Steps are now being taken to organize an association of restaurant operators, and legal counsel will be engaged in order to combat the recent decision. it is reported.

"This is an unfortunate development but there appears to be no alternative as restaurant operators feel the suggested curfew is discriminatory. We are attempting to cater to tourists from Canada, Connecticut. Western Massachusetts. and up-state New York," Dunfey stated. "And when we talk about a resort that does not provide good restaurant service after mid-night then we are hurting the whole atmosphere of Hampton Beach as a resort."

Dunfey further stated that most restaurant owners on the beach feel that the teenage problem that has received so much publicity is now being used to penalize restaurant operators and that the problem does not center around the restaurant operations on Hampton

Dunfey stated, "Hampton Beach restaurants of today are a great improvement over the many 'all-night' stands that operated at the beach in the past." And he feels that the approach now being taken by the selectmen is discriminatory toward the restaurants and it will have an overall harmful effect on Hampton Beach as a


