Schoolhouse Restoration Report and Gardens

The schoolhouse restoration is winding down for the year. It's been a wonderful team-building experience and work will continue as weather permits.

We started in May with enthusiastic volunteers doing demolition. By the end of May a dedicated core group showed up every Tuesday and Thursday without fail. Our tasks included replacing rotted window frames and siding parts, sanding and cleaning salvaged original clapboards, reapplying siding to exacting specifications, fabricating flat exterior crown molding and corner boards, caulking, priming and painting.

These activities gave the crew the opportunity to learn proper restoration techniques and to become more skillful using a variety of hand and power tools. For example, we mastered laying out clapboard siding with the use of a story pole and making scarf joints. Another skill learned was how to side a gable end using only one dimension and the roof pitch and no other measurements.

Credit for all that has been accomplished goes to the restoration team of Mike Stiers, Ben Moore, Mike Compos, Mark McFarlin and Gary Grashow. And thanks also to those who assisted with demo: Lori Cotter, Ed Baechtold, Jim Metcalf, Pat Bushway and Betty Moore.

Gardens were not forgotten this year, although it has been a weird year weatherwise. After a normal start July turned very wet and was followed by an abundance of 90 degree days. In late October we had still not experienced a frost. Annuals were flowering and, of course, weeds were spreading. We had a lot of help maintaining our lovely gardens this year. Special thanks to Mike and Kathy Compos, Marilyn Wallingford, Karen Raynes, Joe O'Neil and Betty and Ben Moore for their work.

Collection Manager Annual Report 2021

While the museum was closed to the public, the Collection Committee chugged along throughout the pandemic, just slowing down for the winter months. When we started up again in April, I did not comprehend how much I had missed the people I work with who are my “museum family.” Nothing like a common goal to bond people together!

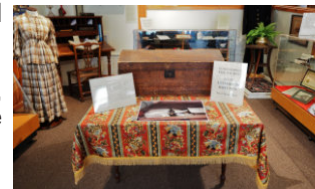
When assembling the Dow exhibit, I learned how little credit has been given to Josiah Page and Lucy Dow in recording Hampton history. Josiah did much of the genealogy work in his cousin's *History of Hampton* and is mentioned in the preface of the book; but Dow never acknowledged the monumental work of his daughter, Lucy, who ultimately ended up finishing his book and was responsible for its publication after her father's death. I started thinking about all the other people over the years who had documented our history and were not recognized. So, I started a “Hampton Historians” project listing all the people that had contributed to recording, interpreting, and preservation of Hampton's history, whether they were involved in the HHS or not. The list grew to include artists, teachers, researchers, writers, librarians, and even musicians. I did not think the project would be that complex, but I was wrong. Now we have this information in one location and can add to it over time.

We continue documenting our own institutional history. In 2015, a master volunteer list was developed, going back to the original founders in 1925, so we updated that list to 2021. Currently, the count is over 600 people having furthered the mission of the society by volunteering in some capacity.

This year our Building and Grounds Committee undertook restoration of one of the largest items in the collection (2020.464) – our 1850s one room district schoolhouse (see pages 2-3). Thanks go to Chair, Gary Grashow, and his talented crew, who have been out working on the building two days a week since spring. The craftsmanship of the project is first rate, and we are fortunate that they were willing and have the skill to undertake this important project. It was hard to explain to visitors the 1970s vinyl siding when giving a tour of a building over 170 years old. When finished, the schoolhouse will interpret Hampton's early education system more authentically.

Additional accomplishments:

- Over 500 new collection records were added this year – the work of Carol Keating, Carol Angelari, Mary Ertl, Mary Ann Nelligan, and Betty Moore.
- Rich Hureau continued his photography of important collection items, added collection content to the website, and scanned photographs for the HHS image database.
- Karen Raynes created a walking tour brochure of Hampton Center and provided monthly history articles in the Hampton Union using the collection resources.
- Mounted the exhibit “How History is Written” with assistance from Kathy McLaughlin, Cheryl Lassiter, Karen Raynes, Ann Carnaby, Marsha Hannon-Buber, and Joshua Silveira.
- Research assistance offered as we worked with our terrific in-house researcher Lori Cotter, as well as PHD candidates, authors, home schoolers, and museum visitors, making the collection accessible to as many as possible.
- Collaborated with town commissions and agencies including the Heritage Commission, Conservation Commission, Hampton Master Plan committee, and Lane Memorial Library.
- Inventory records were updated by Ben Moore, who inventoried all the collection files and updated the accession and vertical files.
- Refreshed the outdoor wayfinding cases and exhibits with new graphics and updated text.
- Completed conservation work on Charles Henry Turner's oil painting “Hampton Mill.”



It takes many people to make this committee run efficiently. Elizabeth Aykroyd and Karen Raynes work with me on following our collection policy. Kathy McLaughlin, Liz Premo and Rich Hureau handle requests for newspaper, internet, and website publicity relating to exhibits and collection issues. Our museum guides are important in telling our story through the collection. The HHS Board of Trustees approves and finds funding for the projects the committee brings forward. However, we can only accomplish this through the assistance of our members. Your generosity and support enable us to do so much!

Community Engagement Committee Annual Report

This is my first report as the chair of the Community Engagement Committee, and it's certainly been an unusual start for me in this position! But even with COVID restrictions continuing into 2021, we did manage to have some interesting events, beginning with a program by NH Humanities entitled "Wit and Wisdom: Humor in 19th Century New England" on April 28th. This was the first of two programs conducted online and co-sponsored with the Lane Library.

As the year and COVID went on and we continued to look for events that could be held either outdoors or online, the next event was the Pine Grove Cemetery Tour, conducted by Betty Moore and Lori Cotter. That turned out to be "Tours" because the first iteration on July 17th was such a big hit that Betty and Lori did a second tour on August 7th to accommodate all those who wanted to participate.

The second online event conducted collaboratively with the library was presented on August 26th. "Whaling Captains of Color: America's First Meritocracy" by author Skip Finley gave us an insight into the early history of whaling off the coast of New England, with particular focus on the challenges of captains of color.

On September 22, the Associate Director of the UNH Shoals Marine Laboratory, David Buck, presented "The Human and Natural History of Appledore Island," our next online event. We learned about the cultural and natural history of the island, as well as the marine science initiatives in which the Laboratory is engaged.

October 10th brought us to our first-ever Fall Festival, a family-friendly event held on the museum grounds that included live entertainment, music, games, and food (see pictures at right and elsewhere). It was a great day of fun for all who attended, and we look forward to doing it again next year.

Our annual meeting was held online on October 17th, and Betty Moore took us through a look inside Joseph's Trunk, a trunk purchased by the HHS that once belonged to Joseph Dow and contains much of the information he used to write his history of Hampton.

With the uncertainty of COVID still impacting our planning, we've decided to forego the December Open House that we would have held this year, and we'll look forward to an even bigger and brighter holiday celebration next year. We're currently working on the programs and events for next year, so keep an eye out for those announcements!

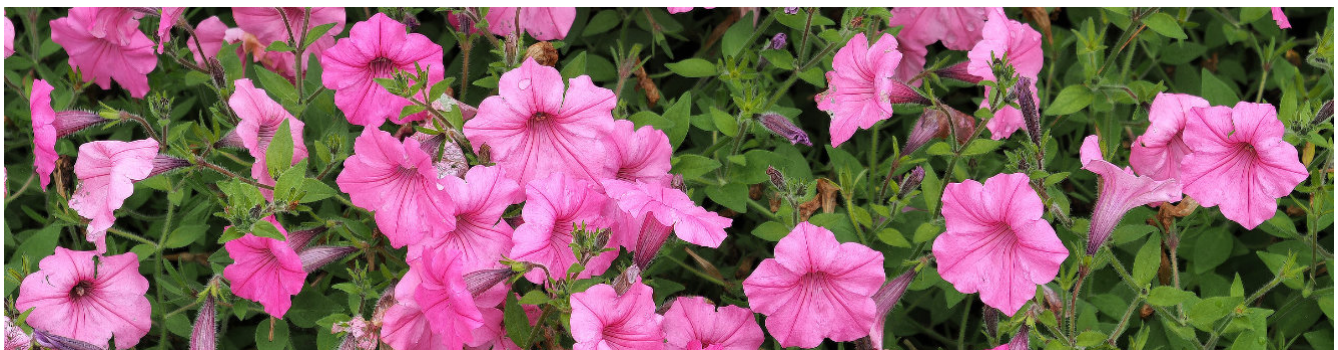

October 17th 2021**

The meeting was called to order at 6:34 by President Linda Metcalf.

Minutes of the October 15th, 2020 Annual Meeting: It was noted that the 2020 Annual Meeting minutes had been posted on the HHS website all year, and, that they had been presented to the trustees prior to this meeting via email for review. There was no discussion of the minutes. Motion to accept the 2020 meeting minutes was made by Michael Stiers and seconded by Rich Hureau. Motion passed unanimously.

Report of the HHS Nominating Committee: Mike Compos

In addition to Mike, this year's nominating committee consisted of Betty Moore, Jim Metcalf, Mark McFarlin and Kathy Compos. Linda Metcalf also provided a valuable lead that resulted in a one new trustee member.

Motion to adjourn the business portion of the Annual Meeting was made and unanimously approved at 6:42 – even faster than last year!

After the business meeting, Collections chairperson Betty Moore gave a very interesting talk/slideshow on 'Joseph's Trunk.' This trunk, which belonged to Joseph Dow, came into the HHS collection fairly recently and contains a fascinating collection of artifacts from Hampton's earliest days, which formed the basis of Mr. Dow's well-known history of Hampton and an in-depth look at the town's founding residents.

The meeting ended at 7:22.
