Save Our Sanford (S.O.S.)!

The combined team of Hampton Historical Society members and members of the Professional Firefighters of Hampton, Local 2664 are continuing their work in support of Project Save Our Sanford (S.O.S). This intends to provide a permanent home for the Sanford pumper (pictured below), purchased by the town of Hampton in 1924. Additional details on the history of the firetruck were provided in the July newsletter.



Having determined that this very significant piece of Hampton history should remain in Hampton, and that the truck would be a wonderful addition to the Fire Museum on the grounds of Tuck Museum, the committee is working hard to make that happen. The new addition to the Fire Museum building, designed by Gary Grashow, will showcase the REO/Sanford Pumper and will fit nicely onto the back of the current Fire Museum across from the Recreation Center.

Creating this new home for the Sanford will require financial support, and to that end we're seeking donations from members of the community who are interested in being a part of this project to build a permanent location for the Sanford. Witches, the Bible, and Two Chronicles

It is always a plus to have unplanned publicity for the museum, so when Sean McDonald of WMUR New Hampshire Chronicle called, we were ready to welcome them to the museum to tell our history about Hampton witches. It's that time of the year when Ole Goody Cole gets dusted off and tells her story.

HHS President Lori Cotter told them that we had more to share about witches in Hampton than just famous witch Goody Cole with our recently installed shelf exhibit, "There Was More Than One Witch in Hampton."



Witchy things have been happening around the museum recently. When I was installing the new exhibit in Tuck Hall one late afternoon by myself, I heard a loud 'thunk' and got up to find that the Bible, one of the books that mentions witches, wizards and sorcerers, [Exodus 22:18 "Wizards thou shalt not suffer to live."] had fallen from the shelf. I quietly and reverently picked the Bible up and replaced it back on the shelf, where it remains today.

Lori and I also found the date and time for the interview fortuitous: month 10, day 10 at 10 a.m. The number 10 connects the physical world with the spiritual world – how appropriate to our interview.

On the day of the interview, Sean and cameraman arrived along with North Hampton artist Norma Torti, who painted *Wielding Hysteria*, the large centerpiece for the witch exhibit. All was going well except I had a coughing fit and then, as I was being interviewed, the museum phone began ringing. Those pesky witches again at work.

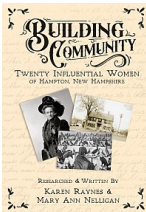

2025 Collection and Exhibit Report

Merrily we roll along...

This year's activities saw over 550 items entered into our database thanks to the work of Carol Keating, Bruce Fuller, Mary Ertl, Lynn Larsen, Ben Moore, Diane Riley and me. We are almost at the point of having most of the items catalogued and now will just need to keep up with new donations. This means that we can begin to do specialized projects that have intrigued us over the years but have never been top priority. Bruce and Lynn are new to the collection team; Carol has been doing this for almost 18 years – I'm sure she is delighted to see light at the end of the tunnel!



Karen Raynes continues to move in many directions, from the video produced for the HHS 100th anniversary with Mike Garland, Josh Silveira, and the help of many others, to writing a series of articles with Mary Ann Nelligan featuring Hampton houses for the local papers using research from our collection. The duo also published their book *Building Community – Twenty Influential Women of Hampton, NH* based on research from an exhibit and program they developed by the same name.

Speaking of exhibits

In the main exhibit area, Karen created an exhibit titled "Temperance," focusing on how the temperance movement affected Hampton, which was a tie-in to our 1920s theme for the year. She also instituted "shelf exhibits" – 2-month exhibits that rotated through our research library, utilizing artifacts and books pulled from our collection. They have included: General Moulton, Miss Hampton Beach, Baseball, curated by Lori Cotter, and The Other Witches of Hampton.

Audit Committee Annual Report

The Society thanks Joanne Castiglione for her services as auditor of the HHS FY 2023-24 financial statements. The audit was a success, and no significant issues were found. Joanne pointed out some ways where the bookkeeping could be made more efficient, and those recommendations have been implemented. In an effort to share financial results with the membership and public, the HHS IRS filing, Form 990, will be available on the web site soon after it is submitted in December.

Mission

The mission of the Hampton Historical Society is to increase public knowledge and understanding of the history and cultural heritage of the town of Hampton, New Hampshire, from its earliest inhabitants to the present generation. We will communicate that history through an active museum, educational programs, and a resource library.

Greetings from the Program Committee!

Like so many of the HHS members and volunteers, the Programs Committee focused on the wonderful events in celebration of the 100th anniversary of the museum. Members of the Programs Committee joined the quilt team and made a quilt square of their choosing. Other members helped with the various events when and where they were needed. Now, after our year in support, the committee has reconvened and we're excited to present our tentative schedule of events for 2026!

As 2026 will be the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, we're kicking off the program year in March with the "Women of 76" by actress Rita Parisi of Amesbury, MA. Ms Parisi will introduce us to some of the women, loyalist and patriot, American born and foreign, who witnessed and, in some cases, changed the course of the American Revolution. The event will recognize both Women's History Month and the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence and will be held on March 26 **24** at 6 p.m. at the Lane Memorial Library.

April is National Poetry Month, and we'll celebrate with our annual Poetry Event featuring Hampton Academy students presenting their own original work that will also focus on the 250th anniversary. The students will select, research, and create a poem about a topic from Hampton history in the time of the Declaration of Independence. The students will present their work at 6:30 p.m. on April 16th in the multi-purpose room of the Recreation Center across from the museum.



And, since the Trolley Tour for our 100th anniversary was so popular (photo on left), we've decided to do it again next year! Plan to join us on June 4th for this narrated tour of historical sites in Hampton and learn more about buildings and places around our community. There will be two tours, one at 3 p.m. and one at 4 p.m. to accommodate all who want another opportunity to see and learn more about Hampton.

As a number of folks have expressed an interest in seeing the behind-the-scenes work that goes on at the museum's Collection and Research Center (CRC) located on Lafayette Road, we'll be having an Open House there on July 18th and 19th from 1 – 3 p.m. This event is free, but we will ask that you RSVP so that we can ensure everyone has a good opportunity to see the historical treasures that are located there.

On August 22nd, we'll have a full day of interesting things to do and see on the museum grounds that we're calling "Textiles and Treasures." In the barn we'll have a textiles exhibit that will include a quilt display and a spinning and weaving demonstration. After enjoying that, visitors will have the opportunity to explore and possibly buy antiques and collectibles that will be displayed on the Meeting House Green. Stayed tuned for more information on this fun and interesting day!

As we continue to commemorate the signing of the Declaration of Independence, there will be a tour of Ring Swamp Cemetery on October 24th at 1 p.m. This tour will focus on veterans of the Revolutionary War and will also include some very interesting stories about some of those that are at rest there.



We'll wrap up the year with the annual town Tree Lighting on the Green on December 4th at 7 p.m. Children of all ages can visit Santa's Workshop in the barn and take advantage of the opportunity to write a letter to Santa in the schoolhouse. There will even be a chance to do some Christmas shopping in the museum! This is one you won't want to miss!

We're excited about our events for the upcoming year, please watch for updates. We hope that you'll join us to commemorate the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence and continue to expand your knowledge of Hampton history.

Buildings and Grounds Committee Report 2025

Beginning in November 2024 and continuing through September 2025, our volunteers worked Wednesdays and Fridays and completed many projects.

We started the year working in the museum. Nearly (75) lightbulbs were upgraded to energy efficient LEDs. By adjusting the color temperature and the intensity of the light, the new bulbs helped to unify each room and eliminate harsh glare.

The meeting room needed a makeover. We repaired the ceiling and restored the plaster walls. A new wall color brightened up the space.

Spring arrived and work began on the museum's front steps, its handicap ramp and railings. The cottage front landing was repaired too. Upon completion of the work, all areas were re-stained.

There's always more to do. Many exterior doors were painted, and any necessary upgrades were addressed. Several broken windows were repaired.

Lots of limbs were removed around the property and the gardens were attended to masterfully.

Thanks to everyone who volunteered. Consider joining our work crew in the coming year. Learn new skills and make new friends.
