In Celebration of National Poetry Month



On Thursday night, April 11, it was standing room only as we were entertained by 17 wonderful Hampton Academy students reading their very own writings. The poetry project was to spend about two weeks with us at Tuck Museum researching a piece of Hampton History that interested them (see image below). The poems that were read covered such subjects as Hampton cemeteries, ghosts, shipwrecks, beach life, first responders, and fish houses, to name a few. We were thrilled to host this event again and commend all the students for a fine job!



Building Community Program

It was standing room only in Tuck Hall for the first program of the year, *Building Community - Twenty Influential Women of Hampton, NH* on March 27th.

Mary Ann Nelligan and Karen Raynes did extensive research into the lives of twenty women from Hampton, spanning a time period from the mid 1600s to present. They took to the podium to introduce the ladies that they both had become quite close to during their eighteen months of investigation. Now the stories could be told.



They focused on women that had done remarkable things but were comparatively unknown.

With their individual stories an item from the Tuck Museums' collection was shown - a painting by artist Norma Torti, titled "Wielding Hysteria" about witchcraft pertaining to Rachel Braybrook Fuller; a podium made of wood from the original Hampton Academy for a pioneer in education, Elizabeth Knight Webster; Jesse Merrill Toppan's wedding dress; a milk bottle from Elsa Aitken Johnson's dairy farm; a Hampton dog tag from Helen Worledge Hayden's time as town clerk.

After the presentation attendees gathered for refreshments in the Building Community room, where recipes from eight of the women were enjoyed along with viewing the exhibit about the twenty women.

A book, *Building Community - Twenty Influential Women of Hampton, NH* is in the process of being edited and published on Amazon. We will be selling the book in the Tuck Museum gift shop. An e-blast will be sent out by the Hampton Historical Society when the book is available.

Did You Know?

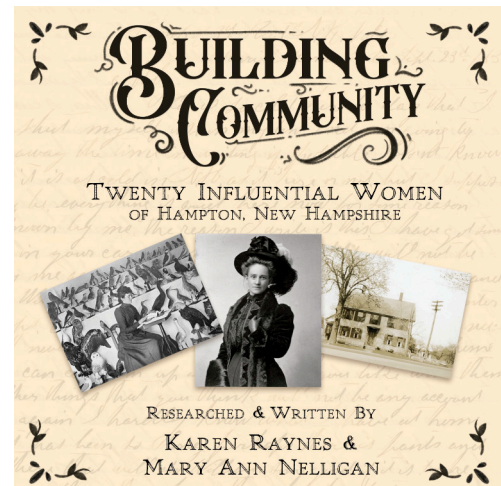
Long ago, in 1925, Mr. Ira Jones, a local retired minister and funeral director made a promise to some civic minded friends...that he would help to create a place that could preserve the town's memorabilia and history. He was 89 years old! He sought the help of his friend, retired banker Edward Tuck (at the young age of 83) to help finance his ideas, and together they formed the Meeting House Green Memorial and Historical Association. The creation of a memorial park, hall and playing fields (now Tuck Field) were the objects of their desires, and thus our historical Society was born!



Edward Tuck had long ancestral ties to Hampton, his family being one of the early settlers and tavern keeper, Robert Tuck. His father Amos Tuck, who married into another generational Hampton family, the Nudds, was a graduate of Hampton Academy and Dartmouth College, becoming a lawyer, abolitionist and congressman.

Edward graduated, like his father, from Dartmouth College in 1862, and was appointed by his father's friend, President Abraham Lincoln, to a diplomatic post in Paris, France, where he remained for most of his life, but still dedicated himself to his beloved state of New Hampshire, helping to fund New Hampshire Historical Society, monuments on Star Island, Stratham Hill Park and the Exeter Cottage Hospital, to name a few. New Enlarged Manning Banner Exhibit

In the July, 2023 issue of the newsletter, I announced our new display of the Manning Banner at the Tuck Museum. This initial display only showed the first half of the banner at a fairly large size, wall space at the museum being at a premium. I mentioned in the article that having a high resolution image of the banner was in some ways better than having the physical banner itself, saying, "we are free to display it in various ways and at various sizes."

Well, I didn't know how quickly this would become true. For 2024 we have moved the Manning Banner exhibit into the main area of the museum and are now displaying the land areas of the full banner (instead of only the first half) in a detailed 50% size (6 feet long). Visitors have been fascinated to view the details of this plan from the early 1930s and what might have happened to the environment of the area had the plan been completed.

Happy Spring from the Programs Committee! We're pleased to share with you our current plan for a wide variety of events for 2024! As you'll see below, our Programs calendar has something for everyone.

We began our year's events on March 27th with a program entitled "Building Community: Twenty Influential Women of Hampton NH" which was researched, written, and presented by Karen Raynes and Mary Ann Nelligan. The standing-room-only crowd was entertained and enlightened by the wonderful presentation about women of our community from the 1600s to present day.

In celebration of National Poetry Month, we held our annual Poetry Night on April 11th. This event featured students from Hampton Academy Junior High who selected, researched, and created a poem about a topic from Hampton history. This annual event is always a great opportunity to give some of the talented young poets in our community a chance to share their work with their family and friends. On May 21st, author Kathleen Bailey will discuss her book *New Hampshire War Monuments: The Stories Behind the Stones* that explores the stories behind NH's war monuments, memorials, and other tributes to our war dead, including our own Marine Memorial at Hampton Beach. This event, fitting for the month in which we celebrate Memorial Day, will be held at the museum at 7:00 p.m.

The Vikings will return to the Green this year for the weekend of June 7th – 9th! They will set up their encampment and demonstrate various aspects of the way of life of a Viking. More details about specific times for various demonstrations and activities on Saturday and Sunday will be provided as we get closer, but please put this great event for kids and adults on your calendar!



If you've ever thought about capturing your family's history, but weren't quite sure how to go about that, our event in July could be just what you're looking for. Join us on July 20th for *Family, Memory, Place: Writing Family Stories*. This NH Humanities To Go program will focus on capturing family stories that are part of personal, generational, and communal history and will be held in the large room of the Hampton Recreation and Senior Center, 34 Park Avenue (near the Tuck Museum) at 2:00 p.m.

September will be a busy and interesting month for us as we will go back in time to meet two very important figures from our nation's history. We'll begin on the morning of September 1 when we welcome the "Marquis de

Lafayette" as he makes his bicentennial return, arriving at Tuck Museum from approximately 10:30 - 11:30 a.m.

Then on September 18th, we'll have the opportunity to meet "John Adams" and join in a lively and revolutionary conversation with America's Second President. This amusing and informative reenactment will be co-hosted by and held at the Lane Library at 7:00 p.m.

And as has been the case for the past three years, October will bring our annual Fall Festival with games, food, a petting zoo, and entertainment for all ages! This family-friendly event will be held from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on Oct 13th on the museum grounds.
