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Collection and Exhibit Committee Annual Report

In 2024, we accomplished an unbelievable amount of work. Normally we process about 200 records each year into our database; this year we completed 500! Currently we have over 8,700 records in this collection – many of them represent multiple items.

This year's collection goal was to finish pulling sensitive materials (documents, photos, objects from the Fernald Containers), which was accomplished. Then the building and grounds committee did extensive work on the Seacoast Fire Museum (see Gary Grashow's report at right and more pictures below) and we cataloged all the items in the building since everything but the fire engine was emptied out for the renovations.

There are a lot of people to thank who make our collection management function: Diane Riley (data entry); Ben Moore (filing and data entry); Carol Keating, Mary Ertl, Bruce Fuller, and Ben Moore (cataloging); Ann Carnaby (textile issues). Rich Hureau is an "honorary" member of our committee – this year he re-photographed our glass plate negatives and finished converting the last of the Fernald slides for easier use.

Our feature exhibit for the year was *Building Community Twenty Influential Women of Hampton* – thanks to Karen Raynes and Mary Ann Nelligan. Their research evolved from an exhibit, to a program, to a book (which will be available soon). The shipwreck exhibit – *Seeking Safe Harbor* – was reworked and moved to the main exhibit area.

A wall exhibit — *Prophecy for Hampton* — was mounted, expanding on the 1930s Manning Plan for the development of Hampton Beach, thanks to Rich Hureau, Karen Raynes, Pat Bushway, and Lori Cotter. Lori also set up a mini exhibit to coordinate with Lafayette's bicentennial celebration visit to Hampton on September 1.

If you are looking for an interesting and rewarding way to spend a few hours a week, consider joining us! You can explore your creativity with exhibits and research; if you are detailed oriented, cataloguing may be for you; or if you enjoy people and want to learn more about Hampton history, you may want to give tours. Training is provided, as are great refreshments!

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Announcing the HHS Centennial Fund

Betty and Ben Moore's dedication and generosity have helped sustain the Hampton Historical Society since they began volunteering in 1988. Now Betty and Ben have set up a new trust fund at the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation and named HHS as the beneficiary. The fund is named "HHS Centennial Fund". They have seeded the fund with \$90,000 in 2024, and they plan to add another \$10,000 in 2025, the centennial year of the Tuck Museum. The NH Charitable Foundation invests the money and provides a distribution of the profits to the designated charitable organization each year, but it doesn't touch the principal. Annual distributions in recent years have been between 3.5% and 4.5%, which means that the HHS Centennial Fund will provide approximately \$3,500 to \$4,500 to HHS every year.

The Moore's generosity is intended to help assure HHS solvency in the future, and it will go a long way toward that goal. However, more is needed. HHS is now launching the HHS Centennial Fund Campaign with the intent to increase the Fund significantly during the Tuck Museum's Centennial in October 2025.

Important Note: Do not make the check payable to the Hampton Historical Society and mail it to HHS. HHS cannot accept your check and add it to the Fund, as the society is prohibited from doing that. Only individuals may add to the Fund, and they must contribute directly to the NH Charitable Foundation.

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Program Committee Annual Report

Happy Fall from the Program Committee! 2024 has been a year of interesting and varied events that offered a little something of interest for everyone. Here's a brief recap:

On March 27th Mary Ann Nelligan and Karen Raynes presented their project *Building Community: Twenty Influential Women of Hampton NH*. This extensive work highlighted women of interest in our community from the mid-1600s to the mid-1900s to honor and recognize women of Hampton through the centuries. The accomplishment of these women ranged from Hampton Academy teacher to World War II nurse to hotelier at Hampton Beach and even a taxidermist. This event was a true crowd-pleaser!


In April to recognize National Poetry Month, we conducted our annual poetry event for Hampton Academy Junior High students. Lori Cotter and Lisa Barreto worked with the students as they wrote a poem about a topic of their choosing from Hampton history. The young poets presented their work to a standing-room-only crowd of family and friends on April 18th.

In May, the month in which we pay tribute to those who have fallen in the defense of our nation, we had a presentation of the book entitled *New Hampshire War Monuments: The Stories Behind The Stones*. On May 14th, author Kathleen Bailey took us through the history behind NH's war monuments, memorials, and other tributes to the fallen. It was a fitting remembrance in preparation for Memorial Day.





June brought the return of the Vikings to the Green! On June 8th, the Vikings recreated the life that these warriors lived over 1,000 years ago.
