she took top honors in the Miss New England contest and a year later, in 1961, she was back at the beach again and this time captured the hearts of the judges and audience to take the coveted title. She became the first and only girl to hold both the titles of Miss New England and Miss Hampton Beach simultaneously.

Not satisfied, Sandie later became Miss New Hampshire 1962 for the Miss Universe contest and set a sparkling example for other girls to follow with her recent showing at Miami Beach.

Over the years the contest has been large and small. In 1950, only 11 girls competed but in 1956 a record high of 44 young ladies took part. The early contests were held on the new historic beach chamber with John Dineen, past chamber president and owner of the Casino Ballroom later offering use of the ballroom in 1957. The pageants, made more beautiful each year, have been staged in the ballroom since that time.

Perhaps the most incredible portion of the Miss Hampton Beach story is the work over the years of Production Manager Henry Hamel. In his 10th season with the local chamber, Henry, year after year, has persuaded many girls to enter the contest with many being a little reluctant and scared to do so. But in the case of Sandie Kay, Dianne Lipson, Carolyn Komant, Sally Ann Freedman, Sandra Ramsey, Sandra Sadowski and Lyla Moran among others, a proud Henry Hamel has seen his girls bring honor not only to themselves but also to their respective states in achieving national fame.

Girls from all portions of the United States, Canada and Cuba have competed over the years. Massachusetts holds the honor of having the most winners with eight. New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Maine and Canadian girls have also won. Over the years, only three local girls have placed. In the Miss BEACHCOMBER Cover Girl contest in 1947, Lois Yell, a beach girl gave Hampton its only winner in history. Later, in 1952 and 1954, Beverly Brindamour, now Mrs. Bucky Hollingsworth, placed third. In 1961, Jonnye McLeod of Hampton was named Miss Personality and placed fifth.

The oldest girl to cop the title was Gaynor Jenkins, a Canadian lass who won at the age of 22 in 1952. Six girls took youngest winning honors at 17.

Five girls, including Caryle Cadaro, Sally Atkinson, Barbara Curran, Sally Ann Freedman and Sandi Kay placed second or third one year and then displaying determination came

back in following years to take top honors.

Over the years, some of the area's top personalities including such names as Claire Devaney, Dinny Whitmarsh, Ted Ashby, Claude Higgins, Cliff Taylor, Doris Romaine, James Broderick, Walter Green, Mary Tierney and many others have served as judges.

The girls are chosen on a modified point system modeled after the Miss Universe contest. Following elimination rounds, the girls accumulate points for poise, personality, face and form. No talent is required. Girls are attired in a bathing suit and wear high heels. Evening gowns are displayed by the contestants later at the Coronation Ball. Contest rules are simple for girls desiring to enter.

In the light of Sandie Kay's recent achievement and because Bill Elliot, master of ceremonies over the years and Henry Hamel, have gone all out to make the 15th annual affair the best yet, a capacity crowd is expected at the ballroom Tuesday evening

when many of the area's beauties vie for the top honors of the Hampton Beach summer season.



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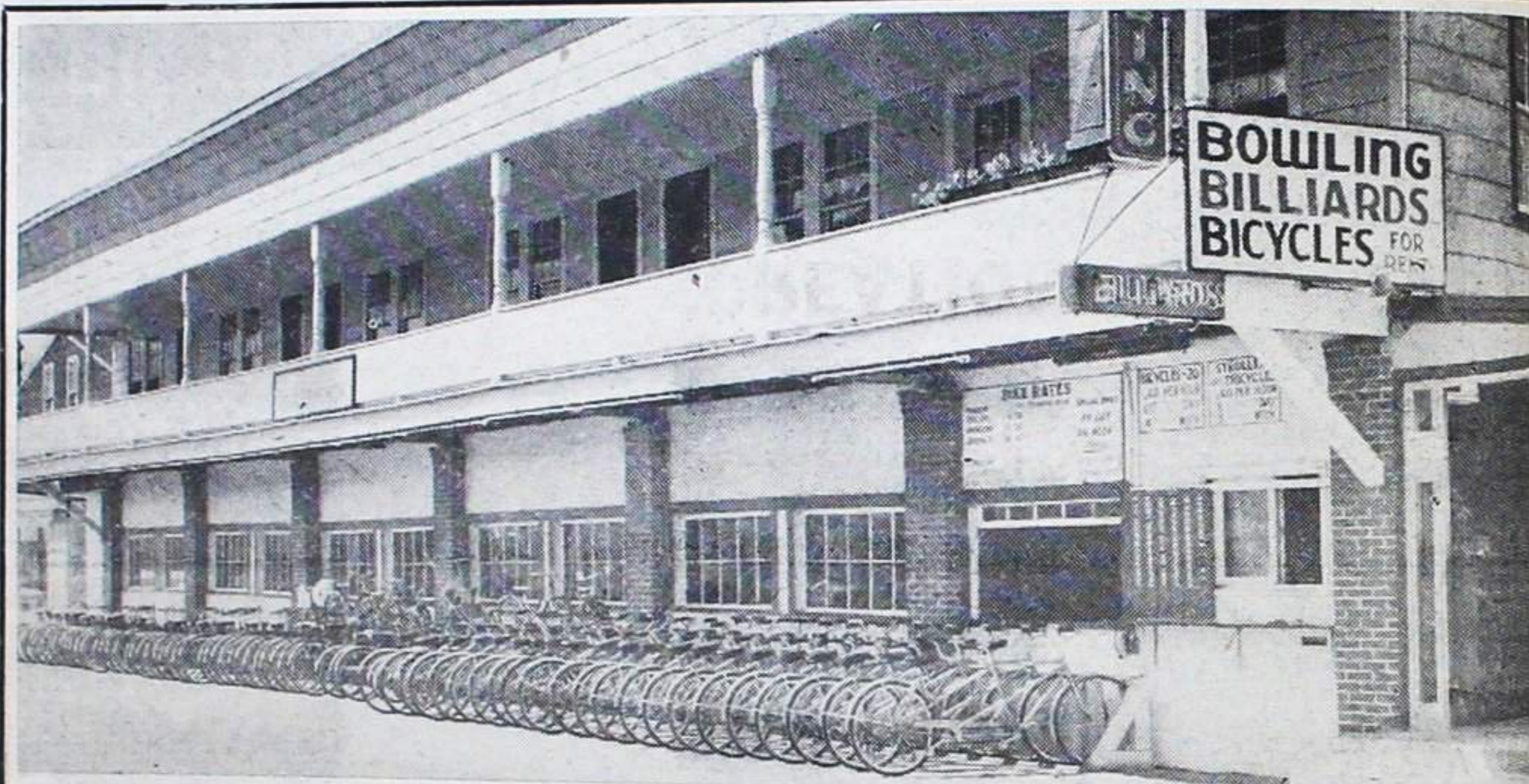

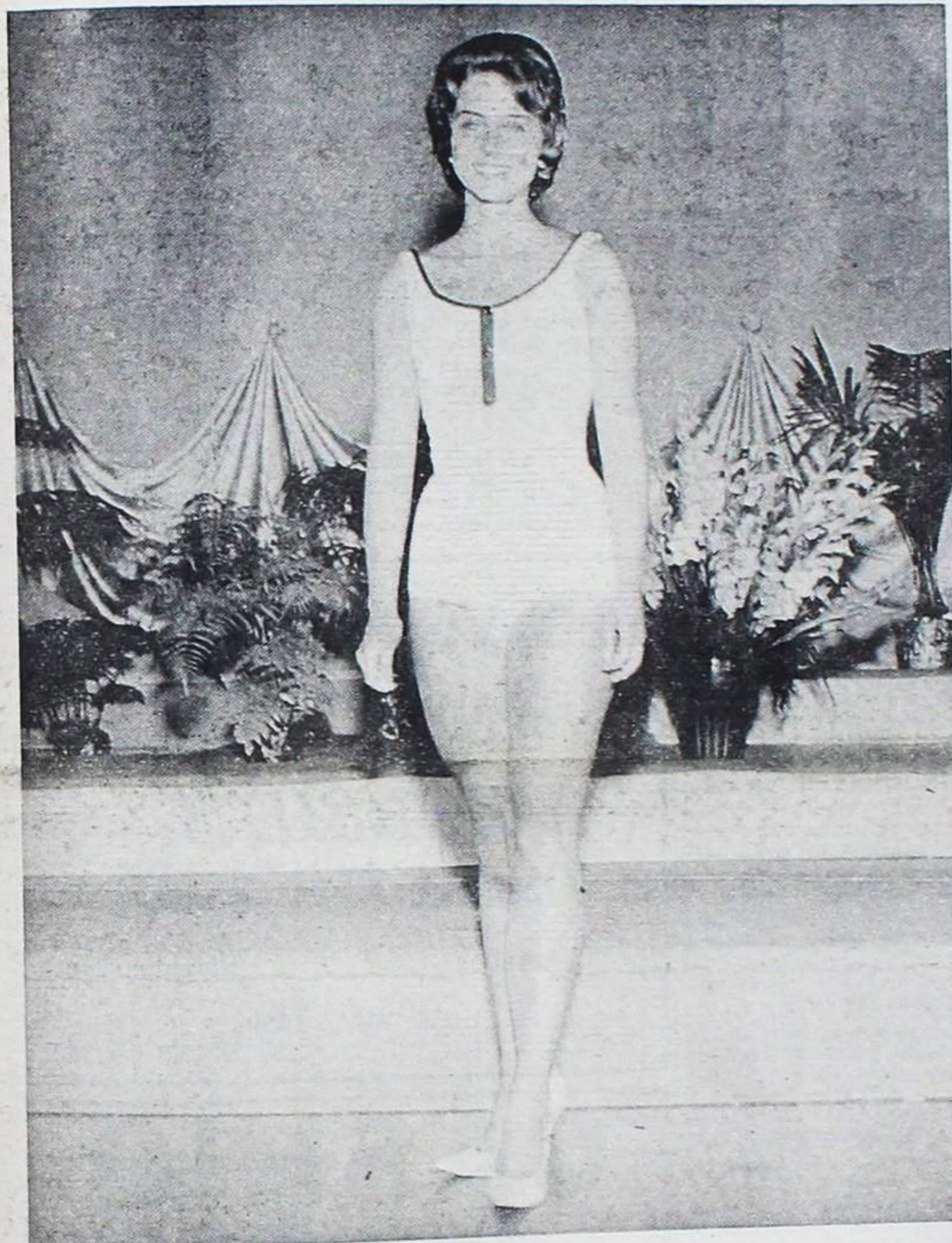

Hampton Girl Wins Crown

Miss Hampton Beach of 1963 was selected at the Casino Ballroom last night, when 38 lovely contestants competed for the coveted title.

Winning this year's title was Miss Jonnye McLeod of 556 Lafayette road, Hampton, the first local girl to achieve the honor in the 15 year history of the pageant. Jonnye is seventeen years of age and a June graduate of Winnacunnet High school. She is 5 ft. 3 1/2 inches tall and weighs 115 lbs. Vital statistics revealed 34-24-35 dimensions. A pretty brunette, she has achieved success in the field of interpretive dancing during her high school years.

Second place winner was Miss Louise Ann Richardson of Georgetown, Mass., who had placed third in the Miss New England contest last year. Louise is a 5 ft. 4 inch brunette weighing 115 lbs. Like Jonnye, she is seventeen years of age and her measurements are 35-24-35.

Capturing third place was Miss Martha Ann Wiggin, King's avenue, Hampton. She is seventeen years of age and weighs 126 lbs. Five foot 3 1/2 inches tall, her proportions read 37-24-36. Like Jonnye and Louise, she is also a comely brunette.

John Dunfey, president of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce, presented Miss McLeod with her trophy and a \$100 savings bond. She received her crown from Sandie Kay of Plaistow, last year's winner who has just returned from the Miss Universe contest in Florida. Her ribbon was presented by Miss Margaret Waas, Miss New Hampshire of the Miss America pageant, who will soon compete in Atlantic City.

Second and third place trophies and bonds were presented by Jay Dineen and Sylvia Gustavson (Miss New England) a runner up in this contest.

A floral bouquet was presented to Miss McLeod from Chip Urban, representing the Chamber of Commerce and the Air Force. Gifts were also given to all three girls by Mrs. Norma Dunne of Beverly, Mass., a representative of Sarah Coventry.

Serving as judges for the contest this year were Leo Cloutier, manager for the Miss New Hampshire Miss America pageant and columnist for the New Hampshire Union Leader and Sunday News; Dennis Whitmarsh, executive director for television newscasts of WBZ-TV, Boston; Gail Matthews, a columnist for the Boston Globe and the writer of a daily column called "Young Adults"; Mr. Stanley Selib, the New England director of the Miss Universe contest and Mr. John McLean, assistant to the publishers of the Hearst papers of Boston.

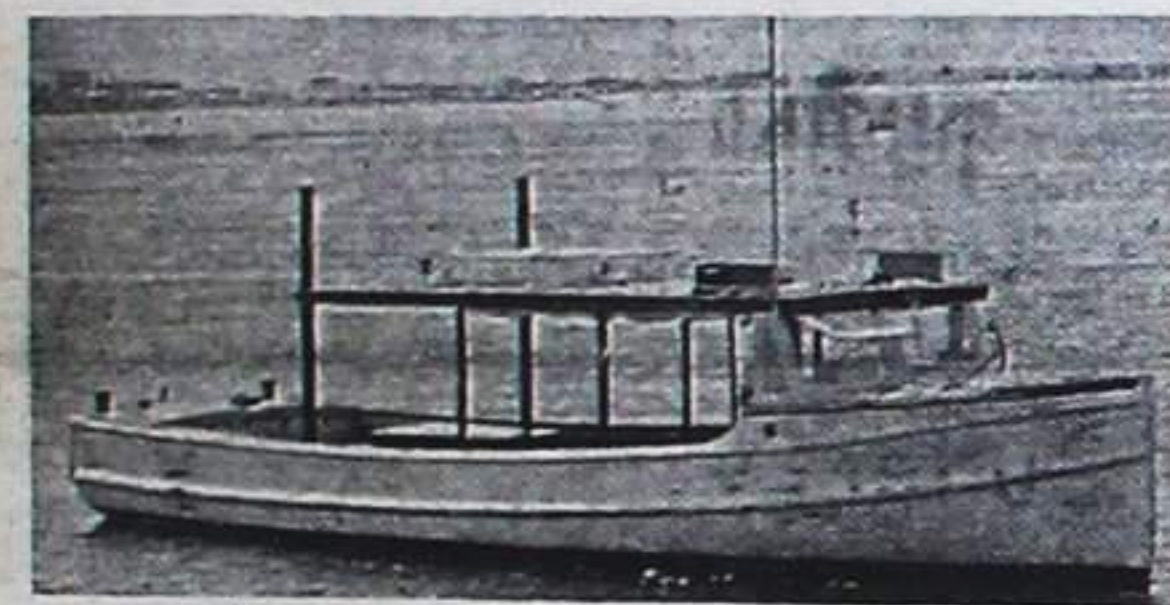

Mile-Long Wooden Bridge Once A Famed Landmark

Hampton and Hampton Beach have not only been known for their resources in serving thousands of visitors annually as a family vacation spot but also as an area, rich and full of history. Preserva-

tion of much of this heritage is being undertaken by the local Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Society and the Winnacunnet High school Historical Society. In 1941, the beginning of the end for one of Hampton Beach's famed historical structures came about. At that time the state built a road on the Seabrook side of Hampton Harbor and dismantled more than 3,000 feet of what previous to that time had been known as the longest wooden bridge in the world.

Known as the "Hampton River Mile-Long bridge" over the years, the end for this famed structure, just as the end came this year for the bandstand, came in December of 1949. At that time, the state opened the present new steel and concrete toll bridge and Hampton lost another picturesque landmark which had served both a practical and useful purpose in making Hampton Beach accessible by trolleys and later by automobiles from the south.

It is ironic to note that at that time more convenient entrances were needed to what was rapidly becoming one of the largest recreational centers on the Atlantic Seaboard. Even now, history is repeating itself as 1963 will find a third entrance, created by necessity, leading from many distant points to Hampton Beach.

Records on the Mile-Long bridge are incomplete but we are indebted to the files as contained under the late James W. Tucker's column in the HAMPTON UNION entitled "Our

Town" for a brief description of the bridge. Quoting from Mr. Tucker's article of January 3, 1952, we found that "on December 5, 1900, more than three years after the Exeter Street Railway was completed, Promoter Wallace D. Lovell, having acquired land at Seabrook, and Hampton Beaches, organized

the Granite State Land Company for the purpose of selling real estate and for the building of a bridge which would connect the two beaches." Information gained through the research of Mr. Tucker indicated that "the new structure will be 4,740 feet long and

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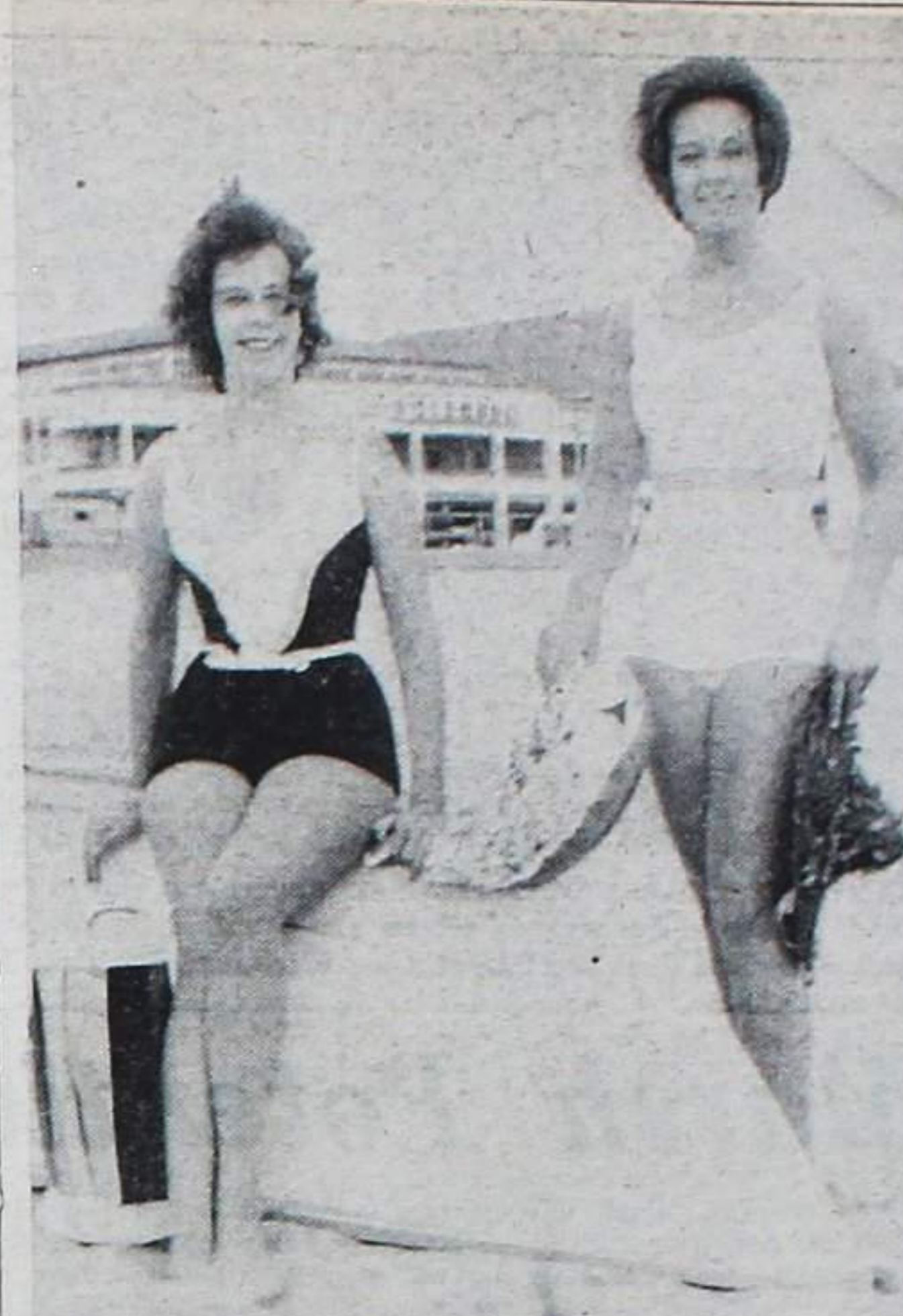

As the summer vacation season approached the halfway mark, no serious fires have been reported. During the past week, however, firemen were called to answer four alarms including another false alarm.

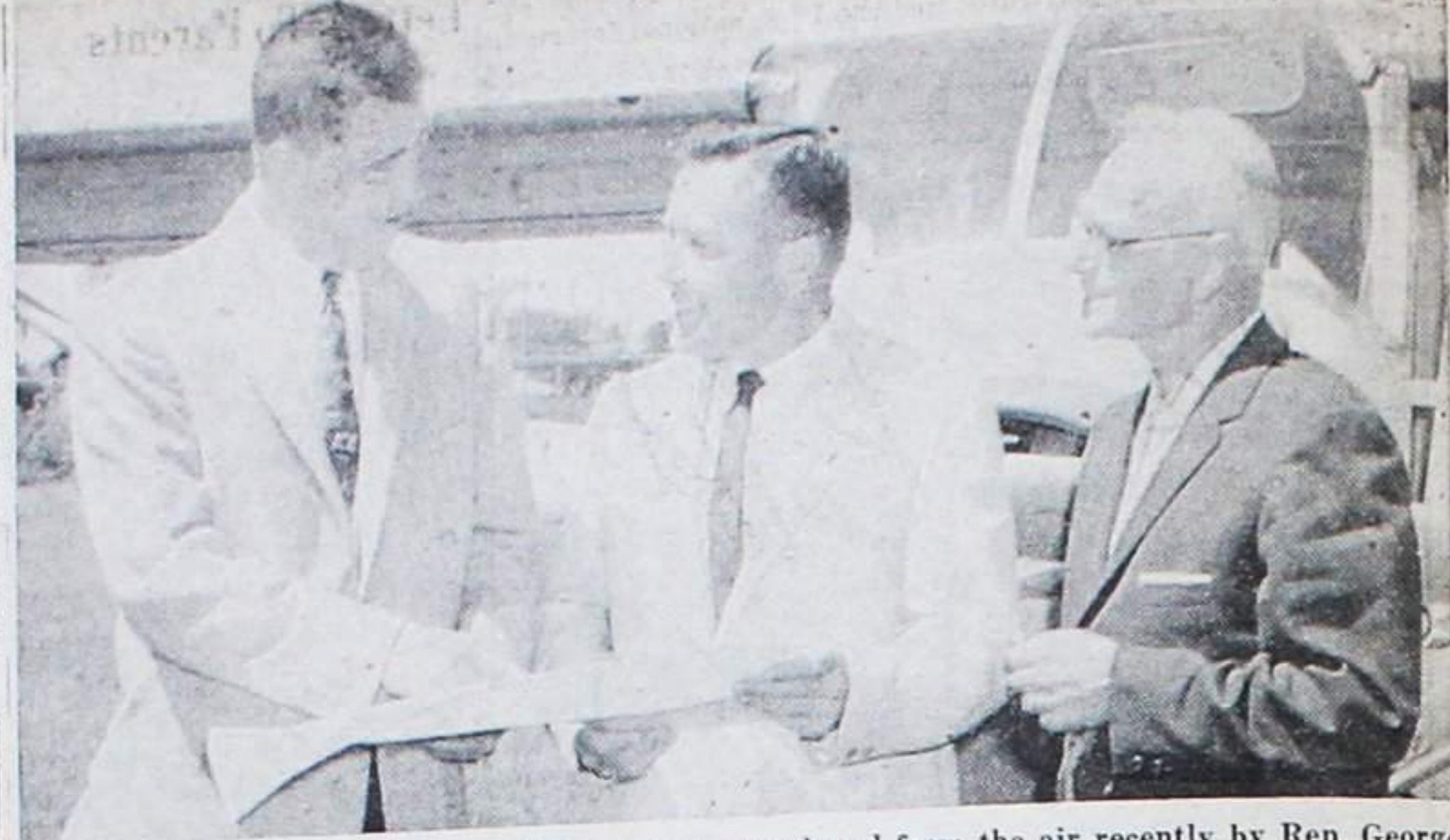

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Clam Flat Section In Hampton Closed

A reminder was issued this week that the New Hampshire Fish and Game department, upon the recommendation of the advisory committee on shore fisheries, has closed the Middle Grounds, Hampton River, to the taking of clams Monday through Thursday of each week. Clams may be taken from this area on Friday, Saturday and Sunday only. The effective date of the closure was July 18, and will run for an indefinite period of time.

Marsh Potential Cited

Rep. George "Gus" Gilman, candidate for Congress was in Hampton recently and discussed Federal participation in the marsh reclamation project with Municipal Development Authority members. Gilman flew to Hampton Airport and took Authority members for an aerial tour of the project area.

After the flight, Gilman said the best way to appreciate the potential of marsh reclamation is to view the area from the air. "Our aerial trip showed two things," Gilman said. "It showed that almost every square foot of good recreational land now suited for development is being utilized, and it also showed how much additional land could be made available if the vast area of the salt marshes just back from the beach could be developed."

"The potential of this area is amazing. Recreation is the only logical way for recreational expansion to occur, not only in Hampton, but along the entire New Hampshire seacoast." Gilman pointed out the possible increase in tax revenue to the towns if additional development could be undertaken on what is now unsuitable land. It could mean about ten times the tax revenue to the towns over what they are now getting he said.

"Since the Federal government has some jurisdiction over coastal areas and is participating in seacoast projects, I think it necessary to be completely familiar with this project. I would be delighted to work with the town of Hampton if they decide to go ahead with reclamation and must contact Federal agencies in connection with surveys and financing."

Gilman flew out of Hampton Airport to continue his campaign. Before leaving, he commented, "This is one of the most beautiful areas to fly over there is, and the beauty of the New Hampshire seacoast can best be fully appreciated by seeing it from the air."

This is to inform you of your son's action while at Hampton Beach and in hopes that you will take proper disciplinary action of your own. The above offense taking place on - - - - -"

The letter is signed by Chief Roden. Questioned on the reaction to numerous letters forwarded by his department, Chief Roden this week said the response appears to be one of not caring by the parents of the youth. As of this week, not one reply had been received at the Hampton police headquarters from parents.

Roden said his department would continue to make use of the letters and any other similar devices which might help curb the rowdiness, drunkenness by youth, alcoholic beverages in possession of minors, fighting and other such matters.

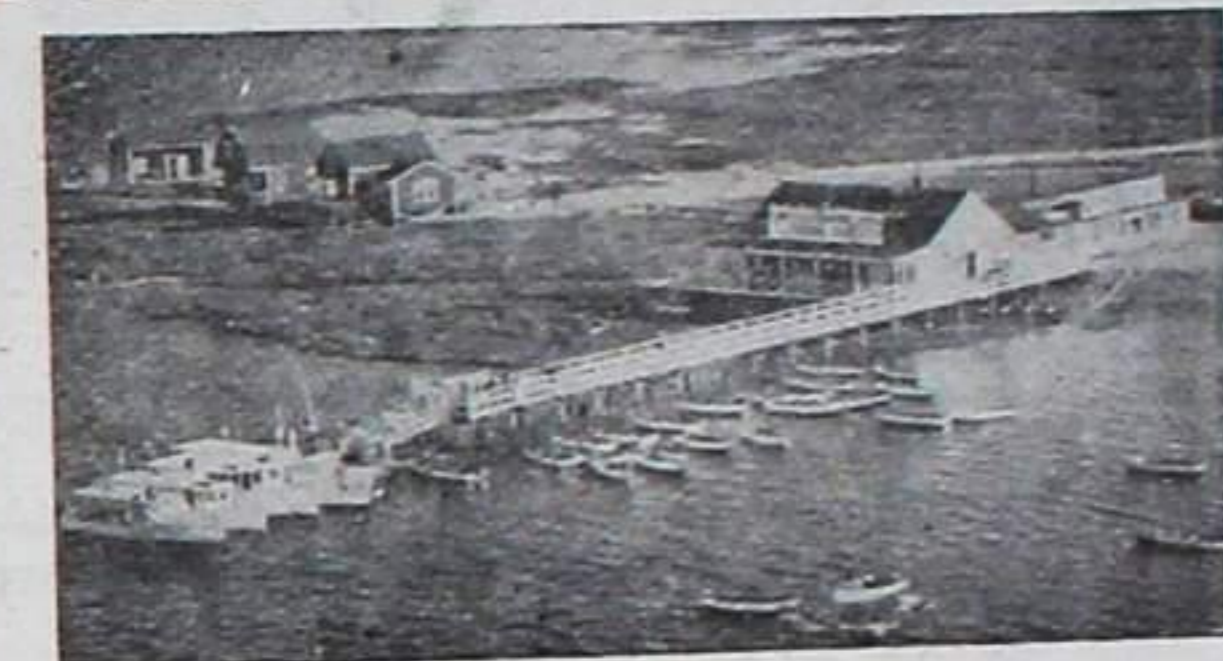

Safety Tips For Boaters

Cruising is considerably safer if boaters know the distress signals both for the benefit of themselves and others as well. Some of the more common forms to keep in mind include the following: 1, Fire a gun or other explosive signal at intervals; 2, sound fog warning signal continuously; 3, fire red stars from rockets or shells one at a time at short intervals; 4, signal SOS in Morse Code, by radio-telegraphy or other method; 5, light a fire in a metal oil or tar barrel; 6, using radio telephone repeat the word Mayday; 7, signal with a square flag and above or below it a ball or something resembling a ball; 8, fire a rocket parachute flare showing a red light; or 9, actuate auto alarms of other vessels by sending a radio signal of 12 dashes sent in one minute, each dash 4 seconds each interval one second.

Access Road, Restaurant Closings Aired At Hearing

No opposition was voiced at a public informational hearing on the proposed construction of an access road running the entire length of Hampton Beach proper.

A great deal of opposition was voiced, however, in regard to the possible establishing of a town ordinance pertaining to setting a time for opening and closing hours of restaurants and eating places. The hearing was held at the Hampton Beach community hall Friday evening, with over 100 persons in attendance.

Town Manager Kenneth Boehner reported this week that two major items on the access road voiced by town and beach people present at the meeting will be presented to representatives of the engineering firm of Anderson-Nichols at a meeting in Hampton today.

Contrary to the report printed in the UNION last week that Bragg avenue and Hobson road would be used as accesses to the main beach along with other roads, it was pointed out by Mr. Boehner during his introductory remarks Friday that only exits in the vicinity of Church street, Highland avenue, F street through the town parking lot and the southern end of the beach, have been provided in the present plans. It was the consensus of opinion of nearly all persons present that a minimum of two to four more exits should be provided and possibly more.

A second factor concerning the route of the road as presently laid out received considerable discussion. Several persons, primarily land owners at the southern end of the beach, felt the new road in that area should follow the original plans of a more direct route to the Hampton River bridge and over land now carrying sewerage mains. Mr. Boehner said both these major items would be presented to the engineers at today's meeting.

Questioned as to the acquiring of the land, Boehner said undoubtedly some land owners will be affected. He said the usual practice in instances such as this is for the town to purchase the land rather than acquire rights of way because of the actual cost involved. He said the right of way would be at least the minimum by state requirements of 100 feet wide.

In response to questions pertaining to cutting down of parking area by putting an access road through the town owned parking lot to F street, the selectmen said they planned ROAD

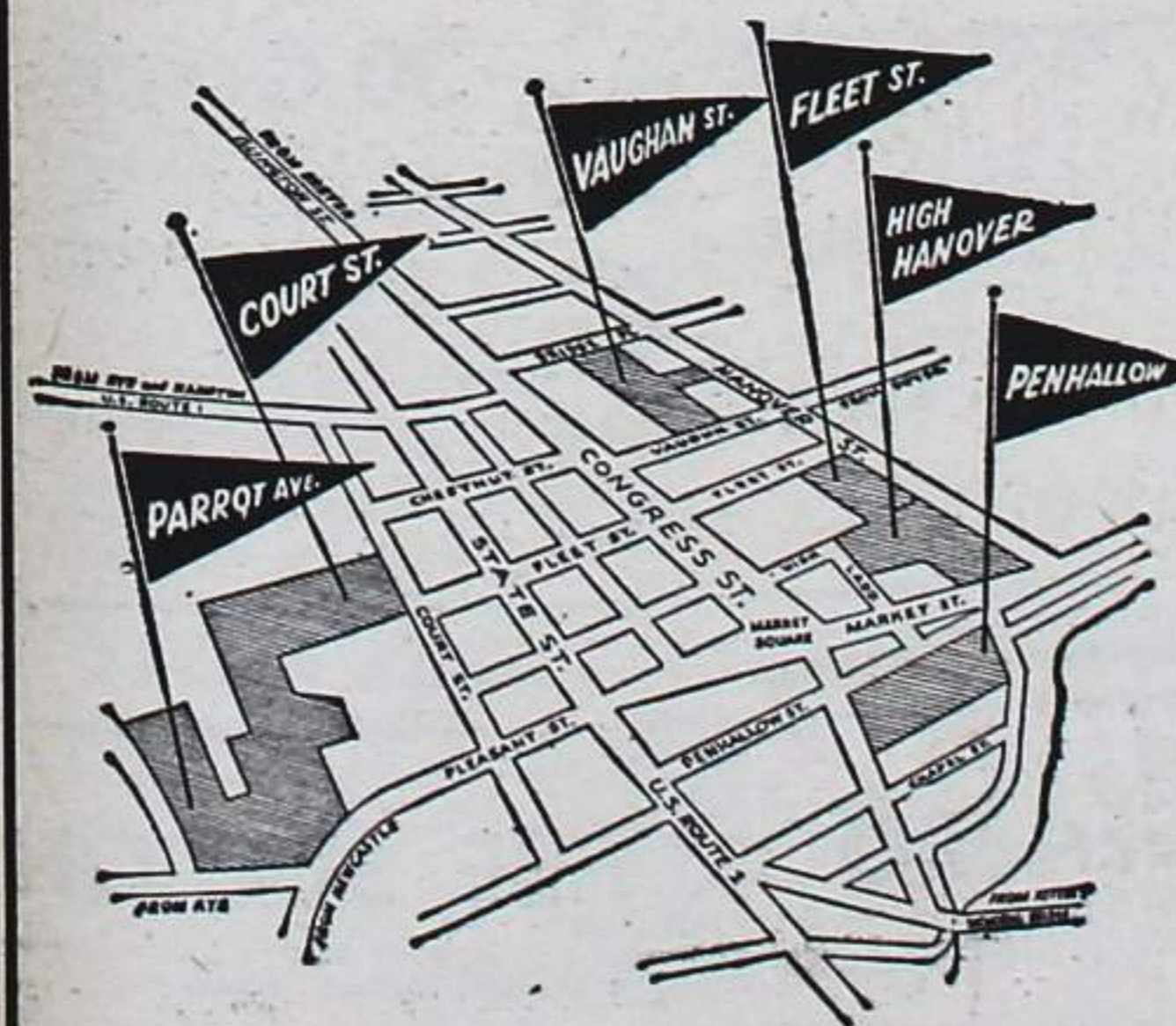

The matter of further beach front improvement has been placed at the top of the agenda for the July 31 meeting of the directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce by President John Dunfee.

As an outgrowth of discussion at previous meetings, it was announced President Dunfee would appoint a committee of local persons to act in an official capacity in meeting with Russell Tobey and the N. H.

Recreation division. The committee is expected to meet with state officials to discuss further development of the beach front area now under construction.

Suggestions brought forth at the meeting were possible including in the over-all project of a shuffleboard, horseshoe pitching pits, gardens and grassed in areas. Other over-all beach front improvement projects will be discussed by the directors at the next meeting along with the appointing of the committee by President Dunfee.

The mail count to date was reported to the directors as being 5,505 as against, 5,541 in 1961 for a slight decrease in inquiries.

Temporary Quarters For Police Planned

The problem of housing the Hampton Police department following the September moving date from the beach station has come to a standstill, Town Manager Boehner reported this week.

Work is expected to be completed on preliminary plans and sketches for a new uptown station by Mr. Russell Pierce of Newburyport the latter portion of this month or the first of August.

Meanwhile, Mr. Boehner said nothing definite has been done on making arrangements for temporary quarters for the department. Possibilities, according to the town manager, are use of the Martel property on Academy avenue or the use of the uptown fire station building. All that would be available in these two places would be office space for records and a radio room.

Mr. Boehner said any person needing to be jailed during the interim period would have to be transported and quartered at the Rockingham county jail at Brentwood.

The police will be forced to vacate the beach station September 10 under the agreement in the contract for construction of the new beach front project. All efforts to coordinate the police and fire department under one roof in the past have failed.

Mr. Boehner said all that can be done now is to await the report of the Planning Board. He noted the police will be forced to use temporary quarters as things now stand for some time, possibly into late fall and early winter.

Annual Old Home Day Slated For Aug. 11

Committees have been at work for many weeks in preparation for the third annual Hampton Old Home Day on Saturday, August 11 under the sponsorship of the Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical association.

Mr. Harold Fernald, president of the association and general chairman of this year's affair, reports that the program being arranged should make this an outstanding summer event, which will be highlighted by the dedication of the new Tuck museum.

Among the attractions will be an exhibit of old Moulton and Towle silver loaned to the local association for the day and arranged by the Towle Silversmiths of Newburyport whose antecedents date back to 1690 and whose reputation as makers of fine silver is universally recognized. All who are interested in the handiwork of Colonial and early American craftsmen will want to see this exhibit.

As in past years, there will be a tour of old houses. All three of the houses to be opened to the public are rich in tradition and historical significance for the Hampton area.

The residence of Mr. and Mrs. William Treat on Park avenue was originally the house of two famous American surgeons of pre-Revolutionary times. The two other houses to be shown, those of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Langley, Jr. on Winnacunnet road and of Mr. and Mrs. Elliott M. Gordon on Lafayette road are especially apropos this year since they have connections with the Moulton and Towle fam-

ilies, two of whose members went from Hampton to Newburyport where they established themselves in the craft of silversmithing. From the early industry of these men developed the Towle Silversmiths of today.

The dedication ceremony opening the new museum will be historic because it will symbolize the achievement of a fitting and attractive repository for the articles and documents which recall the early days of local and national history.

Dr. James Duane Squires of Colby Junior college will speak on a most appropriate topic, "Thoughts for Today from Hampton's Past".

An ever-popular feature of previous old home days, the country-style home-cooked supper, will be served again under the chairmanship of Mrs. Hazel Coffin and a large committee.

All of the events, except the tour of old houses, will take place at the Meeting House Green hall or on Tuck Field.

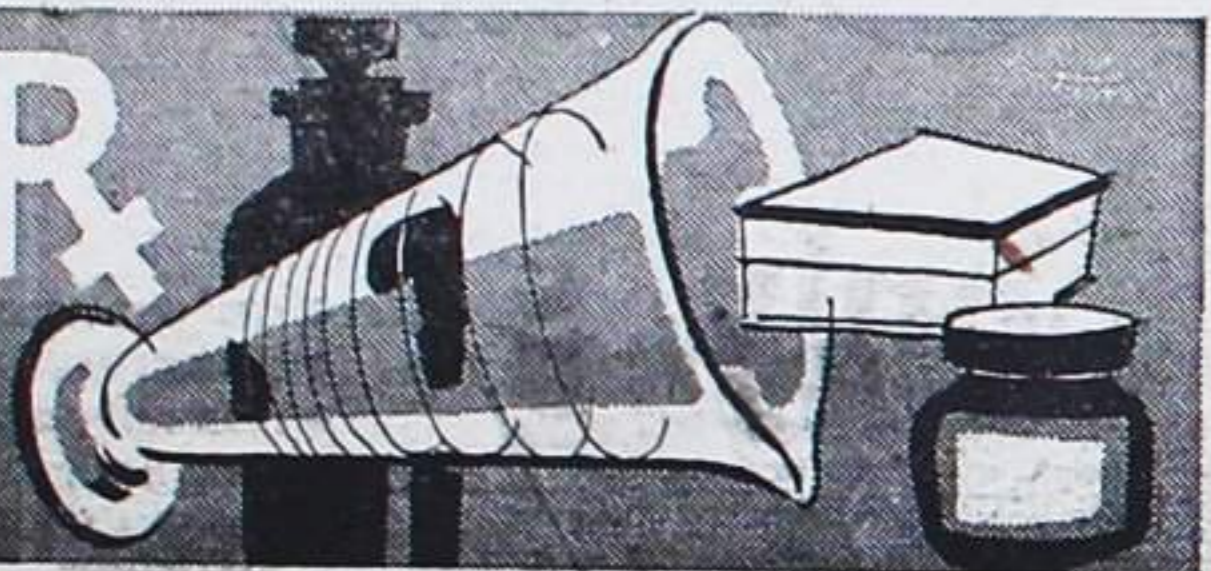

to expand the parking area on land already owned by the town.

Mr. Boehner reported the type highway proposed as being a dual lane road with a median strip with the engineers working in conjunction with the Municipal Development authority and the state highway department on planning the road.

This route was selected from three proposed lay outs. The original road plan was not considered because of the several narrow streets it involved at the southern end of the beach. The present road would also, according to town officials, have the least amount of land damages involved.

Following the initial hearing which was comparatively short, Chairman Salomon of the Hampton selectmen said the selectmen had many complaints on file from people who feel they don't have any time to get rest because of noise at some establishments which remain open late at night and into the early morning hours. The selectman said the board wished to ascertain the feeling of the people in regard to setting opening and closing times of restaurants.

For the remainder of the evening a verbal battle raged between proponents and opponents of the proposal with no compromise being reached. Town Manager Boehner said the selectman planned to consider the matter at their weekly meeting Friday.

During the evening the discussion ranged from one of pedestrian control to teenage problems to the work of the police department.

The situation of the many persons appearing on the western side of the boulevard in a so-called state of undress, that of wearing bathing suits and being wrapped in blankets, late in the evening was also discussed.

The blocking of sidewalks at all hours of the day by stragglers and persons hanging around in groups and thus hampering the normal flow of pedestrian traffic on the sidewalks was also brought forth.

The entire situation came about when owners of the sleeping establishments issued complaints that some of the eating places had been staying open into the early hours of the morning thus depriving persons who desired to sleep the opportunity to do so in several areas of the beach.

Mr. Boehner said the situation has been taken under advisement by the selectmen.

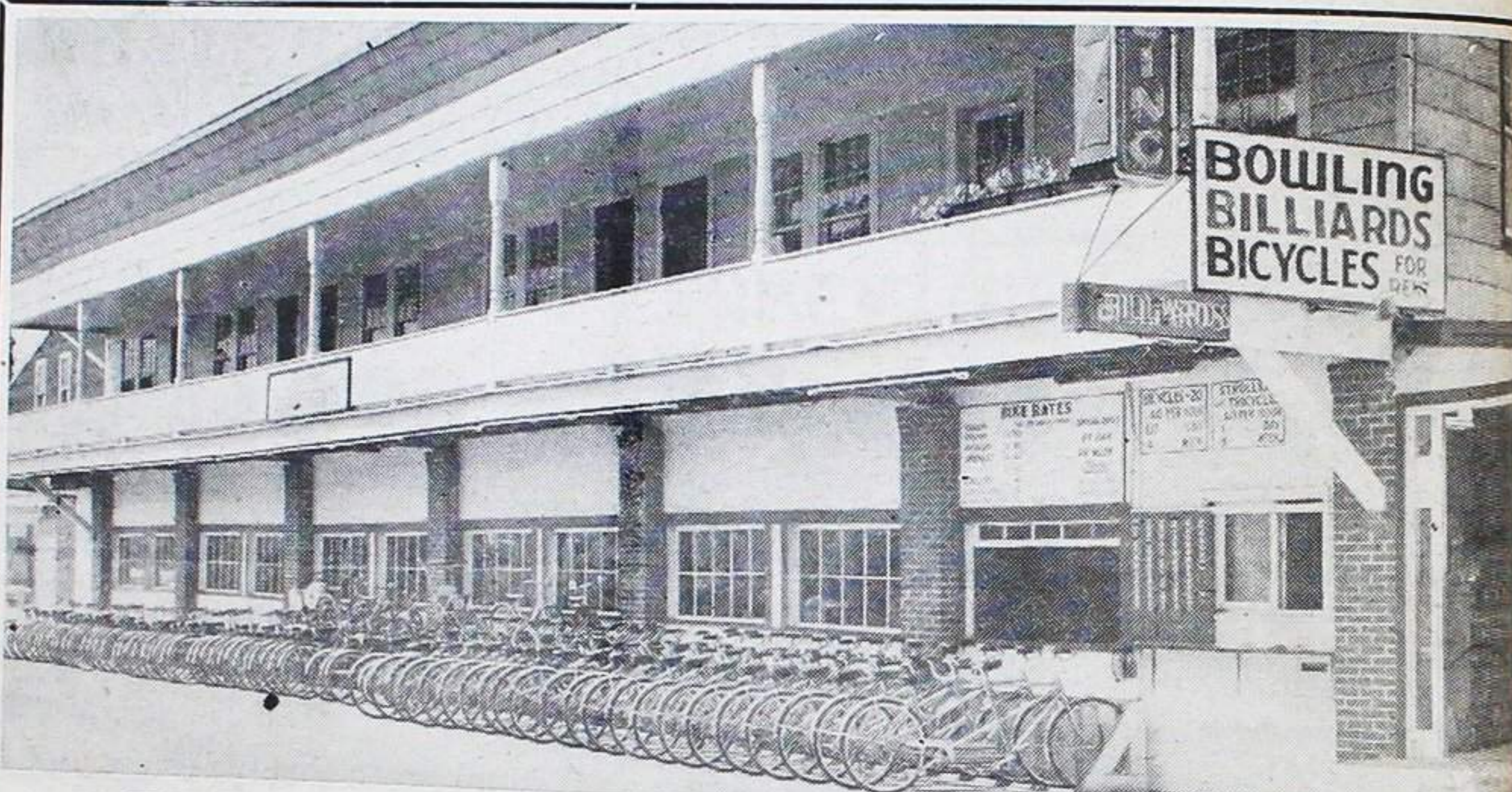

Historic Cannon Recovered Off North Shore By Divers



ANTIQUE CANNON REMNANTS, in excellent state of preservation, were pulled from waters off North Beach Coast Guard Station this week by two Massachusetts scuba divers approximately 500 yards directly off the Hampton Beach Coast Guard station at North Beach. Proud finders of the historic items were Walter "Skip" Hird, Jr., of Methuen, Mass., and David Conrad, Lawrence, Mass. Both boys are 15 years of age.

A search of local history books was underway this week following the discovery of an old cannon by two young Massachusetts scuba divers approximately 500 yards directly off the Hampton Beach Coast Guard station at North Beach. Proud finders of the historic items were Walter "Skip" Hird, Jr., of Methuen, Mass., and David Conrad, Lawrence, Mass. Both boys are 15 years of age.

Relating their experience following the arduous task of bringing the cannon ashore, the youths said they made their discovery June 27 and had kept it secret until recently as they worked out plans to recover it from the ocean bottom.

Brought in first were two perfectly shaped stone wheels with square axle holes. One wheel was approximately two feet in circumference while the second was somewhat smaller in size. Also found were a wooden pulley and two cannon balls.

The prize of the find was the iron barrel of the cannon which was approximately eight feet in length and which weighed nearly a ton. When found the barrel was resting on a stone worn by the constant change of tides and heavy surfs of the area and pointing on an angle directly at the Coast Guard station.

Toughest task was bringing the prize ashore. The boys finally had to call upon Skip's dad, Walter Hird, Sr., a Methuen police officer and longtime summer resident of North Beach and his uncle, Charles Hird of Waltham. The latter devised the float and tackle which eventually brought the cannon to shore. Working with the tides, the men used a ratchet type which

Lifeguards have the capacity of special police officers and may affect arrests if the need should arise. There are many town and beach ordinances which must be enforced. Often
