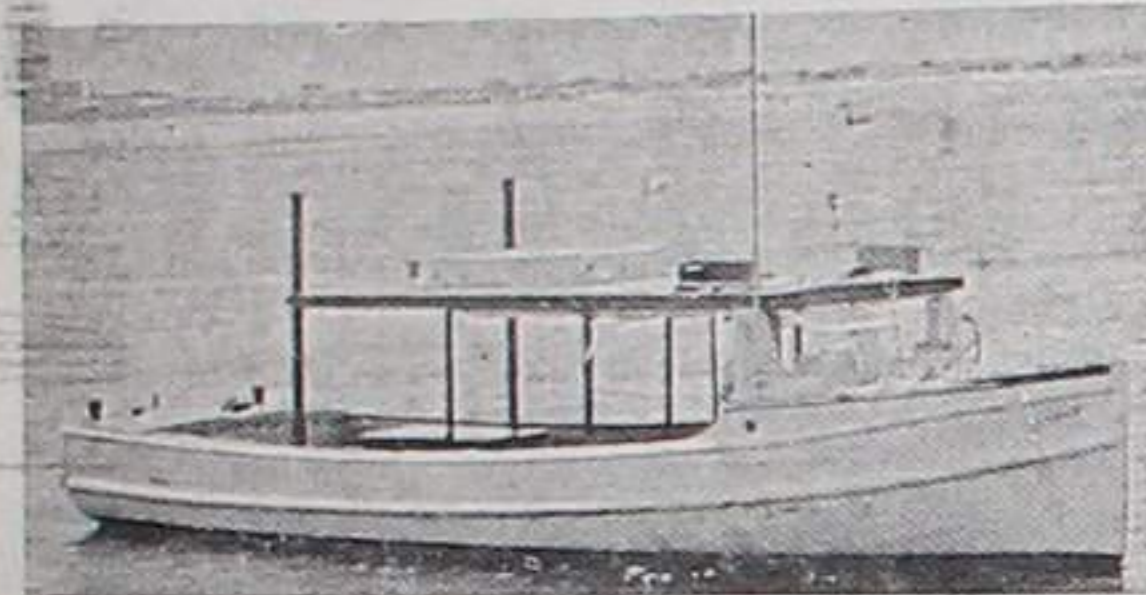

Seek Funds For Mosquito Study

The results of the recent state legislative session relative to the mosquito problems in the seacoast were heard at an informal meeting of the Seacoast Mosquito Control committee in Portsmouth last week.

Rep. Elizabeth Greene of Rye said the bill calling for an appropriation of \$18,000 for a study of the mosquito problem had been approved by the House and sent to the Appropriations committee but did not go further because of the lack of funds.

As a result of the legislative action, plans were being made to seek aid from Governor John King and the Executive Council in the form of a pilot study for a few towns. The request would be for \$18,000.

Other action found the group advocating the urging of area towns to adopt mosquito control districts at the next town meetings. Such districting would be in accordance with HB 606 which did not get past the Appropriations Committee.

The Hampton Playhouse thespians do not have to strain themselves mentally or emotionally to bring off this thin melodrama that involves a man-hungry movie star stranded in a small town who turns on the sex-appeal for the local yokel.

The sweet young thing is in danger of losing her man to sinful Hollywood but the star's press agent heroically steps in to the affair at the critical moment and everyone lives happily ever after. There are many witty lines and funny situations and the audience can enjoy an evening of laughter and amusement with "How Far Is The Barn"—which is a retelling of Lawrence Riley's

Broadway success, "Personal Appearance".

The over-libidoed, throaty movie star is played by Grayson Hall who convincingly ad-just herself to the sexy role and creates an amusing character around which the action pivots. Playing off against her, as her publicity agent, is Dick Kennedy. For an actor of Kennedy's talent, the role is simple and straightforward and does not challenge his real ability.

The same is true of Richard Kneeland who portrays the naive country boy that falls for the ministrations of the Hollywood siren and Holly Hill, as the sweet little country girl wronged by sex-pot. There is not enough depth to either character to provide a

real acting opportunity.

Betty Fromen Bright strikes a spark as Aunt Kate but one of the most outstanding performances comes from young Karen Monko. In the minor role of Gladys, she injects more life and action into the play than the rest of the cast put together. She dominates every scene in which she appears.

Naomi Riseman, Peter Bailey, Fred Hoskins and Barbara Gertz make up the balance of the cast.

Steven Fredrics again scores a hit with his scenic design and execution. Week after week his stage sets have contributed greatly to the success of the production and this week's living room scene in a modest Pennsylvania rooming house is bright and alive.

"How Far Is The Barn" is well-acted, well-produced and well-directed by Al Christie. It is light and entertaining but the plot is so trite that the audience can anticipate the action before it happens. If the movie star is working hard to "make" the local yokel, you just know that someone will pop in to break it up before it gets off the ground. Or if the sweet young thing is in danger of losing her man to the siren, you can bet that love will find a way.

You will not leave the theatre emotionally disturbed or hilariously tickled but it is witty, entertaining and has a happy ending.

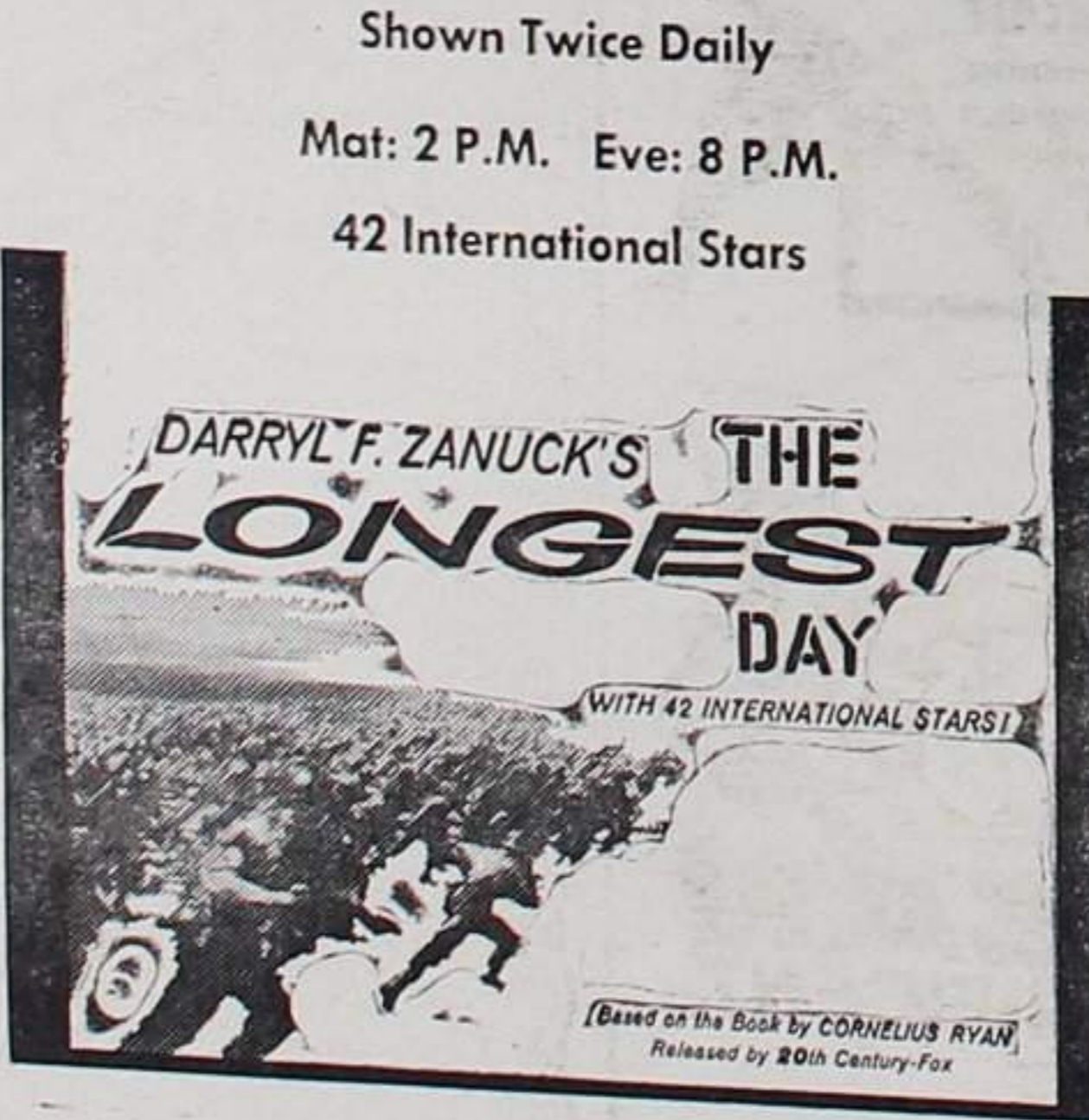

Craftsmen's Fair To Open August 6

WOLFEBORO, N. H. — There's poetic justice that this lovely Lake Winnepesaukee community is hosting the 30th annual show of the League of New Hampshire Arts and Crafts August 6-10. The three-decade milestone of the highly regarded Craftsman's Fair is, of course, an important one. And it is appropriate it will be observed in this charming "white village," since Wolfeboro claims to be the oldest summer resort in America. The claim is based on the fact that Colonial Governor Benning Wentworth built "a summer place" on a neighboring lake now named for him, only five years short of a couple of centuries ago. The league membership now numbers more than 3,000, with about two-thirds of them being practicing craftsmen. Their formal organization was launched in the trying days of the early "thirties" and interest snowballed so rapidly that in its third year — 1934 — it was decided to hold an exhibition at the state level, and Crawford Notch was selected as the site. The Fair went over so well that it was quickly agreed to hold a repeat fair in the Notch the following year. Since then it has been at such distant points as Hancock and Rye Beach, and for 13 years, the locale was the former Belknap area (now Gunstock) at Gilford. Its growth has been so substantial that a permanent site and permanent facilities have been required for well over a decade now. Budding craftsmen and just plain "interested bystanders" will have an opportunity at this year's fair to observe acknowledged experts in action, since each afternoon there will be special demonstrations by the various guilds in addition to other demonstrations throughout the day by guild members. Leading off on Tuesday, Aug. 6, and Wednesday the 7th, will be the husband-and-wife team of Bruce and Ellen Eppelsheimer of Epsom. He will demonstrate fabric stenciling the opening day, and Mrs. Eppelsheimer will demonstrate "Slab Building in the Mold" techniques the following afternoon. Five unusual weaving techniques will headline the Thursday program under the direction of the Weavers Guild's Mrs. Jean Lopardo of Newfields. On Friday, Mrs. Carolyn Pulsifer of Exeter, representing the Jewelers and Metalworkers Guild, plans to explore the metal cutting and sweat soldering for a bar pin, a new design

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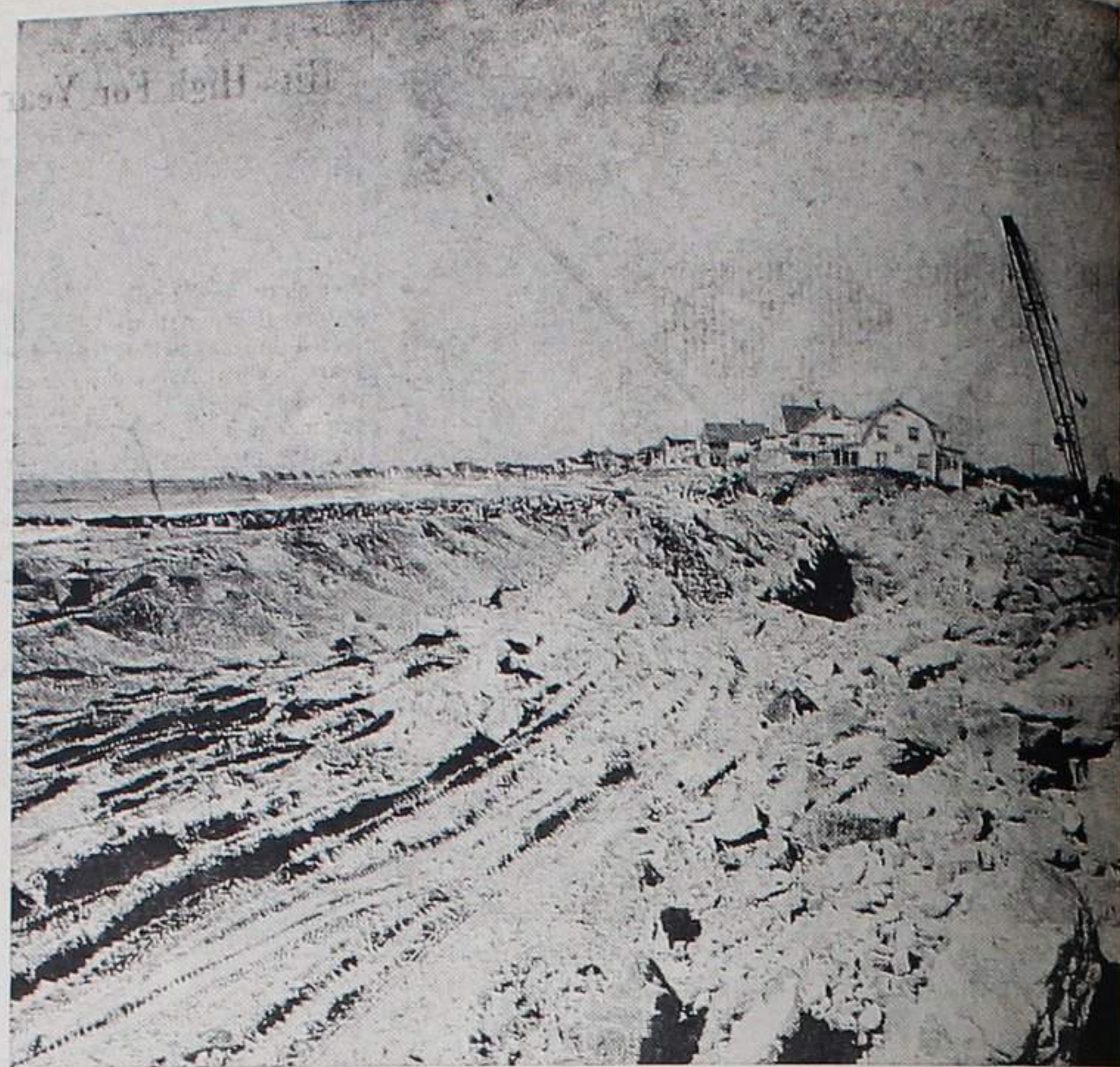

Boating Accidents Take Sharp Upswing

Clifton Smith, state director of Safety Services, recently noted that the number of boating accidents is piling up at a rate almost twice as fast as last year. He blamed this factor on the general carelessness of boat operators.

Mr. Smith likened boating to driving a car on the highway. "The major difference is that there's no white line on one side and no road shoulder on the other to keep the boats in line," he said. "But the general rules of behavior are the same; the same laws—for the most part—prevail, and the same need for care is of prime importance."

Another factor in the rise of boating accidents is that there are simply more boats on the water this year. Smith pointed out that up to July 22 there were almost 32,000 power-boats registered in the state. Last

year there were 39,000 registrations for the entire season. Smith estimates that "better than 50 per cent" of the boating mishaps involve teen-agers. "They are just too often careless," Smith said. And he added that many of the younger boat operators are not sufficiently aware of the state's boating laws.

"We tried to get a program through the last legislature that would have required kids to pass a test on boating before being licensed but the measure failed to get approval," Smith said.

New Hampshire laws require registration of all power boats and license of operators of commercial craft but has no license requirements for individuals, regardless of age.

"We have about 600 water bodies to patrol with some 75 men," Smith said. "We just don't have enough men."

"People have got to realize that boating courtesy is a must—not only during boating courtesy weeks, but all the time."

Two boating collisions on Lake Sunapee last Sunday which involved teen-age boaters were apparently attributable to carelessness.

Water Temperature Hits High For Year

Each morning, shortly after 10 a.m., the staff members on duty at the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce receive a call from the Hampton Beach Lifeguards informing them of the daily temperature of the waters of the Atlantic.

In a unusual switch from past years, when the water was warm in spurts throughout the summer months, the water during the past month has been exceptionally warm. Very few times has it dipped below the 60-degree mark, the norm by which the regular visitors to the beach judge whether or not they can get in for a comfortable swim.

Anything over 60 degrees is usually considered fine enough for a refreshing swim. During the past several weeks, the water temperature has hovered from 62 degrees to an unusual high of 69 degrees last Friday. Old timers were this week searching the records of their memories in efforts to recall such a long, consecutive stretch of high water temperature days off the local beach. The temperature has, on one or two very infrequent occasions, climbed over the 70-degree mark in past years.

Even many of the natives of the area continue to shake their heads in disbelief as they make their daily treks to the beach. The area resident, who frequents the beach, usually gets into the water daily regardless of the temperature. But even for him, the consecutive days of high temperatures has been a pleasant change from the past.

Except for periods of a couple of off-shore storms during the summer months, the water has also been clean and free of the seaweed which usually visits the area two or three times during the summer months.

Crowds Pack Beach To Escape Heat

Area residents welcomed the mild relief Tuesday from the sweltering heat wave which had plagued the area for the past week breaking many of the existing records for high temperatures in this area.

A crowd estimated by beach officials as upwards to 130,000 persons jammed nearly every inch of beach last Sunday as the Fourth of July crowd of 1963 was exceeded considerably. Although the temperature was over a sweltering, muggy 90 degrees, the warmth of the Atlantic waters pleased the thousands who sought out some sort of relief.

State police said that traffic was heavy on the highways to and from the beach and the other major resort areas around the state, but no major accidents or serious tie-ups were reported.

Sunday's high temperature, at least statewide, of 96 degrees did not break the record 97 degree mark set for that day back in 1949.

The lack of rain did cause general concern around the state, however, both because of the possible loss of some crops and because of the fire hazard. According to Agriculture Commissioner Frank Buckley of Derry, his office has written letters to each of the county agents in the state requesting a detailed report on drought conditions in their respective areas. Depending upon the reports, the possibility of petitioning the Federal Government to declare sections of the state as disaster areas might be imminent.

Doctors were advising persons to wear hats when working out of doors during the hot spell, if the work is for long periods of time, to reduce the danger of sunstroke.

Many areas of the state reported concern over diminishing water supplies. Seacoast area water officials are keeping a close watch on water levels, but thus far there has been no mention of any enforced ban on water use. Voluntary bans on water usages were placed on use in some area communities earlier in the season.

Probably the busiest persons during the past week were police and fire officials in the local area and the attendants at the first aid headquarters at the beach who were called upon to render first aid on numerous occasions. Firemen were called to render resuscitator aid saving tragedies or mishaps during the height of the heat wave.

Miss New England Contest Will Be Staged Next Tuesday

Following a year's reign as New England's most beautiful girl, a pretty Georgetown, Mass., lass, Louise Ann Richardson, will relinquish her crown to the new Miss New England at the end of next week's contest.

The Miss New England beauty pageant, second major event of the 1963 beach summer season and prelude to Mardi Gras week entertainment-wise, will be staged at the Casino ballroom next Tuesday evening, August 13 beginning at 8:30 p.m. The affair will again be under the direction of Production Manager Henry Hamel, now in his 11th year in that capacity, with William "Bill" Elliot serving as master of ceremonies.

This will be the 7th annual Miss New England contest with the present program having been an outgrowth, in 1957, of several previous contests which augmented the Miss Hampton Beach contest.

At that time, weekly contests were held out-of-doors on the stage of the old bandstand and were known as the Miss Personality, Miss Glamor Girl, Miss Sunshine and Miss Sea Nymph contests. Girls participating in the Miss Personality contest were required to wear cotton or sunback dresses. Those competing in the Miss Glamor Girl pageant wore cocktail gowns or afternoon dresses while those in the Miss Sunshine contest were required to wear shorts and blouses or sweaters. The Miss Sea Nymph contest found entrants competing in swim suits or beach outfits.

These contests were staged as a prelude to the Miss Hampton Beach contest in 1954, 1955 and 1956. In 1957, they were combined to make one gigantic pageant to coincide with the Miss Hampton Beach contest. Although it has not reached the status of its famed sister contest, it is, nevertheless, becoming increasingly larger with each passing year.

Some of the interesting statistics which go with this contest are as follows:

In 1959 and 1960, 23 girls participated making for the lowest number of contestants to compete. Last year, in 1962, 33 girls took part for the largest number of girls to date.

Massachusetts took over the lead in winners last year when Miss Richardson copped the title. Up to that
