For Miss Higson, the adage of "if at first you don't succeed,, try, try again" was borne out. The 5 ft. 5 in., 19 year old beauty reached the top 15 girls in both the 1963 Miss New England contest and the 1963 Miss Hampton Beach contest. This year, in a close contest, she went all the way to become the new queen of New England.

Dianne was sponsored by the Hampton Beach Life Guards. She sported a 35-21-35, 112lb. figure. She resides at 90 Andrews Street in Lowell, Mass



On the day of the 1964 Miss New England Contest Mrs. Blanche (Thompson) Worcestor, 4 Parkview lane, Bradford, Mass., returned to the scene of her triumph of nearly 50

Mrs. Worcestor was the first beach queen at Hampton Beach. Back on September 9, 1915 she was crowned as the Carnival Queen. How did she win? It was a little different in those days. In order to meet expenses for the Carnival week activities which were always held the week following Labor Day instead of the week prior as is now done, candidates for the honors were called upon to solicit funds.

The 1915 beach queen recalls that she took the top honors as she was able to collect (with the help of her dad) something over \$300. For her efforts she received a large heart shaped box of candy, a small diamond ring and an airplane ride
