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Local C.G. Unit Due Major Change

Two major changes for the Hampton seacoast area involving future Coast Guard facilities are presently undergoing study in Washington. Also under study are changes in Portsmouth Coast Guard facilities. The changes as recommended would be made during the next ten years if the approval is finalized.

In a Coast Guard report to the Treasury department, the recommended changes over the next ten years primarily include the following three points: 1. A new search and rescue station at Hampton Harbor, operated on a seasonal basis from a new type houseboat facility. 2. Better boats, more men and improvements to the helicopter pad at the Portsmouth Harbor Lifeboat Station in New Castle.

3. Closing of the Hampton Beach Lifeboat Station when the new Hampton Harbor facility is established. This latter proposal is similar to one made in 1959, and then called a "manned mooring." Closing of the Hampton Beach station also was proposed in 1947 and 1949 and, on both occasions, strongly opposed by area fishermen and boat owners. The Coast Guard report says use of helicopters, faster boats and changed shipping habits warrant thinning out of its open beach lifeboat stations.

According to The Navy Times no definite date has been set for the Hampton changes, except that they would be made during the next 10 years.

The Portsmouth Harbor station improvements are listed for the third year of the program.

The program, affecting 900 of the Coast Guard's 1,300 shore stations, is estimated to cost

Hampton Harbor Project Wins Executive Approval

John King recently signed into law a bill which will find major improvements being undertaken in both Hampton and Seabrook Harbors by dredging and constructing jetties together with the renourishment of Hampton Beach proper with sand.

Several years of cooperative planning and work on the part of local area citizens, state legislators, town, state, and beach officials together with the aid of the Federal government were climaxed late last week as Gov. John King signed the bill which will better Hampton and Seabrook Harbors and the sands of Hampton Beach.

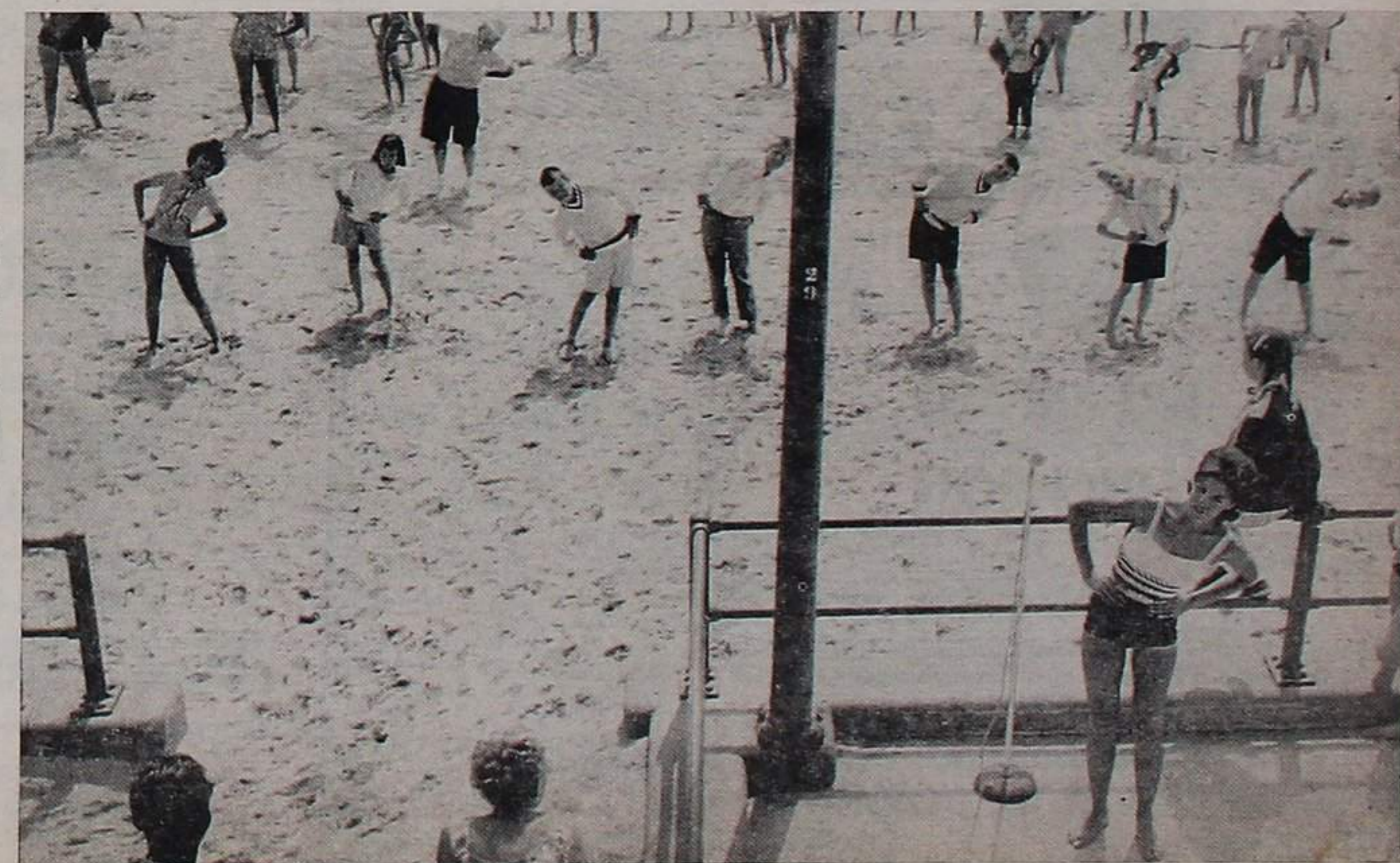
The bill relative to the improvement of the Hampton Harbor entrance, dredging of the inner and outer harbors for both Hampton and Seabrook by widening and deepening the channels, and the restoration of sand lost by erosion on state-owned land at Hampton Beach, passed both the Senate and House of Representatives in the final moments of the recent 1963 legislative session. It was one of the final bills signed by Gov. King.

Much of the more than 10 feet in depth of sand that has washed from the northerly end of the main beach is expected to be replaced by sand dredged from the harbor. Thousands of yards of sand have washed southward with much of it spilling over the jetty at the entrance of Hampton Harbor and on into the harbor creating hazardous sand bars for boats.

Future steps, according to Sen. Douglass Hunter, include the notifying of the U. S. Army Engineers that the project has been approved on state and local levels. It is then expected that the matter will be discussed between Federal officials and the members of the N. H. Highway department. Contracts and specifications will have to be prepared and then the project let out for the customary bidding period.

Included in the project as approved will be construction of a jetty over the Church street ledges to curb the flow of sand southward. The jetty at the Harbor mouth is expected to be enlarged and dredging will take place within the harbor mouth and inside harbors to enlarge the channels to both Seabrook and Hampton docks.

The entire project including local, state and federal funds is expected to exceed half a million dollars.

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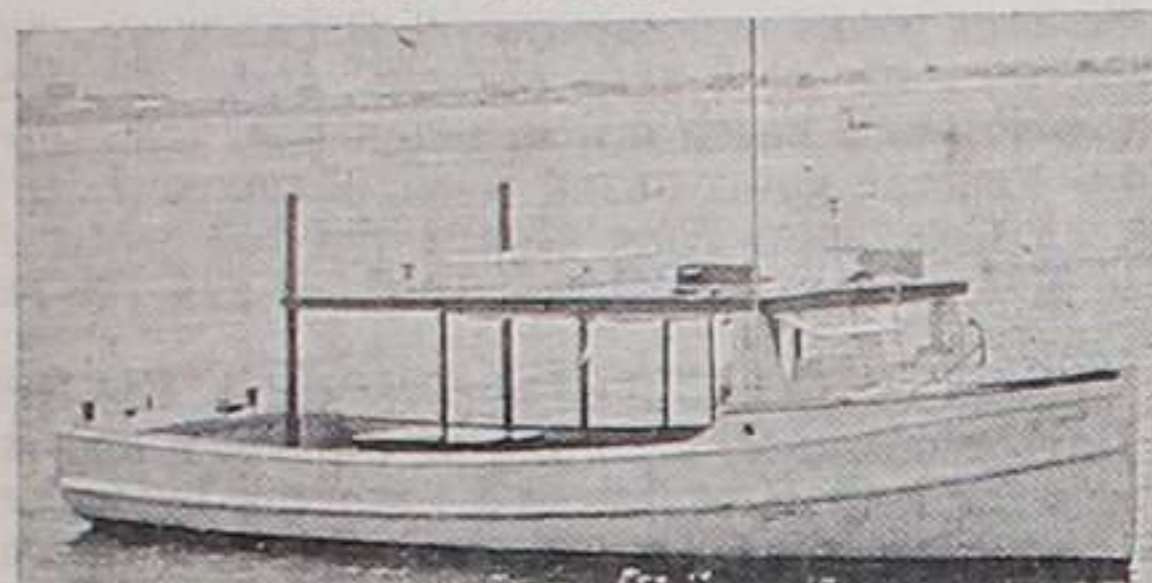

Shark Nailed  
By Pair Off  
Boar's Head

A baby shark was towed into Hampton Harbor Saturday afternoon by Arthur Fellows, Fellows avenue, Hampton Beach, and a friend, Charlie Hager of Seabrook.

The shark was harpooned by Mr. Hager approximately two miles off Great Boar's Head between the beach and the Isles of Shoals. Mr. Fellows reported the shark measured 10 feet 4 inches and weighed approximately 1,000 pounds. Mr. Fellows, veteran beach lobsterman, towed the shark to the state pier in Hampton Harbor. When the two fishermen reached the pier, the shark was still alive but died later.

Following the taking of several pictures, the shark was towed back to sea and cut loose. Mr. Fellows reported the sharks usually travelled in pairs but that there appeared to be only one in the area at the time it was harpooned.

Although sharks have been spotted off the coast in past years, few have been reported in the local area close to shore.

**Exeter To Beach Expressway To Open July 15**

CONCORD — Four and a half miles of the new 8-mile Exeter to Hampton Beach expressway will open to public travel at noon on Monday, July 15, New Hampshire Public Works Commissioner John O. Morton announced today. He also said there was a good possibility if weather permitted that the remaining section would be ready to open to traffic about August 1st.

The segment of the Route 101-C relocation opening next Monday noon joins the eastern end of the Exeter by-pass and, paralleling old Route 101-C to the north, interchanges with Route 101-D, crosses the N. H. Turnpike on an 8-span bridge to end at the interchange with existing Route 101-C near the Hampton toll plaza. At present, only two of the four ramps of this interchange will be open to traffic—the east-bound "off-ramp" and the west-bound "on-ramp".

Work started at the Exeter end of the \$4 million, access-controlled highway just a year and a half ago. R. G. Watkins and Son, Inc. of Amesbury, Mass. holds two contracts for 5½ miles totalling \$1,915,213; Constructors Inc. of Lexington, Mass. built the bridge over the turnpike for \$274,768; Curran-Lavoie, Inc. of Littleton has a \$1 million, six-tenths of a mile project which includes the interchange with U. S. Route 1 in Hampton, and State Highway Department forces have constructed the mile-and-a-half project across the marsh to the beach for approximately \$130,000. Total cost of the new highway includes preliminary engineering, right-of-way and construction.

Morton said that work on all five projects had progressed ahead of schedule and east-to-west summer traffic to and from the coast resorts would be accommodated by a new modern facility much earlier than had been expected.

**Gala Celebration Planned For 325th Anniversary**

Plans were nearing completion this week for the 325th anniversary celebration of the founding of the Town of Hampton.

### Safety Rules Set For Beach

Ordinances and regulations for Hampton Beach remain essentially the same as in previous years. For the benefit of swimmers, regulations to ensure the safety and pleasure of vacationists are in force as follows:

No person or organization is permitted on the beach between the hours of 1 a.m. and sunrise unless through a special permit issued by the chief of police.

The lighting of fires on the beach is prohibited.

The changing of clothes in cars in the beach area is prohibited.

Dogs and other pets are prohibited on the beach and in the water.

Ball playing and similar games may be permitted at the discretion of the lifeguards.

Inflatables are not permitted in the water at any time.

Missing persons should be immediately reported to the lifeguard on duty.

In matters of safety and orderliness, persons shall obey all requests made by the lifeguards.

Lifeguards will not assume parental responsibility for children left unattended by their parents or guardian.

Complaints should be addressed to the Town Manager, c/o Town Offices, Hampton.

Persons found violating any of the above regulations or ordinances shall be evicted from the beach and subject to a fine of not more than \$25. (Section 7, Chapter 219, RSA)

Ordinances at the state controlled area of the beach vary slightly and should be checked by visitors to those areas. Complaints should be addressed to Recreation Commission, Department of Resources and Economic Development, State House Annex, Concord, N. H.

### Seacoast Regional Seeks Information On C.G. Move

In a letter to Congressman Louis Wyman the Seacoast Regional Development association, has requested further information regarding the proposed disestablishment of the local Coast Guard station. The association's letter also requested Mr. Wyman's "support in maintaining an active Coast Guard Station at Hampton, N. H."

The letter states in part: "Plans for the disestablishment of the life boat station at Hampton have been proposed many times in recent years, correspondence in the Regional Association files indicate that attempts were made in 1947, 1949, and 1959 for disestablishment of the station. The 1959 recommendations were made by a 'Board of Survey of Coast Guard Facilities' which was convened on 17 August 1955. It is believed that this agency or its successor has developed the present recommendations."

"The State of New Hampshire and the Town of Hampton are currently joining with the Federal government through the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, in a three-quarter of a million dollar construction project to improve Hampton Harbor entrance channels. Commercial fishing and pleasure boating have shown phenomenal increase in the Hampton area for the past several years and it is expected that the improved navigation facilities will reflect a tremendous increase in the number of boats using this area in the years to come."

"To say the least, it seems highly questionable for three units of government to be expending large sums of money to improve boating facilities along our coast line while another agency of government proposes to eliminate vitally

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"Bye-Bye Birdie" - Crazy! Man Like It's The Most!

Fun - fun - fun - good, clean fun is "Bye Bye Birdie" which fills the stage at the Hampton Playhouse with songs and laughter in an entertaining production of the popular musical; comedy that satirizes the teenage "rock and roll" hysteria. Played by actors who can sing, rather than singers who can't act, "Bye Bye Birdie" provides the theatregoer with a colorful and lively evening of diversion.

Putting together a musical comedy in one week out of a summer stock company is a Herculean task at best but increasingly difficult when the director Al Christie has to cast such a production from a company composed principally of actors and not specially trained singers and dancers. This is what makes this week's presentation so amazing in its fine results.

But after all, an actor is trained to project his voice with resonance and clarity and the simple step up to singing lyrics is a natural. There are no Ray Middletons or Ethel Mermans or Mary Martins but the songs go over with a bang - and the lyrics can really be heard and understood - something that I can not always say when a professional singer is warbling the words. The musical tone with

the trained singer comes first - and the significance of the song becomes lost in runs up and down the scale to the accompaniment of a thirty piece orchestra.

The Hampton Playhouse relies on a piano, drums and bass fiddle and the songs are put over with a vim and vigor that captures the full sweep of this hilarious comedy. As the frustrated secretary, Marie Jordan brings a great deal of zing to "Bye Bye Birdie". Her dancing is rhythmic and eye-catching and she injects a full charge of pep into the play. Miss Jordan's final scene performance of the "Latin from Pennsylvania" was tops for the show and worth the price of admission alone.

The versatile Richard Kneeland revealed his fine talent for comedy - and a surprisingly effective singing voice - as Albert. He spreads a large dose of laughter into every scene that he plays but especially those that he does with the veteran Betty Fromen Bright, who plays his overpossessive mother. The combination results in some hilarious laughter - and Miss Bright is in rare form. However, in the serious vein Kneeland's singing of the lovely ballad "Talk to Me" was another high point of the show.

Last week, Ray Girardin convulsed audiences as Ensign Pulver in "Mr. Roberts" but this week he comes up with an even better performance as Birdie. Girardin creates a wonderfully amusing teenage idol with feet of clay and the rock and roll numbers which he sings are real Elvis Presleyish. The script limits the dialogue of the title role so that Birdie will not destroy his public image by opening his mouth too wide - except to sing - so to create his character the role of Birdie must be well-acted - and this is exactly what Girardin does evolving the stupid sort of jerk that Birdie is supposed to be.

Richard Kennedy does his usual fine piece of acting as the confused father of a teenage girl and his singing of the boisterously gay song, "Kids" is another show stopper. His daughter is played by Rosemary McNamara and uncovers a delightful find for the Hampton Playhouse. She not only shows a rare talent for acting but her singing voice is delightfully charming and sweet. She was especially effective with her singing of the sentimental ballad, "One Boy". Added strength to the cast also comes from Naomi Riseman, as Mrs. MacAfee, and young Michael MacDonald, as the son.

Freddy Hoskins, who has the busy job of stage manager, is often called upon for bit parts and although Freddy hates to go on stage, he always manages to steal every scene that he plays. As the mayor of Sweet Apple, his hysterical attempt to present the key to the city to Birdie gave the audience a glimpse into his genius.

A large supporting cast added color, variety and rollicking group singing to "Bye Bye Birdie" which keeps the play on the move from opening to closing curtain. The support came from Karen Monko, Edward Blake - who deserves a special mention for his role of Hugo - Mary Ellen Weber, Steven Fredrics, Rebecca Calla-

han, Daniel Olin, Steven Levi, Peter Bailey, Betsy Patrick, Barrie O'Brien, Susan Stalcup, Barbara Gertz, Susan Christie, Leslie Hunkins, Jeanie McDorland, Cee Jay Currier, Jeffery Blake, Sonny Spiller, Bill Robertson and Dave Turner.

This is a family play full of fun and good music. The youngsters will enjoy it fully as well as the adults. It solves no problems - provokes no tears - but serves the one purpose of providing an entertaining evening of jolly theatre.

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Officials Order Crackdown On Bunking In Automobiles

A new ordinance tightening restrictions of sleeping in cars on public highways or public property in Hampton was approved by the Hampton selectmen at a recent meeting.

Town manager Kenneth Bohemer this week said that numerous complaints brought about the enactment of the ordinance plus the fact that local law enforcement officials had no previous power to enforce such a rule on the highways.

The new ordinance states "It shall be unlawful for any person to sleep in any vehicle parked upon any public highway, or any public property without first obtaining permission from the Hampton Police department."

The ordinance also spelled out the penalty for the offense as follows: "Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefor shall be liable to a penalty of not more than twenty dollars (\$20) for each offense."

"Any vehicles parked in violation of this ordinance may be ordered towed away by the Police of the Town of Hampton at the expense of the owner or custodian of said vehicle."

The ordinance went into effect June 28, 1963.

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Chamber Seeks Beach Business A.M. Shutdown

The directors of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce recently voted to send a letter to all business establishments at Hampton Beach which remain open all night or nearly all night and to ask their cooperation in a voluntary closing during specified early morning hours.

The chamber officials said they would seek on a voluntary basis to have all business establishments which remain open throughout the early morning hours to close for any five hour period between 12 midnight and 6 a.m.

The chamber officials also stated they agreed with the precinct commissioners that more State Police help is needed at the beach particularly where there is so much state property, including the Hampton Beach State Park and Sea Shell, involved.

They also noted that they definitely felt that all the proposals previously given in regard to possible solutions to curb problems such as have cropped up the past two years should be seriously considered. They feel it will take a combination of both state police help and such measures as curfews, ordinances and other proposals aimed in the right direction to completely remedy the situation.

In a recent letter to town officials, it was noted that Gov. John King was aware of the situation and that more state police officers have been assigned to the Seacoast area. It was also stated that other state police help would be available if needed.

The directors, however, continued to commence taking other strides to put Hampton Beach back to the noted family beach of the past with the announcement of the letter which would be sent out in the near future requesting the business owners to cooperate in the five hour early morning closing hour.

Area Mail Zips With New P.O. Code Numbers

Mail in the seacoast area began "zipping" last Monday as the Post Office department inaugurated its zone improvement plan, better known as the ZIP code.

In announcing the ZIP code, Post Office officials said the program using a five-number code with addresses will speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail.

The first number in the code is for the New England area, the second for the state, the third for the area distribution point and the last two for the locality.

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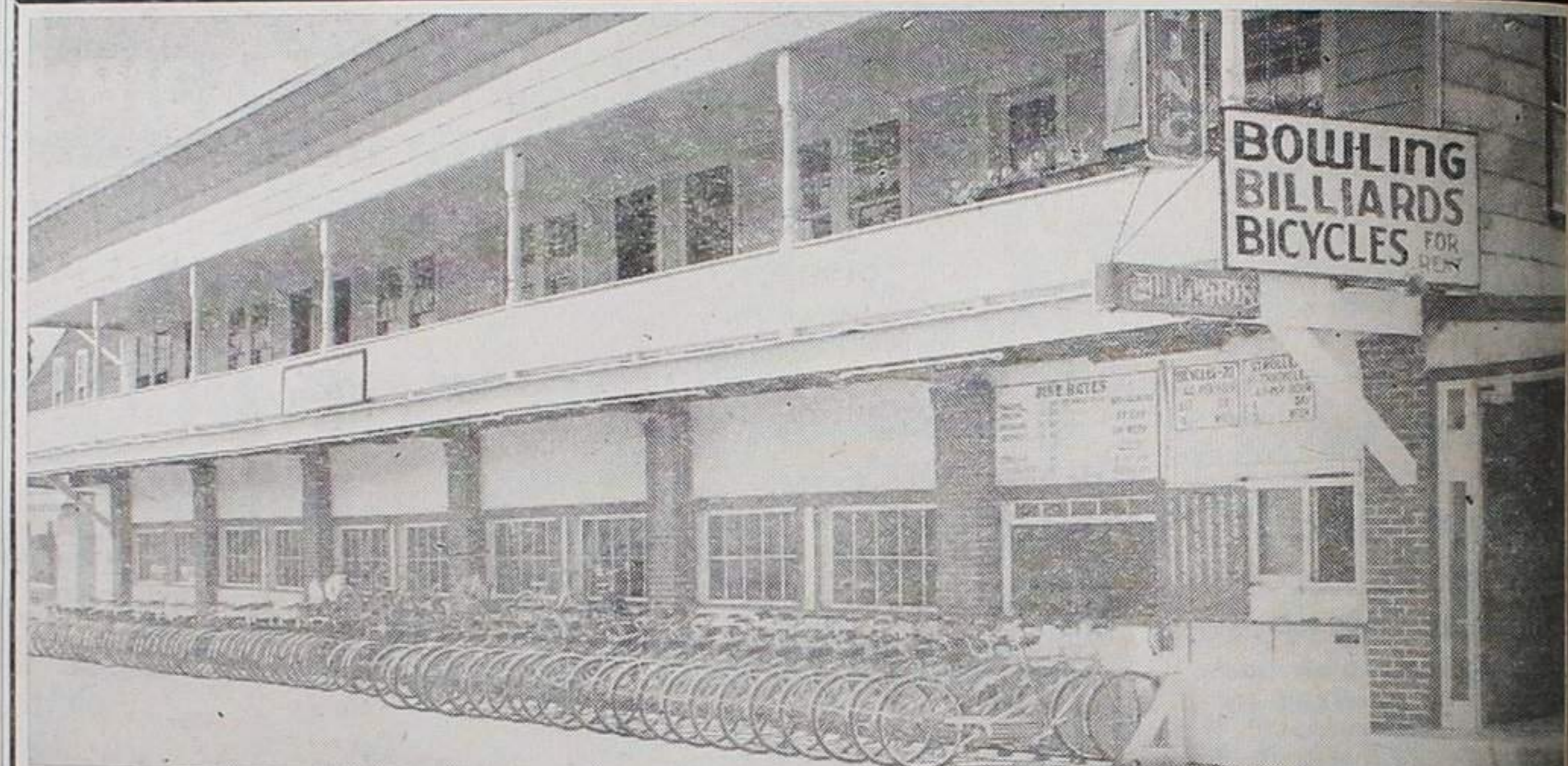

40 Beach Beauties Vie For Miss Hampton Beach Crown

The first major attraction of the local summer recreation season, the Miss Hampton Beach Beauty Pageant for 1963, will be held at the Casino Ballroom next Tuesday evening, July 23 at 8:30 p.m.

Close to 40 girls from many areas are expected to participate in the 16th annual affair with the cherished title of Miss Hampton Beach at stake. Most of the girls will be eyeing the enviable positions held last year by Miss Sandie Kaye of Plaistow, first New Hampshire girl to win the title, and Miss Jonnye McLeod, present titleholder and first Hampton girl to gain the top honors. Both girls were later named to participate in the Miss Universe contest. Miss McLeod is presently in Miami participating in the Miss USA and Miss Universe contests together with two other New England states winners with whom she participated at Hampton Beach last season.

As in the past, for some of the girls come evening's end, there will be sadness while for others there will be joy. For all, a cherished experience never to be forgotten. New friendships will be made, some of which will last a lifetime. Others will find the contest the beginning of a brilliant future. Backstage, the girls will display nervousness and emotion. On stage, they will show poise, personality, talent and a sincere desire to win.

Over the years, the BEACHCOMBER has had more than a passing interest in the show which has become probably the greatest single attraction in the Hampton Beach summer entertainment program. One of the Eastern seaboard's largest and most fascinating beauty shows, the Miss Hampton Beach pageant as it is known today got its start on an idea conceived by the former editor of the BEACHCOMBER, the late Edward S. Seavey, Jr.

During the summers of 1946 and 1947, Mr. Seavey organized the Miss Cover Girl contests. In 1948, the local chamber of commerce took up the lead given by Mr. Seavey and thus was born, 16 years ago, the Miss Hampton Beach beauty pageant. A note of sadness will be seen at this year's show, however, as Mr. Seavey who attended the 15th anniversary of the affair last year as an honored guest, only recently died.

The story of the pageant down through the years has been nothing short of fabulous to say the least. Each year new history has been made. A search of the BEACHCOMBER files has revealed a few interesting statistics worth mentioning in conjunction with the 16th annual pageant.

Perhaps one of the most incredible stories connected with the contest over the years was brought to light last year by the previous titleholder, Miss Sandie Kaye of Plaistow. Competing in the program in 1960, after urging from her friends, Sandie placed second. A month later, she took top honors in the Miss New England contest and the next year was back at the beach again. This time she captured the hearts of the judges and the audience to become the first girl to hold both the titles of Miss New England and Miss Hampton Beach simultaneously.

Not satisfied with these achievements, Sandie later became Miss New Hampshire 1962 for the Miss Universe contest and set a sparkling example for other girls to follow as she placed fifth in the Miss USA contest.

Equally exciting has been the story of the first local girl to rise to local beauty contest fame. Jonnye McLeod likewise placed among the top five girls in two earlier beach contests prior to taking the coveted Miss Hampton
