Judging is based on the same system as that used in the Miss Hampton Beach contest, modified from that of the Miss Universe contest. Following two to three rounds of elimination in which the judges pick the girls who won't return in following rounds, a point system is used whereby each girl may accumulate points over the final two to three rounds. Judging is based not only on over all form, but poise, personality and face. There are no talent requirements.

Judges for these annual affairs come from all walks of life and from all sections of New England. They are not named until just prior to each contest.

Several of the girls have used the Miss New England contest as a stepping stone to

gain wins in the more cherished Miss Hampton Beach affair. Among these were Sally Ann Freedman, Sandie Kay and the present Miss Hampton Beach title holder, Miss Jonnye McLeod. No Hampton girl has ever won this contest although Beverly Brindamour Hollingworth copped the Miss Sea Nymph title in 1954.

Expected to be on hand to relinquish her crown is Sylvia Gustavson. Miss Hampton Beach, Jonnye McLeod of Hampton, will also participate in the program.

Production will again be under the direction of Henry Hamel of the chamber of commerce with William Elliot serving as master of ceremonies.

Bay State Brunette Crowned Miss New England At Beach



In colorful ceremonies at the Casino Ballroom last night, Miss Louise Ann Richardson of Georgetown, Mass., became Miss New England of 1962. She was chosen from a bevy of 33 beautiful contestants.

The new Miss New England is 17 years of age, five foot four inches tall and weighs 115 lbs. A vivacious blue-eyed brunette, she captivated the audience with her winning personality. No stranger to local beauty contests, she was runner-up in the recent Miss Hampton Beach contest and placed third in the New England contest last year. Her sponsor was the Springfield Hotel.

Miss Nancy Jean Brackett, sponsored by the Rice Dudley department store, was the first runner-up. From Brighton, Mass., she is 16 years of age, five foot five inches in height, and weighs 123 lbs. A pert blonde with a winning smile, her measurements read 36-23-35.

Placing in the 2nd runner-up spot was Miss Su Su Smith of Newton Upper Falls, Mass. Sponsored by the Casino Ballroom, she is a five foot seven inch brunette weighing 125 lbs. Dimensions are 37-23-37. She is 21 years old and was a runner-up in the Miss New England contest last year.

Contestants this year included girls from all of the New England states, with Massachusetts copping all three wins. Of the 41 girls registered only 33 were able to make the final contest. Hampton's own Martha Wiggins, third place winner in the Hampton Beach contest was unable to attend because of illness.

Judges included A. Russell Didsbury, travel editor of the Providence, Rhode Island journals; John L. Coughlin, advertising director of the Hartford, Connecticut Courant; Daniel F. Martin, Springfield newspaper ad representative in this area; Sally Ann Freedman, former Miss Hampton Beach, Miss Massachusetts, Miss Boat O Rama and a contestant in the Miss Universe pageant from Mass. and John O'Malley, travel sales engineer for the Boston Herald. Tellers were Wayne Elliot and Wilson Dennett, local public accountant.

Hearing Held On Sight-Seeing Service

A decision on the application of LeRoy Leonard for authority to operate a sight-seeing common carrier route between Hampton Beach and New Castle is expected in the very near future. The future of the possible sight-seeing service along the New Hampshire coastline will depend upon the outcome of a hearing held by the N. H. Public Utilities Commission at Hampton Beach Monday afternoon.

The hearing, running into a lengthy three hours, covered all phases of the project as proposed by Mr. Leonard. Approximately 25 persons were in attendance to listen to the testimony offered by the many witnesses.

The type of sight-seeing service as proposed by Mr. Leonard was strongly supported by many beach businessmen as well as town officials. Only three persons, all called to testify as witnesses by Atty. George R. Scammon, Exeter, representing the Marshall Transportation Co., were in opposition to such a service.

Approving the service, feeling it was "unique" and would definitely provide another attraction, especially for older persons visiting the beach, were William Elliot of the chamber of commerce, Fred Gagne, chairman of the precinct commission, Pat Fuller, James F. Fallon, Jr., Noel Salomon, chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Ralph Moulton, Rep. Douglass Hunter, Rep. Herbert Casassa and John Dineen.

Atty. Lindsey R. Brigham of Portsmouth served as counsel for Mr. Leonard. Through questioning during the session it was learned that Mr. Leonard felt the proposed service would offer a method for persons who came to the area by bus and train to "get a good look at the seacoast area." It would also afford elderly persons the opportunity to sit down for a short time.

Original plans to have the route pass through Portsmouth so passengers may view some of the historical houses were abandoned, at least for this year. Mr. Leonard gave as a reason for this, that arrangements had not as yet been completed with the Portsmouth Chamber of Commerce. It was also stated that if the proposal was approved by the Public Utilities Commission, runs would probably be made Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week for the remainder of the season.

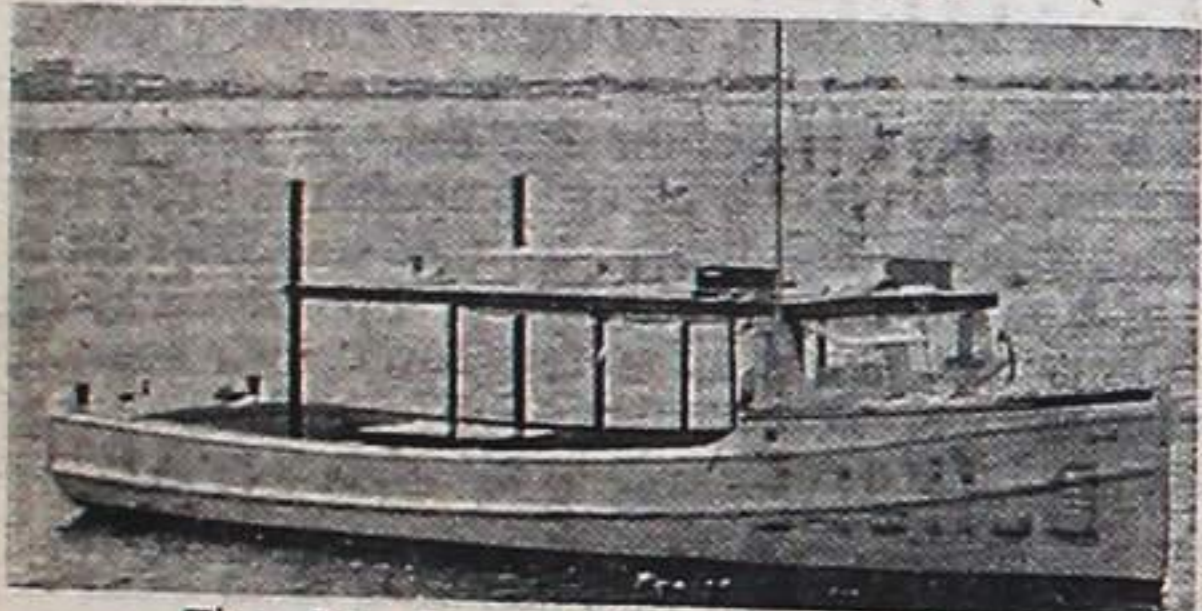

This year's affair will be billed as a family fashion show with men's, women's, and children's clothes being modeled. Also highlighted will be bridal outfits and clothes for all occasions.

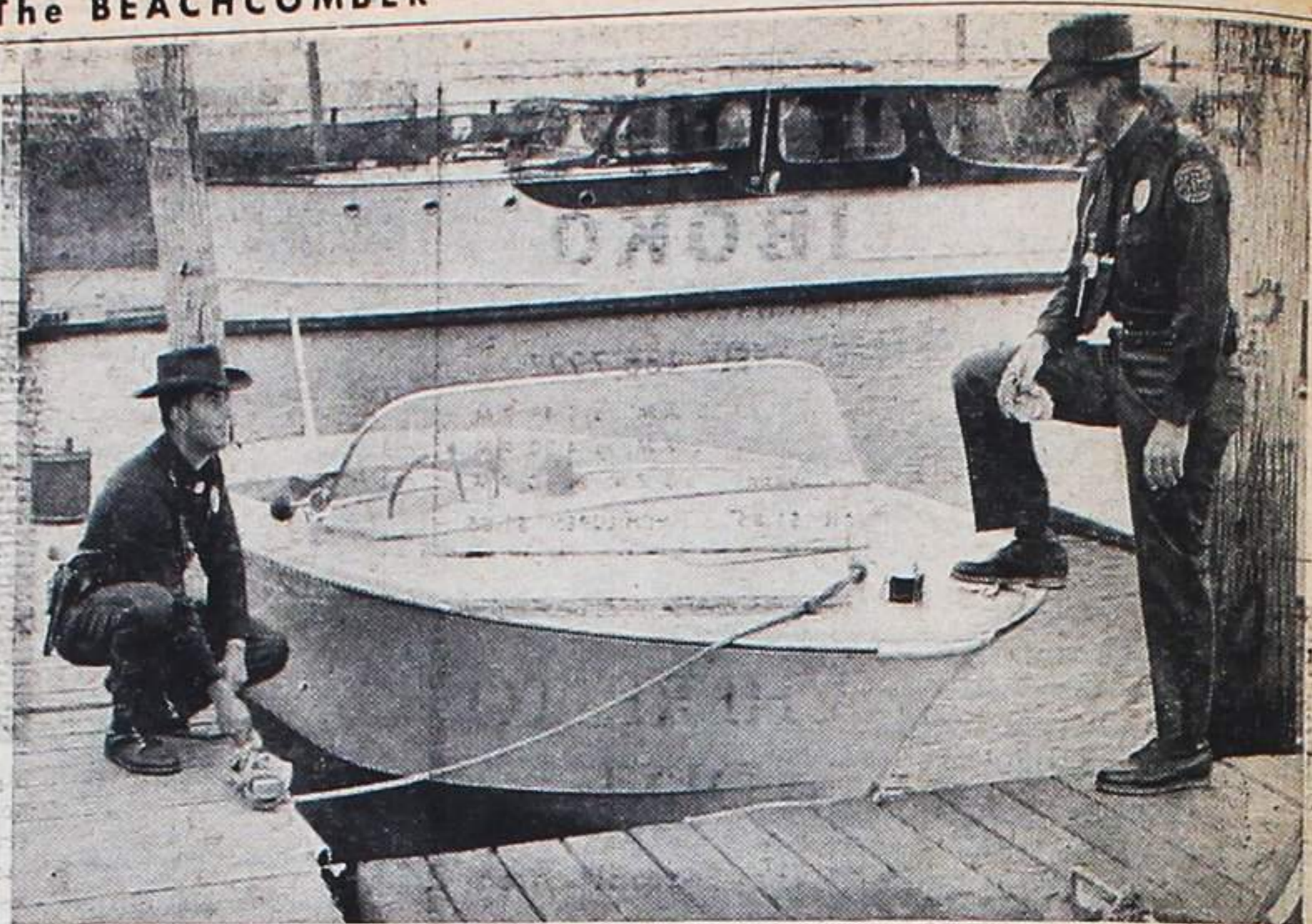
Merchants participating in the show will be The Smart Shop and Randall's of Hampton Beach, Vanity Case of

Beach Precinct Property Valuation Set At \$8,671,479

Beach property owners will be faced with a tax increase of five dollars per thousand of valuation this year. The new tax rate was set today at \$65 per thousand. Town Manager Kenneth Boehner met with state Tax Commission officials this morning and verified the new figure.

The Hampton selectmen only last week completed the annual assessing of property and came up with a new record high valuation of \$20,802,849. Veteran's exemptions were set at \$495,000 making for a net valuation of \$20,307,849.

At the same time, Town Manager Boehner said Hampton Beach Village Precinct valuation figures had been set at \$8,671,479. The precinct tax for 1962 has been set at \$4.80 — an increase of 70 cents over the '61 rate of \$4.10 based on expenditures totalling \$41,623.10.

Despite the record high valuation, the increase in the tax rate was attributed in main to three major expenditures as voted by Hampton citizens during the past year. These consisted of the sewer bond issue for the million dollar sewer project now underway, the addition to the Hampton Academy and Junior High school and funds appropriated for Hampton Harbor improvement.

The 1962 tax rate is based upon net budget expenditures for all purposes totalling \$1,320,010.18. The breakdown as approved by the state Tax Commission this morning follows: town expenses, \$553,613.; Hampton school district, \$440,270.15; Cooperative school district, \$253,942.94; county tax, \$72,183.36.

The 1962 valuation figure, as submitted to the State Tax Commission for tax rate purposes, represents an increase of \$1,189,931 over last year. Principal increases in property assessments were reported from factory buildings and machinery which jumped from \$22,300 last year to \$142,700 for 1962 and a large increase in stock-in-trade valuations from \$350,476 in 1961 to \$624,000 for the current year.

A turn away crowd was on hand to board the bus for the trip which was given free of charge to the first 24 persons on board. The tour began at the chamber of commerce office and covered Route 1-A and some of the back roads to New Castle.

Awaiting a certificate from the Public Utilities Commission for permission to operate a sight-seeing service after a public hearing held earlier this week, Mr. Leonard made the first run last week on a trial basis through the compliments of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce. If permission is granted for a permanent route, Mr. Leonard plans a regular once a week morning trip along the seacoast and into Portsmouth. Plans are to leave the chamber of commerce-Casino area at approximately 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday mornings.

The planned route, as submitted to the Public Utilities Commission, would consist of conducted tours of the Fuller Gardens, Rye Beach, Rye Harbor, Wallis Sands, Wentworth-By-The-Sea, Fort Constitution, Newcastle, the Gov. John Langdon House and other historic spots along the route.

The first trip, endorsed by the chamber of commerce as another needed attraction to the area, was highly successful. Taking the first ride were oldsters and youngsters alike.

Pollock, Cod Catches Tops With Old Salts

Two fishermen caught haddock while fishing from an Al Gauron boat, and making a catch of a 6-lb. haddock was Edward J. Wilusz of Manchester. Frank Callagher of Stoneham, Mass. boated a 4 1/2-lb. haddock to complete the list of new members for the week.

Five Craft Aided By Coast Guard Crews

Potter searched the harbors and waters in the area. The search was later called off when the sloop docked at Plymouth harbor.

The Coast Guard also rescued a man from a 17-foot outboard pleasure craft which went aground Sunday on the Hampton River flats. Donald P. Han-

cock, North Reading, Mass., was taken from the craft which was later towed to Littlefield's landing on the Seabrook side of Hampton River. Assisting in this rescue were Chief Andrew J. Pratt, BM/2 William Lockard, SNBM Richard P. Crowley and SN Kenneth H. Clayton.

The Coast Guard were also called to assist Hampton police Captain Lloyd Ring when his motorboat became grounded in Hampton River. Capt. Ring was piloting his 16-foot craft in the river at 8 p.m. when it ran aground on a sand bar off the North Bay beacon near the river's entrance.

The Miss Irene, a party boat owned by the Littlefield party boat firm of Seabrook, was towed to shore last week after equipment failed at the mouth of Hampton river.

The 24-foot boat owned by Robert Madison, North Amherst road, Bedford, Mass. broke down when its propeller became entangled in lobster buoys near the Hampton ledges, five miles off Hampton Beach. The Coast Guard towed the craft to Hampton Harbor.

Plans Being Readied For Proposed New Police Station

In a reversal of previous reports, Town Manager Kenneth Boehner this week said Mr. Russell Peirce of Newburyport has started work on preliminary plans and sketches for a proposed police station at Hampton Beach.

Approximately a month ago it was stated through Mr. Boehner and Planning Board representatives that sketches and plans for an uptown station would be prepared first with the hopes of presenting them to voters at a special town meeting soon after Labor Day.

Mr. Peirce was in town last week to discuss necessary requirements and needs for new police facilities with town officials and Chief John Roden. A tour was made of the proposed areas for possible construction of a station or stations at Hampton and at Hampton Beach.

Mr. Boehner said the plans for a beach station call for it to be located in the town parking lot, adjacent to the beach fire station. The town manager also said plans for an uptown station would be drawn following completion of plans for the beach facility.

At the same time, Mr. Boehner said although the figures submitted by a local building mover on the possible moving of the beach station have not, as yet, been submitted to the Planning Board, it would seem highly inadvisable. During last week's discussion, figures of \$14 to \$15 per square foot were estimated for possible new construction. Size of the beach station has been mentioned as approximately 40 x 60 feet.

During the discussion, consideration was given for separate facilities for persons involved in felonious crimes, drunkenness and juvenile delinquency. The beach station would be strictly a functional building needed for summer use, according to Mr. Boehner.

'Father Of The Bride' Is Family Type Comedy

Most every American of ambulatory age has at some time or other been connected with the basic ceremony that unites a man and woman under our social laws. The wedding is here to stay. Thus everyone in the audience at the Hampton Playhouse this week for the production, "Father Of The Bride" will have no trouble putting themselves into the play. We have all been through it and it is lots of fun to view the many faceted problems of the wedding from the outside. Then it seems funny!

This delightfully amusing play picks up the story at a Sunday morning breakfast when the "engagement" bomb is dropped in the middle of the table, frolics through the confusion of pre-nuptial arrangements, and climaxes with the tender moment before father and daughter leave for the church.

Unquestionably, all brides are beautiful because beauty is an aura and not a combination of just so many physical characteristics. Susan Hesse brings a loveliness and charm and sweetness to the bride's role before she is ever seen into a wedding gown—but in full array before she departs for the church, Miss Hesse literally leaves the audience breathless, proving it is possible to gild a lily.

As the confused—and bewildered—father of the bride, Richard Kennedy combines his versatile talents for both comedy and serious acting to produce a highly amusing and at the same time sympathetic character who gives his wife, ably portrayed by Katherine Helmond; and his two sons played by Eric Shugaar and Burleigh Booker a chance to produce the entertaining contrast. Eric Shugaar, in his first supporting role at the Hampton Playhouse, presaged a real future on the stage with his excellent characterization of Tommy.

William Douglas brought off a fine portrayal of the bridegroom when he found himself alone and almost helpless on the male side of the wedding ceremony under the steam rolling of women.

Great strength was added to the performance by using star players in minor roles. Betty Bright, who takes over the lead in next week's play, gave a superb performance in the role of Miss Bellamy. In addition, some hilarious comedy was generated by Dennis Drew and Ian Sullivan, as Mr. Massoula and Joe. It gave the play tremendous balance in the bit parts.

The rest of the large cast was composed of Frances Isbell, Pat O'Riordan, Rex Tackae, Murph Berry, Mary Ellen Weber, Paul Rosen, David Huston, Leslie Hunkins and one local thespian, Debbie Green.

"Father of the Bride" is a family play which is entertaining for all ages that provides theatre goers with an evening of a musement and tenderness in which they will have no trouble projecting themselves. The staggering realization that a daughter is old enough to be married—the doubts about the groom—the headaches of the guest list—the duplication of wedding gifts—the staggering cost of marrying off a daughter—and all the other problems of the bride that have brushed our own lives.

Take the clever script of

"Father Of The Bride" gives it a good strong cast from top to bottom—play it against one of David Hustons colorful and decorative stage settings—and place the directing in the capable hands of Alfred Christie and it becomes obvious that the Hampton Playhouse has come through with another winner.

No sex—no violence—no four letter words—just a down to earth comedy which a complete cross-section of theatre goers can find satisfying and entertaining. It is highly recommended for one and all.

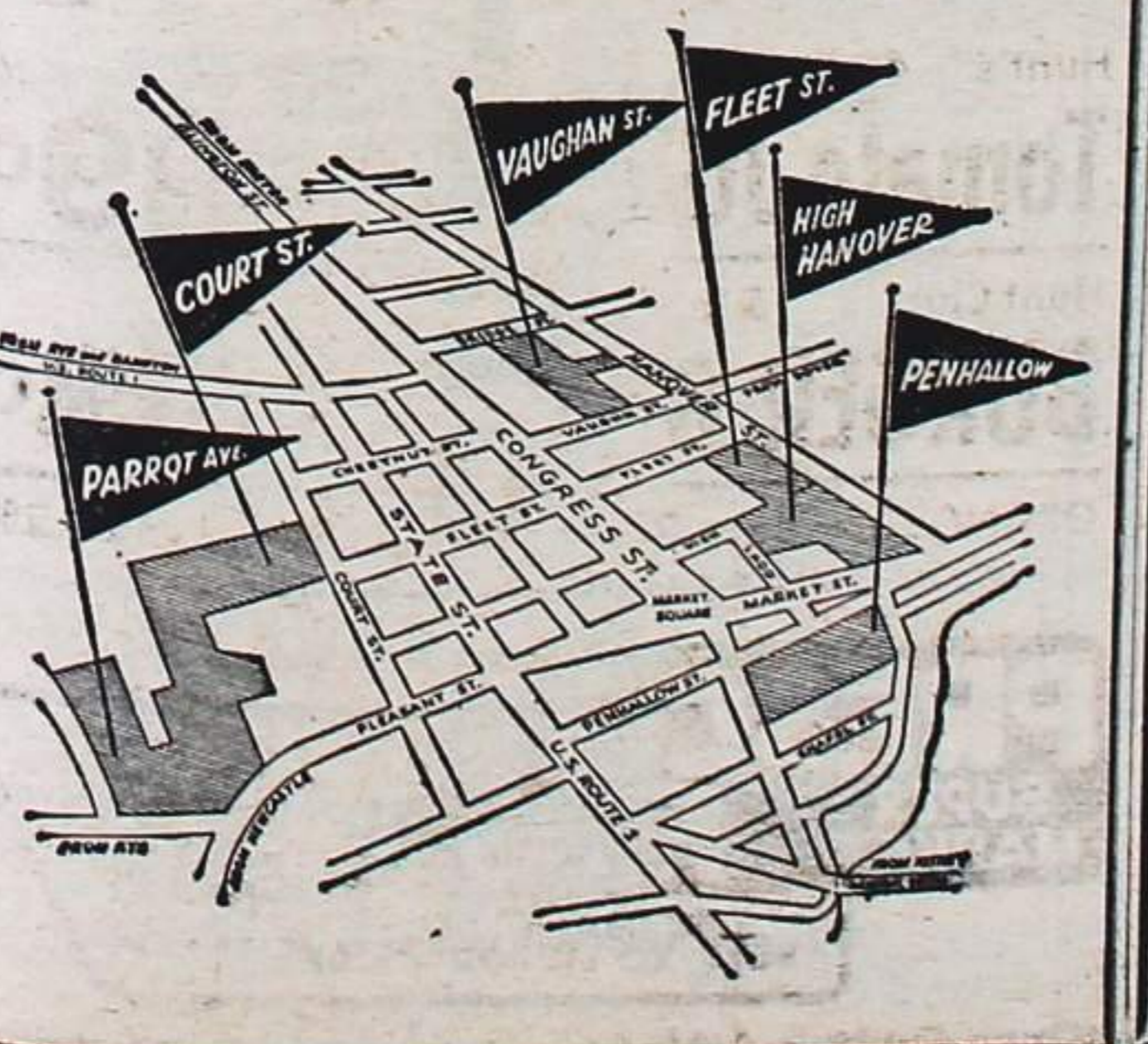



Beach Expressway Section Out To Bid

Bids advertisements for the third section of the Exeter-Hampton Beach expressway have been released by the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.

This phase of the bidding is for construction of the section of roadway beginning just west of Interstate 95 and running southeasterly for two miles to its future connection with U. S. Route 1.

Plans now call for reinforced concrete slab, steel beam bridges to be built, carrying Route 101-C (Exeter road) and Trole road over the expressway. An interchange will also be constructed with Route 101-C at the Hampton turnpike plaza.

Work on the new beach route consisting of approximately seven miles of new roadway began last December when the first contract for 3½ miles of

construction from the termination of the Exeter by-pass to the turnpike was let to R. G. Watkins and Son, Inc. of Amesbury, Mass., for \$996,638.

In April, the eight-span bridge over Interstate 95 was placed under contract to Constructors Inc. of Lexington, Mass., for \$247,767.

Following the receipt of bids on the third phase of the pro-

ject, two sections of the expressway will remain to be completed. This includes construction of an interchange with U. S. Route 1 and one and one-half miles of roadway east from the interchange to Hampton Beach. Both should be under contract by fall.

The Lafayette road interchange portion includes extension from the last 500 feet of

Drakeside road to a point in back of Winnacunnet High school.

Approximately 70 per cent of the excavation work in the first phase of the project has been completed. The crews have been excavating swamp mud and backfilling approximately a mile beyond the site of the Route 101-D overpass.

The Guinea road overpass,

126 feet in length, is 80 per cent completed with the steel having been erected and the deck work already started. This portion of the project is expected to be completed in Sept.

Mr. Russell Stanley, supervisor for the Marshall Transportation Co., gave a detailed account of that company's service now offered between Portsmouth and Hampton Beach. He also told of a new excursion route running from Hampton Beach to Kittery and York, Maine recently started by the Marshall Transportation Company.

Following the hearing at the Hampton Beach Community Hall, the members of the Public Utilities Commission, along with others who took part in the hearing, were given the opportunity to view first hand evidence when they were given a ride on the Busmobile by Mr. Leonard.

No Word Received On Sewer Mains Permit
No further word has been received in regard to the construction of the new sewer lines southerly on Ocean boulevard.

No Federal Aid Seen In Mosquito Battle

Dr. Richard O. Hayes, Public Health Service entomologist, told state and area officials at a meeting in Concord last week he was doubtful a federal grant could be obtained to battle mosquitos in the seacoast area. At the same time, he said he didn't feel it would be absolutely necessary. He felt the best plan would be to have the State Legislature put up matching funds with area towns.

Dr. Hayes felt a meeting with Cape Cod and South Shore officials in Massachusetts would be highly beneficial because these areas recently had a mosquito problem serious enough to hurt the area economy until control projects were instituted. After hiring consultants, the Cape Cod-South Shore people started a program of ditching, diking and flooding which was apparently effective.

The meeting, if held, probably won't take place until after Labor Day.

Representing the seacoast area at the Concord meeting yesterday were Thomas Allen, Rye, a member of the Southeast Mosquito Control project; State Rep. Elizabeth Greene, Rye, and Governor's Councilor Andrew Jarvis, Portsmouth.

Others present included James J. Barry, state health and welfare commissioner, who set up the meeting; Dr. Mary M. Atchinson, acting director of the State Public Health Service; William Healy, director of the Bureau of Sanitary Engineering; and Gilman Crowell, chief of the Bureau of Food and Chemistry.
