most ship St. George. Thanks to the efforts of Mrs. Kirby Higgins and through the use of the UNION files and former "Our Town" columns of the late Mr. James Tucker, a perfect account of a shipwreck on November 30, 1764 is given for nearly the exact location at which the cannon was found.

Quoting from Page 211 (1733-1780) of "The History of the Town of Hampton" written by John Dow and published as Volume I in 1893 we find the following: "For a long series of years til the Revolution, the sovereign of England claimed exclusive rights to every white pine tree in New Hampshire and elsewhere, fit for a mast for service of the Royal Navy. Such trees, growing outside the township granted before the 21st of September 1723 were branded with the 'broad arrow', and no man might dare cut them down, even on his own land, under heavy penalty. Large ships brought to our shores goods we were forbidden to provide for ourselves and carried cargoes of our best

pinus. What wonder then, that as the exactions of England grew more and more rigorous, a 'mast ship' became a hated object.

"Such a ship, with a valuable cargo, wrecked on Hampton Beach on the night of November 30, 1764, not, it is believed, an act of rough weather, but owing to the pilot's ignorance of the coast. The ship drove on to the sands a little to the south of the present line of fish houses on the north beach, whence the crew, without difficulty, got ashore. The pilot, Captain William Branscomb, afterward settled in this town, and became the third husband of Prudence Page (nicknamed 'Old Pru')."

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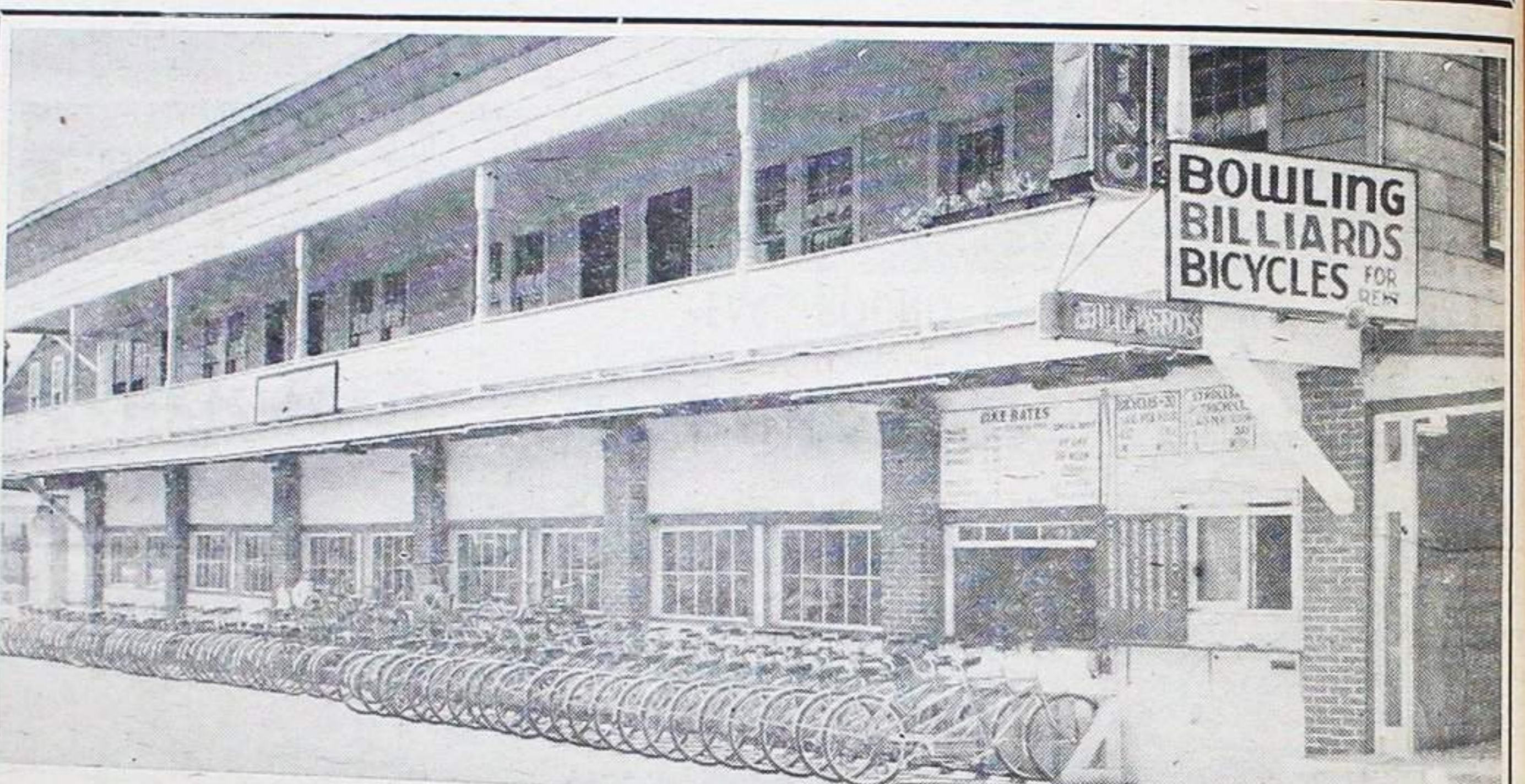

with air tight oil drums. The elder Hird brothers are brothers of the late Arthur Hird of Hampton.

In previous years the young divers had been diving in the same area and had never seen the items previous to their discovery in June. They felt the severe storms of the past winter must have uncovered the prize.

Several calls have already been sent out to various places interested in historic lore for help in ascertaining the approximate date of the cannon. The key to the mystery appears to be the stone wheels with the square axles. Some persons have dated the fire arms as around Revolutionary or pre-Revolutionary War days, while others say that iron wheels were in use at that time and the piece is actually much older.

If the cannon was on a ship and it went down during the pre-Revolutionary War period it could have been the English

Miss New England Contest Will Be Staged Next Tuesday

The Miss New England beauty pageant, second major event of the 1962 summer season and a prelude to Mardi Gras week will be staged at the Casino Ballroom next Tuesday, August 14, at 8:30 p.m.

Unlike the Miss Hampton Beach contest where participants may come from any state, the Miss New England affair is confined to participation by girls from the six New England states only.

This will be the sixth annual Miss New England contest with the present program having been an outgrowth, in 1957, of several previous contests which augmented the Miss Hampton Beach pageant.

Briefly recalling the history of the beginning of the Miss New England affair, the contests from which it originated were started in 1954.

At that time, monthly contests were held out of doors on the old bandstand and were known as the Miss Personality, Miss Glamor Girl, Miss Sunshine and Miss Sea Nymph contests. Girls participating in the Miss Personality contest were required to wear cotton or sun back dresses. Those competing in the Miss Glamor Girl pageant wore cocktail gowns or afternoon dresses while those in the Miss Sunshine contest were required to wear shorts and blouses or sweaters. The Miss Sea Nymph contest found entrants competing in swim suits or beach outfits.

These contests were staged as a prelude to the Miss Hampton Beach contest in 1954, 1955 and 1956. In 1957, it was combined to make one gigantic pageant to coincide with the Miss Hampton Beach pageant. Although it has not reached the status of the famed sister contest, it is, nevertheless, becoming increasingly larger with each passing year. Last year, 32 girls sought the title with Miss Sylvia Gustavson of Winchester, Mass. gaining the win.

In 1959 and 1960, 23 girls participated for the lowest number while 32 participated in 1961 for the largest amount to date.

Up to now, New Hampshire and Massachusetts share the honors of two winners each while Vermont has one first place girl. Connecticut, Maine and Rhode

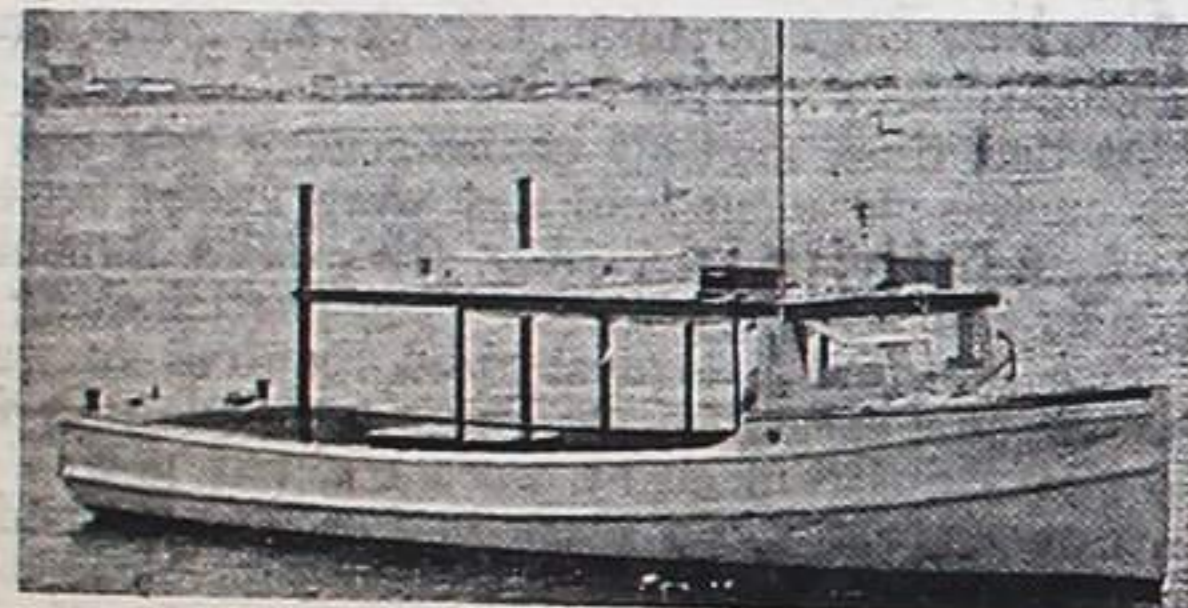

It is loud-boisterous-risque humor from opening to closing curtains.

A second viewing early this week revealed that the corn had been polished. The blistering pace of the action went smoothly—lines had been added—others had been cut—actors had adjusted to laughter spots so that a second punch line was not swallowed in the laughter from the audience—the actors, also, had added additional bits of comic business to their actions.

Ian Sullivan continued to lead the laughter parade with his riotous characterization of the woman-hating professor closely followed by Dennis Drew who romps through the role of Mike. Richard Kennedy added some clever scene stealing by strengthening his drunk scene in the third act.

Martha Gibson, as Dodie; Pat O'Riordan, as Marie; Betty Bright, as Mrs. Tarleton; and Ailsa Dawson, as Alicia, had all solidified their characterizations. 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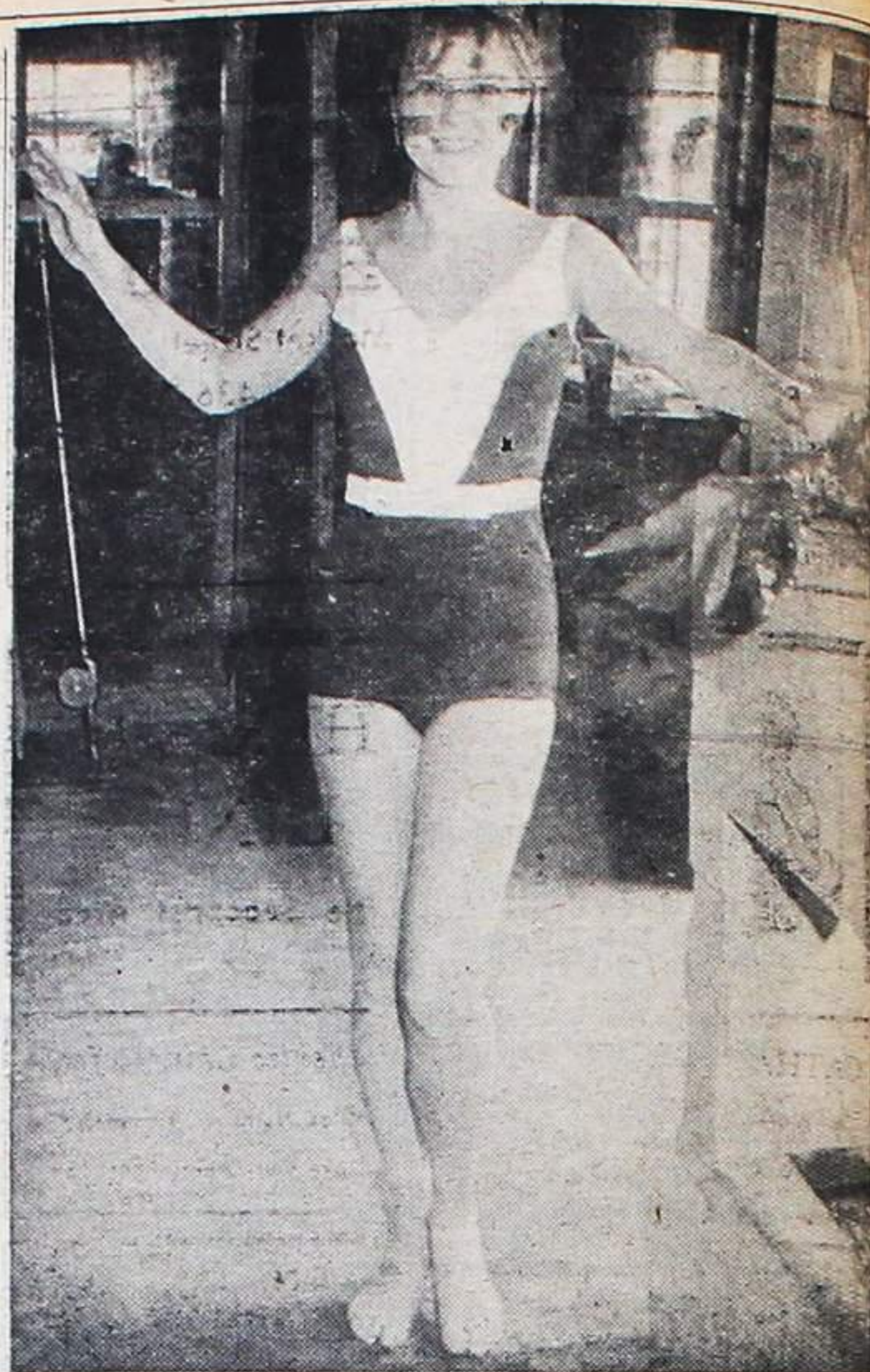

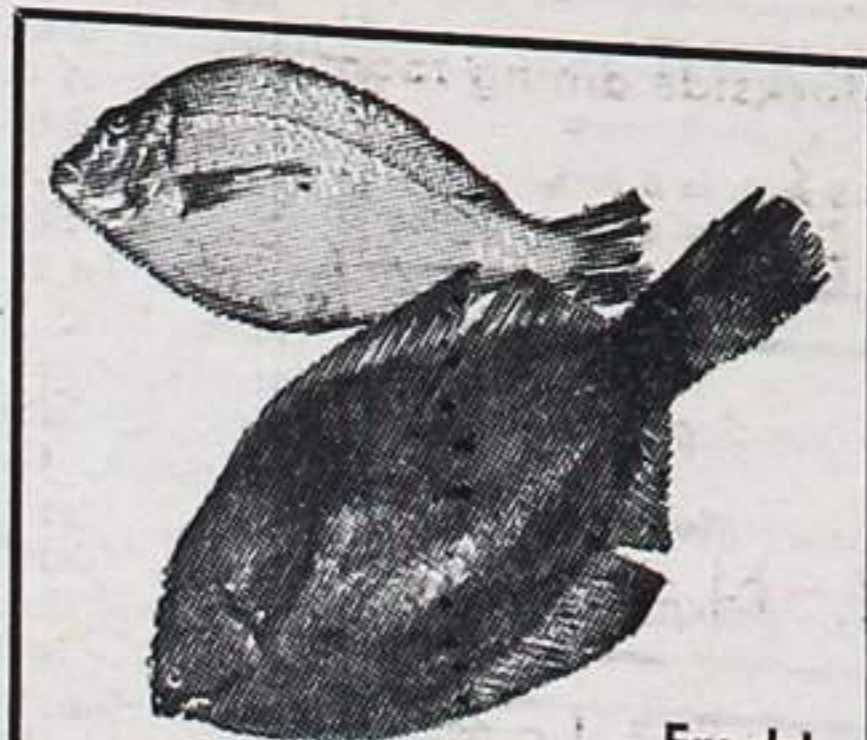

Beach Youth Killed In Crash

The life of a Silver Spring, Maryland, youth spending the summer working at Hampton Beach, ended in a tragic accident early Sunday morning.

Robert F. Stone, 19, was killed instantly when the car which he was driving went out of control on North Shore road

at 2:35 a.m., August 5. The traffic fatality was the first in Hampton since October of 1960 when an accident at Brown's bridge, Lafayette road, claimed another life.

The accident was one of the worst catastrophies to take place in many months at Hampton. Equipped with seat belts which, if they had been worn might have saved a life, the late model convertible while heading west on North Shore road spun out of control shortly after passing the residence of John Churchill, and skidded sideways for 211 feet before leaving the road.

The vehicle crashed into a tree and stone wall before coming to rest upright just south of the brook, which passes between the summer residence of William Barkley and the home of John Breen.

A passenger in the car, John D. McLaughlin, 19, Olive street, Nashua, escaped uninjured when he dove to the floor of the car as the vehicle went into a skid. The car was borrowed at the time and was owned by

Fred Shaheen, 4 Caswell avenue, Methuen, Mass. The entire front end and underneath of the car was damaged.

Father Stephen Scruton of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal church was called to the scene and administered last rites. Friends of the victim at Hampton Beach were this week accepting contributions to send his body home for burial.

Stone was thrown out of the side door of the drivers seat ahead of the car. The car then came down on top of the victim. Dr. Wendell P. Clare, Rockingham county medical examiner, ruled death by lacerations of the brain. The youth also received a compound fracture of the skull, multiple compound lacerations of the scalp and multiple fracture of the left humerus.

Officer William Keene, on routine patrol at North Beach, was the first policeman on the scene. He immediately requested further help with Officers John Woodburn and John Robinson responding in the other police cruiser. At the same time, State Trooper Norman Marsh arrived on the scene along with North Hampton Officer Ralph O'Connor. Sgt. Leavitt and Chief Roden also assisted with the investigation.

John McLaughlin, the passenger at the time of the mishap, resides at M street with his grandmother. Stone's summer residence was the Barn motel, North Beach.

The body of the accident victim was removed to the Sturgis Funeral home.

Two other accidents were reported during the week. A tractor-trailer combination driven by Allan F. MacDonald, Saco, Maine, and owned by Rouse Transportation Co. of Middlebury, Vermont, and a car driven by Mary Clara DeSilvio of 32 Payson street, Manchester, were in collision on High street. The mishap was investigated by Officer Thomas Burke with no injuries being reported.

Officer Clifford Eastman reported another accident on August 1 at 2:40 p.m. in the town parking lot at North Beach. Cars driven by Wallace R. Krom, Fern road, North Hampton, and Caroline B. Lewis, 120 Willard street, Berlin, collided while attempting to back up. No damage was reported to the Krom car while the Lewis vehicle, owned by Charles Ashley of 9 Blake lane, received damage to the left rear fender and panel.

Safety Tips For Boaters

Cruising is safer if you know your channel markers.

CAN BUOYS are black in color and are marked with odd numbers. They designate the PORT side of a channel as you enter from seaward. If you keep in mind, "BLACK to port as you come BACK to port", it's easy to remember.

NUN BUOYS are painted red and are numbered evenly. The pointed NUN BUOYS mark the STARBOARD side of a channel, entering from seaward. As your memory aid puts it, "RED to RIGHT as you RETURN."

LIGHTED BUOYS at night as you enter from seaward are designated by green or white lights on the PORT side of the channel with red lights on the STARBOARD side. The lights may be fixed, slow-flashing or occulting. The latter is an arrangement where the "on" period is longer than the "off" period.

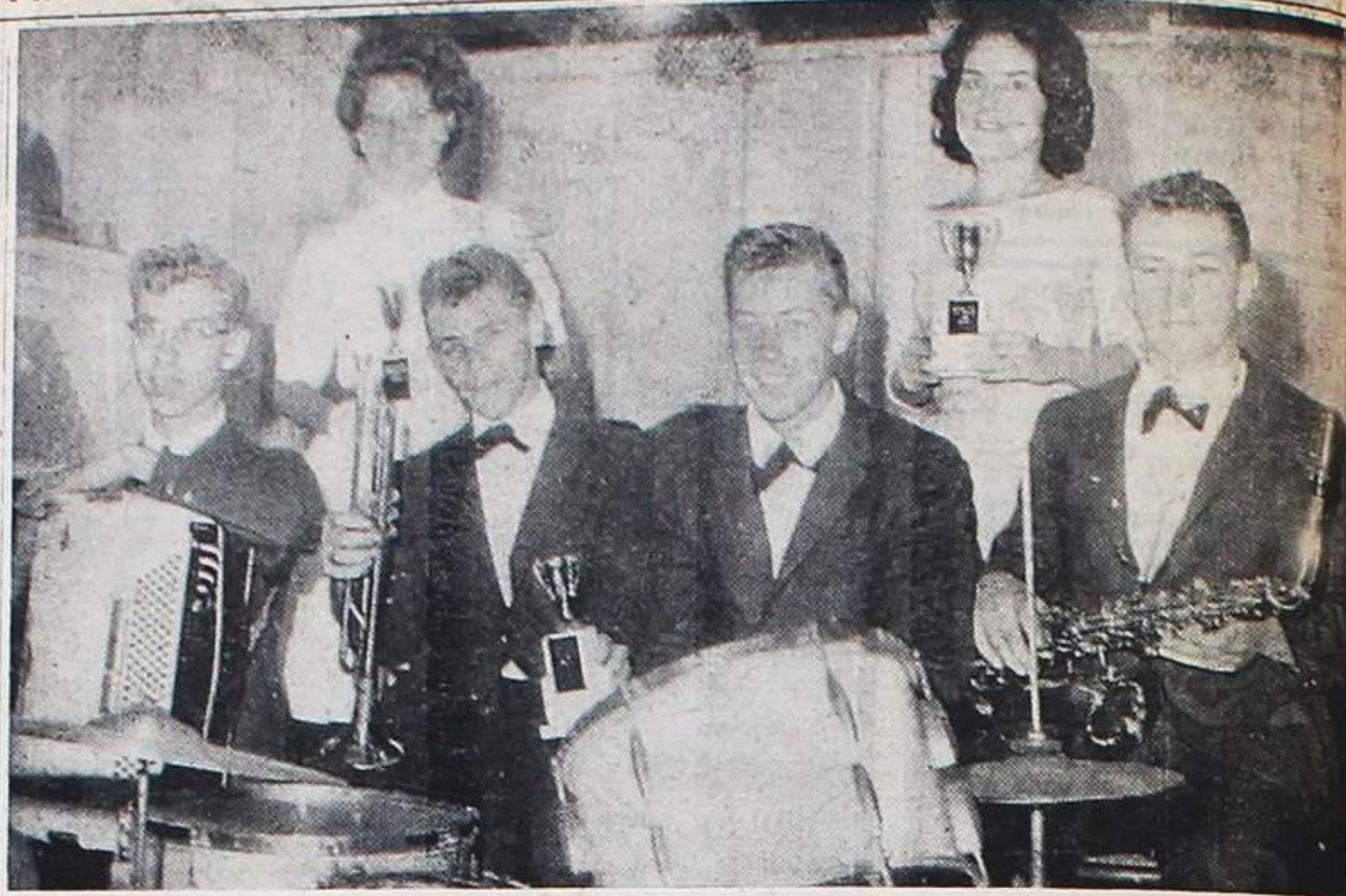

Playground Is Popular Spot

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

Second Cannon Found Off North Shore

A second weapon, a historic sand-cast swivel gun weighing some 40 pounds, was recovered by skin divers last Saturday from approximately the same spot from which an 1800-lb. cannon barrel was found last week.

The newest find, brought up by approximately 20 skindivers from Hartford, Conn. and employed by the New England Naval and Maritime Museum at Newport, R. I., has been placed in a solution of fresh water and chemicals at the museum in an attempt to preserve it.

Near the fuse hole on the swivel-gun is the inscription P-60. A preliminary examination by Jackson Jenks of the museum indicated the piece is the same type used on ships of the late 1600's and early 1700's. The ship itself from which the firing weapons have been recovered is believed to be more than 100 feet in length.

Jenks also noted the items have no monetary value, but are highly significant historically.

M. V. Brewington of the Salem Maritime Museum, Salem, Mass., examined the swivel-gun and said it was used to fire at persons attempting to board ships and was not commonly used to fire at other ships. Authorities investigating the items include Jenks, Brewington, Howard I. Chapelle of the Smithsonian Institute, the Navy Historical Research department, Carl C. Cutler of Mystic, Conn. and the Mariners Museum of Norfolk, Virginia.

The large cannon found last week by Walter Hird, Jr. and David Conrad is presently wrapped in water soaked burlap at the Hird's North Beach summer cottage. It will later be transferred to the Portsmouth Naval Base from where it will be transported to Newport, R. I.

After undergoing treatment to preserve it the cannon will be taken to the Traxunt Deatur Museum in Washington. According to Jenks, the items will be shared on a 50-50 basis with the boys who discovered the wreckage. The swivel-gun, after being treated with preservatives, will be returned to the boys unless they permit it to be loaned to marine museums which, Jenks said have already asked to exhibit it.

Harold Fernald of the local Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Society said this week, he would endeavor to talk with the boys about the possibility of having the prize exhibited at Hampton's new Tuck Memorial Museum. Already rich in articles recovered from the Hampton area which are highly significant historically,

the new addition increasing the size of the Tuck Museum will be dedicated Saturday at Old Home Day services. Other organizations already interested in exhibiting the items include the Salem Maritime Museum, the Smithsonian Institute, the Navy and the Mariner's Museum.

The Coast Guard station at Hampton Beach, at the request of the Navy, assisted in the recovery of the most items last Saturday. Skindivers placed the items aboard the Coast Guard boat which brought them ashore.

The original items consisting of a cannon barrel eight feet in length and weighing nearly a ton, two grind stone wheels,

a wooden pulley and cannon balls were brought ashore by the boys and their friends and relatives entirely on their own last week.

Other items found included timbers believed to be off a wreck. They were put together with wooden pegs indicating the items dated back to the colonial period.
