The annual highlight of the summer season at Hampton Beach, Mardi Gras week, will commence Saturday morning, August 18, at 10:30 a.m. with an antique automobile exhibition on the boulevard in front of the Casino.

Throughout the week until the grand climax, the Coronation Ball on Friday evening, August 24, a complete program of events has been arranged by the Hampton Beach Village Precinct Commissioners, Hotel Association members and the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce.

August 22 — Star vaudeville act at 2 p.m.; parade of horrors, 3 p.m.; vaudeville acts at 7 p.m.; giant fireworks display at 9:30 p.m.

August 23 — Sand castle contest at 9:30 a.m.; children's parade at 2 p.m.; prize awards at 2:30 p.m.; crowning of Jr. Miss Hampton Beach of 1962, 2:30 p.m.; free ice cream if under 12 years of age to be given away at the playground at 3:30 p.m.; vaudeville acts at 4 and 7 p.m.

August 24 — Coronation Ball at 8:30 p.m. from the Casino ballroom.

August 27 — Finals of talent show contests, 7:30 p.m., bandstand.

**No Federal Aid Seen In Mosquito Battle**

Dr. Richard O. Hayes, Public Health Service entomologist, told state and area officials at a meeting in Concord last week he was doubtful a federal grant could be obtained to battle mosquitos in the seacoast area. At the same time, he said he didn't feel it would be absolutely necessary. He felt the best plan would be to have the State Legislature put up matching funds with area towns.

Dr. Hayes felt a meeting with Cape Cod and South Shore officials in Massachusetts would be highly beneficial because these areas recently had a mosquito problem serious enough to hurt the area economy until control projects were instituted. After hiring consultants, the Cape Cod-South Shore people started a program of ditching, diking and flooding which was apparently effective.

The meeting, if held, probably won't take place until after Labor Day.

Representing the seacoast area at the Concord meeting yesterday were Thomas Allen, Rye, a member of the Southeast Mosquito Control project; State Rep. Elizabeth Greene, Rye, and Governor's Councilor Andrew Jarvis, Portsmouth.

Others present included James J. Barry, state health and welfare commissioner, who set up the meeting; Dr. Mary M. Atchinson, acting director of the State Public Health Service; William Healy, director of the Bureau of Sanitary Engineering; and Gilman Crowell, chief of the Bureau of Food and Chemistry.

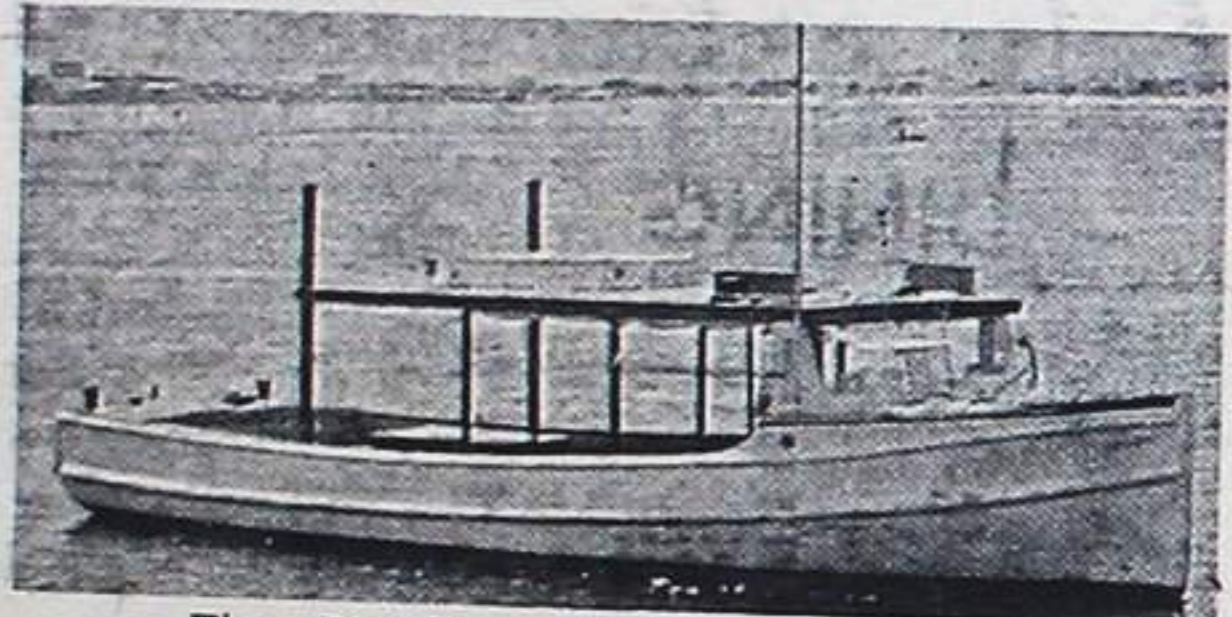

## Beach Businessman Dies In Bay State

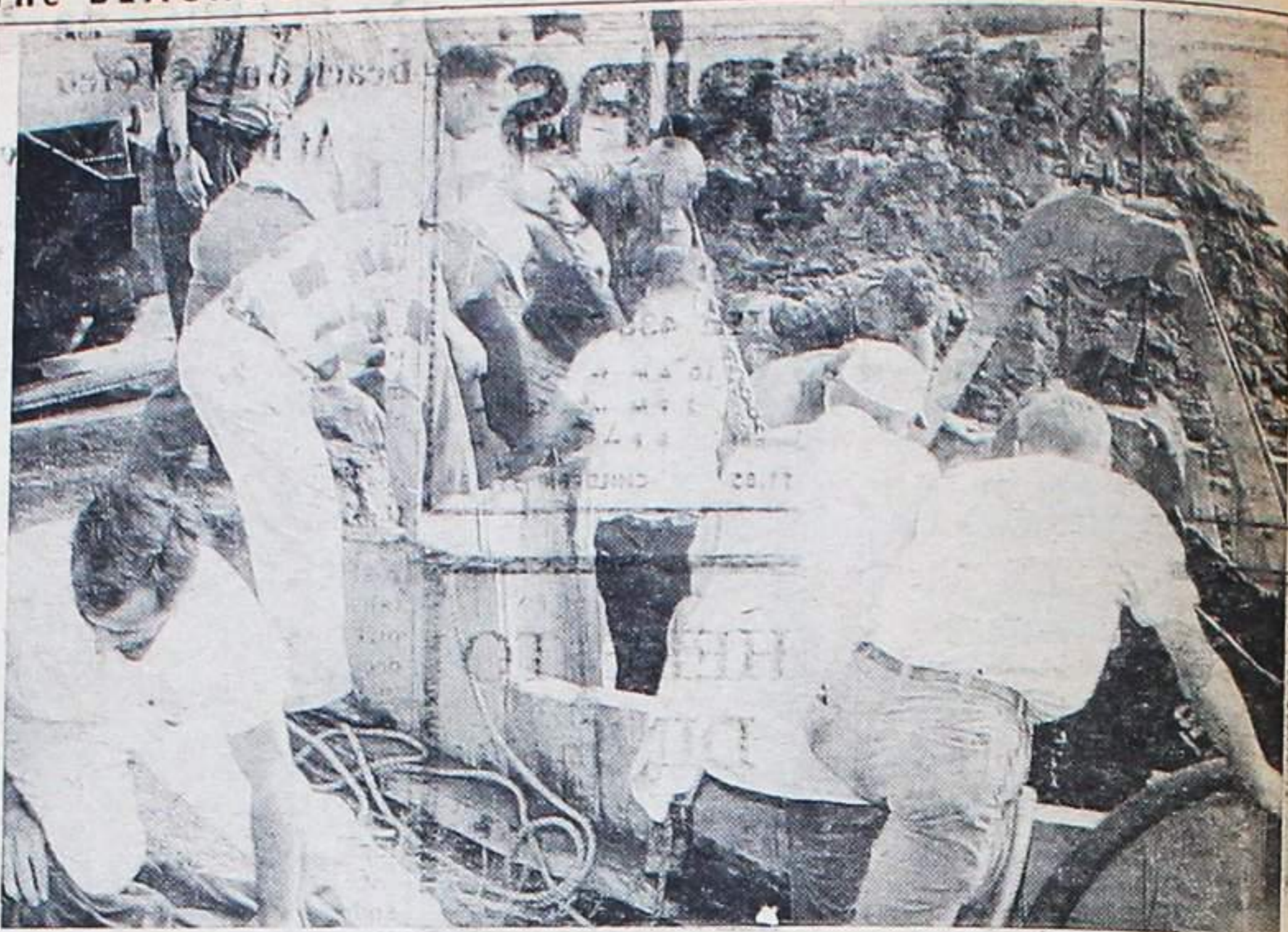

Mr. Walsh had been a co-owner with John E. Hines of several business enterprises in Massachusetts and at Hampton Beach, where they operated an amusement concession and Cuddy's Drug Store at one time. He had been an honorary member of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce until his retirement a few years ago.

ers of 25 pieces from Dover, Golden Eagles Drum and Bugle Corps, 60 piece New Hampshire Junior State champions from Portsmouth, Sacred Heart Band of 110 pieces from Lowell, Mass., the all girl Saugus Blue Bells Highland Pipe Band of 27 pieces from Saugus, Mass. and the Hampton Beach concert band.

Taking part from Hampton's Fire department was the Chief's car driven by Winthrop Hart, Rescue Unit I, driven by Richard Swain, Engine II, driven by Henry LaDuke, Engine IV, driven by Howard Stickey, Ladder I, driven by Mike Linn and Tank I, driven by Bruce Horne.

The winning entry in the antique exhibition was a 1906 touring car entered and driven by Clyde Roberts. Mr. Roberts had worked on the vehicle for approximately 15 years in perfecting it.

Top place honors awarded in competition for the best float in the merchants division went to the Casino Beauty shop operated by Marguerite Maguire.

The winning entry in the Hotel association float competition was that of the Deerfield cottage of 9 J street, owned by Mrs. Loretta Stickle.

### Noise Curb Sought At Beach

Hampton's board of selectmen last Friday handed down a decision in regard to a request for the possible regulation of opening and closing hours at town and beach eating establishments and restaurants. In lieu of passing an ordinance for the present, the selectmen are asking for cooperation on a voluntary basis.

Proprietors are being asked to curb undue noises which might arise from juke boxes, public address systems or radios between the hours of midnight and 7 a.m. The selectmen, for the time being, have not set up an ordinance regulating such action. The request has been put on a strictly voluntary basis.

Town Manager Kenneth Boehner said the board felt if this action was taken by proprietors of the restaurants and eating establishments by shutting off juke boxes, public address systems and radios, during the hours mentioned, less over-all disturbances will be noticed. Mr. Boehner also said much of the noise had been arising from kitchens. This, too, could be controlled on a voluntary basis although it was not included in the decision as made by the board.

At the same time, the selectmen said they realized the need for some eating establishments and restaurants to remain open after midnight, particularly during the summer season. However, the board served notice that unless complete cooperation was received from the proprietors of the restaurants and eating establishments, it would have no other alternative than to establish an ordinance regulating opening and closing hours prior to the 1963 summer season.

The board said it recognized the need for quietness during the established hours for those persons desiring to sleep. Mr. Boehner said if the disturbances continue as in the past and the

voluntary request is not complied with, then an ordinance will undoubtedly have to be established.

Under the ordinances now stated in the Revised Statutes, Annotated, persons creating such undue noise from juke boxes, public address systems and the like could be charged with a public nuisance count.

Richard Kennedy as the blustery and dumb muscle-man brings off another fine portrayal.

**Beach Rules For Safety**

Ordinances and regulations for Hampton Beach remain essentially the same as in past years. For the benefit of newcomers regulations to ensure the safety and pleasure of vacationists are in force as follows:

No person or organization is permitted on the beach between the hours of 1 a.m. and sunrise unless through a special permit issued by the chief of police.

The lighting of fires on the beach is prohibited.

The changing of clothes in cars in the beach area is prohibited.

Dogs and other pets are prohibited on the beach and in the water.

Ball playing and similar games may be permitted at the discretion of the lifeguards.

Inflatables are not permitted in the water at any time.

Missing persons should be immediately reported to the lifeguard on duty.

In matters of safety and orderliness, persons shall obey all requests made by the lifeguards.

Lifeguards will not assume parental responsibility for children left unattended by their parents or guardian.

Complaints should be addressed to the Town Manager, c/o Town Offices, Hampton.

Persons found violating any of the above regulations or ordinances shall be evicted from the beach and subject to a fine of not more than \$25. (Section 7, Chapter 219, RSA)

Ordinances at the state controlled area of the beach vary slightly and should be checked by visitors to those areas. Complaints should be addressed to Recreation Commission, Department of Resources and Economic Development, State House Annex, Concord, N. H.

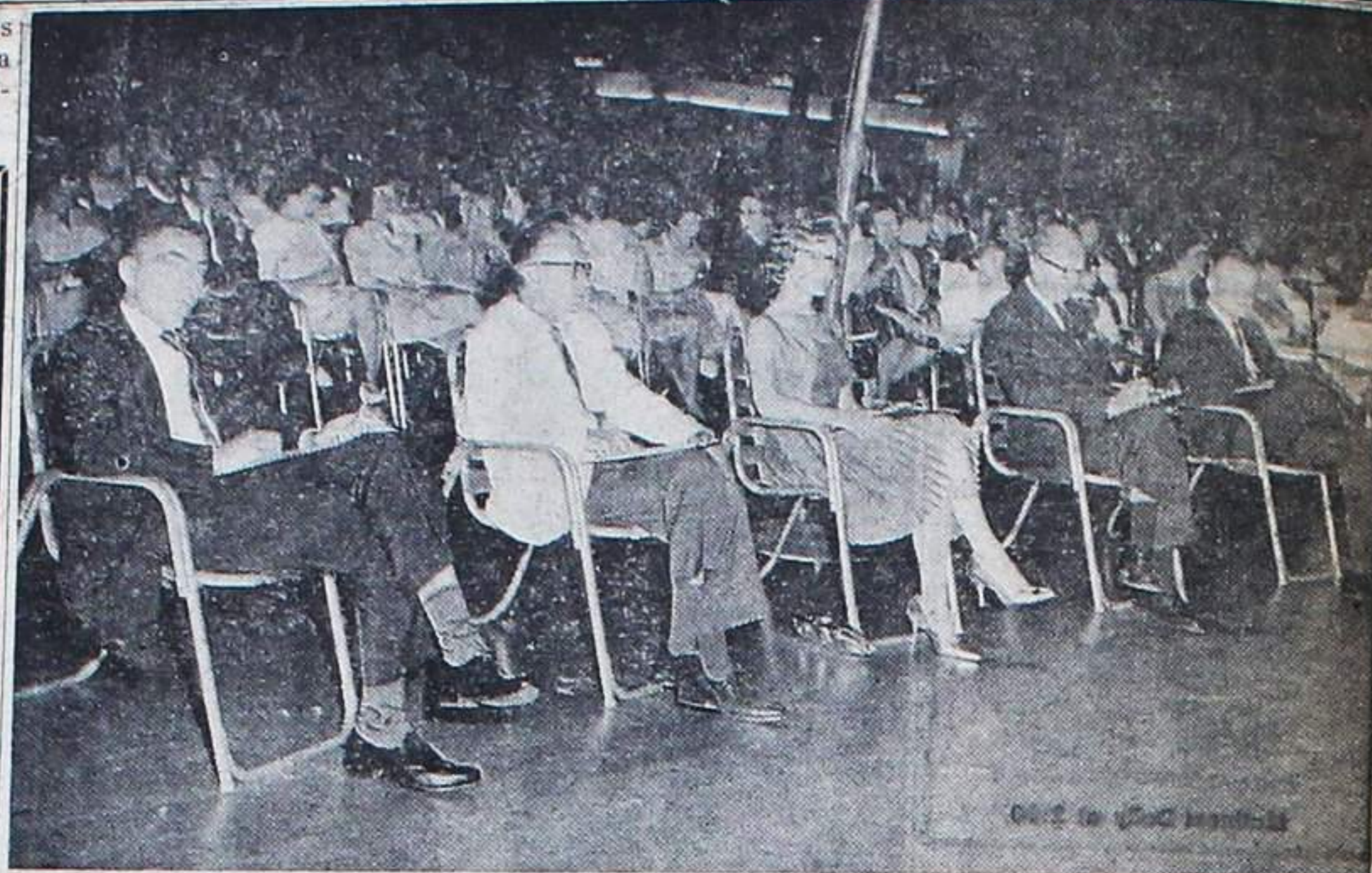

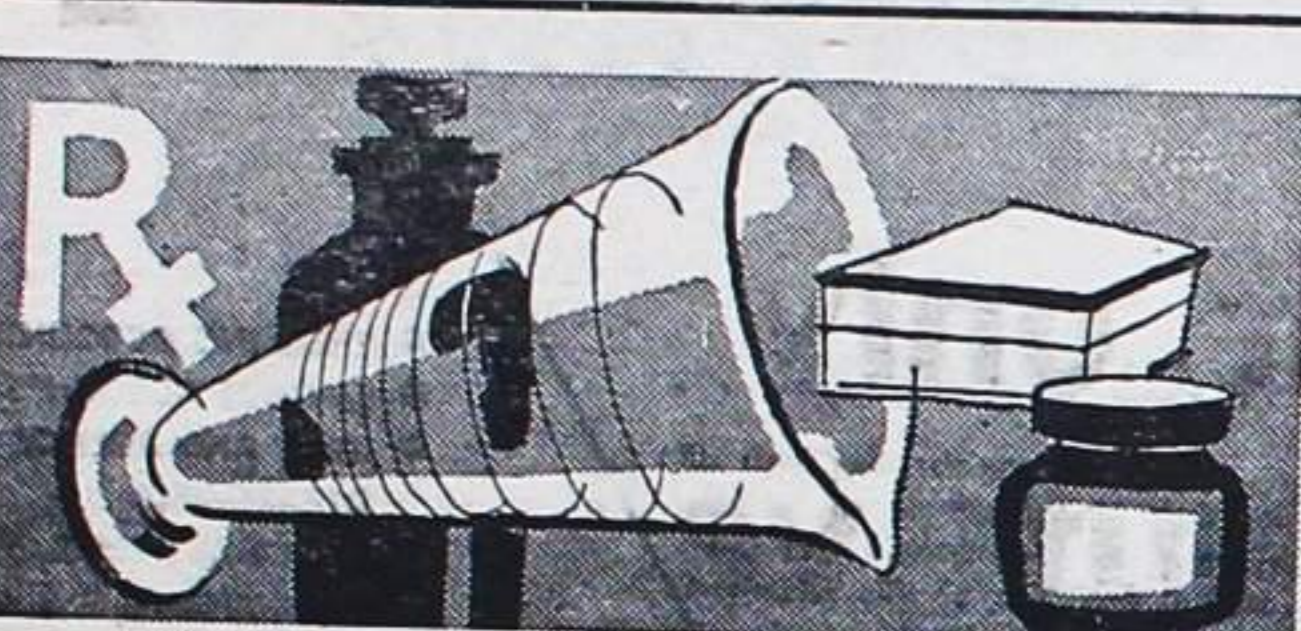

**Reward Offered In Power Cut-Off Case**

Exeter and Hampton Electric company officials this week offered a reward of \$100 to the person or persons offering information which would lead to the arrest of those who tampered with high voltage power equipment Saturday night.

Police and Manager Maynard MacLean of the electric company said someone apparently climbed the fence surrounding the large sub-station located at Shaw's bridge off Lafayette road. The power was shut off at 11:01 p.m., Saturday evening, August 18 by culprits who caused malicious damage. The entire section of Hampton Beach and portions of Hampton were without power until 11:50 p.m. when a portion of the area had electricity restored. Full power was gained at 11:53 p.m. following prompt action by electric company workmen.

Chief John Roden of the Hampton Police department said this week his department was working on the theory that someone definitely was familiar with the electrical set-up at the sub-station and the area or at least had a good knowledge of electricity.

Emergency power and electricity were supplied from the Hampton Beach fire station through the use of a civilian defense generator during the black-out. Police also reported one automobile accident during the power failure along with several acts of malicious mischief and vandalism throughout the beach area.

Anyone having information which will lead to the arrest and conviction of the guilty party should contact the Hampton police department or Exeter and Hampton Electric company officials.

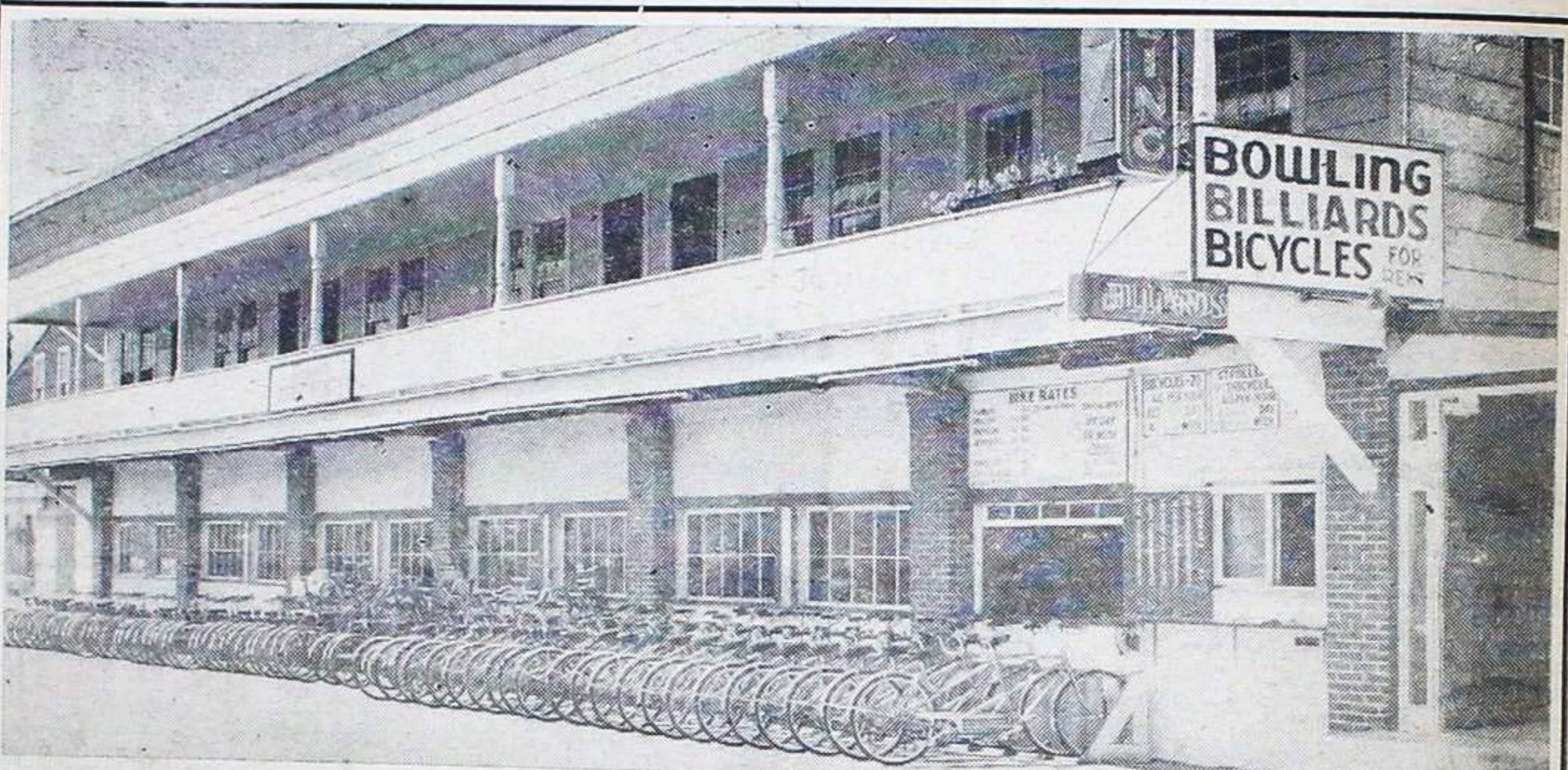
