Of some 40 replies made to a DED questionnaire as to how business was shaping up, 27 sources said they were ahead of a year ago, eight said it appeared to be about the same for them and only two stated it was

One excellent barometer traffic counts - showed them to be up nine percent on "rural" (non-turnpike) roads this June over last. Turnpike increases for the same month ranged from a low of 4.3 at one point on the N. H. Turnpike, to 27.2 at Concord and 28.1 at Tilton, both on Interstate 93.

The gift shop, food and Summit House all show increases, too. Last July 28, the unique railroad carried an alltime record 1,026 passengers to Washington's craggy 6,288-foot summit. 
