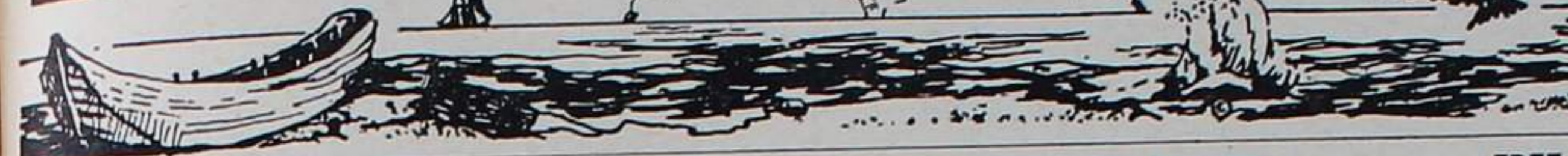

Pretty Sheila Scott, attired in a strikingly white evening gown, officially became Miss Hampton Beach of 1964-1965 during impressive coronation ceremonies at the Casino Ballroom Friday, evening, August 21.

Approximately 9:15 p.m., Miss Beverly Hebert, the outgoing Miss Hampton Beach, relinquished her title as she placed the crown on the head of Miss Scott. Miss Hebert, during her reign, was also named Miss New Hampshire for the Miss Universe contest and only recently returned from Miami Beach, Florida where she took part in the Miss U.S.A., and Miss Universe contests.

Amid a spectacular array of beautiful girls and colorful evening gowns of all the colors of the rainbow Sheila watched as more than 80 girls took part in the Coronation Ball. Several beach officials termed the ball one of the most beautiful since the innovation of the ceremonies.

Master of ceremonies "Bill" Elliot introduced each girl who took part in the program. All the girls were presented bouquets of flowers to carry. Each girl was introduced briefly from the stage of the ballroom. Following the introduction of the girls in the court, the special guests of honor ascended the stage steps to complete Queen Sheila's court.

Heading the list of distinguished guests was Miss Diane Lipson, Miss Hampton Beach of 1959 and Miss New Hampshire for the Miss Universe contest for 1960. Miss New England, Diane Higson, was also introduced and held a prominent spot in the king's court. Her pages were Kenny Bronk and John Slattery.

Miss Hampton Beach, Sheila Scott, reached the high point of a summer she will never forget as she began her year's reign. Entering the stage with her two pages, Matthew and Michael Cushing, Sheila was later presented a bouquet of flowers by the flower girl Wendy Rae Sacks. The crown bearer was Joanne Valhouli.

During the evening, the Tilton Sisters from Danvers, Mass. recent participants and winners in the weekly talent show, sang three songs.

Following the coronation ceremonies, Miss Scott led the large group in attendance in the traditional grand march. The entire production was under the direction of Mr. Henry Hamel, production manager at the chamber of commerce. The unique and beautiful stage decorations forming the backdrop for the Coronation Ball were designed and constructed by Mr. and Mrs. John Valhouli of Hale Shoe Store, Fountain from Angelo's Florist Water St., Haverhill, Mass.

All other events will be held as scheduled.

DANCING NIGHTLY

The Story Of "Smalltown" On NBC Sept. 18 At 10 p.m.

There is one television show we intend to see this season even if we miss all the rest. And that is "Smalltown" which will be aired over the NBC network on Friday, September 18 at 10:00-11:00 p.m., EST. We think our readers will want to see it too.

This NBC "Special Project" will deal with what it classifies as:

"Dream Town"—picture postcard of prosperity, abundance and contentment, but not all it seems.

"Strip town"—usually a collection of villages along an umbilical main highway that brings travellers from the cities and local farm boys to its clip joints.

"Dying Towns"—bleak and boarded up, its people bleak and defeated.

"Trailer Cities"—which offer "economic survival at the expense of cultural heritage" to migrant workers and retirees; and, finally, the

"Suicide Towns"—that refuse in their current prosperity to look on the face of approaching doom.

This documentary is narrated with sympathy, even tenderness, by one-time small boy, Fredric March who says in his opening remarks: "Half a century separates these small towns as they were in my day from what they are today. There is a way of life in them; it has been called the grass-roots, a cultural heritage, that is America. Some disagree and in this Space Age, they insist there is no time, no need for our traditional basic decencies. It is these people who feel that our democratic ideal is old-fashioned." His eulogy, in short, is elegy: "How lovely it was," he says.

"But, was it really as we remember it?" he asks. "Perhaps not."

"But perhaps so! We are not about to admit that our town is no longer lovely, that the day is gone "when all the faces on the street were familiar and so many were friendly." Nor, by the same token, will we insist there is no room for improvement.

Perhaps our town is an exception. But to grant that is to say that America is no longer America. More rational we think, is the view that our nation, born in travail must live in travail, will not only die when all of us—in cities, in towns, and in the country—cease to struggle for our security and our freedom.

Change has come faster and faster. It has brought dislocations and ugliness with it—to small and big. And, if we are any judge, small town people—who are the self-reliant Americans—have taken it in far better stride.

Watch "Smalltown." Accept its warnings.

But judge our town for yourself.

Adopt Project Schedule For Hampton Harbor Work

State and local officials this week adopted a tentative project schedule for work to be undertaken at Hampton Harbor and Hampton Beach.

Sen. Douglass Hunter this week said that a final endorsement had been received from the Army Engineers and that a special committee consisting of himself, John Batchelder of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, Mal Chase, Special Projects Engineer for the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways and Richard Smith secretary of the New Hampshire Port Authority had met to set up future plans.

Although the list of dates associated with the dredging of the harbor, constructing of jetties and renoirishing of Hampton Beach with sand is still "strictly tentative" according to officials, it appears now, weather permitting, work will get underway between Dec. 1 and Dec. 15 of this year.

A survey party of Army Engineers has been busy for some time going over previous plans of the harbor area and will continue to do so. Following compilation of all this necessary data, electronic soundings of the areas to be worked on will be undertaken. This will take approximately two weeks. But the project has been officially adopted as a Federal project and final survey and acceptance has been made of the area.

This actually culminates nearly ten years of work and planning. Sen. Hunter said officials have been reviewing reports of studies and plans dating back to 1954.

As it looks now, the agenda for the actual work on the harbor and beach reads as follows:

Middle of September — survey reading of all data available and compiled to that time. This will be followed by a meeting of the same aforementioned officials who hope to arrive at a final acceptance so that work can be started. The committee meeting will be followed by another meeting wherein all interested persons including town officials, fisherman, boat owners and others will review the work plan.

Oct. 1 — Compilation of all surveys and field notes. Acceptance of final draft by Army Engineers.

Nov. 1 — Specifications and plans to go out for bid.

Dec. 1 — Opening of bids.

Dec. 15 — Work to be started by this date depending upon weather.

May 1 — Approximate deadline for completion of all projects.

Pawtuckaway State Park Discussed At Committee Meeting

The Rockingham County Rural Areas Development Committee met on July 1, 1964 to discuss aspects of the Pawtuckaway State Park and its impact upon the town of Nottingham. Present at the meeting were John Rowe, Commissioner of the Department of Resources and Economic Development, Russell Tobey, Director of Parks, the Selectmen and Planning Board members from Nottingham and other interested citizens.

The RAD Committee has long been interested in this project and highly endorses the decision to place a park in the Paw-

tuckaway region. It was concerned, however, with any undue hardships upon the town that might arise from the fact that the state will own approximately 20 percent of the land area of the town. The problem here, of course, is that the town will lose taxable property presently amounting to approximately 10 percent of the annual gross revenue. This, coupled with the fact that the State has no plans for an access road to the park through the town and thereby voiding the town of any economic benefit from visitors to the park, prompted this meeting.

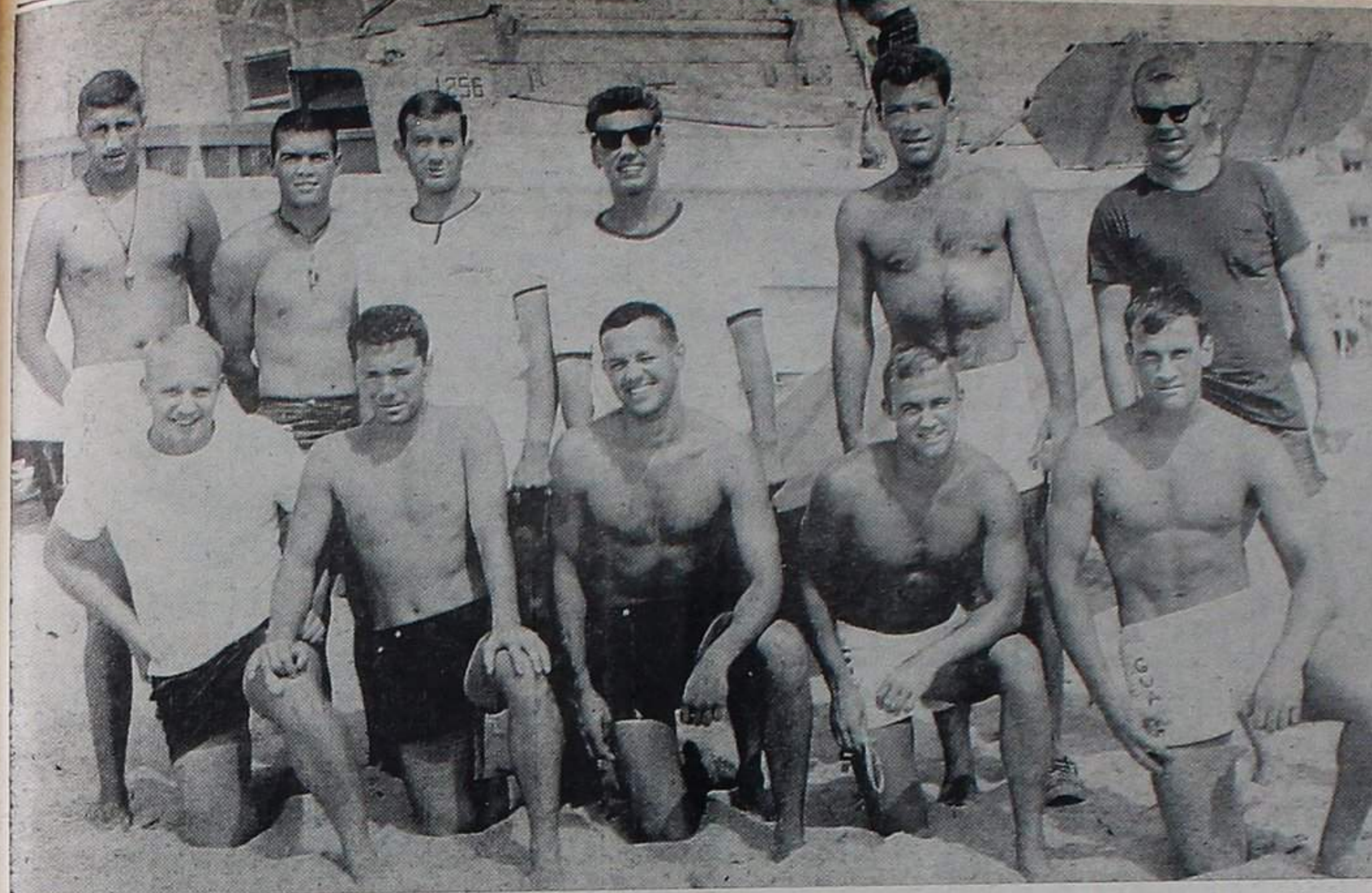


Next to the last week of the summer season is upon us. If you were looking for me last week—well, I'll let the editor explain that one to my loyal readers.

The lively arts can not stray as far from traditional form as the fine arts because pure abstraction is the use of line, shapes and colors without reference to natural objects.

Actors, themselves, are natural objects and they project their media with natural talents so the theatre arts can not be purely abstract—but "Oh Dad, Poor Dad" which is playing at the Hampton Playhouse this week comes very near to it with its distortion of the traditional.

To be entertaining, a play must capture and hold its audience and to be a significant play it must contain something of value. "Oh Dad, Poor Dad" does both in a most interesting and gripping manner. Your personal interpretation will probably vary from your seat-mates or from every other member of the audience but you will be moved by it and entranced by the action on the stage.

When Jeannette Cliff—a beautiful but sinister Madame Rosepettle—does her expository scene, she casts a spell over the audience. With witchlike incantation, she builds the monologue to a crashing crescendo that will have you twisting your program or grasping the arms of your seat. Her performance was superb!

In the extremely difficult role of the mentally disturbed son, a young actor—Peter Bailey—reveals a fine potential and depth of talent while Katherine Helmond continues to show her great versatility with another triumph in the role of the nymphomaniac.

The mark of a fine actor is the ability to project atmosphere by merely being present on-stage. Louis Beachner is this kind of an actor and his does much to give a large measure of interpretation to "Oh Dad, Poor Dad" when he just sits at a table bewitched during the long revelation soliloquy.

Life Guard Kevin Donahue Makes Dramatic Sea Rescue

Hampton Beach veteran life guard Kevin Donahue of Woburn, Mass. made a dramatic rescue last week from the waters just south of the U. S. Coast Guard Station at North Beach.

Assisted to safety from the surf which was extremely rough at the time was Louis Savintino, Elmeroff Road, Stamford, Conn. Mr. Savintino had been staying at a 15th street residence at North Beach.

Donahue, noticing two girls caught on the rocks approximately 200 yards south of the Coast Guard station, went to their assistance. As he approached them, they yelled that Mr. Savintino was in trouble.

Meanwhile, Dennis Walsh, another guard on duty with Donahue, ran up the beach to get a life buoy. He returned it to Donahue who swam through the heavy surf approximately 100 yards to Mr. Savintino's aid. Donahue found that the man was too tired to move so he got the buoy on his chest and started towards shore.

The Beach guard said that as he spotted Mr. Savintino, it did not look as if he were in trouble. But he later found that the man had lost his strength, had become exhausted and was floating to rest himself.

Meanwhile, a Coast Guard boat had been launched and had gone to the rescue. But Donahue, after some time, began to make headway and finally got the man ashore.

Chief Frances Bajowski, in charge of the beach Coast Guard station, had high praise for Donahue and called the rescue a "spectacular save."

He noted that the man was much larger than the smaller Donahue.

For Donahue, it was his second major assist of the summer. He also aided in the plane crash tragedy of several weeks ago although it was his brother Jim, who actually made the original rescue at that time.

Head life guard Dan Stone also had high praise for Donahue following the save.

No matter which way you say it, you're suggesting using credit. To buy an item on credit means that you can buy now and pay later.

Our Yankee forefathers don't have approved of credit at all. Even today many people immediately assume that using credit is bad. Others use credit for almost everything they buy. Using credit isn't always bad or unwise, but neither is it always wise. Credit can be dangerous if used wrongly.

How do you decide whether or not to use credit? Take a look at the advantages. It's convenient. You can use things while paying for them. You get better service. It's handy in an

emergency. Sound good? Now look at the disadvantages of using credit. It's expensive. You may find it very easy to overspend. You may not shop around as carefully for the best buy. The terms of credit buying are hard to understand.

Some of the words used by people extending credit are difficult to understand completely. Here are some of the common terms with their definitions.

BALANCE—the amount you still owe on an account at any given time.

COLLATERAL—the property

The Director is specifically authorized to negotiate with agencies of the U.S. Government such as the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and various agencies of the State of New Hampshire in the interest of the further development of the Marine Fisheries industries of Seabrook Harbor and related matters.

The Director announced that one of the first projects that is to be undertaken will be to negotiate with the Fish and Game Department for the removal of mussels from the Seabrook Middle Grounds as provided for in a special act passed during the last legislative session. The Director, who has been working closely with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on the Seabrook-Hampton Harbor project since 1957, will continue to work in coordinating and liaison capacity.

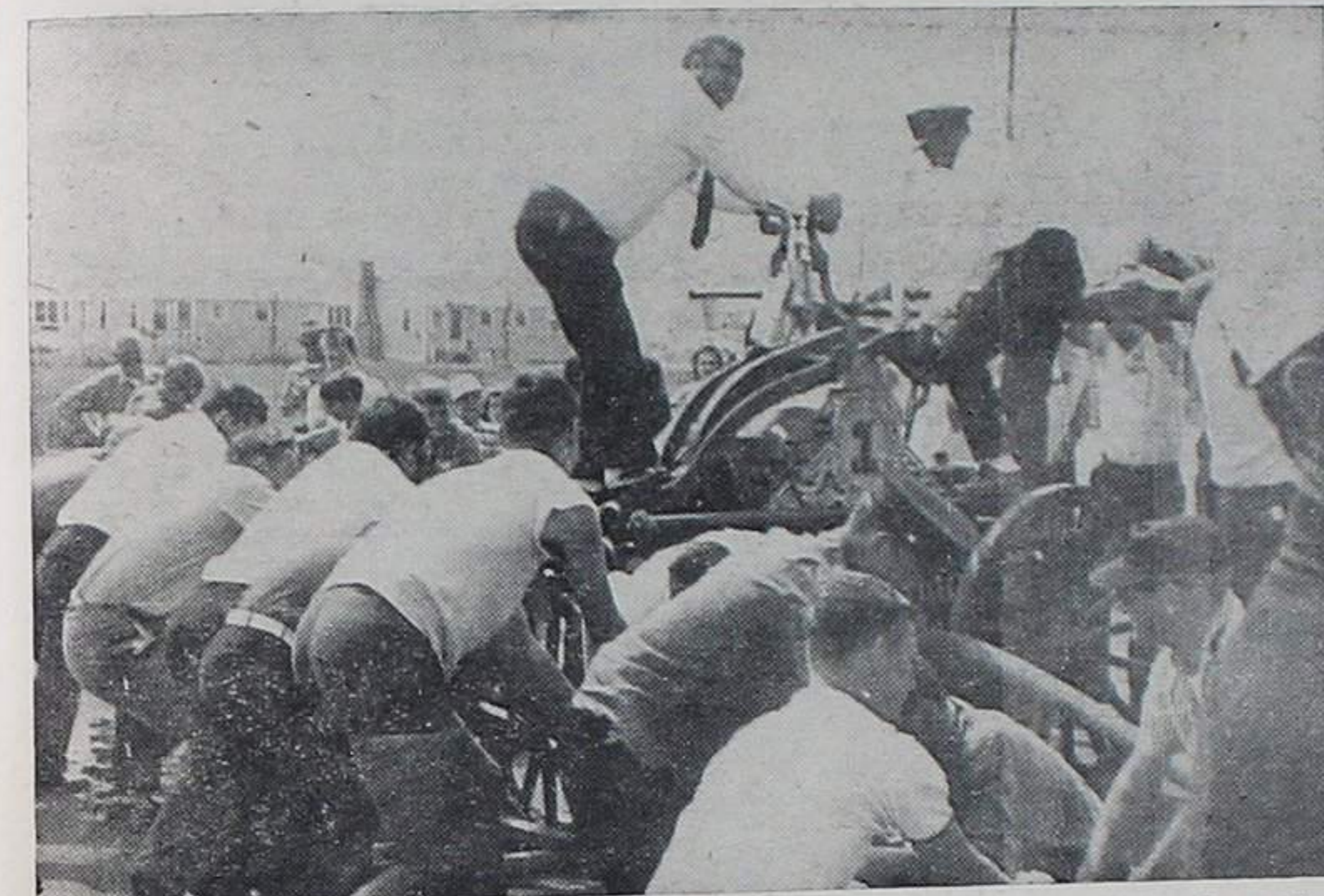

Thousands Jam Boulevard For Huge Parade

Thousands jammed the sides of Ocean Boulevard to watch one of the largest parades in beach history on Saturday morning.

The many decorated floats and convertibles were joined by 26 different firemen's groups and some of the prettiest beauty queens of the year.

Before the parade began, Miss Pat Curtin of Lawrence, Mass., was chosen Muster Queen of 1964-65. She was sponsored by Engine No. 3 Niagara of Brunswick, Maine.

Runners in the contest were Miss Marla McCourt of Portsmouth, sponsored by Engine D. A. Taggart of Goffstown, N. H. and in third place, Miss Janet Parker of Haverhill, Mass., sponsored by Engine Androscroggin of Topsham, Maine.

Although there were many beautiful floats in the parade, the judges finally selected "Ships of New England" with the Newburyport Rainbow girls as the best hotel sponsored float.

The best all-around floats selected were Hale Shoe store, a horse drawn float sponsored by the Hotel Association and The Patio.

The best antique was the Ben Richard Special, a 1908 Ford. The best Firemen's Muster musical group was the Oko's of Marblehead, Mass.

The parade was extra long this year because a postponement two weeks ago forced a combination of the annual beach parade with muster parade.

In the muster, the Volunteer of East Greenwich Conn., and the Hancock of Ashburnham, Mass., won first place in each division.

Hand Engines Make Beach Muster Success

Twenty six hand engines competed last Saturday at Hampton Beach in the largest firemen's Muster in New England in more than 20 years.

A first prize of \$200 went to the "Volunteer" of East Greenwich, Conn. in class A and to the "Hancock" of Ashburnham, Mass. in class B.

The day's activity, which began with a beauty contest at 9:30 a.m. and concluded with the muster finals at 7:30 was marred by one accident. Allen

Bowen, 23, of Milford, Mass. at the Exeter Hospital and released.

Several of the early starters in the muster were handicapped by a cross wind which did not stop until midway in the meet.

The "Winnacunnet" No. 1 owned by the Hampton Beach Firemen's Relief Association, put in its first appearance under its new owners. The pride of the men and their desire to excel was a bit too great and one of the brakes was snapped in the first attempt to shoot a stream. The engine did shoot a stream of 161' 4" and this was the leading score until the wind changed.

The winning A tub hit 215' 6" and it was followed by the "Protection" No 1 of Newbury with a stream of 201' 4". This tub holds the world's record of more than 275 feet. Second place money was \$150.

"Niagara" No 3 of Brunswick, Maine, was third with a stream of 197' 10" and the L.V. Spaulding" of Haverhill, Mass. was fourth with 190' 4". Third and fourth place collected \$75 and \$50 each.

Second place in class B went to "Tiger No 1" of Newmarket with a length of 179' 4". In third place was "D. A. Taggart" of Goffstown, N. H. with a stream of 167' 3". "Androscroggin" of Topsham, Maine, was fourth with 152' 5".
