18th Miss Beach Contest Tuesday

Approximately 40 girls from many areas of the United States are expected to participate in the upcoming 18th Annual Miss Hampton Beach Beauty Pageant to be held at the Casino Ballroom next Tuesday, July 20th. One noticeable feature in the pageant during recent years is that it has attracted many local area girls. This year is no exception with several girls from New Hampshire already being registered.

For four consecutive years the home state of New Hampshire has dominated the local beauty scene. Last year pretty Sheila Scott, a Hampton Beach resident at the time, took top honors on her first try. A year previous, Beverly Ann Hebert of Manchester was the winner. Beverly later went on to represent New Hampshire in the Miss Universe Contest at Miami Beach, Florida. Still a year earlier, Jonnye McLeod, a Hampton girl walked off with the title and to make it four years in a row, Sandie Kaye of Plaistow, one of the few girls to hold both the Miss Hampton Beach and Miss New England title also won. Sandie and Jonnye also represented New Hampshire at the Miss Universe Contest. Sheila, one of few girls to cop the title at the age of 16, was deemed too young to compete in the Miss Universe Contest.

Over the years the BEACHCOMBER has had more than a passing interest in the show which has become probably the greatest single attraction in the Hampton Beach summer program. One of the Eastern Seaboard's largest and most fascinating beauty shows, the Miss Hampton Beach pageant as it is known today got its start on an idea conceived by the late editor of the BEACH-

Miss Hampton Beach crown. At Miami she was one of the youngest girls to compete in the Miss Universe Contest.

More recently, Fran Houlihan of Seabrook, recent Winacunnet High School graduate took the Miss New England crown two years ago. Last summer, trying to become the second girl to hold both titles, Fran was edged by her fellow classmate Sheila Scott.

Over the years the contest has been both large and small. In 1950 only 11 girls competed but in 1956 a record high which still stands, 44 young ladies took part. The early contests were held on the now historic bandstand which was demolished two years ago to make way for the new Sea Shell facilities. The pageant is now held each year in the Casino Ballroom.

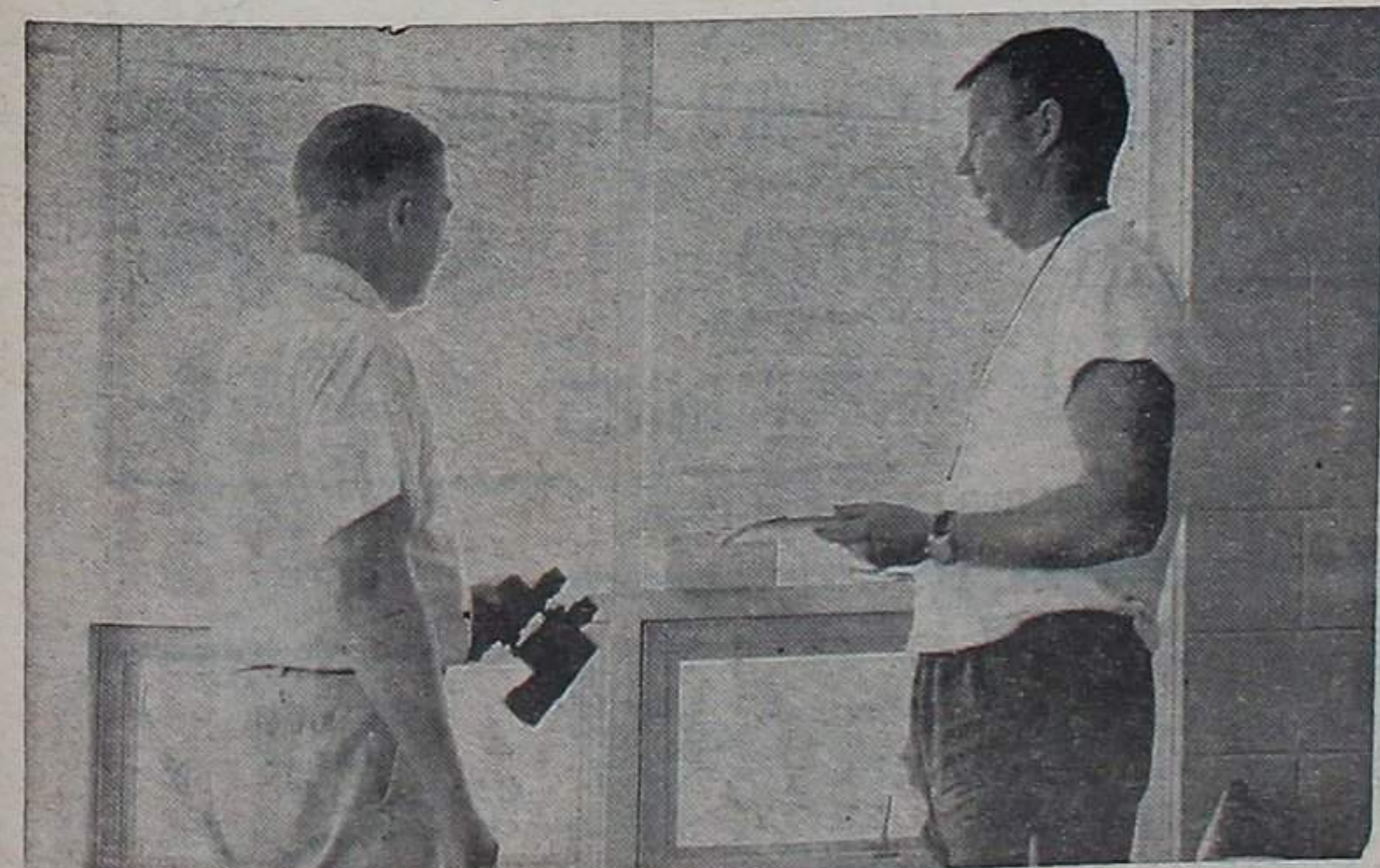
Another outstanding feature of the Miss Hampton Beach story is the work of Production Manager Henry Hamel. In his 13th year with the local chamber, Henry, year after year, has persuaded girls to enter the contest with many being reluctant to do so. But in the case of Beverly Hebert, Jonnye McLeod, Sandie Kaye, Dianne Lipson, Carolyn Koutant, Sally Ann Freedman,

Sandra Ramsey, Sandra Sadowski and Lyla Moran among others, a proud Mr. Hamel has seen his girls bring honors not only to themselves but also to their respective states in achieving national fame. All the above mentioned girls participated in the Miss America or Miss Universe Contests following their starts at Hampton Beach.

Another man who has worked exceedingly hard on the productions and promotions at Hampton Beach is the executive secretary, "Bill" Elliot. Mr. Elliot, each year, serves as a "father" away from home for the girls. His pre-pageants backstage talks with the girls just prior to the actual performance has dispelled much nervousness on the parts of the girls. Mr. Elliot is a human dynamo of energy when it comes to final preparations for the productions at the beach. Both he and Mr. Hamel have put in many long hours being reluctant to do so. 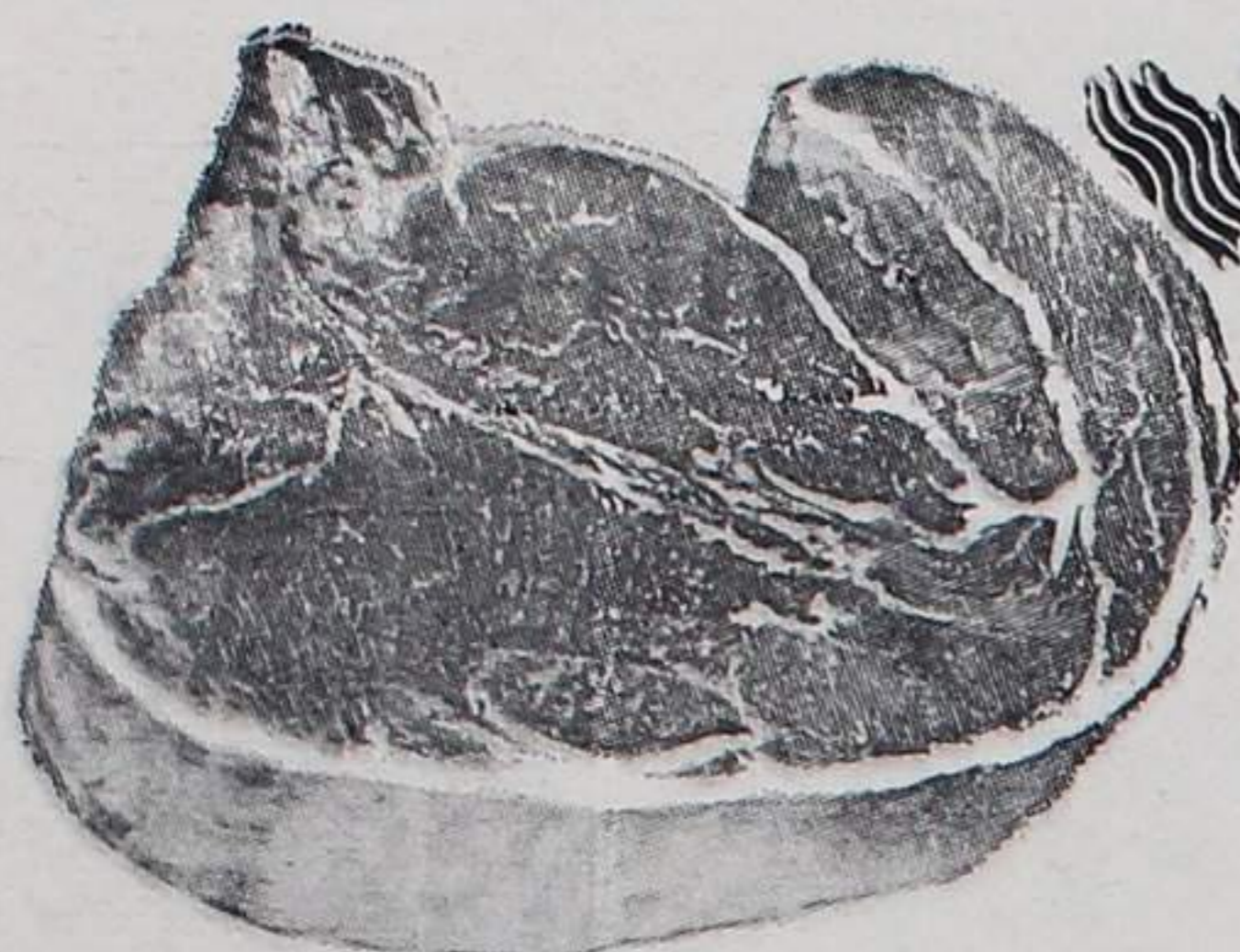

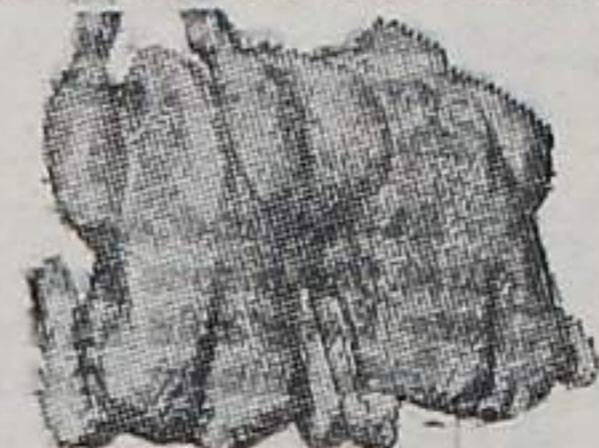

The late Pulitzer Prize winning playwright, Robert Sherwood, once wrote that a man who wants to be a playwright had better have his first play produced by the time he is thirty, or give up. It was this dire warning that made George Axelrod rush his comedy "The Seven Year Itch" to completion to barely beat the deadline. But Sherwood's dictum didn't hold for Summer Arthur Long, author of the enormously popular Broadway comedy hit, "Never Too Late", which is coming to the Hampton Playhouse next week. For Long was 42 when his comedy was first presented in New York in the fall of 1962 (it ran to continuously large audiences until April 1965). He proved that it was indeed "never too late" for him. His

discharged debut was not only better than never. It was tremendous. Born in Boston in 1920, he left high school before getting a diploma and went to work as a printer's devil. Feeling that the printers' trade had no future for him, he enlisted in the Navy in 1940, and was at Pearl Harbor when the Japanese dropped their bombs there in December 1941. Discharged after five naval years, he could not take advantage of the GI bill to get a college education because he had no high school diploma. He decided that he must gamble for big stakes in his career. To take the kind of job for which he was qualified, such as a gas station attendant, would never be his springboard. He concluded that being a writer was his only op-

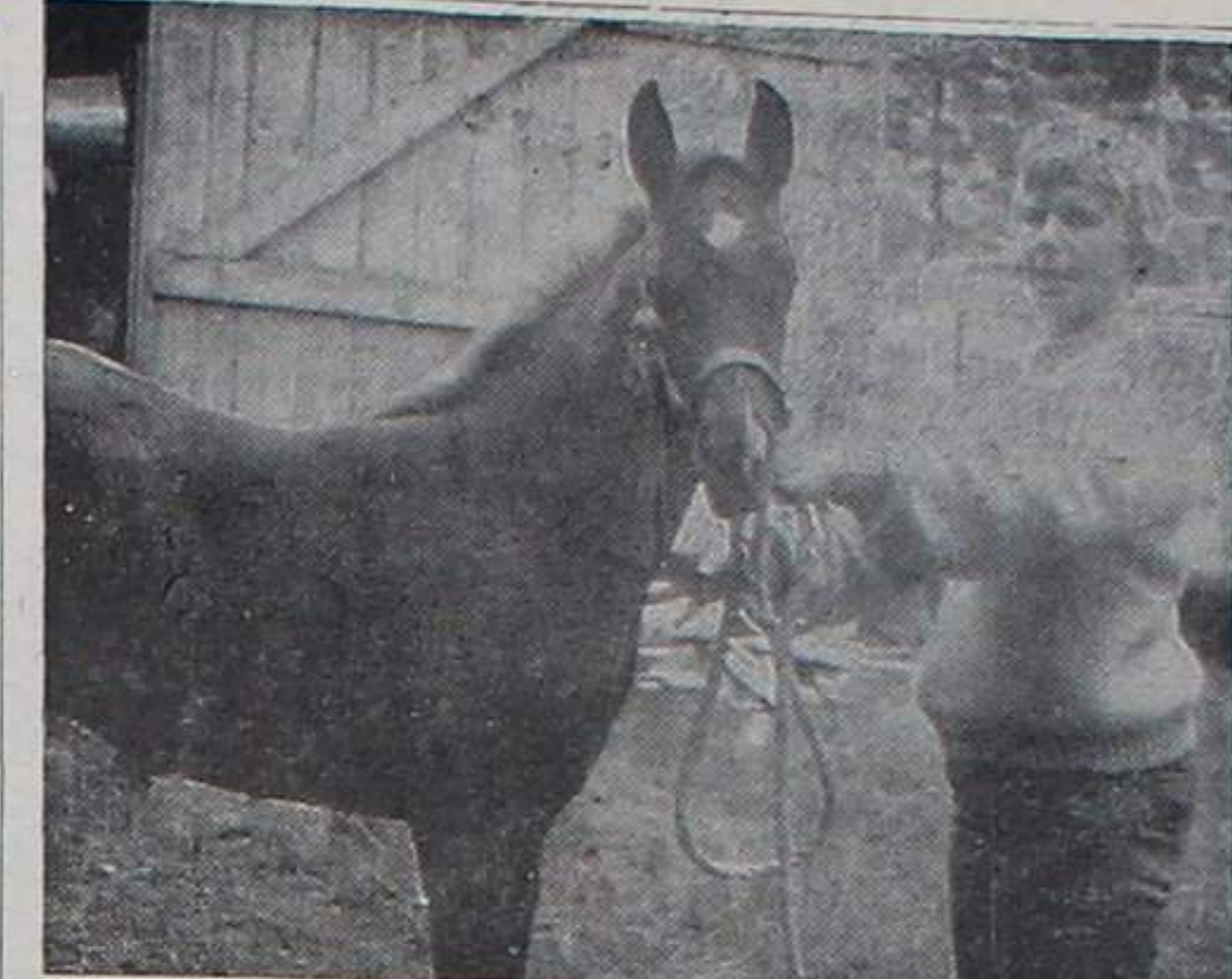

portunity to go upward with a quick, high bounce. He didn't know anything about writing but he thought he could teach himself. With his service savings he put up a Quonset hut on the dunes of Provincetown, Mass., Cape Cod, lived largely on fish he caught by surf-casting and for nearly three years went on a reading binge. He also wrote two novels as practice runs that he refused to burn later. Abandoning the beach he set off for the likeliest writers' market — Hollywood. He arrived with just \$22 in resources. It turned out to be enough, for almost immediately he sold a story outline to Columbia Pictures and began a steady \$200-a-week job writing the outline into a film scenario. Thus launched, Long continued for twelve years to make a good livelihood as a writer in film and TV studios in Hollywood, until the success of "Never Too Late" made him rich.

At the end of the comedy first prosperous year on Broadway Long told an interviewer a little smugly, that "the play has made a bum out of me. By which he meant that he had enjoyed all the rewards of success without doing more else — he had gone to all the parties to which a successful playwright is invited, he had enjoyed visits to the opening of the road company and the London opening, attending to the sale of the movie rights and the foreign rights, and otherwise "managing his property."

The rewards have been fairly tidy — over half a million so far, with more constantly accruing from the foreign productions, stock and amateur presentations and his royalties when "Never Too Late" plays at the Hampton Playhouse this week.

CAVE For Interested Youth
After the Labor Day disturbances of September, 1964, the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce launched a year-long program designed to improve the image of Hampton Beach. At that time, the TAP (Teen Age Problems) Committee was established, from this effort emerged the TAR (Teen Age Relations) Committee. CAVE (Committee to Avoid Violent Eruptions) developed as the youth sponsored - supported program as a result of the TAR Committee's interest in promoting better communication and understanding between the youth and adult communities. With a grant from the Federal Government to finance the program, the Hampton Beach Project assumed a definitive form approximately four months ago, and began its work at the Beach for the C.A.V.E.

State Takes Control Of Beach Lifeguards

The equipping, paying and supervision of the life guards of Hampton Beach formerly changed hands from the Town of Hampton to the State of New Hampshire last week on July 7.

A long time in coming, the move was finally made possible through legislative action with the House, Senate and finally the Governor concurring. Official announcement was made by John Lyford, Water Safety Supervisor for the Division of Parks for the State of New Hampshire.

Lyford has been at the beach for the past several days working with the local life guards in setting up the new program. Bringing the life guards under the jurisdiction of the state will also bring to the beach several changes in the future. Some will come in the immediate future while others will probably not be noticed until next year and ensuing seasons.

Lyford announced that the local guard contingent which has been handling the main beach and the North Beach area has now absorbed the life guards already on duty at the Hampton State Park and who were under the jurisdiction of the state. The new guard complement will be a total of 17 guards.

In addition to the regular guards Lyford announced that the head guard will be Dan Stone who will be retained in the position that he has held for several years while under the jurisdiction of the town. Head Guard Stone will be moved into more of a supervisory capacity under the new set up and will assume several new duties and responsibilities.

One of the most noticeable parts of the new program for the guards will be a program of continuing physical fitness and review of life saving techniques by the guards. Each morning the guards will meet for approximately an hour between 9 and 10 a.m. on the beach in front of the Sea Shell. Depending on the size of the crowd at the beach the guards will then go through their regular morning calisthenics program preparatory for the day's activities. This will be followed by a continuing program in review of life saving techniques, plus learning of all the new methods. The guards will be working out in the water, they will practice with the torpedo buoys, boats surf boards and other life saving techniques.

Lyford is also in charge of the first aid facilities and the first aid headquarters at the Sea Shell manned by Mrs. McDonald will now come under his jurisdiction. However, the lifeguards will now also be giving Mrs. McDonald a boost with one guard being on first aid duty at the Sea Shell lifeguard headquarters each day. The lifeguards at the Hampton Beach State Park at the southern end of the beach will be handling first aid at that location.

Lyford stated this week that the public is invited to observe any of the workouts by the guards as they go through their daily training and physical fitness program. Other changes in the program will be forthcoming and they will be announced when they are made.

In contrast to last year's Fourth of July, this year's weekend displayed less tension, and unlike other areas of the U. S., Hampton Beach suffered no disturbances. Personal interviews gathered from the merchant population at the Beach reveal some interesting opinions about the Fourth. For example, Lt. McLeavy, of the Hampton Beach Police Force, said that in his opinion, "the kids were very well behaved".

Mr. Roberts said that such entertainment as the free folksinging program showed evidence of the community's "catering to the teenager" and that such behavior might be detrimental to the Beach since it could attract too large a crowd. Labonte said that this year's 4th of July was "much quieter". Mrs. Kurrier, director of the playground, said of the weekend, "it was marvelous! The behavior of the teenagers reveals a vast improvement and I think CAVE is a fine organization". William Elliot, of the Hampton Beach Chamber of Commerce, reported that so far as he was concerned this year's July Fourth weekend was "far, far better" than last year's holiday weekend. Gerald Dunfee, stated that he agreed with Chief of Police Paul Leavitt in saying that TAR and CAVE had a definite influence on the Beach's more relaxed attitude which permeated this year's Fourth of July atmosphere. He also felt that all forces should combine to support and emphasize the effort that CAVE is making as it works with the young people at the Beach. Pat Candio reported that in his opinion this year's Fourth of July weekend was one of the best on record. He observed that the crowd was very orderly and responsible and that they responded well to the folksinging program.

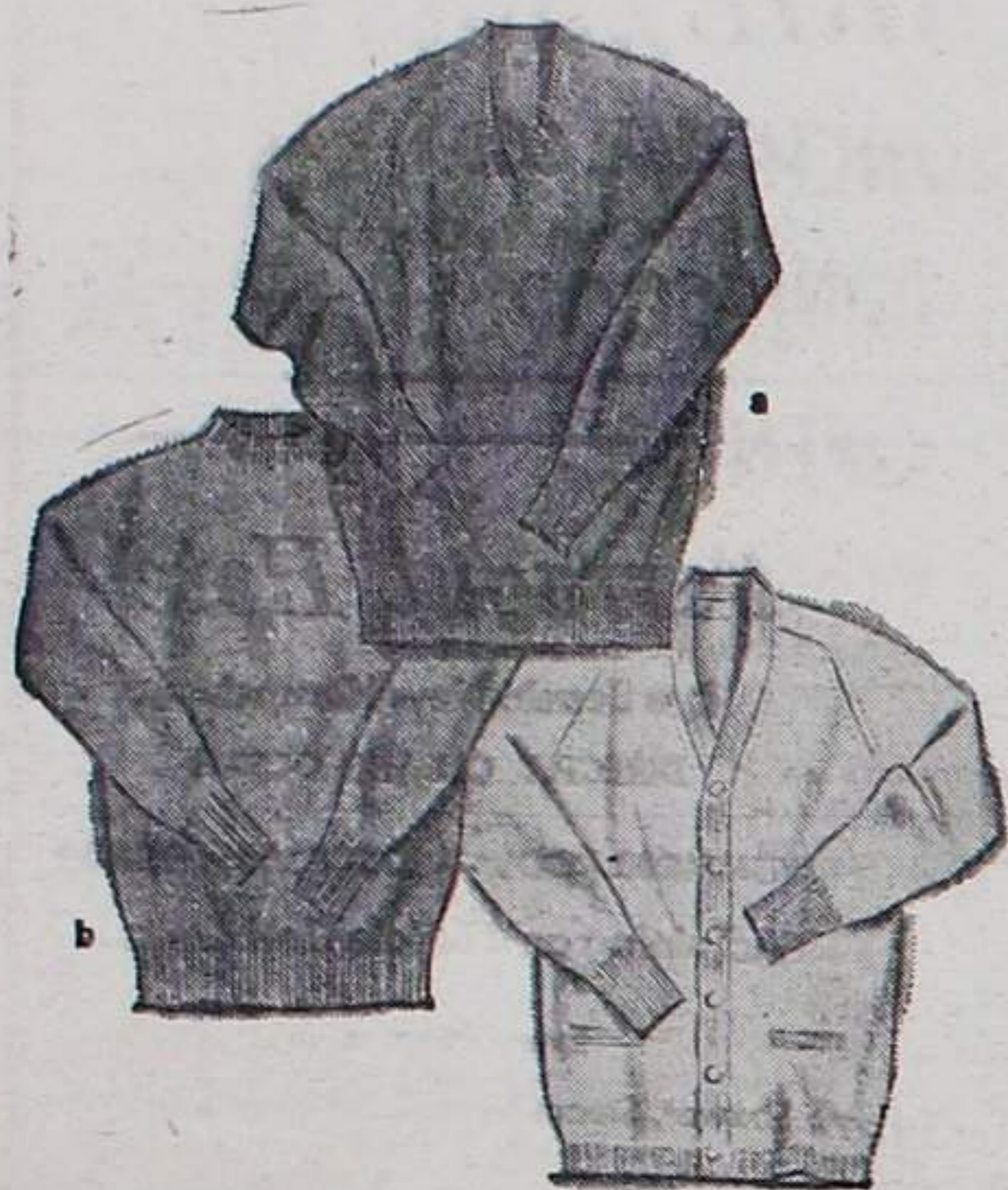

Third and fourth runners-up were Anita Finnegan, Hyde Park, Mass. and Candy Walker, Paris, France.

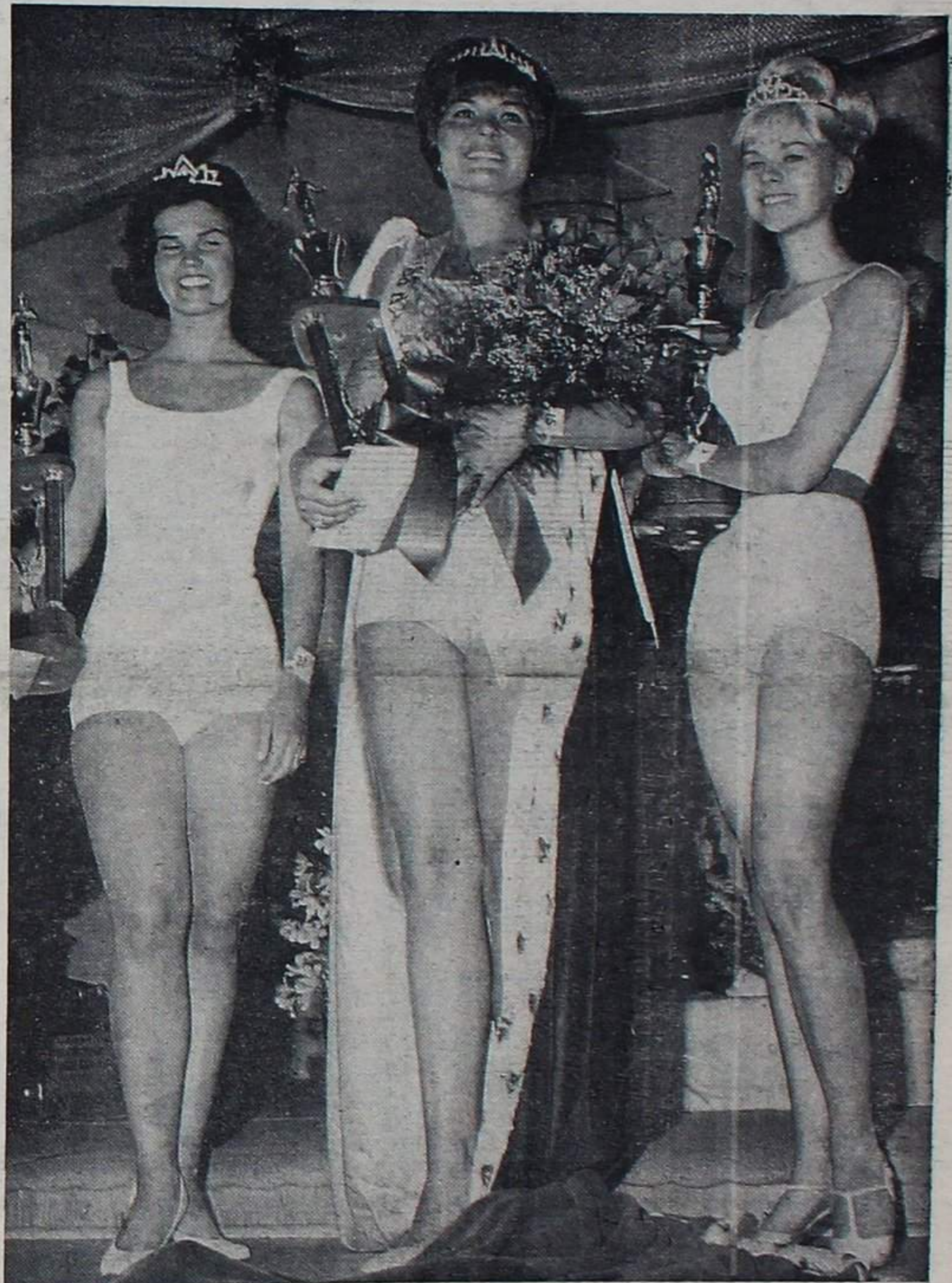

History, Art Displayed At Library

Mrs. Gertrude Dole of Haverhill, Mass., has a varied display of her charcoal, pastel, and oil paintings on exhibit at the Lane Memorial Library through July and August. The paintings include still life, landscapes, and portraits; also, Mrs. Dole has used the sea and coast as subjects for several of her paintings. Among the larger paintings are two of Mt. Chocorua, one in summer and one in winter. On display in the cases at the library is a collection of interesting historical documents the Revolutionary War; Town of the town of Hampton. The earliest is dated 1735 and is a Town Warrant calling for election of a representative to the Provincial General Assembly from the Province of New Hampshire. Other documents displayed are: Town Warrant to send a delegate to the New Hampshire Constitutional Congress, 1775; and immediately after the Revolutionary War; Town Invoices; Town Warrant to exempt soldiers from taxes from the current year 1776; Bill and Town Warrant for the payment of 1779, pertaining to the "future" Hampton's share of the cost of ownership of marsh lands.
