

Area Groups Join Forces To Battle Pesky Mosquitos

The problem of mosquito control in the seacoast area was brought to a head last week when the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce and the Southeastern New Hampshire Mosquito Control association, at separate meetings, agreed to do everything possible to rid the area of mosquitos.

The local chamber stated "they were ready, willing and anxious to help in any way possible in the mosquito control program for the seacoast area." President John Dunfey appointed a committee of Douglas Hunter, chairman, Herbert Casassa, and Donald Ring to work on the program. Also appointed to the group was Spaulding Owen who will serve as an advisor because of his engineering experience.

Nearly 30 interested members attended a similar meeting of the Southeastern New Hampshire Mosquito Control association at Rye last week and most agreed it was urgent to get state financial aid to continue the task of mosquito control in the Seacoast area.

Frank Bennett of Belmont, Mass., an expert hired by the project last year, pointed out there are many more varieties of mosquitos in the Seacoast area and they are present from the time the snow melts in the spring until the first snow-fall in the winter.

Bennett stressed the importance of "ditching" and larvae control for the marsh mosquitos prevalent along the coastline. He said much of the breeding land is state-owned property.

The gathering was also told that this area of the state has the largest mosquito problem.

Safety Tips For Boaters

The U. S. Coast Guard has classified motorboats for use and inspection purposes. Powerboats are as follows: Class A, under 16 feet; Class 1, 16 feet to less than 26 feet; Class 2, 26 feet to less than 40 feet; Class 3, 40 feet to not more than 65 feet.

LIFE SAVING DEVICES — all boats are required to have a Coast Guard approved life-saving device in good condition for each person aboard. A life preserver, buoyant cushion, ring buoy or buoyant vest may be used.

FLAME ARRESTORS — one approved flame arrestor is required on each carburetor of every inboard engine installed after April 25, 1940. The Coast Guard recommends this type equipment on all inboard motor boats.

New friendships will be made, some of which will last a lifetime. Others will find the contest the beginning of a brilliant future. Backstage, the girls will display nervousness and emotion. On stage, they will show poise, personality, talent and a sincere desire to win.

The BEACHCOMBER has more than a passing interest in the show which has, over the years, become the greatest single attraction of the annual Hampton Beach summer season programs. 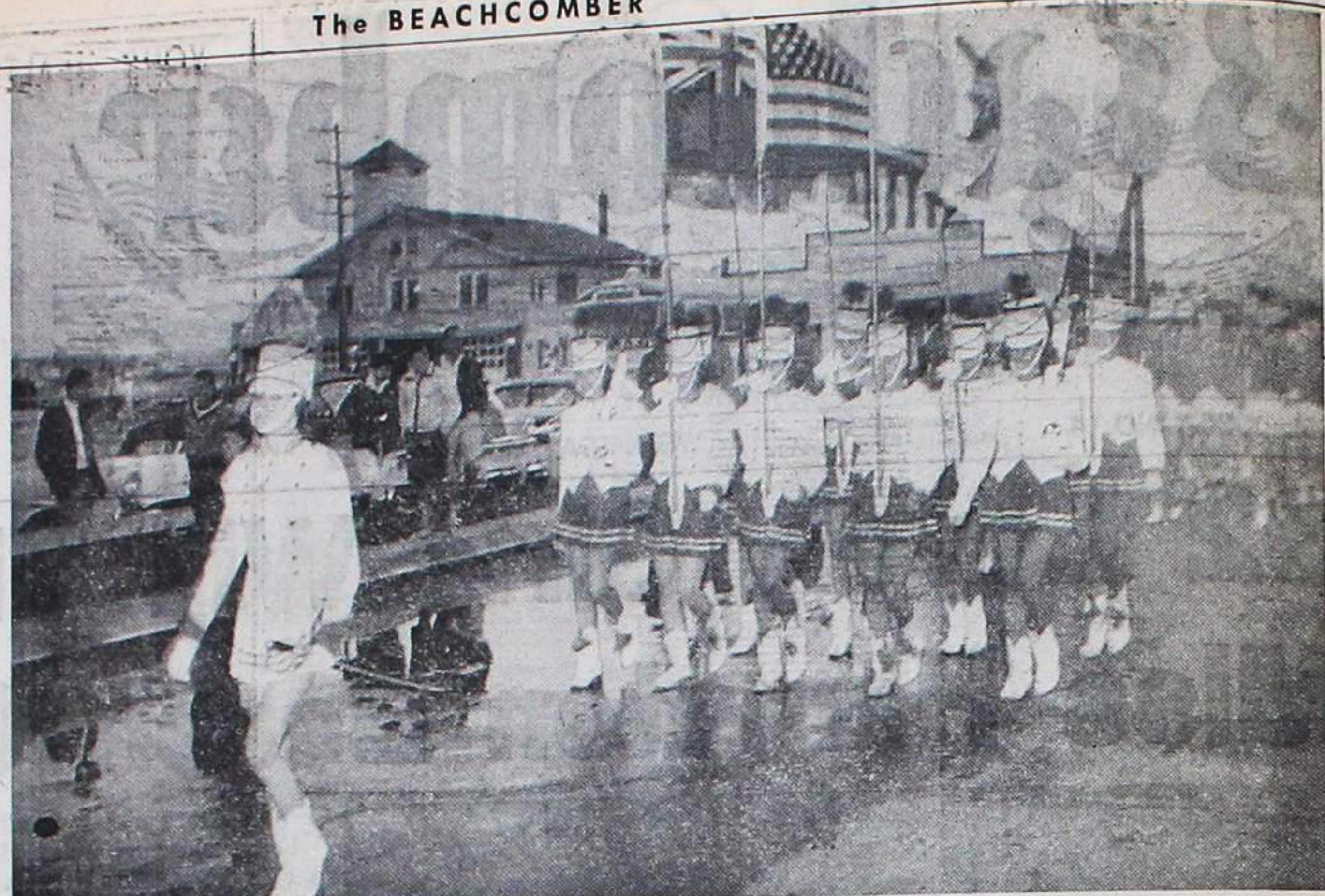

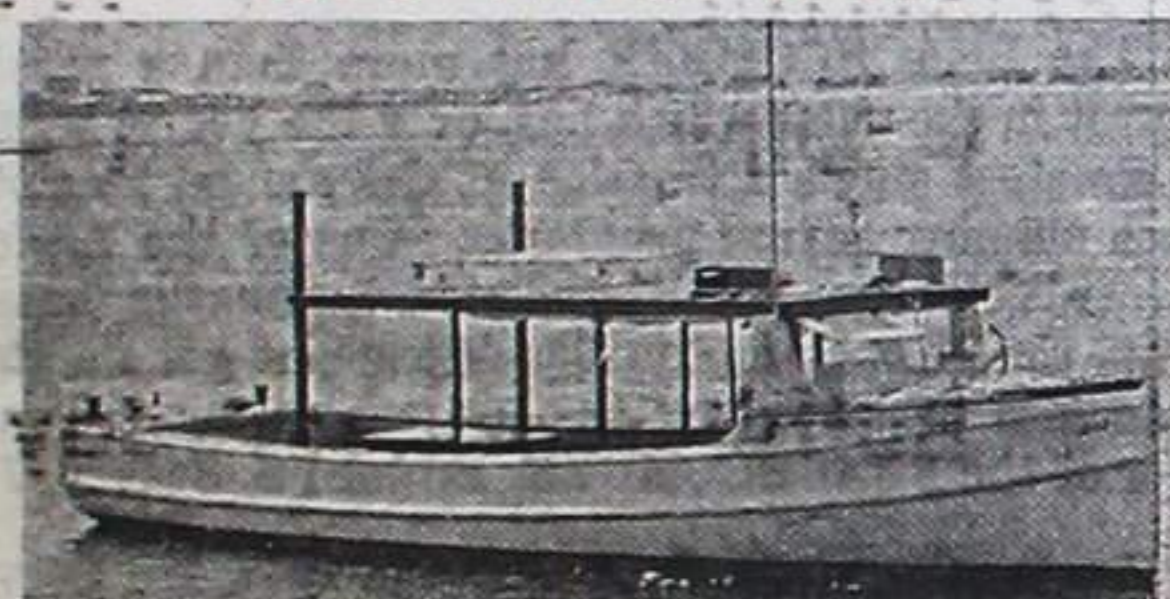

Safety Tips For Boaters

LIGHTS — If boaters plan to operate boats between sunset and sunrise, lights are required. Boats under 26 feet in length must display either of two arrangements including (1), white light on the stern visible for 2 miles and a white light on bow visible for 3 miles, along with separate side lights visible for 1 mile; (2), white light stern, visible for 2 miles, white light atop cabin, visible for 3 miles and a combination red and green light on the bow, visible for 1 mile.

The aforementioned light arrangements are the regular international requisites as outlined in the international rules. Inland lighting rules consist of white light on the stern, visible for 2 miles and a combination red and green light on the bow visible for 1 mile.

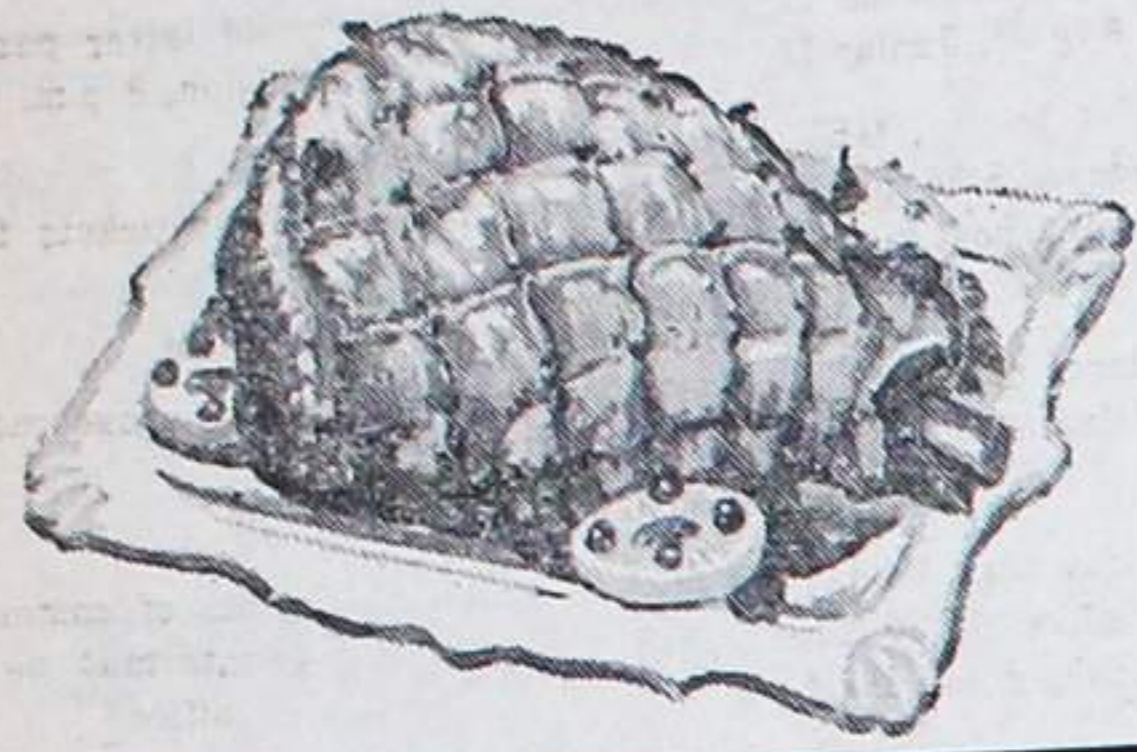
Recover Stolen Car In Routine Check

Precaution Urged On Beach Umbrellas

Following a request by Hampton Beach lifeguards, the directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce this week issued a safety suggestion concerning the use of beach umbrellas at the beach.

The directors were notified by the lifeguards that "when the wind is five miles per hour or more these umbrellas, particularly the aluminum or metal type, become a hazard and accidents have occurred or a

somewhat serious nature by the umbrellas being blown and stabbing people. For example, recently a lady received an inch-deep wound in the leg and was taken to the hospital."

The idea suggested by the directors is for a gummed label to be attached to the handle of the umbrella informing people of this possible danger and also suggesting the handle be inserted into the sand as far as a red stripe which would be painted on the umbrella.

The directors noted they realized this would entail a little extra work in acquiring the labels and in painting the stripe on the handle but they believe the results, safety wise, would be well worth the effort.

Owens Withdraws As Candidate For House

"I do wish, at this time to express my utmost gratitude to all my friends who promised their support and votes. I also wish to say thanks to those who would have voted for me this fall.

"My future political plans are indefinite at this time but

I do not wish to be counted out from helping our community in any way I can."

Beach Rules For Safety

Ordinances and regulations for Hampton Beach remain essentially the same as in past years. For the benefit of newcomers regulations to ensure the safety and pleasure of vacationists are in force as follows:

No person or organization is permitted on the beach between

the hours of 1 a.m. and sunrise unless through a special permit issued by the chief of police. The lighting of fires on the beach is prohibited. The changing of clothes in cars in the beach area is prohibited. Dogs and other pets are prohibited on the beach and in the water. Ball playing and similar games may be permitted at the discretion of the lifeguards. Inflatables are not permitted in the water at any time. Missing persons should be

immediately reported to the lifeguard on duty. In matters of safety and orderliness, persons shall obey all requests made by the lifeguards. Lifeguards will not assume parental responsibility for children left unattended by their parents or guardian. Complaints should be addressed to the Town Manager, c/o Town Offices, Hampton. Persons found violating any of the above regulations or ordinances shall be evicted from the beach and subject to a fine of not more than \$25. (Section 7, Chapter 219, RSA) Ordinalances at the state controlled area of the beach vary slightly and should be checked by visitors to those areas. Complaints should be addressed to Recreation Commission, Department of Resources and Economic Development, State House Annex, Concord, N. H.

"South Pacific" Is Smooth Production

"South Pacific" enters its final week at the Hampton Playhouse—and how does it look after six previous performances? A second viewing of this wonderful Rodgers and Hammerstein classic revealed that a good production can get even better. The technical problems have been overcome—the performers are more concentrated in their roles—and the group routines have been smoothed. The net result is a fast moving "South Pacific" that communicates a wonderful story that will touch your heartstrings and send you away humming and happy. Delightful Susan Hesse is captivating with her moving portrayal of Nellie Forbush while Dennis Drew shows great strength and dramatic aplomb

building songs and dialogue into a magnificent Emile DeBeque. But outside of the polished talents of the leads, a second viewing uncovers the important bits that make up the background against which the leads must be played. These are the small roles—a few speaking lines—a couple of bars of a song—or a bit of dance routine—but these are the warp into which the warp must be woven. Suddenly you become aware of Tom Moody's outstanding tenor voice when he does his short solo in "There's Nothing Like A Dame" or Katherine Helmond's little bits of business that firm up the female chorus or perhaps, George Axler catches your eye with his characterization of the executive officer. In a virtually lineless role, Daniel Aedes gives "South Pacific" a real touch of comedy with his antics and facial expressions as Stewpot or you realize that the durable Freddy Hoskins—man of all talents—is creating two quite opposite roles in the same play. Also, Rex Tackae's quiet desperation as the radio operator gives suspense to the scenes in the C. O.'s office. All these little things add so much to a big production play like "South Pacific". On the second look, one becomes more aware of the terrific technical problems of the play which David Huston's clever set design made seem easy. Musical Director Ernest Murphy deserves a bouquet in bringing off a smooth and important phase of the show. "South Pacific" is a great and moving musical play and the Hampton Playhouse production does full justice to its marvelous score and book. It is given unqualified recommendation for an evening of fine entertainment for the entire family. — H. L. P.

Reject Bids On Sewer Project

Hampton selectmen this week followed the recommendation of the engineering firm of Haley and Ward and rejected the two bids received for Contract 19, calling for construction of the Winnacunnet road and King's highway lift stations. The project was to have been

the second phase of the million dollar sewer project now under construction. The selectmen gave as their reason for rejection "exceedingly high bid prices and insufficient number of bidders."

Only two contracting firms submitted bids for the work including the H. B. Fleming Inc., South Portland, Maine, and James Construction Company Inc., Brookline, Mass. The bid from H. B. Fleming Inc. was set at \$134,660 with the bid from James Construction company being \$197,510.

The estimated cost of the project as established by Haley and Ward was set at approximately \$90,000 to \$100,000.

The Maine firm submitted a bid of \$80,330 for construction of and excavation and fill of the Winnacunnet road lift station. The Massachusetts company submitted a figure of \$155,830 for the same work. H. B. Fleming Inc. submitted

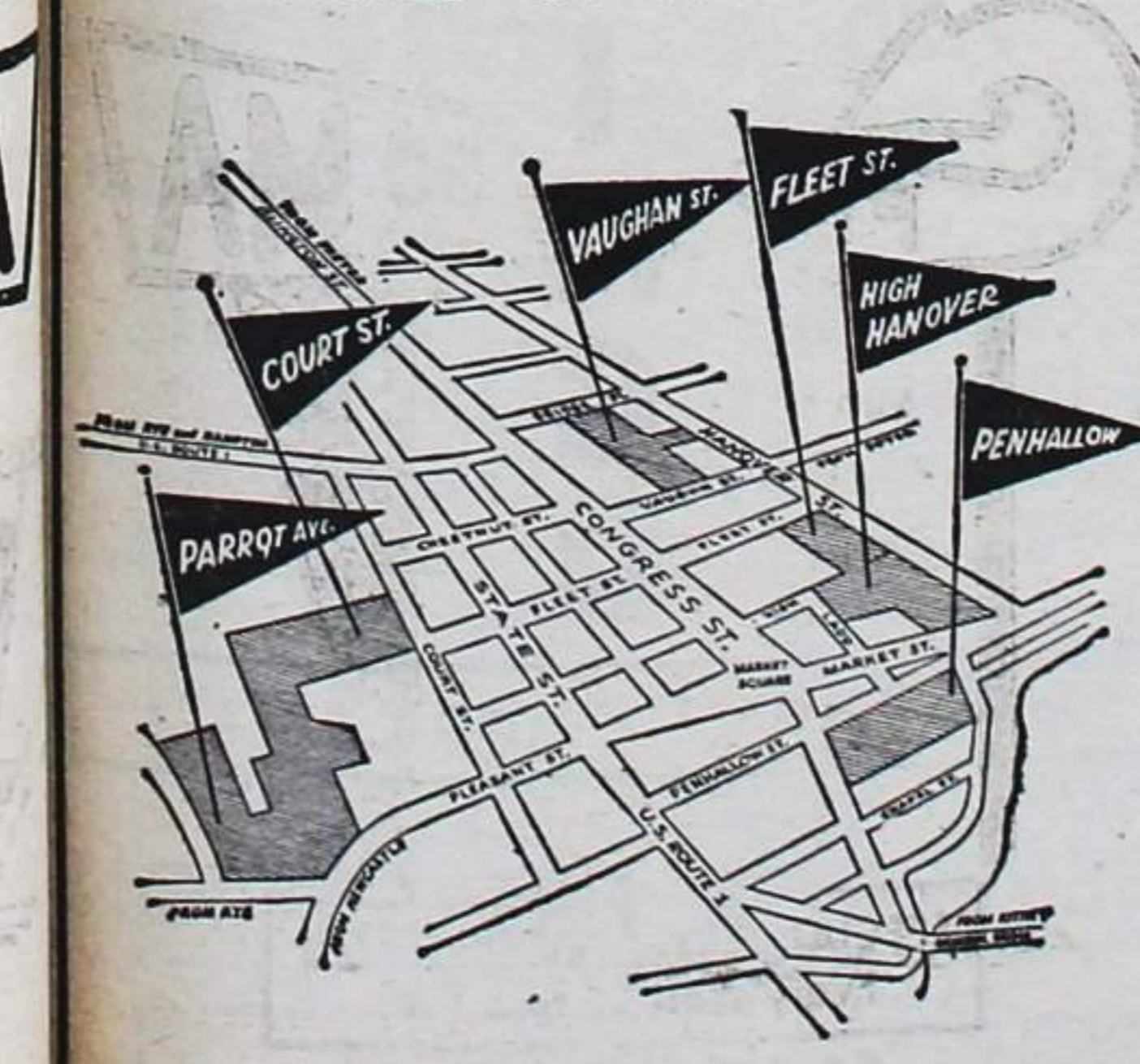

Plan Hearing On Beach Access Highway

Selectmen of Hampton have instructed town counsel Judge John Perkins to complete plans for a public hearing to be held probably within the next three weeks following 14 days legal notice to discuss the proposed construction of a beach access highway over marshland to the west of Hampton Beach. The exact date of the hearing will be announced in the near future.

Preliminary plans prepared by Anderson-Nichols Co. of Concord, include descriptions of proposed and existing necessary property lines, easement lines, curbing, drainage ditches, underground pipe lines, electric lines, telephone lines, manholes, storm drain manholes, catch basins and fire hydrants.

As shown, the proposed new highway would leave the state expressway, now under construction, in the vicinity of Eastman Point road and Glade Path. Entrance to and exit from the main road as planned now will be located at Church street, Highland avenue, Island path, Hobson street and Bragg avenue, with an intersection just north of the Hampton River Toll bridge. Access would also be given from the new road to the area in the vicinity of the Smith and Gilmore fishing pier.

The main purpose of the hearing is to give town officials the opportunity to begin immediate work on acquiring necessary rights of way. Following that, Town Manager Kenneth Boehner said he hopes the financing of the road will be done on a sharing basis with local and state governments participating. The town manager said this might possibly be accomplished through work in the next session of the state legislature.

The highway is so laid out that traffic flowing onto the beach from the Exeter to Hampton Beach expressway would exit in an east bound lane at Eastman Point road and enter in a westbound lane from Glade Path and Church street.

CofC Asks Extension Of One-Way Traffic

Following a lengthy discussion, the directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce this week voted to request Highway Commissioner John O. Morton to extend the one-way traffic pattern one week after Labor Day this year.

she took top honors in the Miss New England contest and a year later, in 1961, she was back at the beach again and this time captured the hearts of the judges and audience to take the coveted title. She became the first and only girl to hold both the titles of Miss New England and Miss Hampton Beach simultaneously.

Not satisfied, Sandie later became Miss New Hampshire 1962 for the Miss Universe contest and set a sparkling example for other girls to follow with her recent showing at Miami Beach.

Over the years the contest has been large and small. In 1950, only 11 girls competed but in 1956 a record high of 44 young ladies took part. The early contests were held on the new historic beach chamber with John Dineen, past chamber president and owner of the Casino Ballroom later offering use of the ballroom in 1957. The pageants, made more beautiful each year, have been staged in the ballroom since that time.

Perhaps the most incredible portion of the Miss Hampton Beach story is the work over the years of Production Manager Henry Hamel. In his 10th season with the local chamber, Henry, year after year, has persuaded many girls to enter the contest with many being a little reluctant and scared to do so. But in the case of Sandie Kay, Dianne Lipson, Carolyn Komant, Sally Ann Freedman, Sandra Ramsey, Sandra Sadowski and Lyla Moran among others, a proud Henry Hamel has seen his girls bring honor not only to themselves but also to their respective states in achieving national fame.

Girls from all portions of the United States, Canada and Cuba have competed over the years. Massachusetts holds the honor of having the most winners with eight. New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Maine and Canadian girls have also won. Over the years, only three local girls have placed. In the Miss BEACHCOMBER Cover Girl contest in 1947, Lois Yell, a beach girl gave Hampton its only winner in history. Later, in 1952 and 1954, Beverly Brindamour, now Mrs. Bucky Hollingsworth, placed third. In 1961, Jonnye McLeod of Hampton was named Miss Personality and placed fifth.

The oldest girl to cop the title was Gaynor Jenkins, a Canadian lass who won at the age of 22 in 1952. Six girls took youngest winning honors at 17.

Five girls, including Caryle Cadaro, Sally Atkinson, Barbara Curran, Sally Ann Freedman and Sandi Kay placed second or third one year and then displaying determination came

back in following years to take top honors.

Over the years, some of the area's top personalities including such names as Claire Devaney, Dinny Whitmarsh, Ted Ashby, Claude Higgins, Cliff Taylor, Doris Romaine, James Broderick, Walter Green, Mary Tierney and many others have served as judges.

The girls are chosen on a modified point system modeled after the Miss Universe contest. Following elimination rounds, the girls accumulate points for poise, personality, face and form. No talent is required. Girls are attired in a bathing suit and wear high heels. Evening gowns are displayed by the contestants later at the Coronation Ball. Contest rules are simple for girls desiring to enter.

In the light of Sandie Kay's recent achievement and because Bill Elliot, master of ceremonies over the years and Henry Hamel, have gone all out to make the 15th annual affair the best yet, a capacity crowd is expected at the ballroom Tuesday evening

when many of the area's beauties vie for the top honors of the Hampton Beach summer season.

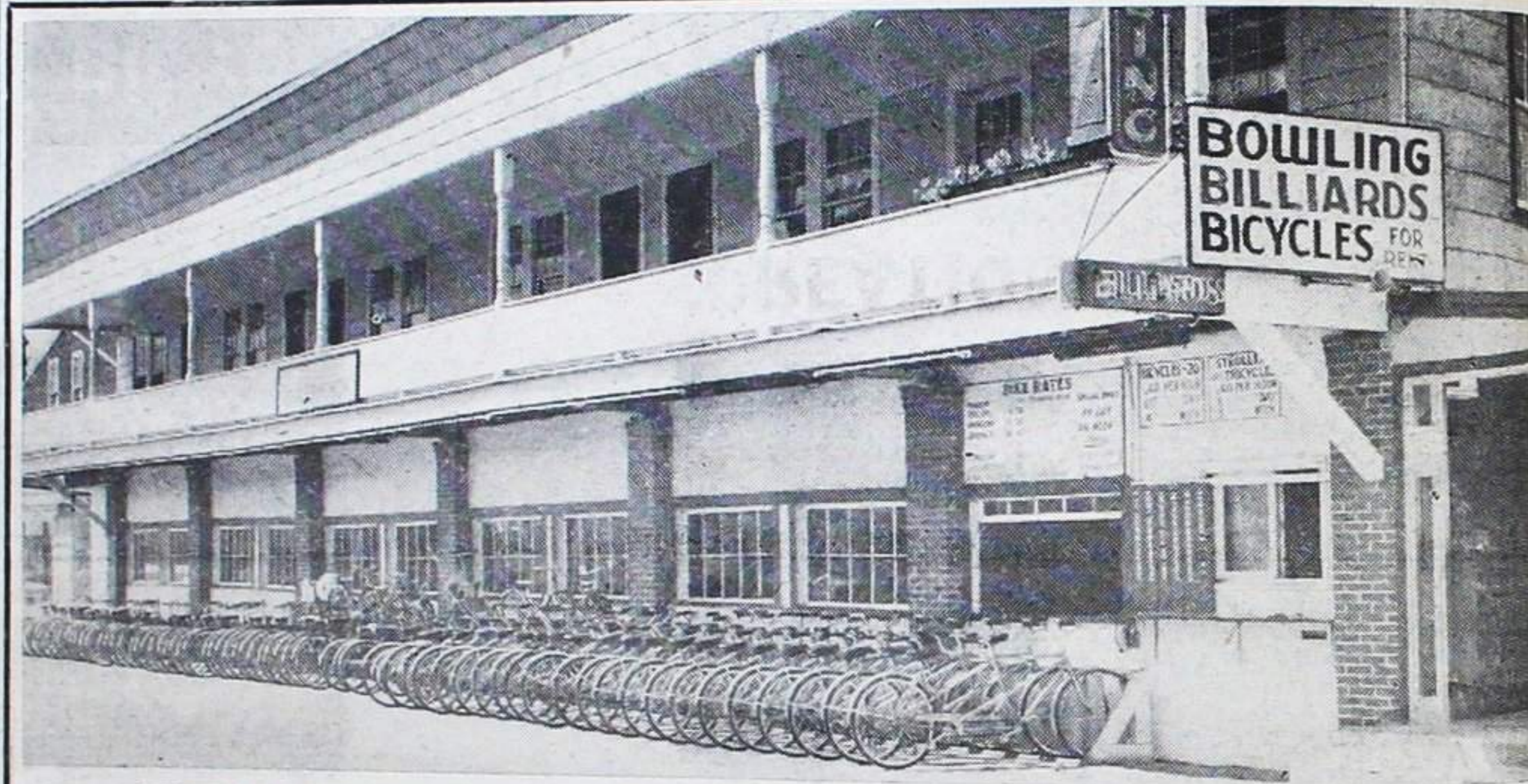
