

Reward Offered In Power Cut-Off Case

Exeter and Hampton Electric company officials this week offered a reward of \$100 to the person or persons offering information which would lead to the arrest of those who tampered with high voltage power equipment Saturday night.

Police and Manager Maynard MacLean of the electric company said someone apparently climbed the fence surrounding the large sub-station located at Shaw's bridge off Lafayette road. The power was shut off at 11:01 p.m., Saturday evening, August 18 by culprits who caused malicious damage. The entire section of Hampton Beach and portions of Hampton were without power until 11:50 p.m. when a portion of the area had electricity restored. Full power was gained at 11:53 p.m. following prompt action by electric company workmen.

Chief John Roden of the Hampton Police department said this week his department was working on the theory that someone definitely was familiar with the electrical set-up at the sub-station and the area or at least had a good knowledge of electricity.

Emergency power and electricity were supplied from the Hampton Beach fire station through the use of a civilian defense generator during the black-out. Police also reported one automobile accident during the power failure along with several acts of malicious mischief and vandalism throughout the beach area.

Anyone having information which will lead to the arrest and conviction of the guilty party should contact the Hampton police department or Exeter and Hampton Electric company officials.

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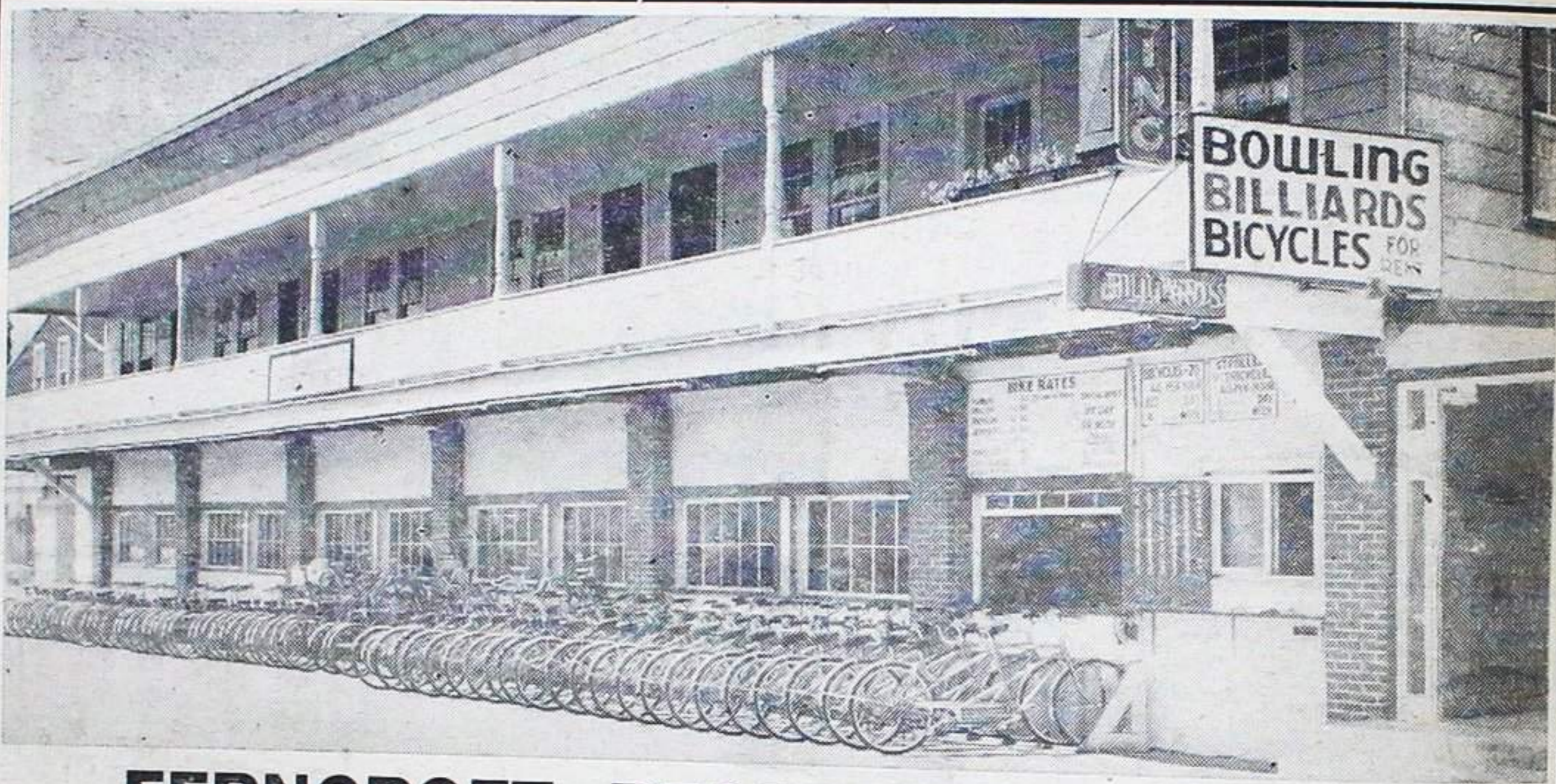

Hampton Beach Lifeguards
Take First In Swim Meet

Hampton Beach lifeguard Dave Stone, powered his way to a tremendous victory in the two mile free style swimming event, feature attraction of the annual Mardi Gras races, Saturday morning.

Stone's victory in 54 minutes by 10 to 15 feet over Tom Maguire swimming as an independent from Charleston, Mass., enabled the Hampton Beach lifeguards to completely overwhelm their Salisbury opponents in the annual dual between the two lifeguard squads.

Old man weather cooperated to the utmost for the races held off the police station Saturday morning. The water temperature was 61 degrees at race time and the sea was fairly calm with only a few ground swells. Head guard Dan Stone and his team of officials who manned the small meet boats and surf boards did an outstanding piece of work in handling the event.

By the time the two mile event got underway, however, the tide had gone out moving the quarter mile course closer to shore. The swimmers had to combat heavier ground swells and occasionally choppy water. Considering the distance covered by the swimmers, the margin of victory was extremely small. Stone, Maguire, and Bill Wentworth finished very close to each other amid the cheers of spectators on the deck of the lifeguard duck at the end of the course.

This year, special races were held for children. Parke MacCarthy copped both the 50-yard and 100-yard free style events. Close behind Parke in the 50-yard event was the meet's first girl to finish in the trophy and ribbon competition, Carol Feldman.

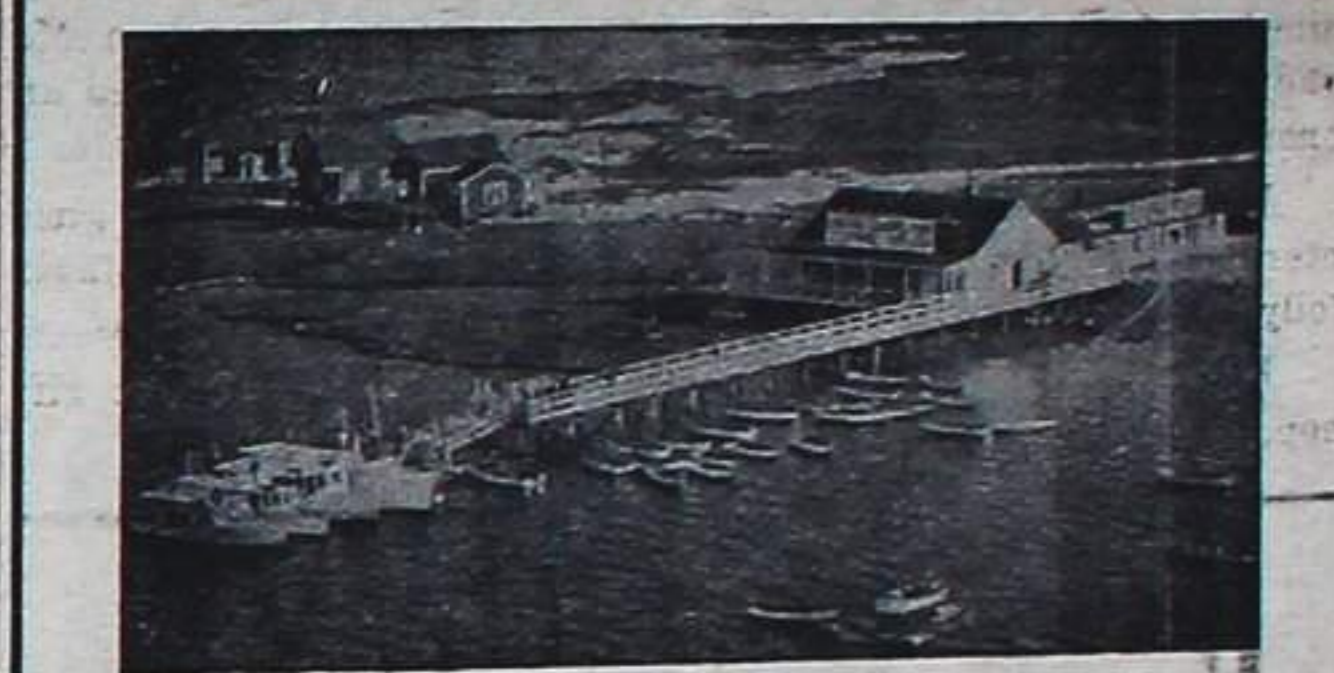

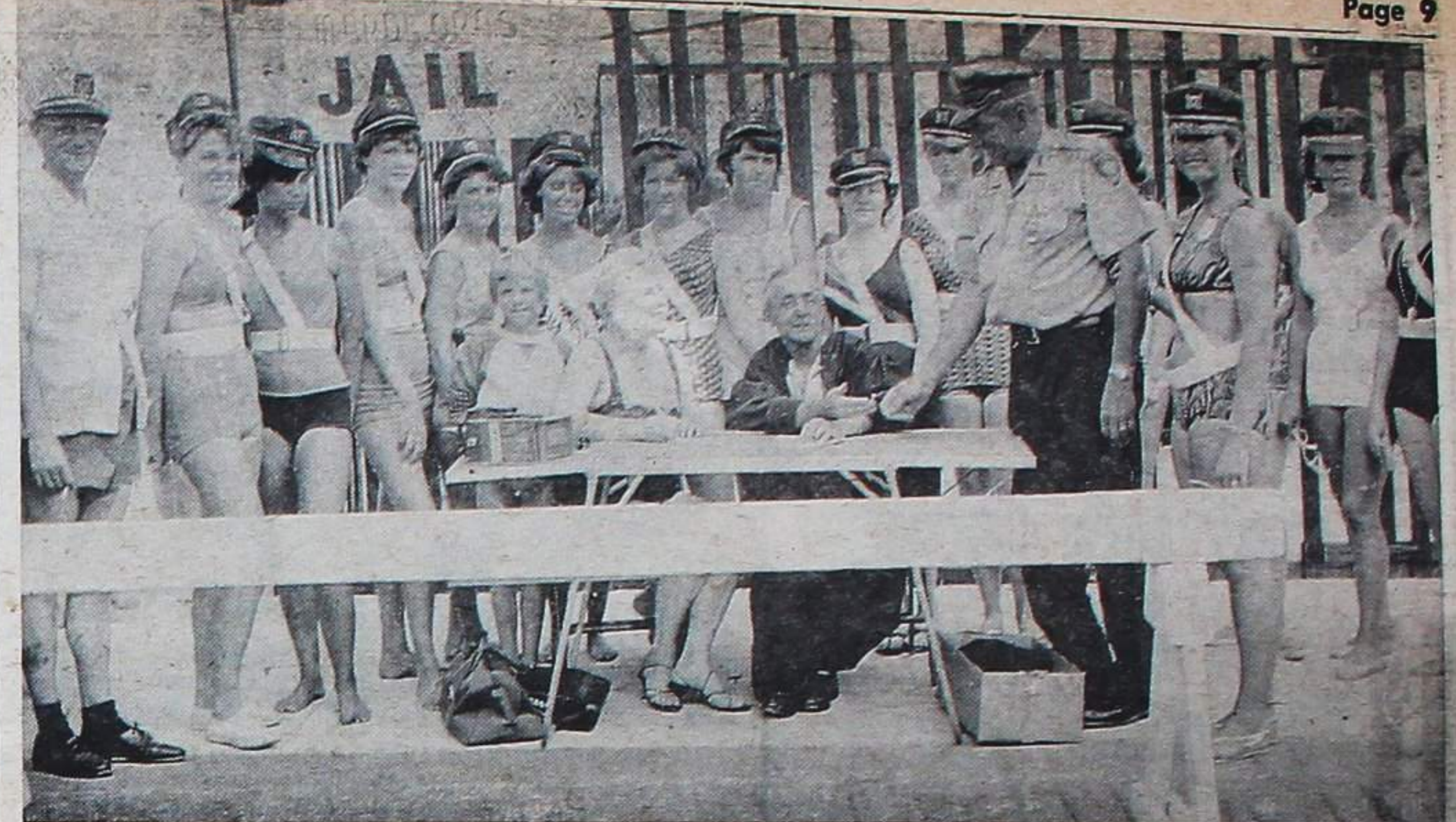

Beach Project Before Senate

A program to widen the beaches on the Atlantic coastline of New Hampshire is currently before the senate Public Works committee. Senator Norris Cotton (R-NH) reports there is little or no opposition to the program from other members of congress.
 The New Hampshire beach improvement program embraces New Castle, Rye, North Hampton and Seabrook.
 With an estimated total cost to be \$311,000, the state and towns involved will provide the major portion, or \$223,000, with the balance, \$88,000, coming from the federal government.
 The cost of the program breaks as follows: North Hampton — \$129,000 from state and local funds, \$41,000 from federal funds; Wallis Sands (Rye) — \$82,000 from state and town, \$41,000 from federal government; Hampton, \$12,000 from state and local, \$6,000 from federal government.
 Upon completion of the beach widening program, the federal government would pay \$16,700 annually toward the maintenance of the beaches for the first ten years. The state and towns would pay \$33,300. After ten years maintenance of the beaches would be solely up to the state and towns.

Beach Rules For Safety

Ordinances and regulations for Hampton Beach remain essentially the same as in past years. For the benefit of newcomers regulations to ensure the safety and pleasure of vacationists are in force as follows:
 No person or organization is permitted on the beach between the hours of 1 a.m. and sunrise unless through a special permit issued by the chief of police.
 The lighting of fires on the beach is prohibited.
 The changing of clothes in cars in the beach area is prohibited.
 Dogs and other pets are prohibited on the beach and in the water.
 Ball playing and similar games may be permitted at the discretion of the lifeguards.
 Inflatables are not permitted in the water at any time.
 Missing persons should be immediately reported to the lifeguard on duty.
 In matters of safety and orderliness, persons shall obey

Permission Granted For Sightseeing Bus

Mr. LeRoy Leonard, operator of the Busmobile at Hampton Beach during the summer months has been granted permission to operate a sightseeing service between Hampton Beach and New Castle next season. The decision was handed down by the New Hampshire Public Utilities commission following a lengthy hearing held at the beach approximately two weeks ago.
 The report of the commission states in part, ordered that LeRoy W. Leonard be, and hereby is, authorized to operate in the common carriage of passengers in round trip sightseeing service between the Hampton Beach Casino and New Castle, via New Hampshire Highway, Route No. 1-A, and unnumbered highway to the bridge north of Fort Constitution, and it is "further ordered that the service authorized herein shall be performed by a vehicle specially approved by the Commission and the Motor Vehicle department."
 Mr. Leonard said this week that plans are already being formulated along these lines. He is making arrangements to have a 49 passenger single unit sight-seeing bus in operation prior to next year. The open air effect will still be used as the new bus will be cut down to simulate the present Busmobile but the new unit will have protective-bar covering on the roof in the event of a roll over.
 The only request made by the commission is that Mr. Leonard must provide a single type unit with protective top covering rather than the tractor-trailer type unit now used as the Busmobile.

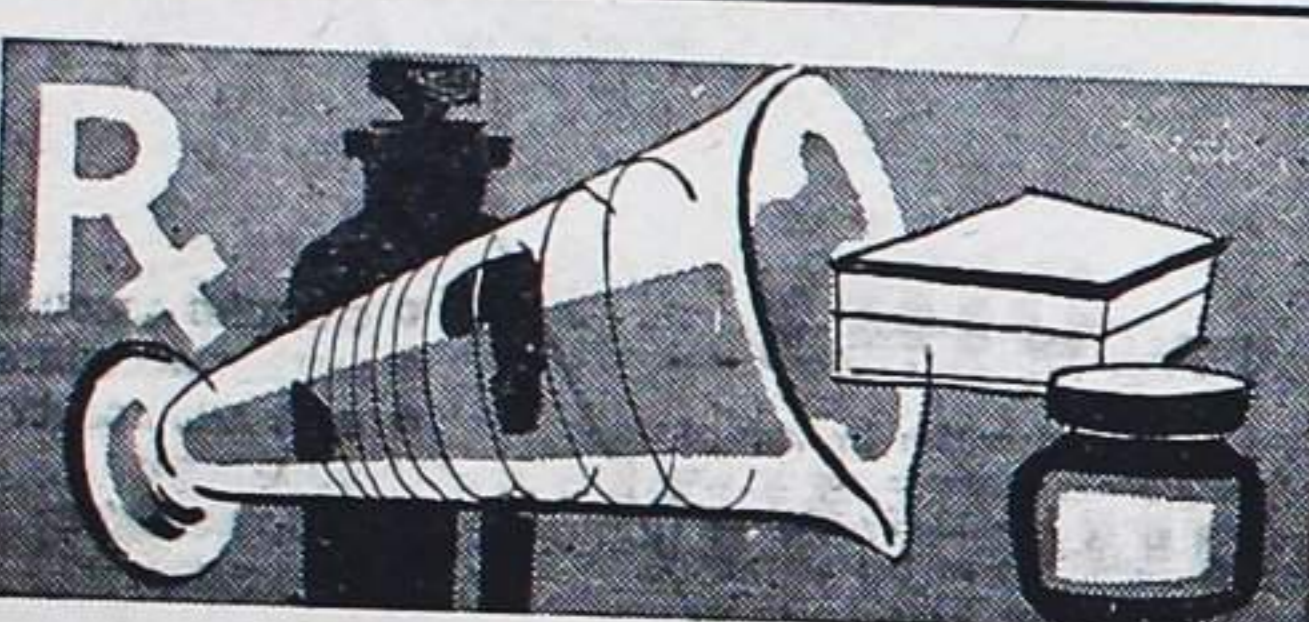

Beach Restaurant Owners Say Curfew 'Discriminatory'

John P. Dunfee of Lamie's Tavern and Dunfee's restaurant at Hampton Beach stated today that he had been contacted by numerous restaurant owners on Hampton Beach concerning the recent curfew decision of the Board of Selectmen.

Mr. Dunfee who is presently serving as president of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce expressed regret that a new association was being organized.

Steps are now being taken to organize an association of restaurant operators, and legal counsel will be engaged in order to combat the recent decision, it is reported.

"This is an unfortunate development but there appears to be no alternative as restaurant operators feel they are in a commercial zone designed for business operation and that any action restricting their operation will have a direct bearing on the value of their property and their operation for future taxation." It now appears that a meeting of the Restaurant Owners association will be called within the next ten days in order to make more definite and formal plans concerning this whole subject.

Most resetaurant owners who have become involved in this new association feel they are in a commercial zone designed for business operation and that any action restricting their operation will have a direct bearing on the value of their property and their operation for future taxation.

Dunfee further stated that most restaurant owners on the beach feel that the teenage problem that has received so much publicity is now being used to penalize restaurant operators and that the problem does not center around the restaurant operations on Hampton Beach.

Dunfee stated, "Hampton Beach restaurants of today are a great improvement over the many 'all-night' stands that operated at the beach in the past." And he feels that the approach now being taken by the selectmen is discriminatory toward the restaurants and it will have an overall harmful effect on Hampton Beach as a summer resort.

Beach C of C To Meet September 18

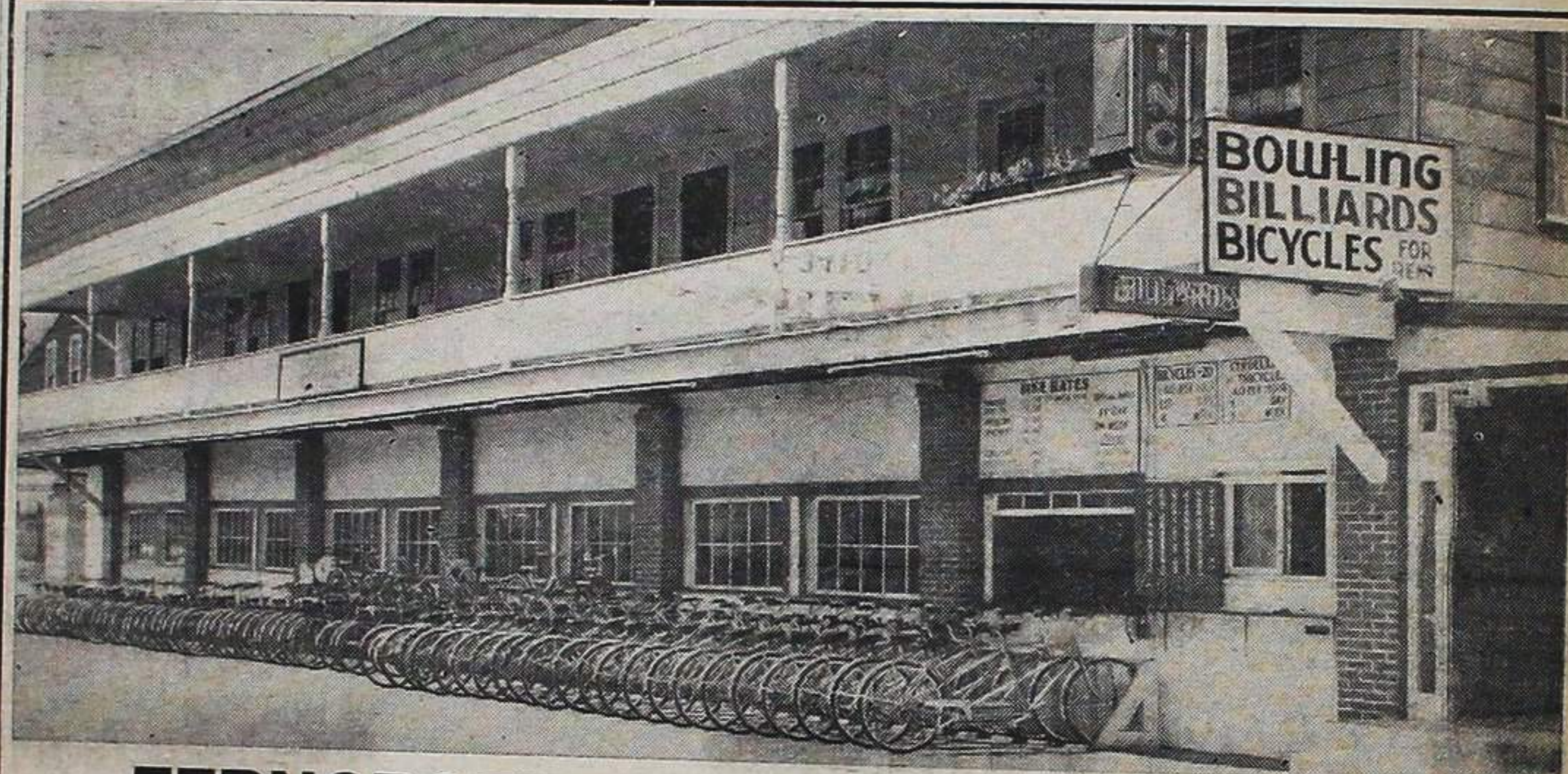
