to expand the parking area on land already owned by the town.

Mr. Boehner reported the type highway proposed as being a dual lane road with a median strip with the engineers working in conjunction with the Municipal Development authority and the state highway department on planning the road.

This route was selected from three proposed lay outs. The original road plan was not considered because of the several narrow streets it involved at the southern end of the beach. The present route would also, according to town officials, have the least amount of land damages involved.

Following the initial hearing which was comparatively short, Chairman Salamon of the Hampton selectmen said the selectmen had many complaints on file from people who feel they don't have any time to get rest because of noise at some establishments which remain open late at night and into the early morning hours. The selectman said the board wished to ascertain the feeling of the people in regard to setting opening and closing times of restaurants.

For the remainder of the evening a verbal battle raged between proponents and opponents of the proposal with no compromise being reached. Town Manager Boehner said the selectmen planned to consider the matter at their weekly meeting Friday.

During the evening the discussion ranged from one of pedestrian control to teenage problems to the work of the police department.

The situation of the many persons appearing on the western side of the boulevard in a so-called state of undress, that of wearing bathing suits and being wrapped in blankets, late in the evening was also discussed.

The blocking of sidewalks at all hours of the day by stragglers and persons hanging around in groups and thus hampering the normal flow of pedestrian traffic on the sidewalks was also brought forth.

The entire situation came about when owners of the sleeping establishments issued complaints that some of the eating places had been staying open into the early hours of the morning thus depriving persons who desired to sleep the opportunity to do so in several areas of the beach.

Mr. Boehner said the situation has been taken under advisement by the selectmen.

The entire coastline of N. H. is 18 miles long.

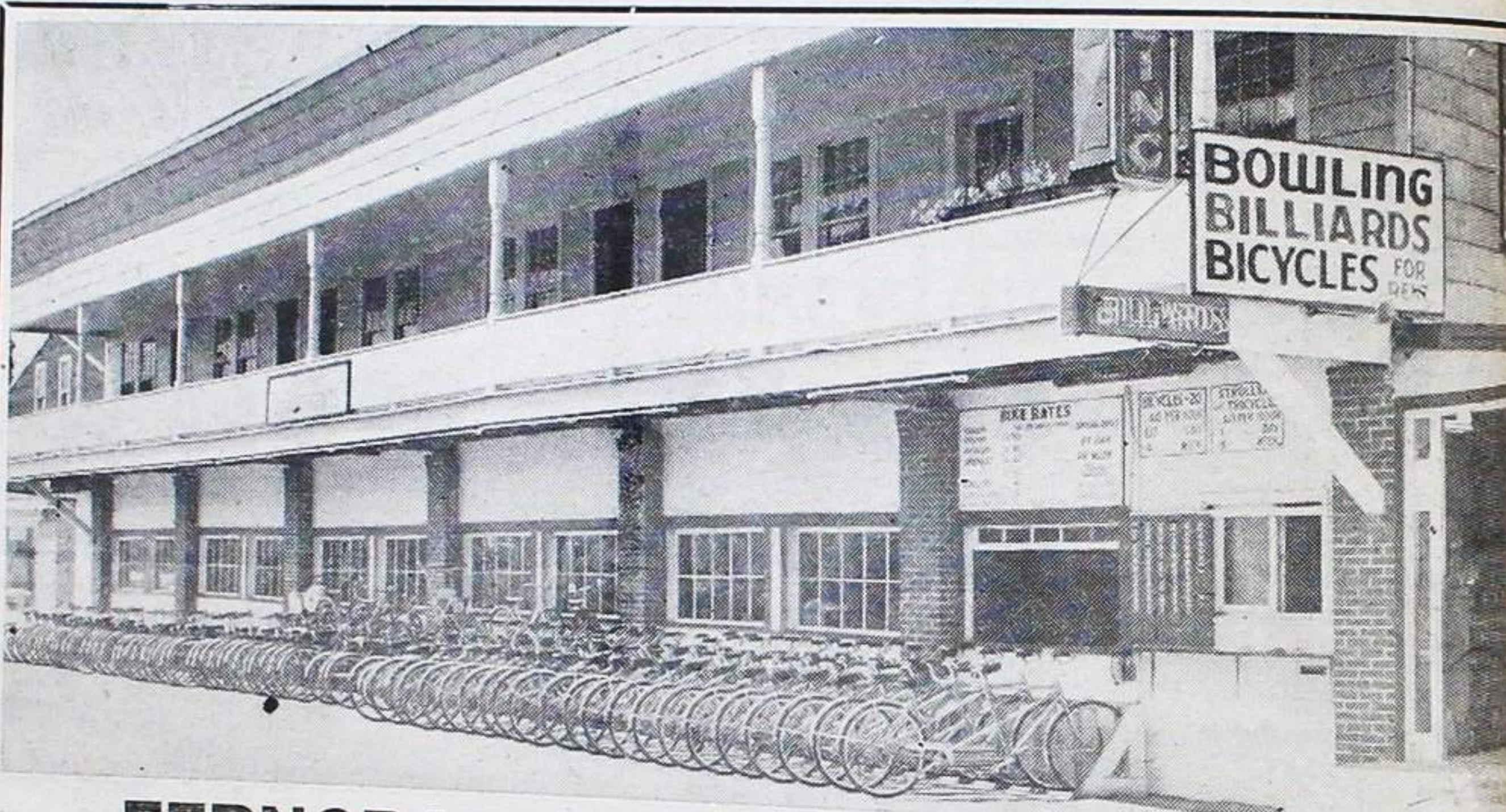

# Historic Cannon Recovered Off North Shore By Divers



ANTIQUE CANNON REMNANTS, in excellent state of preservation, were pulled from waters off North Beach Coast Guard Station this week by two Massachusetts scuba divers and summer residents of the beach. A search of local history books was underway this week following the discovery of an old cannon by two young Massachusetts scuba divers approximately 500 yards directly off the Hampton Beach Coast Guard station at North Beach. Proud finders of the historic items were Walter "Skip" Hird, Jr., of Methuen, Mass., and David Conrad, Lawrence, Mass. Both boys are 15 years of age.

Relating their experience following the arduous task of bringing the cannon ashore, the youths said they made their discovery June 27 and had kept it secret until recently as they worked out plans to recover it from the ocean bottom.

Brought in first were two perfectly shaped stone wheels with square axle holes. One wheel was approximately two feet in circumference while the second was somewhat smaller in size. Also found were a wooden pulley and two cannon balls.

The prize of the find was the iron barrel of the cannon which was approximately eight feet in length and which weighed nearly a ton. When found the barrel was resting on a stone worn by the constant change of tides and heavy surfs of the area and pointing on an angle directly at the Coast Guard station.

Toughest task was bringing the prize ashore. The boys finally had to call upon Skip's dad, Walter Hird, Sr., a Methuen police officer and longtime summer resident of North Beach and his uncle, Charles Hird of Waltham. The latter devised the float and tackle which eventually brought the cannon to shore. Working with the tides, the men used a ratchet type which

Known perhaps more for the policing activities, including prevention of ball playing on the beach and use of inflatable in the water than their lifeguard duties, the group over the years has performed excellent service to Hampton Beach.

Lifeguards have the capacity of special police officers and may affect arrests if the need should arise. There are many town and beach ordinances which must be enforced. Often

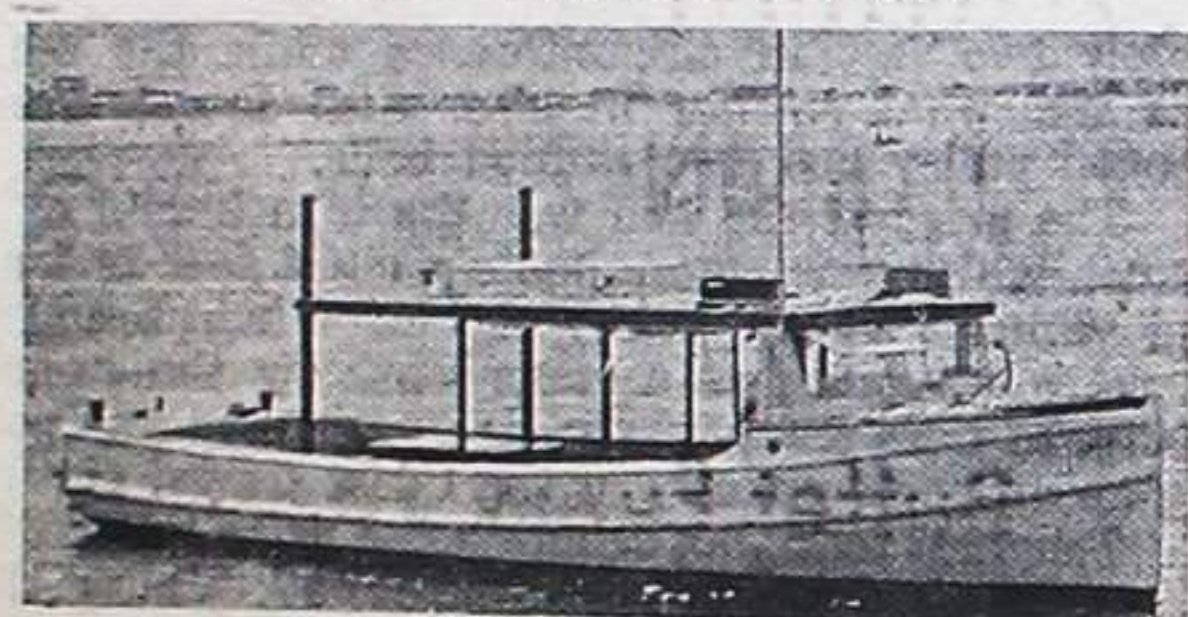

### Report Business Up At Beach State Park

Figures released from Concord this week indicated business at the Hampton Beach state park is almost half again

as good as it was for the same period during 1961.

At the same time, the Seacoast Region's executive secretary, Sen. Cecil Humphreys said he is getting conflicting reports on business to date and conflicting prognostications, too, for the balance of the season.

Going into the final full week of July, New Hampshire's promoters were making haste slowly with reference to pulling their "air conditioned by nature" slogan out of the mothballs.

The summer up to that point, as any vacationist, office, shop or factory worker, farmer or even casual observer will tell you, has been both cool and dry —abnormally so.

It's been great for people who had to remain at their desks, benches, clerking jobs or what have you; but visitors to the beaches and seasonal occupants at summer cottages on New Hampshire's lakes and ocean frontage would have been just as well pleased if Dame Nature had turned the air conditioner a few notches to the left. However, those vacationing in the state have been enjoying the clear, sparkling days and doing more touring about the state during their stay.

Even so, according to Allan V. Evans, director of the N. H. Div. of Economic Development, a majority of individuals closely associated with the recreation business appear to hold the view that by the time the last tourist has gone home at season's end, 1961's banner season will have been surpassed both as

to numbers of visitors and the total of their expenditures

"We agree," Evans said, "with these conclusions."

DED bases its predictions, Director Evans said, on the results of a questionnaire sent to the six regional Executive Secretaries, a number of major tourist attractions, chambers of

commerce and information booth personnel.

From the responses to the survey, the majority of those questioned felt that Canadian business was holding its own and a few even indicated it was ahead.

Proclaimed by nearly everyone connected with the affair as the finest in its 15 year history, Jonnye was so right with her statement. For she had finished ahead of 37 of the most beautiful girls on Hampton Beach. One of the unique factors of the local pageant is that the girls are not only local, but may come from many states. This year, Jonnye won over girls from Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Canada, Florida and one formerly from California.

Speaking of this year's contest when told it was attended by the largest audience in its indoor history, Jonnye said, "If I could have seen all those people through the lights, I never would have gotten past Mr. Hamel and onto the stage. I was very nervous, even though it was my third contest, until I got on the stage and then I was all right."

Asked of the future Jonnye said, "I want to make the best Miss Hampton Beach I know how. I know it will be tough filling Sandie Kay's shoes, but I'll do my best." And she went on to relate how terrific she felt Sandie was.

And with these words she started what will undoubtedly be one of her busiest, exciting summers plus a few after season engagements and appearances. The climax of her excitement will come on August 24 when she receives her official crown from Sandie and Jonnye.

## Mosquito Control Study Is Planned

Following a meeting last week in Concord between representatives of the Southeastern Mosquito Control project and Rep. Howell Shepard, chairman of the Legislative Council and Commissioner James J. Berry, of the State Health and Welfare department, it was reported a comprehensive study of the seacoast mosquito problem may soon be made.

Further progress in the campaign to wipe out the nuisance in the Seacoast region was made when Barry said that at a recent staff meeting it was decided to request the U. S. Public Health department to supply the services of a consultant to look into the problem and the assistance of an entomologist from the University of New Hampshire is also being requested.

Barry said a meeting would probably take place in the Seacoast area in the near future to work on the question of the survey and the cost of eradicating the mosquito.

The mosquito control project has recently been pushing for state aid to carry out its plans. This was recently endorsed by a public meeting held in Rye and the directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce. Local officials were in attendance at last week's meeting in Concord.

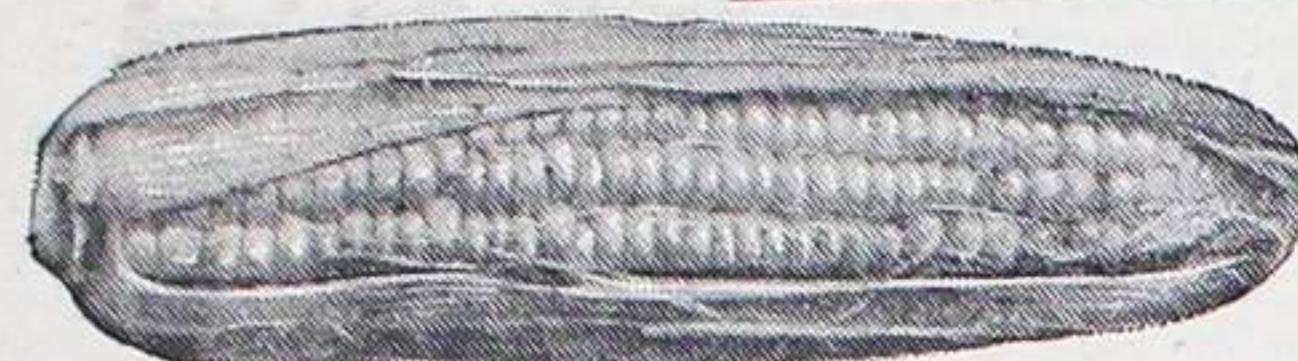

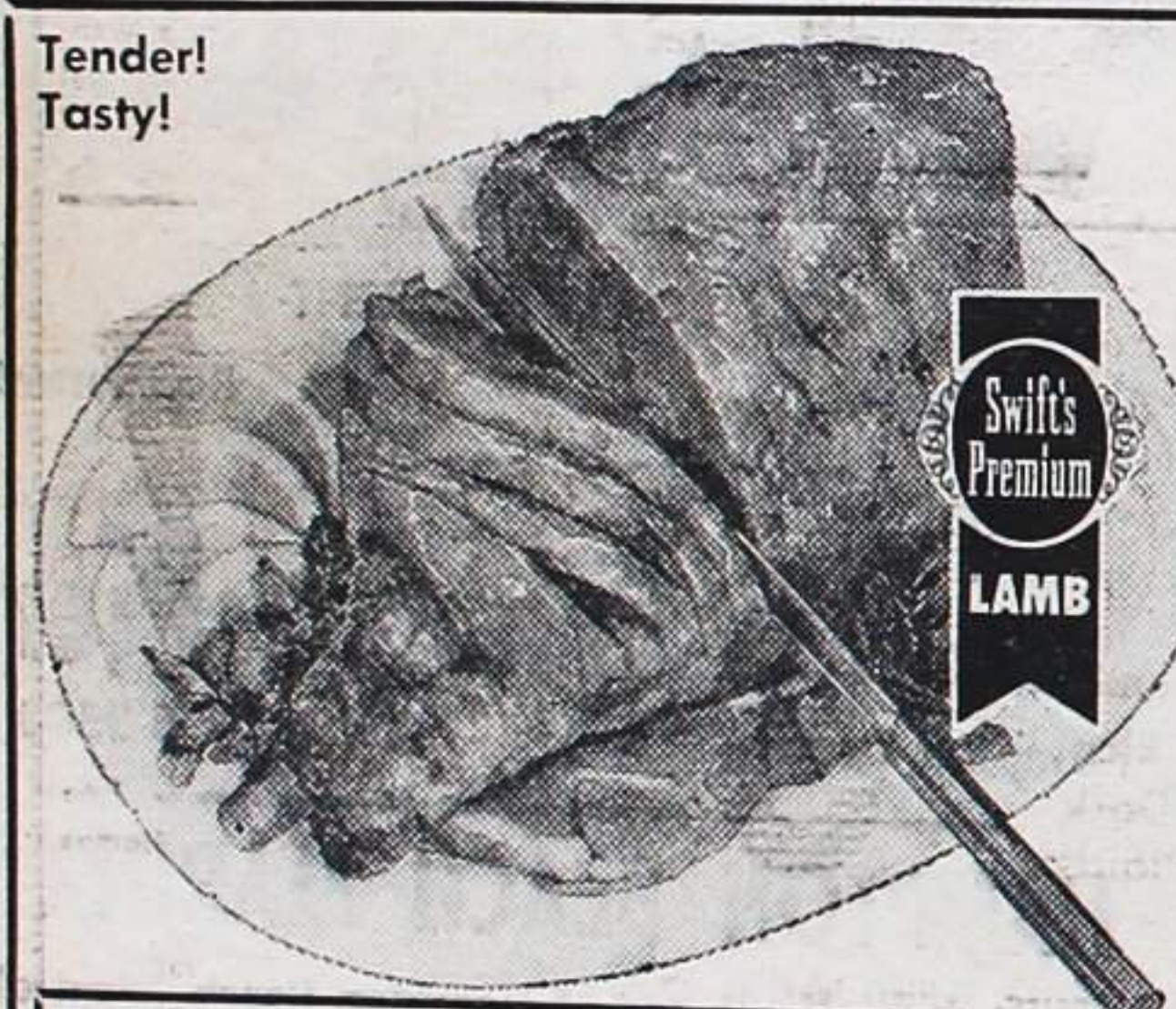

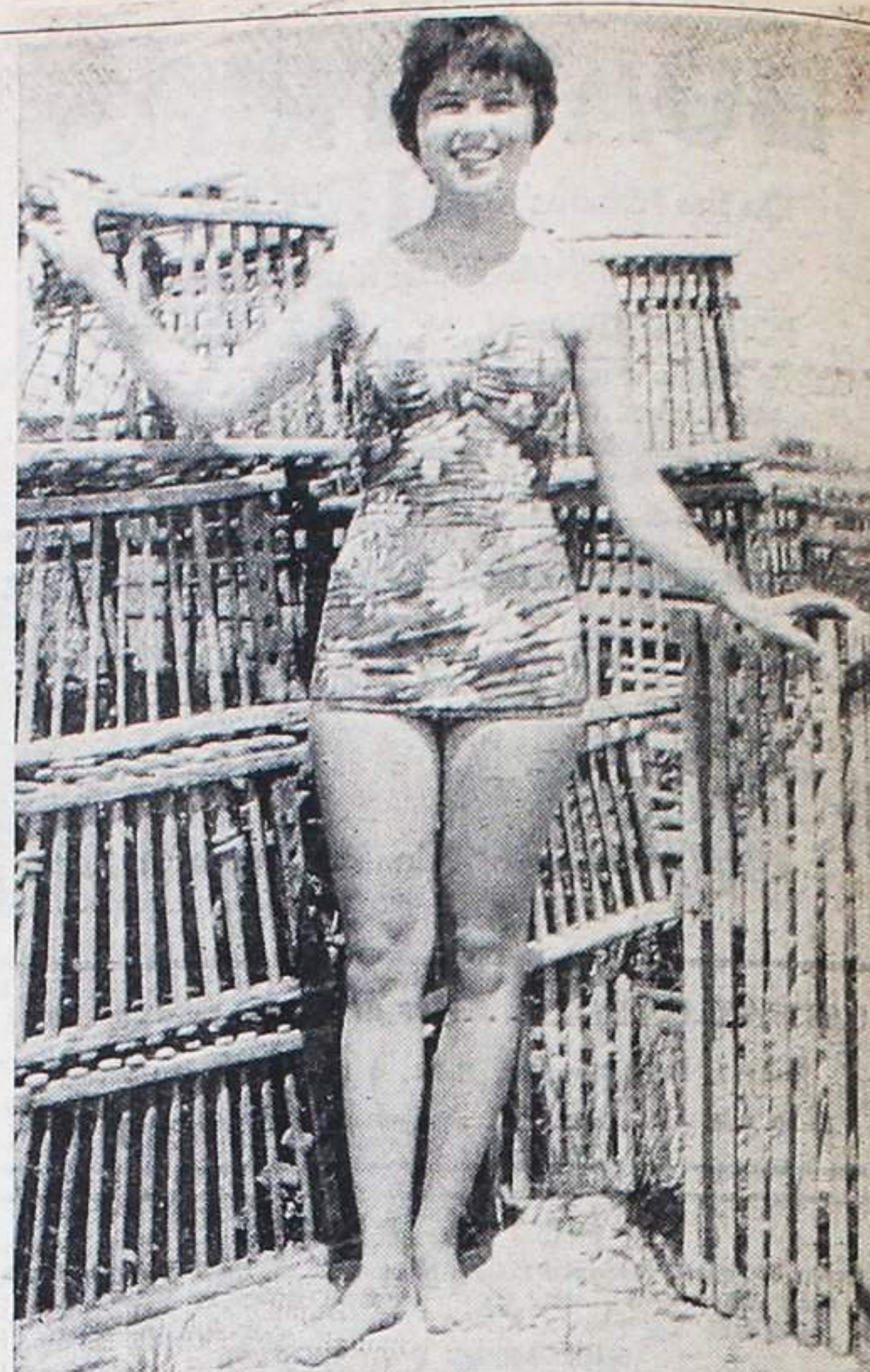

times persons visiting the beach cannot understand the use of the ordinances, but in talking with head guard Dan Stone, now in his 12th year as a guard at the beach, one can understand how many potential rescues or catastrophes are nipped before they materialize.

All of this year's guards have senior life saving certificates and are trained to use the equipment on hand at the beach. Used in emergencies is the amphibious "duck" which is tested every two weeks with each guard having the opportunity to maneuver the craft

through the surf. Three surf boards are also used and are very maneuverable. Four row boats are interspersed along the beach with 14 can buoys ready for immediate use.

Dan Stone is in his fourth year as head guard and is a fifth grade elementary school teacher at Exeter. He resides on Exeter road in Hampton.

Each year, for the past three or four years, the best of the Hampton lifeguards have competed against the best of the Salisbury, Mass., guards in friendly swim races during the summer season.

## State Park Enjoying Banner Year

Thirty acres of beach, ample parking space, spacious bathhouse with observation platform, refreshments, souvenirs, games, picnicking, along with renting of bathing suits, towels, beach chairs and umbrellas and the use of tennis courts, horse-shoe pits, playground and shuffleboard are all yours at the Hampton Beach State park area.

A must visit for all visitors to the beach, the state park is one of 20 operated by the Recreation Division of the State Forestry and Recreation department. The ocean side of the bath-house was given to the state by the town of Hampton in 1933. Two years later, the park was placed in the custody of the State Forestry and Recreation department.

In 1937, a large modern bathhouse was built near the mouth of the Hampton river, providing the best of conveniences for both swimmers and non-bathers. When the Hampton river jetty was built, 30 acres of low-lying land at the south end of Hampton Beach was reclaimed by dredging operations. This now provides a large automobile parking space and play area adjacent to the bathhouse.

The bathhouse has constantly been kept as one of the most up to date in the East, providing spacious dressing courts open to the sun and air with individual dressing booths and show-

ers. Unique hanger baskets in the checkroom can handle clothing of more than 2,000 patrons at the same time.

A beach patrol is vigilant at all times, insuring the safety of

swimmers and paddlers. Music from the loud speakers at the bathhouse is occasionally broadcast for the enjoyment of lounge PARK

## Summer Residents Views Marsh Development Plan

I am writing this letter to express the views of a non-resident property owner at Hampton Beach relative to the creation of a wildlife preserve on the marshlands in the Town of Hampton. Though I am a

non-resident I have spent summers and portions of summers in Hampton since 1926. I am now watching my two sons enjoy the same activities I enjoyed at their age. I enthusiastically and wholeheartedly endorse and support the efforts of the local committee for a wildlife preserve.

This marshland represents centuries of natural development which have yielded a highly specialized natural phenomena which contributes both practically and esthetically to the character of Hampton Beach and the Town of Hampton. According to all articles written by experts in the field of wildlife management any substantial dredging and marsh alteration will destroy the biological balance which makes this contribution possible.

The network of saltwater creeks and the flats in both the harbor and the creeks are the rich source of microscopic and visible food for both fish and clams. They are the habitat where the young of many types of fish and marine fauna develop. They are the habitat which yields the food which supports the offshore, harbor and onshore fishing which is popular.

Thousands of dollars have been invested over the years in attempts to restore the productivity of the clam flats in the harbor. Many hundreds of people have purchased licenses and come to Hampton to harvest the results of this investment. The proposed dredging and construction activities will summarily destroy this source of pleasure and income.

The marshes and creeks are the haven of many types of ducks and shore birds. If the food supply system is destroyed this will no longer be true.

The Hampton marshes represent the major segment of this type of land in the State of New Hampshire. At the rate that unenlightened citizens in other states along the Atlantic Seaboard are permitting the destruction of this type of land, its preservation at this time by forward looking citizens could well make it an attraction for thousands of students of nature in the future.

The expanse of marsh also serves the Town of Hampton in times of high water and in severe storms. The violent action of the water is adsorbed by the marsh with a resulting

decrease in the impact on the land proper and the properties thereon. Any substantial alteration of the marsh area will decrease this action and the force of the water will do its destructive work where it will be expensive.

The beach front is already overcrowded. The bathing area is saturated to the point of discomfort, the traffic is too dense and hazardous, the parking inadequate and the fire hazard great. To me it makes little sense to spend thousands of dollars to increase real estate holdings which will further overcrowd an already saturated facility. At the peak of the season many properties are not rented or occupied.

I urge all resident and non-resident owners of marshland acreage to dedicate their property to the State so that the

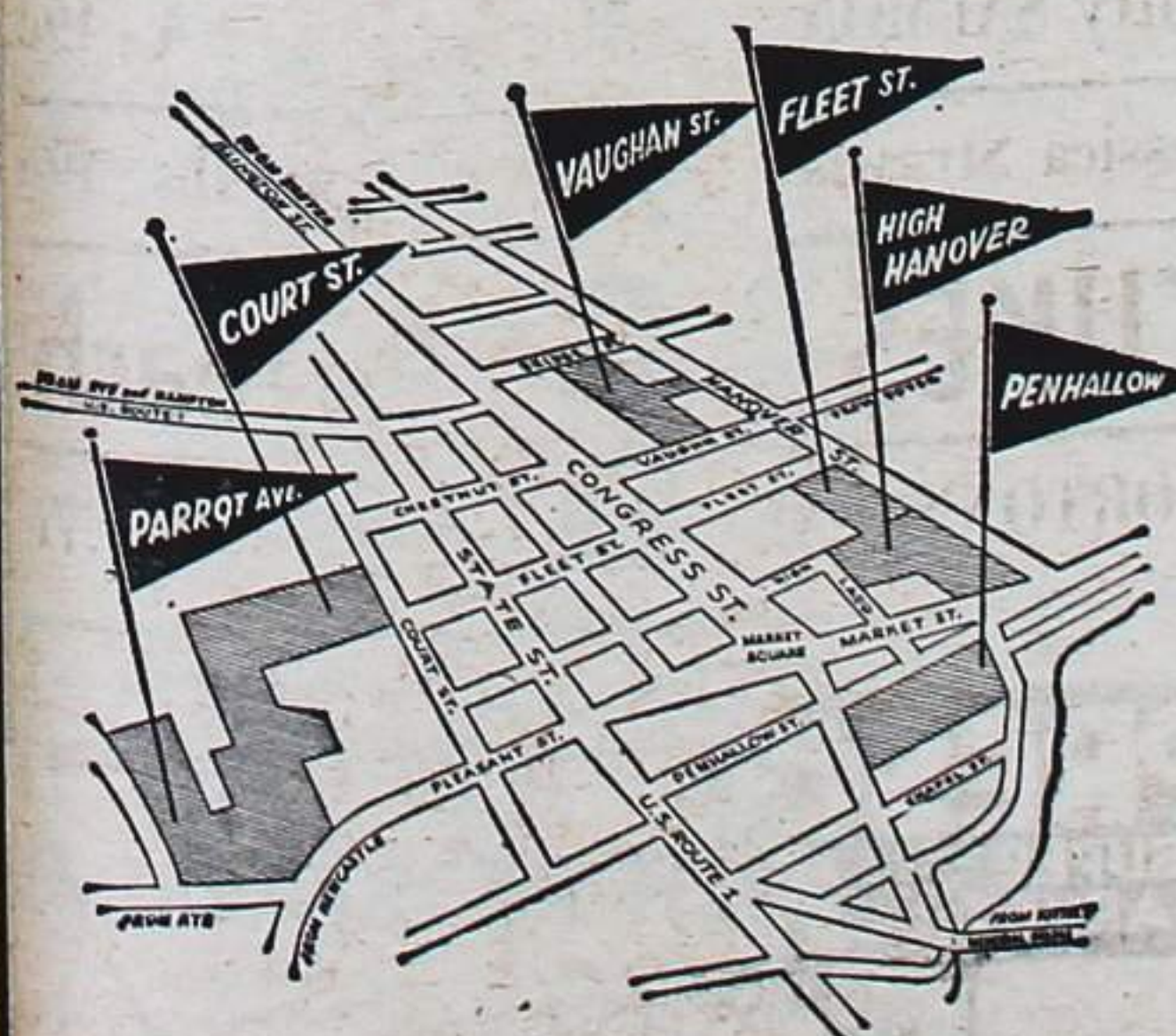

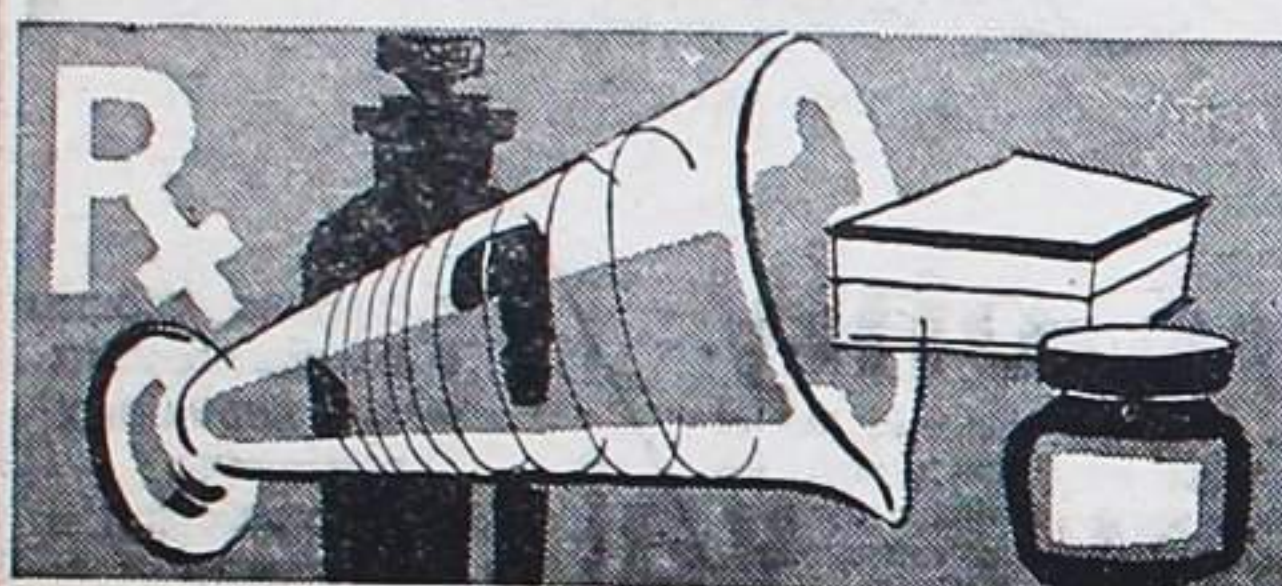

## Plans Are Studied For Police Station

Town Manager Kenneth Boehner today said Architect Russell Pierce, who is working on the plans for a possible new Hampton police station, was expected to confer with officials on the project this week. At the same time, Mr. Boehner reported he had consulted with a local building mover about the feasibility of moving the beach police station to a spot possibly in the town parking lot. The information was requested by the planning board and selectmen.

The town manager said his report to the selectmen this week would note that the building mover definitely did not favor moving of the station. Several reasons were given with one being that the building was too large to move down any of the side streets and would have to go down the boulevard and thence back up Ashworth avenue to the new location.

Another reason given was the fact that the building is in such poor structural condition that a minimum of \$9,000 to \$10,000 was estimated for the moving job and repair to the outside of the police headquarters. This figure, although unofficial, did not include any work on the interior which would have to be completely renovated.

Mr. Boehner said for the amount of money involved, the town could go a long way in erecting a new structure to suit police needs at the beach. He said he would go on record as favoring the demolition of the building as recommended by the building mover.

Outside stucco would have to be completely redone or some other exterior siding applied. The floors in the public areas are cement and would not stand the moving, according to Mr. Boehner's report.

With the arrival of Mr. Pierce on the scene, town officials expect progress will be made on the problem in the near future. The police station at the beach must be vacated by September 10.

gers. An observation deck on the roof of the bathhouse is provided so that non-swimmers may relax and enjoy the salt air. From this vantage point, the Isles of Shoals, ocean pleasure craft and lobster boats may be seen.

Since 1935, the State Park system has been well appreciated by more than 2 million vacationers who have enjoyed the facilities. The major function of the N. H. Recreation Division is to develop, operate and preserve many of the state's unusual scenic, historic and recreational resources such as at Hampton Beach.

As an example of the type of person using the facilities, last year a Catholic orphanage from Rochester, N. H. had an outing at the beach. Each child was allotted money for ice cream. As the children lined up for their treat in the morning, a gentleman from Massachusetts picked up the tab, thus leaving the children still with the money. Once again they lined up in the afternoon and again the bill was paid, this time by a man from Nashua.

John Peterson, Hampton manager of the state park for many years noted that this was the kind of thing that constantly warms his heart as he goes about his task of making vacationers happy.

Assisting Mr. Peterson this year are Richard Eustis, store manager, Geraldine Thomas, Marion Eustis, and Beverly Eastman, store clerks; Kimball Clough, Robert Arseneau and Timothy Brooks, men's checking; Elsie Burke, Evelyn Emerson, Judith Smiley, women's checking; Leo G. Soucy, head lifeguard; John A. Staples, John T. Franz and Edward Chamberlain, lifeguards; George Draffan, Norman Smiley and Richard Rutman, toll collectors; John Hartnett, maintenance and George Mottis and Victor Bo-grett, custodians.

This year, a new roof has been put onto the bathhouse, a new cement walk has been laid to the main beach and numerous other small items have been installed to make the state park a perfect spot to spend a day.

with air tight oil drums. The elder Hird brothers are brothers of the late Arthur Hird of Hampton.

In previous years the young divers had been diving in the same area and had never seen the items previous to their discovery in June. They felt the severe storms of the past winter must have uncovered the prize.

Several calls have already been sent out to various places interested in historic lore for help in ascertaining the approximate date of the cannon. The key to the mystery appears to be the stone wheels with the square axles. Some persons have dated the fire arms as around Revolutionary or pre-Revolutionary War days, while others say that iron wheels were in use at that time and the piece is actually much older.

If the cannon was on a ship and it went down during the pre-Revolutionary War period it could have been the English

must ship St. George. Thanks to the efforts of Mrs. Kirby Higgins and through the use of the UNION files and former "Our Town" columns of the late Mr. James Tucker, a perfect account of a shipwreck on November 30, 1764 is given for nearly the exact location at which the cannon was found.

Quoting from Page 211 (1733-1780) of "The History of the Town of Hampton" written by John Dow and published as Volume I in 1893 we find the following: "For a long series of years til the Revolution, the sovereign of England claimed exclusive rights to every white pine tree in New Hampshire and elsewhere, fit for a mast for service of the Royal Navy. Such trees, growing outside the township granted before the 21st of September 1723 were branded with the 'broad arrow', and no man might dare cut them down, even on his own land, under heavy penalty. Large ships brought to our shores goods we were forbidden to provide for ourselves and carried cargoes of our best

What wonder then, that as the exactions of England grew more and more rigorous, a 'mast ship' became a hated object.

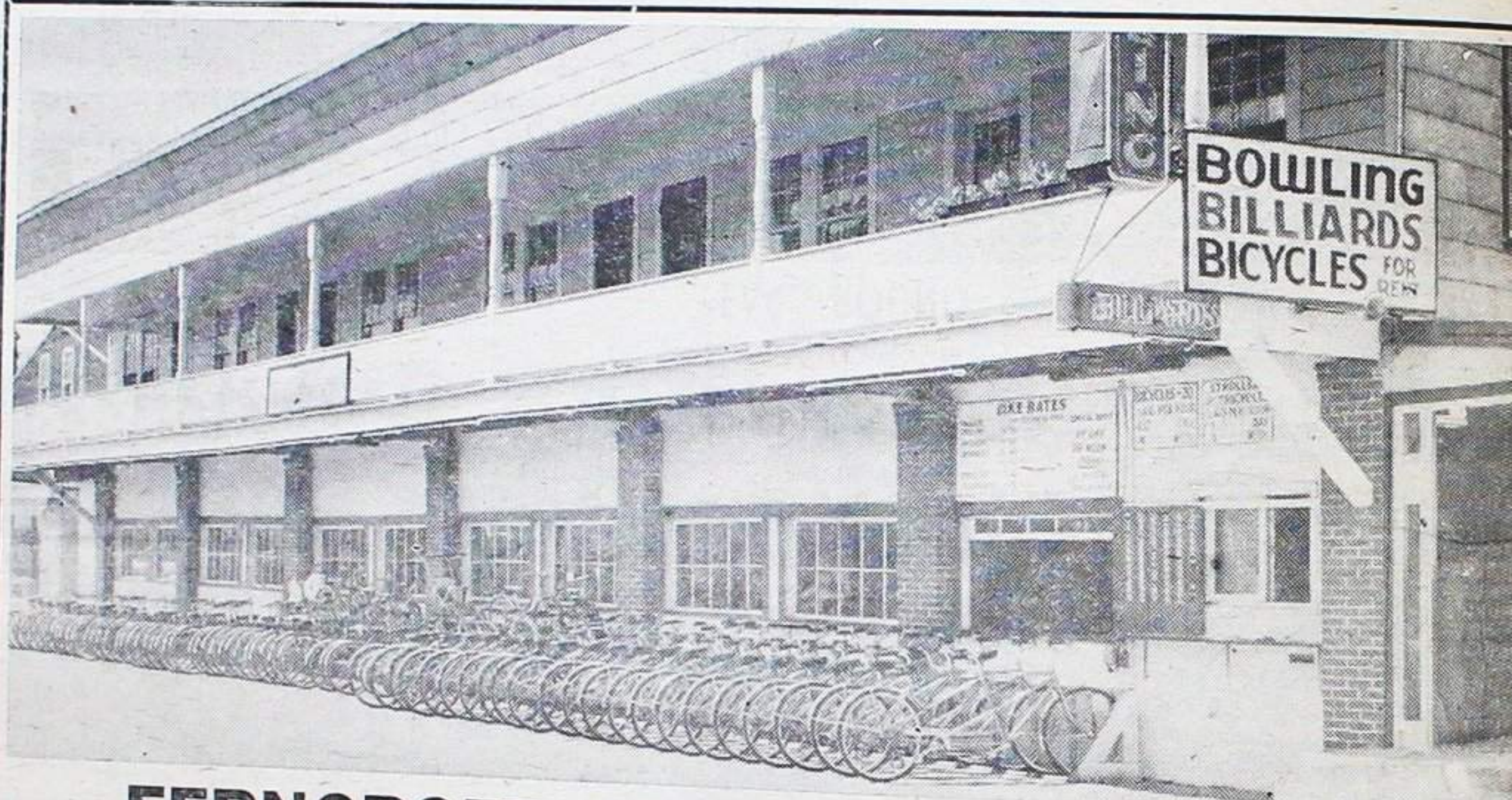
"Such a ship, with a valuable cargo, wrecked on Hampton Beach on the night of November 30, 1764, not, it is believed, an act of rough weather, but owing to the pilot's ignorance of the coast. The ship drove on to the sands a little to the south of the present line of fish houses on the north beach, whence the crew, without difficulty, got ashore. The pilot, Captain William Branscomb, afterward settled in this town, and became the third husband of Prudence Page (nicknamed 'Old Pru')."

# Miss New England Contest Will Be Staged Next Tuesday

The Miss New England beauty pageant, second major event of the 1962 summer season and a prelude to Mardi Gras week will be staged at the Casino Ballroom next Tuesday, August 14, at 8:30 p.m.

Unlike the Miss Hampton Beach contest where participants may come from any state, the Miss New England affair is confined to participation by girls from the six New England states only.

This will be the sixth annual Miss New England contest with the present program having been an outgrowth, in 1957, of several previous contests which augmented the Miss Hampton Beach pageant.

Briefly recalling the history of the beginning of the Miss New England affair, the contests from which it originated were started in 1954.

At that time, monthly contests were held out of doors on the old bandstand and were known as the Miss Personality, Miss Glamor Girl, Miss Sunshine and Miss Sea Nymph contests. Girls participating in the Miss Personality contest were required to wear cotton or sun back dresses. Those competing in the Miss Glamor Girl pageant wore cocktail gowns or afternoon dresses while those in the Miss Sunshine contest were required to wear shorts and blouses or sweaters. The Miss Sea Nymph contest found entrants competing in swim suits or beach outfits.

These contests were staged as a prelude to the Miss Hampton Beach contest in 1954, 1955 and 1956. In 1957, it was combined to make one gigantic pageant to coincide with the Miss Hampton Beach pageant. Although it has not reached the status of the famed sister contest, it is, nevertheless, becoming increasingly larger with each passing year. Last year, 32 girls sought the title with Miss Sylvia Gustavson of Winchester, Mass. gaining the win.

In 1959 and 1960, 23 girls participated for the lowest number while 32 participated in 1961 for the largest amount to date.

Up to now, New Hampshire and Massachusetts share the honors of two winners each while Vermont has one first place girl. Connecticut, Maine and Rhode
