## Beach Muster One of Biggest Ever

A total of 27 hand tubs coming from as far away as Mystic, Conn. (the "Block Island") were assembled at Hampton Beach for a gigantic New England League Firemen's Muster during the past weekend.

The "Gardner 4" of West Newbury, Mass., with a stream of 235 feet emerged the Class A and over-all winner in the hand tub competition which was held during very strong, gusty winds and two rain showers. This didn't dampen the enthusiasm of the large delegation of fire fighters from all over New England, however, as foreman Dan Cashman and Head Pipeman Steve Cashman paced the "Gardner 4" to the well earned victory.

But it was the Class B winner, "Constitution", from New Boston which won the hearts of the spectators. Harlan Brown foreman of the tub, waited and waited for the wind to shift in the right direction. Although the crew nearly used its time up, Foreman Brown called it perfectly as he set his crew loose to forth a new record of 221 feet. Once again it was head pipeman Steve Cashman of West Newbury, Mass., on loan to the New Boston crew, who played the stream up into the cross wind with near perfection.

The Tiger 1 of Newmarket, N. H., was the winner of the John F. Cutter trophy for the third consecutive year.

In the parade competition which was held beginning at 10:30 a.m., the winner of the best parade unit was the group from the "Volunteer" of East Greenwich, Rhode Island. The honors for the best musical unit went to the Warwick Spartans of Warwick, Rhode Island.

The muster was one of the biggest ever held in New England. Local chairman, Perry Tarleton, was being congratulated from all corners following the day long festivities. Perry served as general chair-

man with Chief Perley George as co-chairman.

In the parade the police escort was provided by Chief Paul Leavitt. Chief Marshall was Chief Perley George. A color guard contingent led by Sgt. Leo Cook headed the parade. This group was from the Pease Air Force Base.

The musical unit with the most hand tub, "Winnacunnet 1," was the Granite State Highlanders from Dover. Miss Hampton Beach, Judy Reynolds, led one division of the parade as she rode in an open convertible furnished by Marble Motors of Haverhill, Mass. Fire Queen Miss Denise Putnam of Beverly, Mass., also rode in the parade and led the motor apparatus division. The parade consisted of modern fire apparatus from many surrounding towns, Smokey the Bear, and the hand drawn handtubs and their musical units.

The "Veto", the oldest piece of fire apparatus in the United States, having been built in 1796, was displayed by the Groveland, Mass., Fire department. The contingent from Kingston, N. H., drew its "miniature" hand tub (1894) in the parade.

All of the first place winners for the summer will return next Monday evening, August 30th to take part in the finals for the grand championship.

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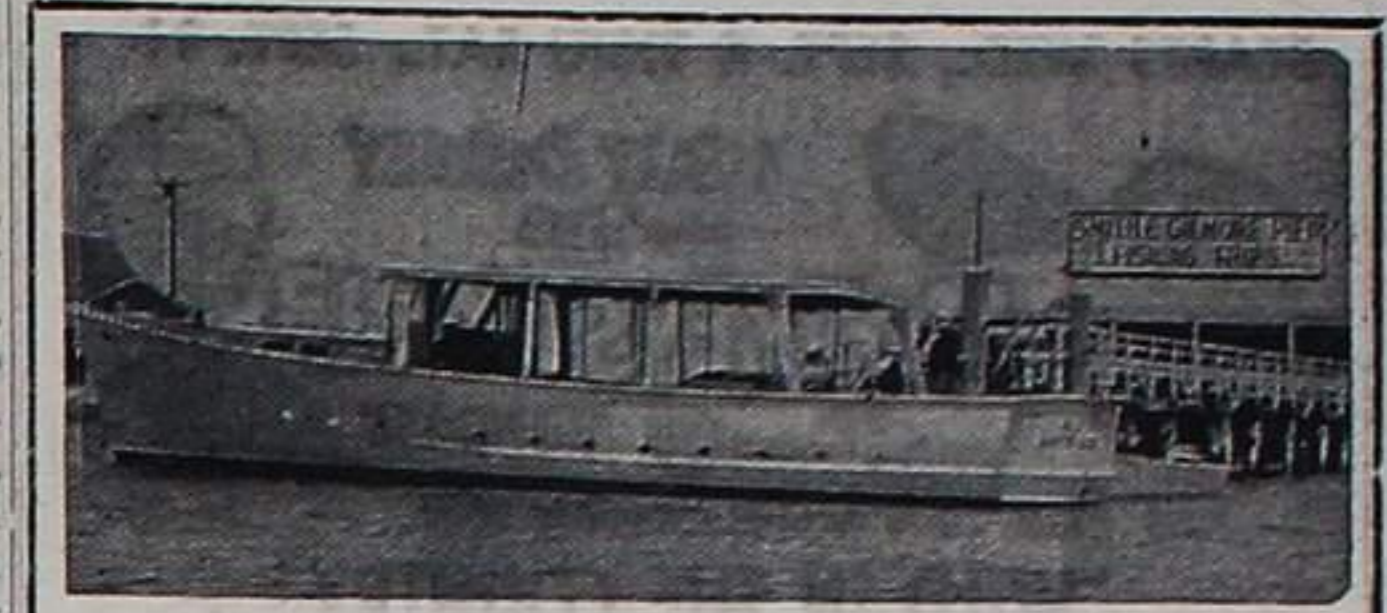

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### "Catch Me If You Can" Corking Good

The theatre season comes to a delightful close at the Hampton Playhouse this week with a corking good mystery comedy, "Catch Me If You Can" that will give you lots of laughter, continuous suspense and a unique twist at the end is fully as surprising as any devised by the mystery master, Agatha Christie.

The Iron Man of the Playhouse, Ian Sullivan, again takes on a lead role and thrills the audience with his characterization of a high-strung bridegroom who has lost his wife and finds himself in the middle of a cleverly devised swindle that will keep you on the edge of your seat.

Opposite him, Rue McClanahan sparkles as the co-gal who pretends to be his wife and Richard Kennedy splatters laughs all over the theatre as the detective trying to unravel the case while Thomas Baring adds a very smooth performance as the "priest" without portfolio.

Anthony Palmer contributes much to the humor—and suspense—as Sidney, the delicate operator who arrives in the middle of the swindle to deliver brunch. Charlotte Costello and Fred Hoskins fill out the cast in minor bits.

If you would like an evening to good entertainment, "Catch Me If You Can" is your dish of tea. The suspense-comedy starts out in high gear and as a critic you wait for the let down in the same manner that a fighter comes out in the first round really swinging you expect him to use up all his ammunition early and fall flat on his face. This was not true of this week's offering at the Hampton Playhouse. It starts throwing bombs from the opening curtain and maintains the pace right up to the explosive finish.

The big twist at the end will set your head spinning—but it is a deep dark secret which you must find out for yourself. "Catch Me If You Can" gets an A-Okay vote from this corner! HLP

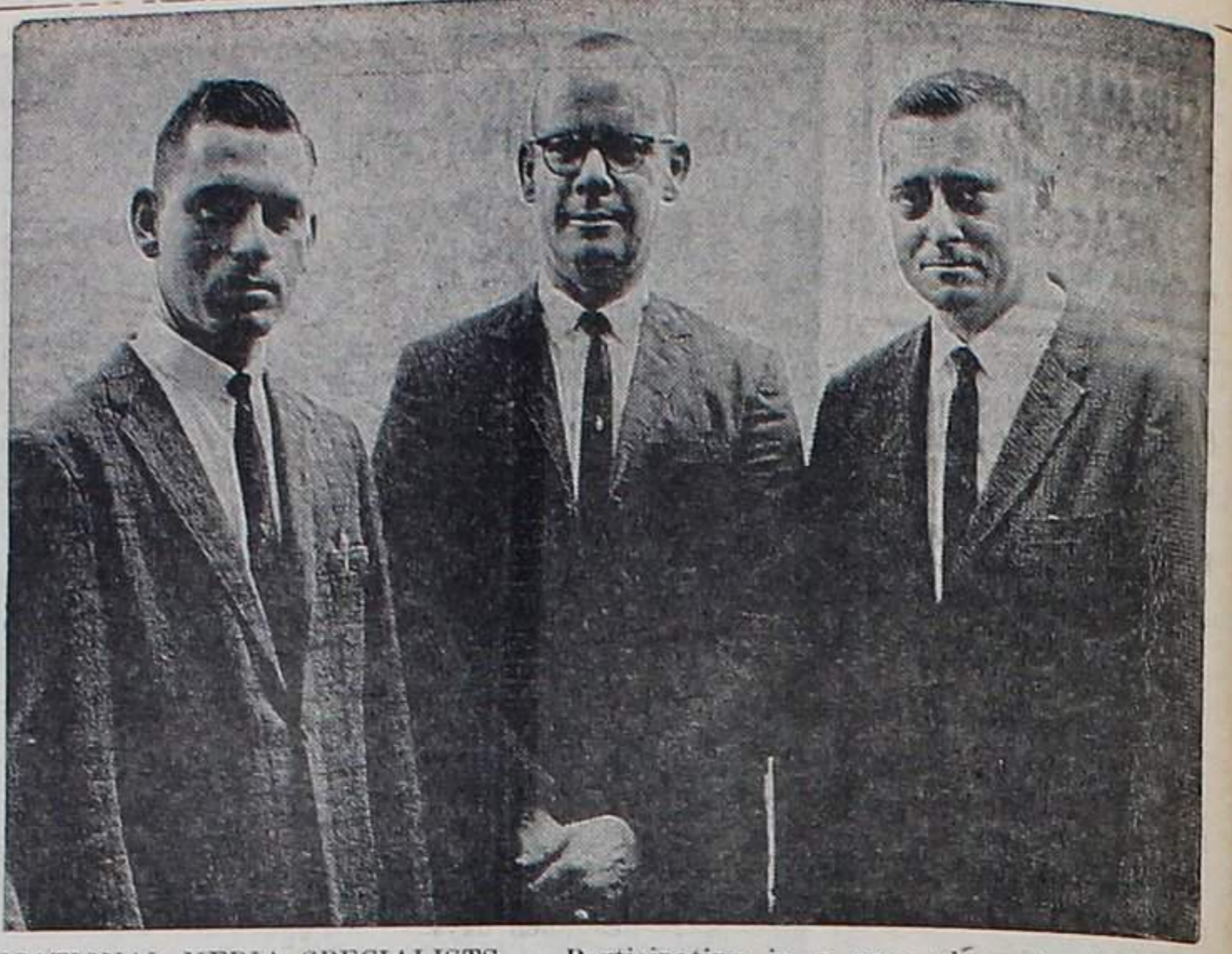

MAN'S RECIPE

Lobster Stew For Two

I cannot remember when I first ate lobster. I don't care for boiled lobsters and all the work involved with axes and hammers, ice picks and tweezers. I like my lobster in a way that I can sit down and enjoy my meal without arduous, wearying labor.

For this easy stew use one five ounce can lobster, two tablespoons butter or margarine, one and a fourth cups whole milk, one fourth cup light cream, one fourth teaspoon salt, one eighth teaspoon pepper, one small can evaporated milk, two tablespoons sherry.

Pick over lobster and remove membranes. Melt butter in top of double boiler; add lobster and the liquid in the can of lobster. Bring this to high heat and add milk, cream, salt, pepper, evaporated milk and sherry.

Bring the mixture again to high heat. Cool. Place in refrigerator for several hours or overnight. Reheat to piping hot before serving. This recipe serves two.

Seraphina's Brownies

A friend asked the other day if I felt that three sisters and no brothers was a handicap to a minister's son. No, if I were analyzing the situation, I would say that it was a help. A minister's son has problems — no question of that. But no one could have had a better childhood and teen-age experience than I. Father taught me nature lore, love of reading and the joy of learning.

This brownie is chewy and moist. Use one half cup plus one tablespoon butter or margarine, one cup sugar, two eggs beaten, one fourth teaspoon vanilla, two and a half squares chocolate melted, one half cup flour, one fourth teaspoon soda, one eighth teaspoon cloves and one cup chopped nuts.

Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs in which vanilla has been mixed and cream some more. Add melted chocolate and blend. Sift in flour, cloves and soda. Mix and beat a couple of minutes. Stir in nuts.

Pour into greased eight by eight pan. Bake at 325 about 40 minutes, or until done. However, watch carefully at the end. An overbaked brownie is an horrendous tragedy.

Winnacunnet, which in Indian language means "Beautiful Land of Pines." The name was later changed to South Hampton in honor of South Hampton, England.

Rev. Bachiler, who lived to be 100 years old, was one of the forebears of John Greenleaf Whittier and Daniel Webster. He was the first pastor of the Congregational Church which was organized in 1638.

Hampton, N. H. is governed by a board of three selectmen and a Town Manager. The budget committee, consisting of 14 members, controls the tax structure under the Municipal Budget Law.

The Hampton Beach Village Precinct, "a town within a town", is governed by 3 precinct commissioners. Taxes are raised for certain services and activities.

The official seal is a central design showing Hampton Academy on a large shield with the name Winnacunnet under it. This is surrounded by a circular design of words stating - TOWN OF HAMPTON, N. H. - SETTLED 1638 - INCORPORATED 1639. This seal was drawn by Hazle Leavitt Smith in 1938 for the Tercentenary celebration.

Bound Rock forms the boundaries of Hampton, Hampton Falls and Seabrook. It is located on the south side of Hampton River Bridge and is considered one of the earliest boundary markers in the United States.

Norsemen's Rock at Surfside Park is thought to be the burial place of Thorvald the Norseman, killed by Indians in 1004. The Tuck-Leavitt Grist Mill on High Street, now owned by the Town for future preservation, is the site of one of the earliest industries in the United States.

Tuck Memorial Park, given in memory of Amos Tuck, consists of an athletic field and historic building, which is open to the public during the summer on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons, 1-5 p.m. A Summer Youth Program is conducted each weekday morning at the athletic field in Hampton Village.

The Town of Hampton has five schools. The Roman Catholic Parochial School, Adeline C. Marston, Centre School, Jr. High School and the Winnacunnet Co-operative High School.

Hampton Kiwanis Club recently built the new Batchelder Park for children. This park includes skating facilities in the winter. Several smaller parks are also included in Hampton, as well as the New Hampshire State Park and bath house at the entrance to Hampton Harbor. Besides the Amos Tuck Athletic Field there is the John C. White Memorial Playground at Hampton Beach.

Hampton is richly endowed with churches, has its own Police and Fire Departments and just about every public utility and community service that the large city throughout the country enjoys.

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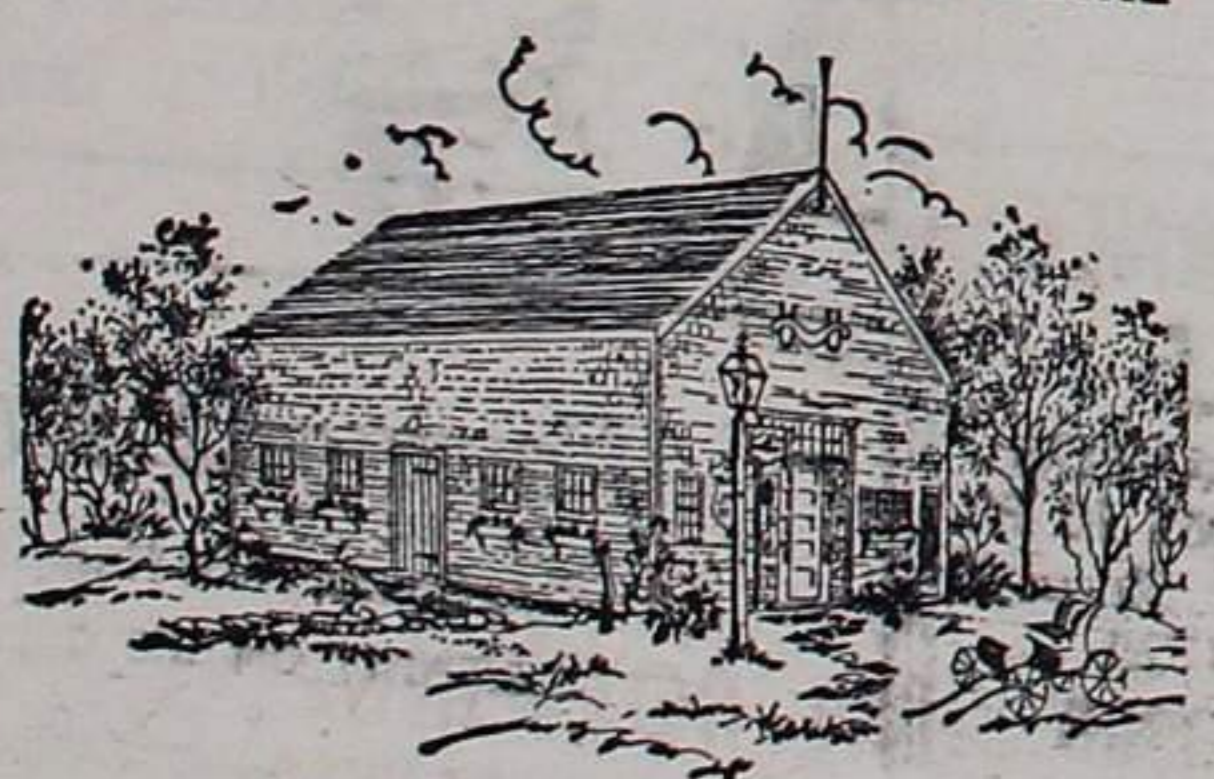

These activities, and others of the year's golden days are just around the proverbial corner, awaiting your enjoyment in the 22 New Hampshire state parks which remain open after Labor Day for those who have learned to appreciate the third season. Then, as at no other time of the year, there is a stillness in the air that bids you to pause, to drink in what you nature can paint to store up a memory, or capture it on film. For foliage viewers, there are many state parks with mountain-top vantage points, others on lakes for boating and fall fly-fishing, several with campgrounds in quiet forests. Many have hiking trails. ## ASC County Committee Election Convention Set

The Rockingham County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee for 1966 will be elected by farmer-chosen delegates to a county convention, on September 13, 1965, at 8 p.m. at the county ASCS office, according to J. Edward Stevens, chairman, ASC county committee. The convention will be open to the public, and any person interested in observing the voting procedure may attend. However, only farmer-delegates to the convention may participate in the election process. Election is by secret ballots. The delegates to the county convention are the chairman, vice chairman and regular member of each community within the county, who have been chosen to serve as community committeemen for 1966. ASC county and community committeemen are in charge of local administration of such farm-action programs as the Agricultural Conservation Program; the Conservation Reserve Program; the Livestock Feed Program; and the National Wool Program. Other duties are assigned to the committee by the Secretary of Agriculture as the need arises.

Any questions on eligibility to hold office as an ASC county committeeman will be decided by the incumbent county committee subject to appeal to the State committee; the convention would proceed, however, on the basis of the county committee decision.

in Franklin, and the Wentworth-Coolidge Mansion in historic Portsmouth. After Labor Day, picnic grounds will be open daily at some state parks and on weekends at others until mid-September and October 12th. For particulars on closing dates, and a brochure describing facilities in the 30 state parks, write to the Division of Parks, Room 304, State House Annex, Concord, N. H.

The tramway operates seven days a week. The Sunapee chairlift, after September 6th, will operate weekends only for the public. Groups of 10 persons or more may make reservations for weekday trips through Manager Richard D. Parker. Except for eight state parks closing on Labor Day for the season, most of the others will remain open until mid-September and Columbus Day. Franconia Notch, including the Flume, is open to October 17; Monadnock State Park in Jaffrey, to November 11th. Those closing their gates on September 6th are: Ellacoya in Gilford, Forest Lake in Dalton, Hampton Beach in Hampton, Milan Hill in Milan, Rhododendron in Fitzwilliam, Eye Harbor in Rye, Wadeigh in North Sutton and Wallis Sands in Rye.
