the chamber of commerce and the Hampton Union concerning the most effective date for the operation of one-way traffic at Hampton Beach."

"Originally we had recommended to the chamber officials and the officials of the community that the one-way traffic pattern be established around Memorial Day and continued in effect until at least one week after Labor Day. At that time our recommendations were ob-

Investigate Moving Of Police Station

In answer to queries concerning the possible location of new police facilities for the Hampton Police department, Town Manager Kenneth Boehner this week stated the Planning Board had authorized him to seek information concerning the possible moving of the Hampton Beach station.

Mr. Boehner did not elaborate on the possible moving of the station other than to say that a local building mover would be contacted in the near future to investigate the feasibility of such a move and to seek possible cost estimates.

At the same time, the town manager announced that Mr. Russell Peirce of Newburyport, the architect retained by the town to submit preliminary sketches for a possible new up-town police station was scheduled to complete work on the plans during the month of July.

Unless an emergency meeting of the Planning Board is held, no further work will be done on the establishment of new police quarters until September. The Planning Board has notified the selectmen there will be no regular meeting in August with the next meeting scheduled for early September.

Police will be forced to vacate their present quarters on September 10.

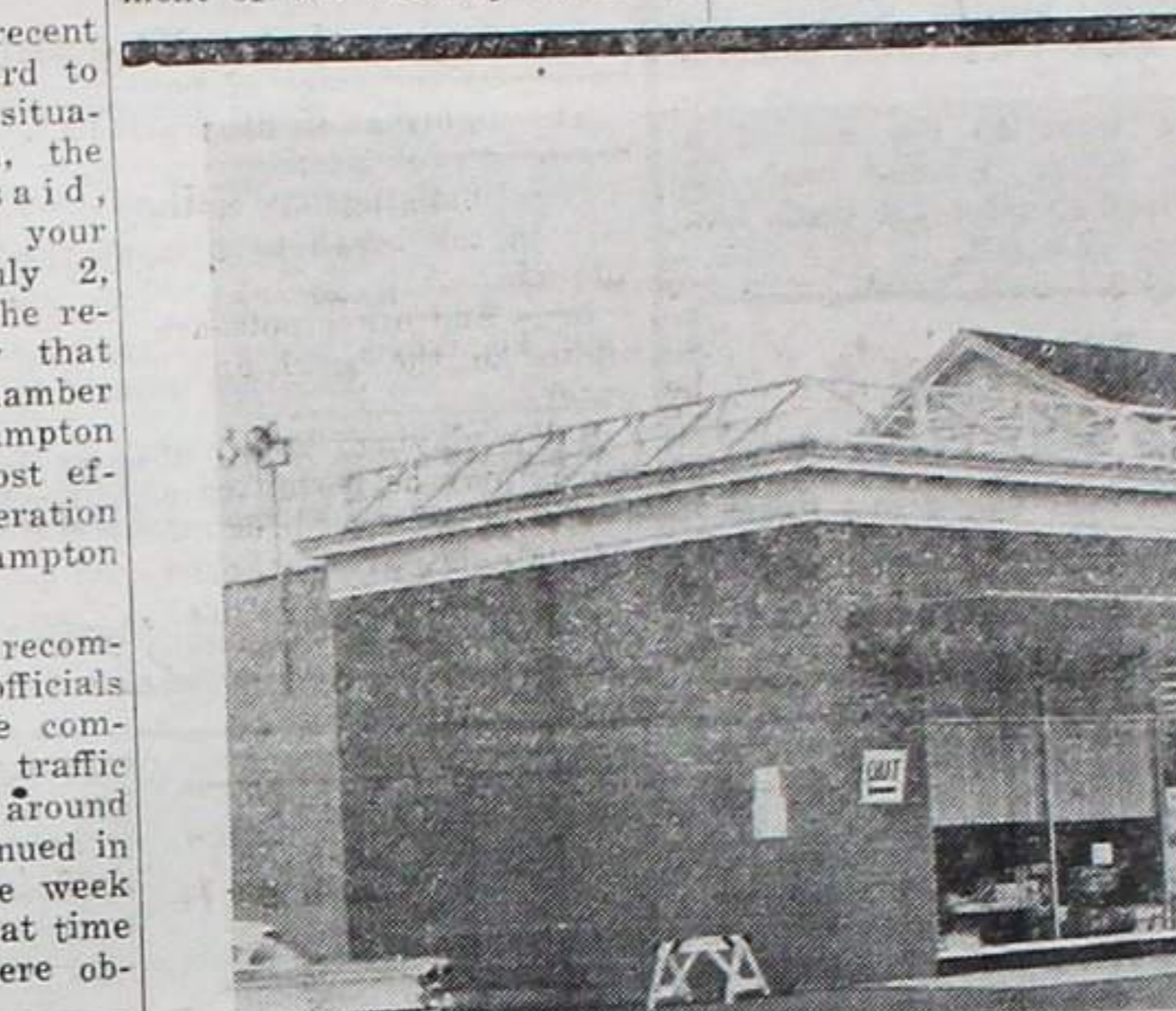

Area Groups Join Forces To Battle Pesky Mosquitos

The problem of mosquito control in the seacoast area was brought to a head last week when the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce and the Southeastern New Hampshire Mosquito Control Association, at separate meetings, agreed to do everything possible to rid the area of mosquitos.

The local chamber stated "they were ready, willing and anxious to help in any way possible in the mosquito control program for the seacoast area." President John Dunfey appointed a committee of Douglas Hunter, chairman, Herbert Casassa, and Donald Ring to work on the program. Also appointed to the group was Spaulding Owen who will serve as an advisor because of his engineering experience.

Nearly 30 interested members attended a similar meeting of the Southeastern New Hampshire Mosquito Control Association at Rye last week and most agreed it was urgent to get state financial aid to continue the task of mosquito control in the Seacoast area.

Frank Bennett of Belmont, Mass., an expert hired by the project last year, pointed out there are many more varieties of mosquitos in the Seacoast area and they are present from the time the snow melts in the spring until the first snow-fall in the winter.

Bennett stressed the importance of "ditching" and larvae control for the marsh mosquitos prevalent along the coastline. He said much of the breeding land is state-owned property.

The gathering was also told that this area of the state has the largest mosquito problem,

whereas other lake and mountain areas do not have the mosquitos for so long a period of time or in as many varieties.

A possibility that the group could bypass legislation and obtain an appropriation for permanent mosquito control from the new Department of Health and Welfare was voted at the Rye meeting.

Governor's Councilor Andrew Jarvis said he would raise the question of state aid at a future meeting of the Governor and Executive Council. He said he did not know whether any money was available which could be "tapped" for the mosquito problem this year, but added the comment that if something is not done soon the costly projects at Rye Harbor and Wallis Sands would mean money "thrown away."

New friendships will be made, some of which will last a lifetime. Others will find the contest the beginning of a brilliant future. Backstage, the girls will display nervousness and emotion. On stage, they will show poise, personality, talent and a sincere desire to win.

The BEACHCOMBER has more than a passing interest in the show which has, over the years, become the greatest single attraction of the annual Hampton Beach summer season programs.
