Tuck Museum and the One Room School House will be open to the public.

This year's program will include a picnic of members of the Historical Society at 5 p.m.

Arrangements are under the direction of Mrs. Donald Murphy, Mrs. Norman Coffin, and Mrs. Thayer Barry.

### Huge Parade Kicks Off August Festival

One of the largest and longest parades in the history of the annual affair at Hampton Beach is slated to get underway at 1 p.m. on Saturday afternoon, August 22, as the August festival activities swing into high gear.

The parade will leave the state park area where it will be formed at 1 p.m. sharp. All units including bands, parades, floats, antique cars and others are asked to report at the state park area no later than 12:15 p.m. on August 22.

This year's parade will be a joint effort of the Hotel Association, Precinct and the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce as the two heretofore parades are joined into one large unit. One change has been made in this year's parade route. The line of march will again begin at the state park area, but it will also continue through to Rocky Bend where it will disband. In previous years it was concluded at Ashworth corner.

Chamber officials announced this week that efforts had been made to see if the parade could be started at the northerly end of the beach and march south. Following considerable discussion and meetings with state and local officials, this was deemed not feasible.

Seven bands will participate in the units and they will be sponsored by local beach establishments. Participating this year will be the Sacred Heart group of Lowell, Mass.; the Spacetown Cadets from Derry; the Starlighters, a comparatively new unit from Pelham, N. H.; St. Mary's Drum and Bugle Corps from Mass.; the Marine Corps Drum and Bugle Corps from the U. S. Naval Disciplinary Barracks of the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and the Hampton Beach Concert Band.

At least four sponsors for the bands have already been named.



With the water at an accommodating 65 degrees, Parke McCarthy, Lowell, Mass. swam his way to double wins in the 50 yard and 100 yard dashes last year.

Roger Cayre, Lowell, Mass., also took twin wins in the 440 and 880.

This year, however, in recent days, the water has been unusually cold. Head guard Stone said if the water is not at least 58° to 60° Saturday, the races will be held Sunday, August 23.

In another innovation started last year, all life guards are required to participate in the 440 event.

## "A Taste Of Honey" Intense, Provocative

All of us at some time come to the well of love and understanding to drink deeply of life! For most there are some sweet satisfying experiences — but for many, many others the well is dry and bitter. It is about the "others" that this week's production at the Hampton Playhouse, "A Taste of Honey", deals so beautifully and intensely.

But when you go to see "A Taste of Honey", do so with an open mind and an open heart. Otherwise you will find the play abhorrent and disgusting from the very nature of its characters — a love affair between a white girl and a negro; a delicate relationship between a homosexual and a pregnant girl; and the uninhibited antics of a prostitute with her fancy man. Not a very pretty alliance of human beings — but dramatically intriguing!

Katherine Helmond — an unusually fine actress — brings a great awareness and depth to her portrayal of the young girl, Josephine. The frustration, the passion, the longing comes through clearly and with moving intensity as Miss Helmond shows thorough understanding of her characterization.

The love making with the Negro sailor is handled with natural self-effacement. There is no awkwardness or self-conscious effort in the scene due in great part to the exceptional acting of Milton Forrest. This handsome young Negro makes the affair seem acceptable and growing out of natural instincts and desires.

Another portrayal which required unusual skill to keep the play from degenerating into a maudlin mess is the characterization of the homosexual that takes up housekeeping with the young girl after she has been abandoned by her Negro lover and her street-walking mother. James Whittle use of great sensitivity and delicacy — understandable deviate whose heart and spirit cry out for help rather than repudiation. His artistry is worthy of highest praise.

Betty Froman Bright — a real lady in her own character — had to push her acting skill to the very limit to portray the vulgar prostitute in "A Taste of Honey" — and she does! Her antics with her fancy man, Peter, help set a sordid background for a squalid situation. And J. Frank Lucas, as the fancy man, solidly holds down a key anchor post in this five character play. The flowing quality of the stage movement, the nuance of the voice and inflection, and the details of gesture and expression reveal the fine attention to detail given the cast by
