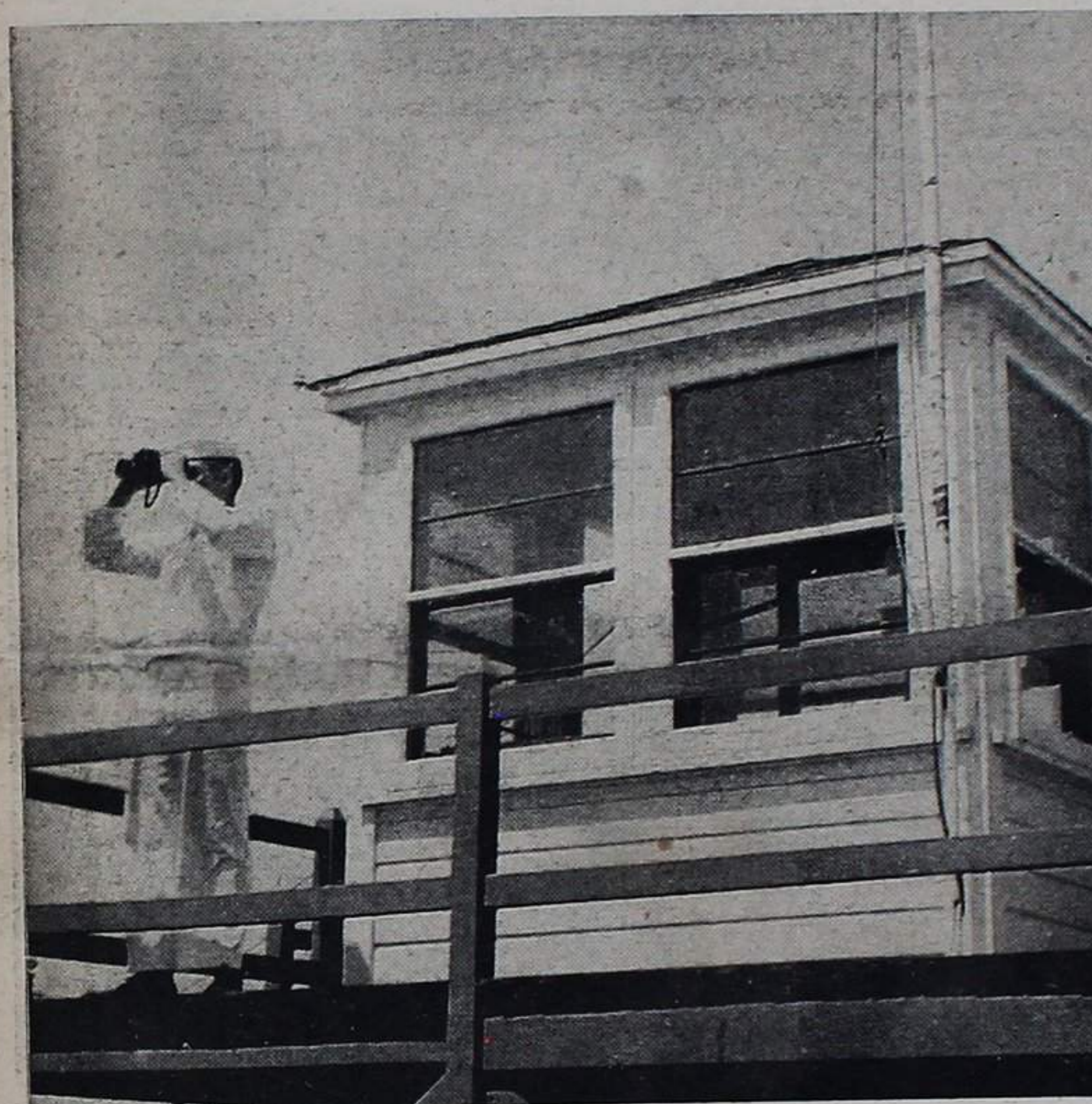

## North Beach Coast Guard Aids Boating Enthusiasm



Thousands of motorists pass by the immaculately kept building at North Beach during each summer season, but relatively few persons give it more than a passing glance as being just another sight of the many seen on their vacation. Not too many visitors to the area have seen the amount of work which is put forth daily by the men who man the Hampton Beach Lifeboat Station (U. S. Coast Guard Station).

But to the ever increasing boating populace and to the men of the local fishing and lobstering industry, these men continue to perform outstanding services. With the growth of the Hampton Beach Marina, re-vamping of the state pier at Hampton Harbor, the newly dredged Rye Harbor and soon to be completed projects at Hampton and Seabrook Harbors, the local boating enthusiasm continues to increase. And increasing with it has been the work load, the rescue missions, the assists by the men who man the Hampton Beach Lifeboat Station.

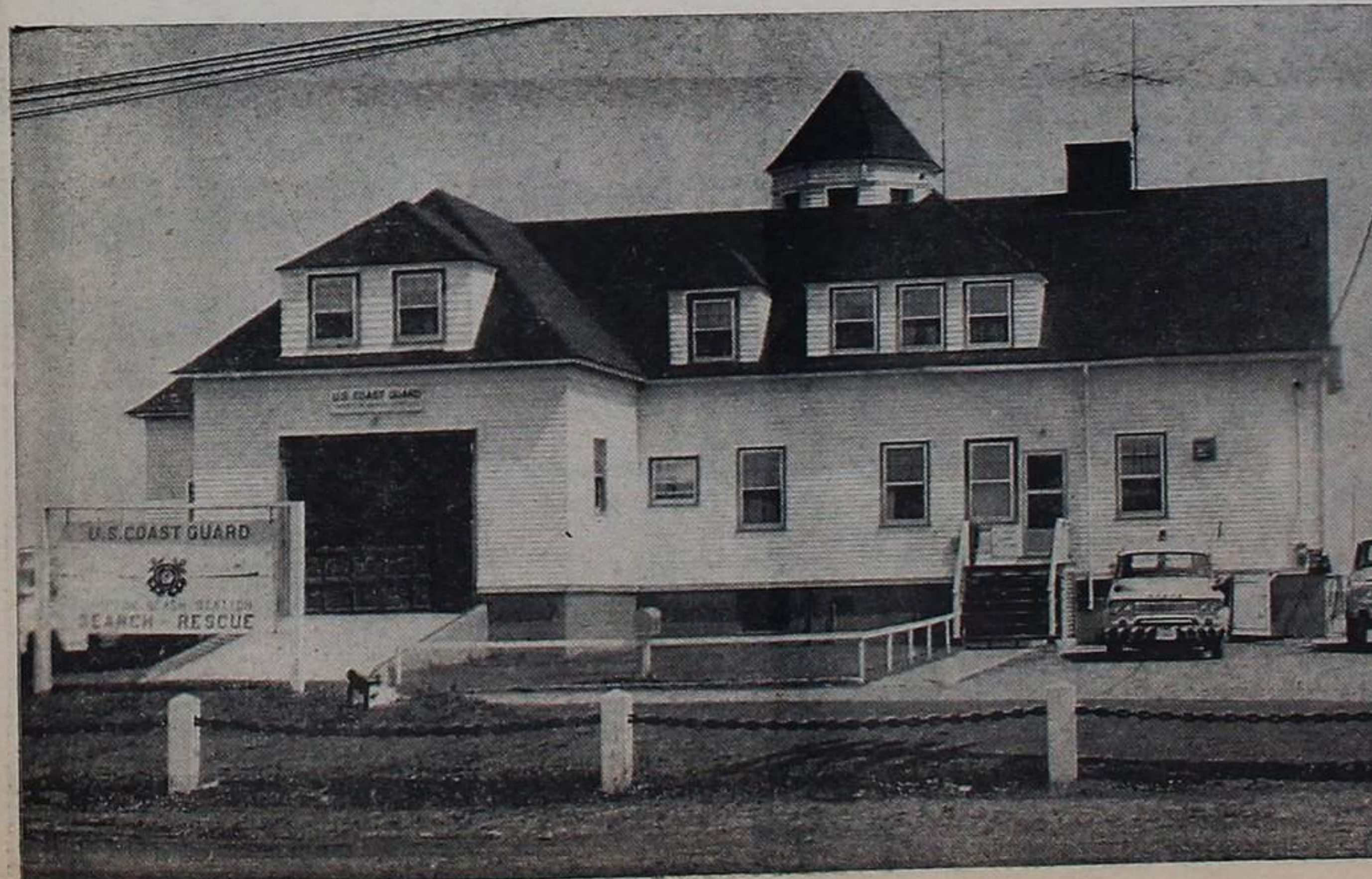
Heading the crew at the local station is a 20 year Coast Guard veteran, BMCN Francis Bajowski. Chief Bajowski pointed out that basically the two main functions of the Coast Guard are providing law enforcement as well as protecting life and property at sea.

The Coast Guard is a branch of the armed services. In peacetime, it operates as a branch of the Department of Treasury. In time of war, the Coast Guard becomes an active part of the U. S. Navy.

The Coast Guard is the nation's oldest continuous seagoing force. Since 1790, it has expanded from only 10 cutters to a large and efficient force of ships and planes. The members of the Coast Guard have fought in every war of the United States. Hundreds of thousands of men, women and children have been rescued from disaster. Millions of dollars worth of property has been saved from shipwrecks and floods. To perform these deeds of heroism—often unsung deeds—as part of their work, Coast Guardsmen have gone to sea under

the worst possible conditions. This is the case with the local Coast Guardsmen.

Breaking down the general operating functions still further, the local Coast Guard members maintain a continuous radio watch. From May 1 through October 1, on weekends and holidays from 8 a.m. to sunset, Coast Guardsmen of the local station alternate in shifts manning the Hampton River lookout tower. The men also maintain an appropriate river and sea patrol and also take action to safeguard life and property. These men receive rigid military training and discipline; they are called upon to use this training in enforcing the Federal laws in accord with Coast Guard regulations; they supply aids of navigation.

During the past year (actually little less than a year) the men of the local station have participated in 61 assistance cases. Some of the cases have consisted of salvage work, towing disabled craft, checking numerous uncertainties such as overdue boats. Basically they have located, relocated, floated, towed, rendered medical assistance, searched for and aided in salvage.

Just since the first of May of this year the men, in performing assistance to boat owners by providing advice, proper boating knowledge and by acquainting the public with safety devices have boarded over 200 craft. Over a third of those boats have been found to be in violation with some form of law - mostly in not having the proper safety devices. Chief Bajowski pointed out that he and his men are not "out to get anyone" but rather to provide all possible safety information for the good of the boat owner and operator.

Numerous other chores go unnoticed. For instance, shortly after the tragic fire which claimed the lives of local residents broke out not too long ago, five Coast Guardsmen of the local station were on hand to render assistance. For this act they received a letter of commendation from Deputy Fire Marshal Herbert Whitney. Many other such letters are on file from parents thanking the men in helping them locate lost children and for other situations.

The local station has under its jurisdiction a 36 foot motor life boat and a 30 foot utility boat. These are based at the Hampton Beach Marina and are ready for immediate use. One contains fire fighting equipment while the other has salvage pump items. Also available are 16 foot and 10 foot dinghys which can be carried by trailer and launched along the coast. Two motor vehicles are also used and contain radios.

On hand during the recent visit to the station by the BEACHCOMBER representative was the area Group Coast Guard Commander A. B. Crowley. He has command of all Coast Guard units from Gloucester, Mass. to Boon Island. He explained the disaster procedure. He told how the Coast Guard quickly makes an evaluation of the situation involved in considering the elements and

come modernized even though the structure is old and has seen much past service. The men themselves have done a goodly share of the work. The men also take pride in the cooking. From the neatly kept and modern galley comes an excellent assortment of food. Chief Bajowski says he endeavors to maintain a high quality in this department at all times as it provides for a good morale builder.

The radio room - nerve center of the local station - is manned 24 hours a day. The local station is hooked up to the 2182 frequency Marine Band on which all emergency calls are heard as well as regular Coast Guard bands. Although the local men don't predict weather conditions, weather situations are dispatched to radio stations. When weather bulletins are received from the weather bureau and if need be all area harbor masters, marinas and other

such sources of boating information are contacted regarding approaching conditions.

The men also conduct constant drills on various functions. They are versed in resuscitator aid. They frequently render first aid.

Much of the repair and maintenance work is done by the men themselves in their own repair shop. Equipment is constantly being checked and repaired.

The barracks room is completely modern and up to date with several sets of maple bunk beds and other equipment. This, together with toilet facilities, is located on the second floor of the building.

The men recently received authorization to panel the walls of the recreation room which is located on the second deck. Adjacent to this rec room is a TV and reading room complete with lounge chairs and all the fixings.

As we toured the Seacoast area and looked over the two major Coast Guard power boats, Chief Bajowski commented on local fishermen and their crafts. "That lobster boat belongs to -" he said as he pointed seaward. "It's a beautiful ship and in fine shape."

Time and time again the men of the local station have upheld the Coast Guard motto of "Semper Paratus" or "Always Ready". This has been done in various ways. 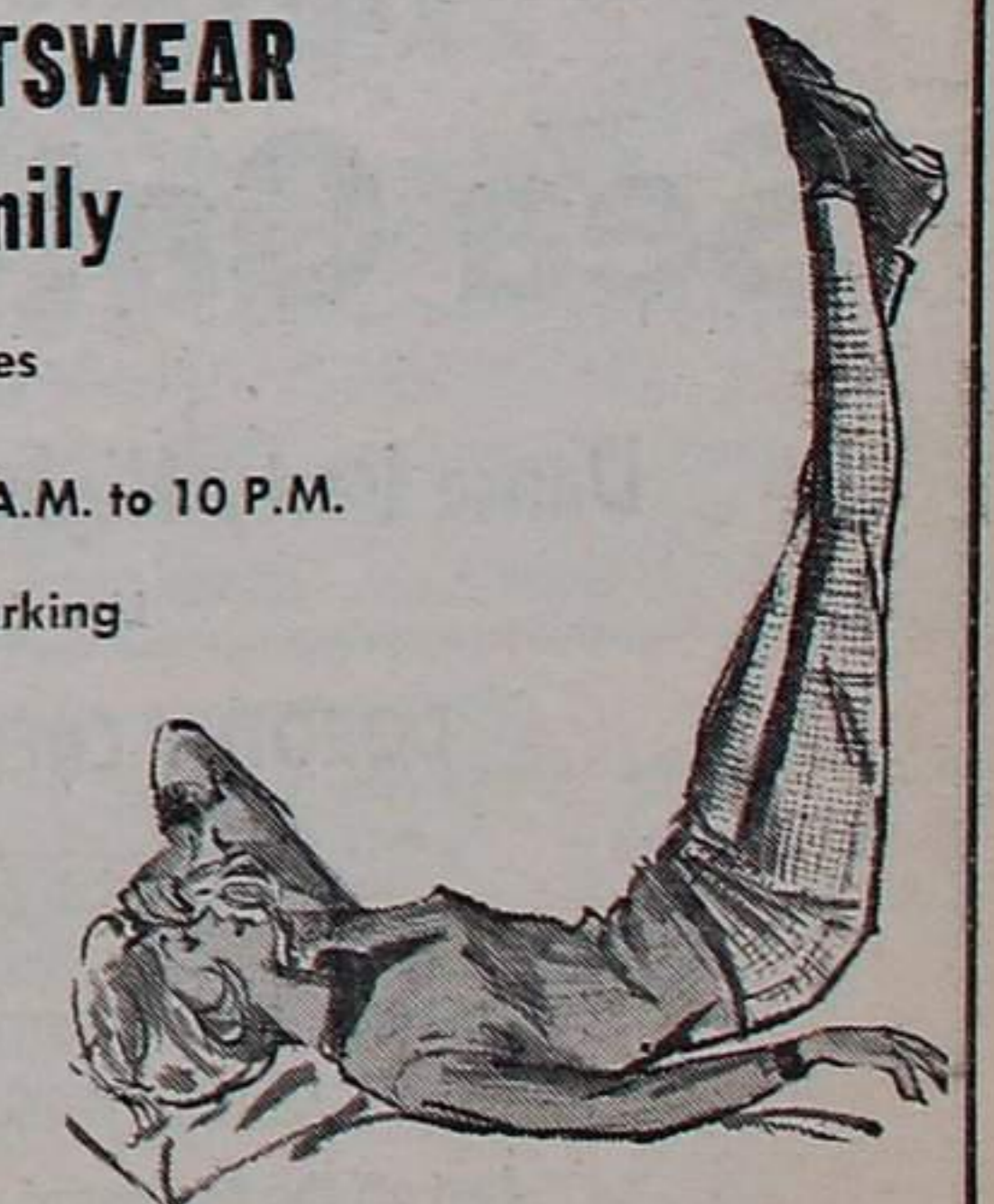

Zoning Board Denies Request By Selectmen

A controversial zoning problem was resolved recently when the Zoning Board of Adjustment unanimously denied a petition by the Hampton Board of Selectmen to revoke a building permit issued for installation of a miniature golf course at Hampton Beach.

On April 21 a building permit was issued by Building Inspector Alfred Janvrin to allow Francis Mackey of Keene to construct a miniature golf course at 375 Ocean boulevard.

The action of the selectmen resulted from their authority to seek revocations if they feel permits do not meet local zoning requirements. It was pointed out that the selectmen felt the golf course falls under a seasonal recreation clause prohibiting amusements such as rides.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment, however, refused to go along with this point and in a decision rendered following a public hearing held June 18 at the Municipal Court room, it was pointed out that "it was the unanimous opinion of the Board that the petition be denied." The move allowed the golf course to be put into operation.

The original petition of the selectmen called for revocation of "a building permit issued by Alfred Janvrin, Building Inspector, for the construction of a miniature golf course adjacent to Ocean Boulevard, and located at 375 Ocean Boulevard, said location being in a seasonal business and recrea-

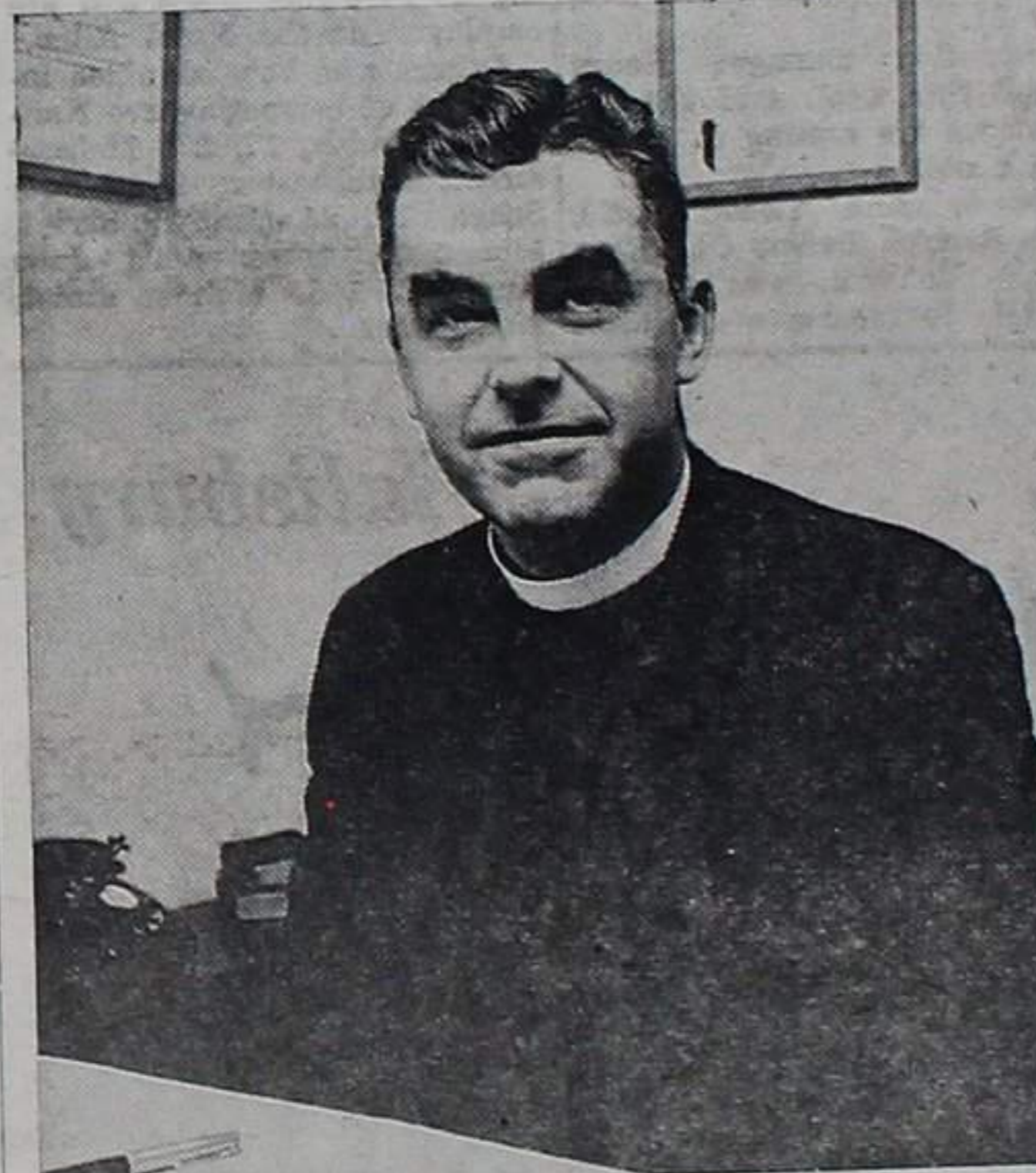

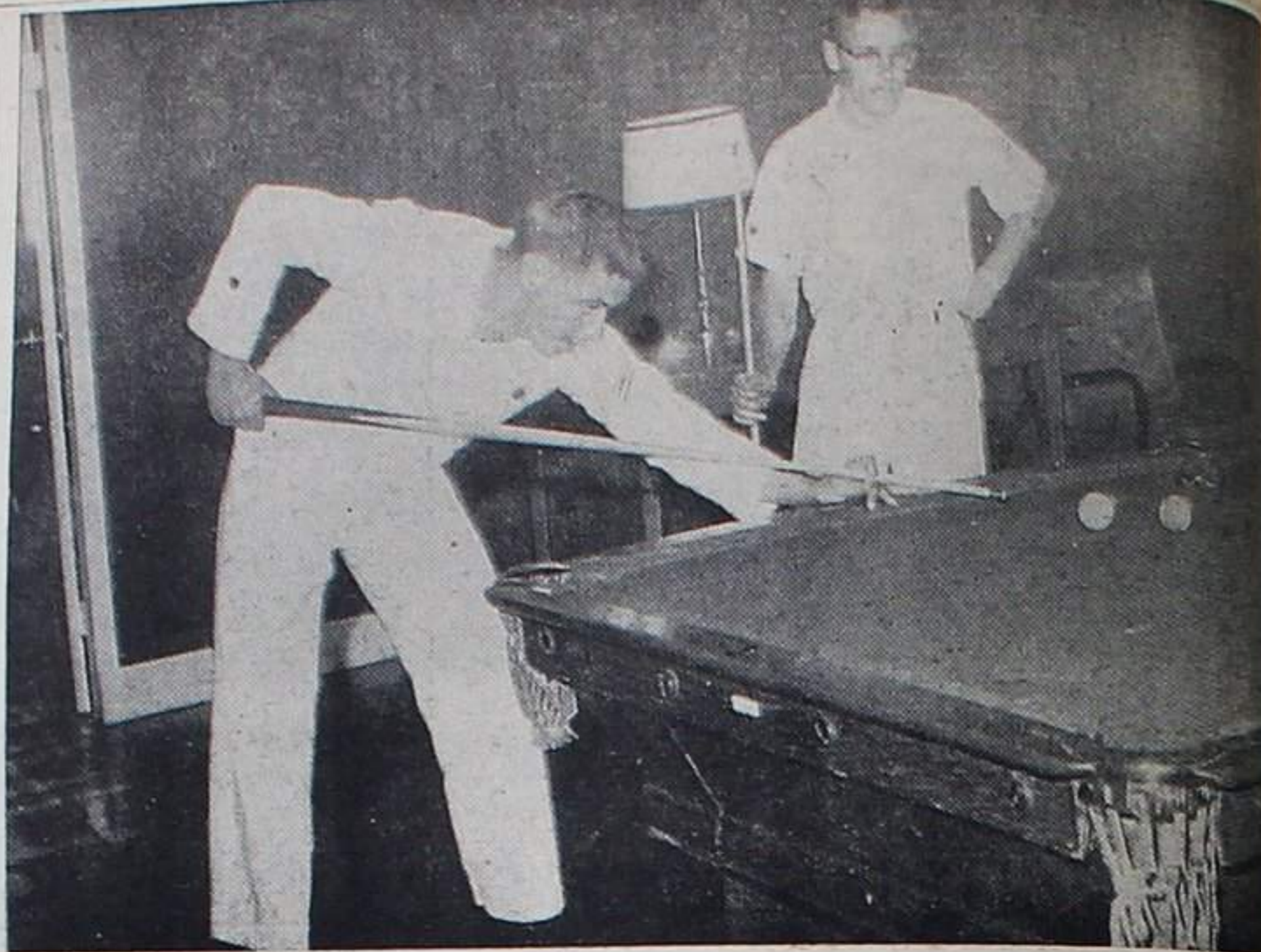

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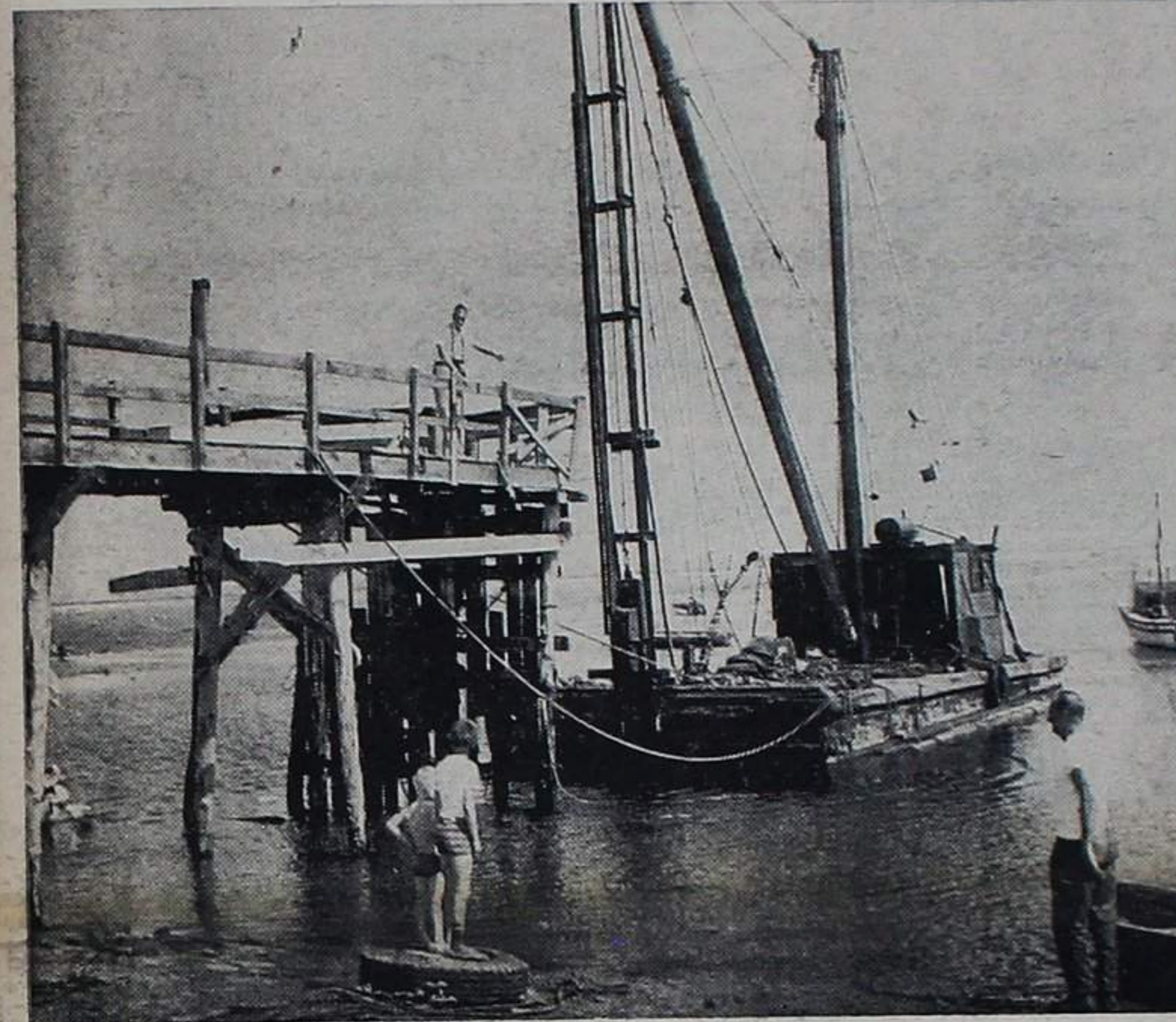

**Seabrook Pier Asset To Area**

When completed, the new construction work coupled with repairs to the existing dock will give the boating enthusiasts another public pier. Both sides of Hampton River will now have excellent accommodations for boaters and fishermen.

Assets to local boating enthusiasts continued to mount with notice of another addition to the boating program of the local waterways. Over at Seabrook Harbor a unique re-construction program is underway which will go a long ways toward giving boat owners and fishermen top facilities on both sides of Hampton River.

Public officials in the Town of Seabrook, the N. H. Department of Public Works and Highway and the Seacoast Region office are rapidly concluding preparations for the twenty-second birthday of the newly rebuilt Public Pier at Seabrook Harbor. The two hundred foot long wooden structure was built by the State Highway Department in 1942 at the time of the re-construction of the Hampton River Bridge.

The original structure, a well designed pier with a wide walkway, was completed with a ramp and large floats. Several years ago, an early winter storm severely damaged the floats and the pier fell into a period of neglect. A commercial fishing operator became the primary user of the pier and performed some necessary maintenance in the intervening years. The Town officials discussed the abandonment of the pier on several occasions but the interest of the fishermen at the harbor kept the facility operating.

Since 1960, two things happened which focused attention on the pier; first was the rapid increase in pleasure boating activities all along the New Hampshire coast and the second was the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers program for the improvement of Hampton and Seabrook Harbors. The Corps of Engineers proposed a three quarter of a million dollar project which would widen the channels, construct jetties and provide anchorages in both harbors. Local participation was required along with that of the State of New Hampshire. Last July, Gov. John W. King signed into
