Director's Report

Between carpentry, painting and gardening the museum has been bustling with activity all summer long.

The tourist cabin (at right) was scraped and painted using the original colors - white clapboards with the traditional New England dark green trim thanks to Sammi Moe, Kelley McLean and Ben Moore. The cabin was thought to be c.1950 but upon additional research we found it was built in the late 1930s and was originally part of Young's Cabins on 877 Ocean Boulevard. The interior of the building has the original pine paneled walls, a built-in eating area and a combination stove/sink/refrigerator unit. We are looking for a metal headboard for a double bed that would have been typically been found in one of these units. Work still needs to be done in the bathroom as the floor was being held together with a lot of imagination and a little bit of vinyl.

We are using this cabin as an opportunity to gain more information about the other cabins and motel units that were scattered in the Hampton-Hampton Beach area and would appreciate any photos, stories or memories that any of you have as we try to capture some of the 20th century history of the town. We have developed a small questionnaire as a starting point but hope that participants go beyond that in providing information.

Visitors are even getting into the act. Jim Fones,

Catherine Fletcher's son, while here on vacation has replaced and rewired outside lighting fixtures on the fire museum and main building entrances and added security lighting to the Green side of the museum. Houseguests everywhere beware...

The beauty of our grounds are due to the mature trees that were planted in the 1920s, so we are establishing a replacement program as the older trees die off or are damaged by storms. This summer Ben Moore removed some dead and dying trees and ground out the old tree stumps. We planted an American Liberty Elm from the Elm Research Institute donated through the generosity of Bruce Booth. The 12 ft tree arrived by common carrier in a cardboard box in perfect condition (the driver said he had never delivered a tree before). This summer we have shared our grounds with the Rockingham County Craftsmen, the Hampton Area Community Band and the Rotary Club for former town manager, James Barrington's farewell party.

In the Winter 2005 issue of the Gatherings From the Green Elizabeth Aykroyd wrote an article on the red broadcloth woman's cloak given to the museum by Betsey Davis. This garment had been passed down through the Philbrick family and we were thrilled to add it to the collection. About that time I read an article on research being done for a book on clothing and textile collections in the US co-authored by Sally Queen, a well respected 18th and 19th century textile spe-They were compiling information the holdings of different museums, institutions and private collections so we submitted our information along with a photograph of the cape. Out of 2600 entries listed in this publication we were one of the 250 photos chosen for the book. Not too bad for little Hampton.

Barn Raising Update



If you attended the Pig Roast you will have noticed the progress on the barn. Bents 1 and 4 (the north and south gable ends) have been laid out on the foundation and repair work on the timbers in those bents continues. The posts on the gable ends had suffered the most damage from weather, animals and insects over the 200 years of our barns history and those posts have been replaced and repaired as necessary to insure that the barn has another 200 years on its new location. Several girths, a cross tie and wind braces have also been repaired replaced. By the end of September these bends will be squared up and ready. The interior bents 2 and 3 are expected to require fewer repairs and will be worked on following the completion of the gable ends. How far we make it on the project this fall is still a matter of conjecture, stop by in the mornings from Monday to Friday each week and see the work in progress.

Our members Chet Riley, Dave DeGagne, and Percy Annis are doing the timber framing work. The amount of time and energy that these faithful volunteers have provided is amazing, the Society owes them a huge thank you. Other members have been involved in the project over the summer as we relocat-



ed the timbers from storage and completed the new sills. Our thanks go to Bud DesRochers,

Doug Aykroyd, Chuck Weinhold and Ben Moore for their assistance during the summer on the work.

Fund raising, of course, continues to complete the project. We have raised \$32,000 towards our need of \$60,000. While the Pig Roast benefits the operation of the Museum we did have a raffle at this year's event that specifically benefited the barn. The JetBlue Airlines ticket raffle raised \$1,100 for the Barn fund. Our gratitude goes to Bryon and Sammi Moe for organizing the raffle, to JetBlue Airways for the donation, and to all who purchased a chance. Congratulations to Pat Morgenstern, who won the tickets.

We are rightfully excited about this addition to the Museum's collection and need the continued support of the community and membership to get the job done, please help with your donation.

Life's Little Challenges

The "office with a sink" is soon to be known as 'kitchen with a desk". As many things in life, emergencies are the impetus behind the priority in which projects are accomplished. The museum is no exception. Since our first Long Range Plan in 1990 and the recommendation of the MAP Grant (Museum Assessment Program) conducted through the American Association of Museums-updating this area was near the top of both lists.

It reached a critical point when the floor started lifting in front of the sink expanding in size daily. When a section of wall was opened, a four-foot crack in the cast iron air vent that goes to the roof was found to be the cause (not good). As the waterlines to the sink were removed to replace the venting, the plumbing literally disintegrated (getting worse). This was also tied into the exposed water supply lines from the former

upstairs bathroom that ran up the kitchen wall and across the ceiling showing evidence of many leaks and problems over the years (see where this is heading). All in all pretty messy.

The small and inefficiently charming cabinets will be replaced (but saved) with up-to- date cabinetry and we will be adding full size appliances to replace the tiny dorm-style refrigerator and twenty year old microwave. Members have volunteered their skills to help complete the project. We hope by years-end to have the room completed.

The removal of the old plumbing fixtures in the former bathroom will provide greatly needed manuscript storage space and the renovation of the office area offers more options in the quality of services we can provide our members, volunteers and visitors.
